Dangerous Shoal south-eastward of Zebayir Islands.

Information has been received through the Political Resident, Aden, that Commander W. U. Moore, H. M.'s surveying vessel *Penguin*, reports that a Coral Shoal with 22 feet water over it has been discovered in latitude 14° 57' 24" N., longitude 42° 20' 21" E. From it the summit of Zebayir bears N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. distant 10.7 miles. This shoal has not been thoroughly examined; it should be avoided, and vessels should not pass eastward of the Zebayir Islands.

BY HER MAJESTY'S HIGH COURT OF
JUDICATURE.

APPELLATE SIDE.

The Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges are pleased to amend High Court Civil Circular No. 96 at pages 59 to 63 of the Circular Order Book as under:—

96. The following Resolutions of Government are republished for information as amended by subsequent Resolutions:—

Bombay Castle, 24th January 1880.

No. 499.—In all cases in which, under the provisions of paragraph 1 of Section 320 of the Code of Civil Procedure, the execution of certain decrees has been, or may hereafter be, transferred to the Collector, the Governor in Council is pleased, in exercise of the powers conferred by paragraph 2 of the aforesaid section, and in supersession of the rules published under date the 16th December 1878, to prescribe the following rules for the transmission of such decrees from the Court to the Collector, and for regulating the procedure of the Collector and his subordinates in executing the same, and for re-transmitting the said decrees from the Collector to the Court,* namely:—

1. If the Court shall be satisfied that the decree is one to which this notification applies, it shall cause a copy thereof to be forwarded to the Collector by post or in such other manner as shall be most convenient.

2. Along with the said copy, the Court shall send—

- (a) A copy of the judgment, if any, of the Court which passed the decree;
- (b) If the decree is that of an Appellate Court, a copy of the judgment of the Court which tried the suit originally, and when there has been a special or second appeal, of the judgment of the first Appellate Court;
- (c) A statement showing the extent, if any to which the decree has been already executed, and clearly setting forth what portion of the decree still remains to be satisfied;
- (d) A copy of the application for execution of the decree, and of the order, if any, made thereon for sale.

3. The aforesaid documents shall be prepared and transmitted to the Collector, free of all cost to the parties; the copies, &c., being prepared by the Court's establishment.

4. On receipt of the decree and of the other documents mentioned in Rule 2, the Collector may either proceed to execute it himself, or may refer it for execution, subject to his supervision and control, to any of his subordinates not lower in rank than a Mahalkari.

* The Governor of Bombay in Council is (also) pleased to declare that inasmuch as doubts have arisen whether a Notification published under the provisions of Section 320 of the Civil Procedure Code affects the execution of decrees by the Courts of Jaghirdars empowered under Regulation XIII of 1830 to execute their own decrees, such Notification is not to be deemed to extend to the decrees of Jaghirdars invested with jurisdiction under Regulation XIII of 1830. (Added: See *Government Gazette* for 1882, page 557).

5. The Collector, or the officer to whom the Collector so refers the decree, shall, without delay, appoint a day for hearing any representations which the parties, or any of them, may desire to make, as to the manner in which the decree should be executed, and shall cause a written notice to be served on each of the parties to the decree of the day so fixed, and shall also require the judgment-debtor to produce all title-deeds and other documents affecting the property in question which may be in his possession or power; and shall, after such enquiry as he considers necessary, proceed according to the methods prescribed by Sections 321 to 325-C of the Civil Procedure Code, as may be appropriate to the nature of the case.

6. The Collector, or other officer aforesaid, may, from time to time, by similar written notices require the attendance of the parties to the decree, or any of them, for the purpose of ascertaining their wishes, or of obtaining any information which he may consider necessary to enable him to provide satisfactorily for the execution of the decree; and if any party does not attend in pursuance of any such notice, the Collector, or other officer aforesaid, shall decide the matter in his absence, and he shall not afterwards be entitled to be heard with respect thereto (*Bombay Government Gazette* for 1880, Part I, pages 96 and 97).

