NOTIFICATIONS.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 2nd June 1890.

No. 2168.—His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction the establishment of a ferry across the river Bhatsa in the village of Borseti in the Sháhápúr Taluka of the Thána District, and to declare the said ferry to be a public ferry under the provisions of Section 2 of Bombay Act II of 1868.

No. 2175.—The following letter from the Imperial and Royal Austro-Hungarian Consul General, Bombay, to the Government of India is published for general information:—

“Letter from the Imperial and Royal Austro-Hungarian Consul General, Bombay, No. 311, dated 31st March 1890.

With reference to my letter dated the 7th September 1889, No. 990, I am directed to inform you

that in connexion with the Agricultural Exhibition to be held in Vienna in the course of this year it is proposed to hold also an International Agricultural Congress during the first days of September next.

Persons intending to be present at the Congress should give notice of their intention and eventually also of the subject which they propose to lay before the Congress during the month of April 1890.

Before and after the Congress general assemblies will be held in which reports will be presented and speeches made but no debates will take place. At the second general meeting the resolution passed by the various sections will also be published.

The debates will be held in the German or French language.

The Congress will be divided into the following sections:—

I.—AGRICULTURE.

1. *Agricultural Management.*—Agriculture, domestic animals, management of fields, veterinary subjects, &c.

2. *Special Branches of Agriculture.*—Culture of fruit, wine, vegetables, tobacco, hop, hemp, silk worms, bees, breeding of fish, &c.

3. *Agricultural Engineering.*—Organisation of the service, draining and irrigation, regulating of rivers, canals, reservoirs, cisterns, conduits, marshes, division of land, buildings, means of transport, the use of waste stuff, &c.

4. *Agricultural Industry.*—The manufacture of sugar, brewing mills, dairy-farming, &c.

5. *Agricultural education and agronomic researches.*

II.—FORESTRY.

6. *Management of Forests.*—Generally wood and timber-trade, forest engineering, recent researches and experiences, &c.

III.—AGRICULTURE AND FORESTRY.

7. *Political Economy.*—Agrarian legislation and policy, statistics, societies, insurance, agricultural banks, protection of birds, &c.

Intending members are requested to send after the 1st of July next 10 florins or 25 francs (£ 1) to the Committee of the Agricultural Congress in Vienna (I Herrengasse 13) when they will receive their tickets as members and also a special Programme of the proceedings.

Special reductions on the Austro-Hungarian Railways will be granted to members as also a season ticket for the Agricultural Exhibition. They will also be admitted to the Fêtes given on the occasion and to the excursions to different large estates which will be made after the Congress.

The above-named Committee will also be glad to give all further information on the subject.

I have the honour to request you to bring the foregoing information to the notice of the respective Indian authorities as soon as possible."