7. Every such notice, and every notice which the Collector shall issue under Section 324 of the Code of Civil Procedure to the judgment-debtor or his representative, may be served in the manner prescribed by Section 191 of the Bombay Land Revenue Code, or by forwarding the same to the Court to be served upon the pleader, if any, of the party to whom such notice is addressed.

Every other notice issued under these rules shall be served in the manner prescribed in Section 191 of the Bombay Land Revenue Code (See *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1883, page 358).

8. All orders which the Collector, or other officer aforesaid, shall pass in respect of the execution of the decree, or of the management or sale of the immovable property of the judgment-debtor, shall be made in writing, and shall be dated and signed by him; and a diary of his proceedings shall be kept in the language of the district, in Form LXXXVIII at page 252, and in conformity with the instructions given in Section 70 of the High Court's Civil Circulars.

9. Previous to proceeding to sell any property, the Collector, or other officer aforesaid, shall, unless he has already proceeded under Section 322-A or 322-C, publish a notice in the language of the district, calling upon all persons having rights in, or charges or claims on, the said property, or any part thereof, to submit on or before a date which shall be named in such notice, and which shall not be less than six weeks after the date of such notice, a statement of the right, charge or interest claimed, and to produce the documents, if any, on which such claims are based,

Such notice shall be published in the manner prescribed for the notice to be issued by the Collector under Section 322-A of the Code of Civil Procedure.

10. If in the opinion of the Collector, or other officer aforesaid, any statement, so produced, is not sufficiently precise or clear, or if it shall appear to the Collector, or such other officer, that all the documents in the claimant's possession or power, relating to the property to be sold, have not been produced, he may refuse to receive such statement, and may give or may not give, as he deems fit, time for the production of a fresh statement.

The Collector, or other officer aforesaid shall, peruse the documents of title which any such claimant produces, but such documents shall not without a special order, the reasons for which must be recorded, be handed for perusal to any other person than the Collector or other officer aforesaid, and his clerk, reader or interpreter; and they shall, after such perusal, be restored to the persons who have produced them, with an endorsement signed by the Collector or other officer aforesaid on each, of the date on which and the purpose for which they were presented, and of the date of return and of the person to whom they are returned (*Bombay Government Gazette* for 1880, Part I, pages 96 and 97).

11. Every sale of property shall be held before the Collector or other officer aforesaid or before any revenue officer not lower in rank than a Mamlatdār's first Karkūn specially nominated by the Collector or other officer aforesaid in this behalf.

Except as is otherwise provided by the Code of Civil Procedure, every such sale shall be proclaimed and held in the manner prescribed by the rules for the time being in force relating to the sale of immovable property in realization of arrears of land revenue.

Every proclamation of any such sale shall contain, in addition to the particulars required by the said rules—

- (a) A list of all claims of which statements have been drawn up under Section 322-B or Section 322-C, or have been duly submitted and accepted by the Collector or other officer aforesaid under No. 10 of these rules, and which shall appear to the Collector or such other officer to be *prima facie* honest and reasonable.
- (b) A caution that no guarantee is given either of the judgment-debtor's title or of the validity of any of the rights, charges or interest claimed by third parties (Substituted—See *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1883, page 358).

12. The Collector, or other officer aforesaid, shall retain the title-deeds and other documents produced by the judgment-debtor under Rule 5; and, if the whole of the property to which they relate is sold, shall hand them over to the purchaser—(*Bombay Government Gazette* for 1880, Part I, pages 96 and 97).

12A. No holder of a decree in execution of which property is sold shall, without the express

permission of the Collector or other officer aforesaid, bid for or purchase the property.

When a decree-holder purchases with such permission, the purchase-money and the amount due on the decree may, if he so desires, be set off against one another, and the Collector or other officer aforesaid shall enter up satisfaction of the decree in whole or in part accordingly.

When a decree-holder purchases by himself or through another person, without such permission, the Collector or other officer aforesaid may, if he thinks fit, set aside the sale; and any deficiency of price which may happen on the re-sale, and all expenses attending it, shall be paid by the decree-holder—(Added—See *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1885, page 631).

13. When any sale has been finally completed, the Collector, or other officer aforesaid, shall give to the purchaser a certificate of sale, as nearly as may be, in the Form No. 150 of Schedule IV of the Code of Civil Procedure.

14. When the property sold is in the occupancy of the judgment-debtor, or of any other person, and a certificate in respect thereof has been granted under the last preceding rule, the Collector or other officer aforesaid shall, on application by the purchaser, order delivery to be made by putting the purchaser, or any person whom he may appoint to receive delivery on his behalf, in possession of the property; by proclaiming to the occupant by beat of drum, or in such other manner as may be customary, at some convenient place, that the interest of the judgment-debtor has been transferred to the purchaser, and, if need be, by removing any person who refuses to vacate the same.

15. When execution of the decree has been, as far as possible, completed, and the balance, if any, of all moneys which have come to his hands, disposed of in accordance with the provisions of Section 324-A of the Code of Civil Procedure, the Collector shall re-transmit the papers received by him under Rules 1 and 2, together with the execution proceedings, to the Court by post, or in such other manner as shall be most convenient (*Bombay Government Gazette* for 1880, Part I, pages 96 and 97).

16. The following powers are conferred on Collectors or such of their gazetted subordinates to whom a decree has or may hereafter be referred under Rule 4:—

- (1) The power referred to in Section 294 of the Code of Civil Procedure to grant express permission to the holder of a decree, in execution of which property is sold, to bid for or purchase the property: Provided that the Collector or other officer aforesaid, to whom an application for such permission may be made, shall not grant such permission, unless the decree-holder—

(a) satisfies him that the application is made in good faith, and that the judgment-debtor is not a minor;

(b) undertakes that he will not himself or through any other person bid or purchase for a sum less than such amount as the

Collector or other officer granting the permission, having regard to the fair market value of the interest to be sold, may determine, and that the permission shall be subject to this condition ;

- (c) agrees that if the decree-holder or any one on his behalf becomes the purchaser, the purchase-money shall be paid to the Collector or other officer executing the decree.
- (2) The power referred to in paragraph 1 of Section 312, Civil Procedure Code, to pass an order confirming a sale if no application to set the sale aside has been made within the time limited by law,* or if every application so made has been disallowed.

* viz. 30 days from the date of the sale, Art 166, XV, 1887.

17. If any application to set aside a sale be made within the time limited by law to the Collector or other officer aforesaid, he shall refer the applicant to the Civil Court. (Added—See Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 91, dated 8th January 1890).

No. 3600.—In supersession of so much of Government Notification No. 7320 of 16th December 1878 (published at page 839 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, for 1878), as has not been already superseded by Government Notification No. 499 of 24th January 1880 (published at page 96 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of 1880), and in exercise of the power conferred by Section 320 of the Code of Civil Procedure, the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council, to declare that in the districts of Poona, Sholapur, Ahmednagar and Sátára the execution of decrees ordering the sale of any immovable property belonging to a person who is an agriculturist within the meaning of the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, 1879, which has been specifically mortgaged for the repayment of the debt to which any such decree relates, shall be transferred to the Collector: Provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to affect the execution of decrees already legally transferred to the Collector under the notification hereby superseded. And in further exercise of the said power, and with like sanction, the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased to declare that in the districts of Násik, Khándesh, Kaládgi,† Ahmedabad, Kaira, Surat and Broach the execution of decrees shall, in the following cases, be transferred to the Collector (viz.) :—

- (1) Decrees for money in execution of which a Court has ordered the sale of immovable property belonging to any person who earns his livelihood either wholly or principally by agriculture.
- (2) Decrees ordering the sale of immovable property belonging to any such person in pursuance of a contract specifically affecting the same (*Bombay Government Gazette* for 1880, Part I, page 519).

†The Kaládgi District is now designated the Bijápúr District.
