MARINE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 17th June 1890.

No. 45.—The following Notice to Mariners, dated 23rd April last, issued by the Commissioners of the Port of Rangoon, is published for general information:—

“BURMA—GULF OF MARTABAN.

Rangoon River—Elephant Point.

On the 10th proximo two white lights will be shown on the pitch of Elephant Point 200 feet apart in a W. N. W. and E. S. E. direction, magnetic, the light nearest the beach at an elevation of 15 feet, and the light furthest inshore at an elevation of 25 feet from the ground.

These two lights in one will cut the present position of the Upper Spit Buoy, and are intended to lead vessels from thence direct to Elephant Point, and *vice versa*.”

No. 46.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased, under the provisions of Section 7 (1) of the Indian Merchant Shipping Act V of 1883, to appoint C. P. Cooper, Esq., Chief Presidency Magistrate, Captain W. F. Potts, Marine Superintendent, B. I. S. N. Company, and Captain W. J. Webber, Master of the P. and O. S. N. Company's S. S. “Assam,” to conduct an investigation into the circumstances connected with the stranding of the S. S. “Suez” on one of the Maldiv Islands on the 28th May last.

2. The investigation will be held at the Esplanade Police Court.

No. 47.—The following intimation received from the Port Officer, Aden, is published for general information:—

“The Massawah authorities have established a light-house on the N. N. W. point of the island of Scheikh-el-abu, situated—

N. Latitude 16° 21' 16”

E. Greenwich Longitude 39° 24' 45”

The light is a fixed one, and on clear nights can be seen at eight miles distance. At low tide it is about 14 metres above the level of the sea. It illuminates with red light, a sector of 40° between the 136th 176th degree with white light a sector of 160°, leaving a dark sector of 136° between the 336th 136th degree.”

No. 3212.—The Governor in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following Rules for the control and management of the Mounted Police Funds, for the whole of the Presidency (including Sind but not including the City of Bombay) in supersession of all existing rules and orders in respect of horse-funds or other similar funds:—

"RULES FOR MOUNTED POLICE FUNDS.

Control and Management.

Subject to these rules and the control of the Inspector-General of Police, the management of the fund is vested in the District Superintendent of Police.

Receipts and Payments.

2. All money transactions connected with the fund shall pass through the accounts of the District

Treasury and be accounted for as transactions of an Excluded Local Fund. On no account may cash receipts be applied to meet expenditure before being credited in the accounts of the District Treasury.

3. The monthly subscription of the Savars shall be recovered by deduction from the monthly pay bill. The District Superintendent of Police is responsible that the correct amount to be recovered is entered against each detailed entry in the bill. The total amount deducted for subscriptions must be entered at foot of the bill to enable the District Treasury Officer when disbursing the net amount, to adjust the recovery to credit of the Remount Fund.

4. Cash receipts must be paid into the Treasury each day, or as frequently as possible, the remittance being accompanied by a Chalan (Civil Account Code, Chapter 1, 3) in duplicate, one copy of which will be returned signed as a voucher for the amount deposited.

5. Payments from the Treasury will be made on simple receipts signed by the District Superintendent of Police. These receipts must specify, as clearly as possible, the purpose or purposes for which the money is withdrawn, and receipts for withdrawals in excess of Rs. 20 must be stamped with a one-anna receipt stamp. Money should not be withdrawn until it is required for immediate payment, and the undischarged balance of withdrawals during the month must be refunded into the Treasury before the end of the month.

Accounts and Returns.

6. The District Superintendent of Police will keep a Cash Book in English with columns—¹Date, ²Number of entry, ³From whom received, ⁴To whom paid, ⁵Particulars, ⁶Amount, Total—in which all the transactions of the fund will be entered in full detail. Cash receipts will be entered by the Accountant as each amount is received, and when each payment is sent to the Treasury, or when several sums are remitted in one amount, the total of these items must be brought out into the last column of the Cash Book on the credit side against an entry 'Remitted to the Treasury this day Rs.—'. Subscriptions recovered and adjusted at the Treasury must be taken to credit in one sum in the Cash Book on the day the bill is cashed.

7. On the debit side must be entered all disbursements as they occur from the amounts withdrawn from the Treasury from time to time. As a check against over-withdrawals during the month, the District Superintendent of Police should keep a subsidiary Register of the amounts for which he passes receipts. The difference (if any) between the withdrawals in the Register and the amount debited in the Accounts Cash Book, would indicate the unspent balance (to be refunded into the Treasury on the last day of the month).

8. The Cash Book must be closed and balanced at the end of each month, and after being signed by the District Superintendent of Police, it should be presented at the Treasury for the Treasury Officer's verification of the Cash Balance as entered.

9. Immediately after the close of each month, the District Superintendent of Police will prepare and submit to the Accountant General, or such other officer as the Government may direct, for audit a monthly Cash Account of the Fund. On the receipt side will be entered in total sums—

1. Opening Balance.
2. Cash Receipts.
3. Subscriptions adjusted at the Treasury.
4. Repayments into Treasury.
5. Total.

the debit side will be an exact copy of the Cash Book and will be supported by vouchers for each payment. The closing entry will be the balance in the Treasury at the end of the month and a total corresponding with the opposite side.

Vouchers.

10. One bill signed by the District Superintendent of Police may be submitted in support of several payments in the Cash Book, but in that case the bill must be supported by sub-vouchers for payments in excess of Rs. 10, and a certificate under Rule 14, Chapter 5, Civil Account Code, for payments of less amount.

11. The result of the audit of his accounts will be communicated to the District Superintendent of Police in monthly statements or letters, and all objections and instructions must receive his immediate attention.

Miscellaneous.

12. No subsidiary fund connected with the Mounted Police is to be maintained.

Subsidiary Rules.

13. A monthly subscription of Rs. 2-8-0 or less, with the sanction of the Inspector-General of Police, shall be paid to the Mounted Police Fund of the district by each member of a Mounted Police Corps.

14. If at any time it is found that, owing to heavy casualties or other necessary expenditure, the solvency of the Fund is likely to be affected, the District Superintendent of Police may, with the sanction of the Inspector-General, fix a higher rate of subscription not exceeding Rs. 3. This special subscription shall continue until the solvency of the Fund is ensured.

15. The monies thus realized shall be credited to the Mounted Police Fund of the district, which shall be devoted to the purposes hereinafter prescribed. Under no circumstances will any subscription be refunded to a member on his leaving the force or to his heirs after his death.

16. The Fund shall primarily be devoted to the purchase of horses and camels for the use of the corps, and such horses and camels shall be deemed to be the property of the corps. The horses and camels, if any, owned by existing members of the corps shall, from and after the date of the agreement to be executed by the said members respectively under Rule 27, cease to be the property of the individual members of the corps and shall be deemed to have been purchased for the corps at the expense of the Fund. Horses and camels heretofore purchased for the corps at the expense of a Fund shall continue to belong to the corps.

17. No new remount purchased for the corps shall exceed Rs. 350 in price, without the sanction of the Inspector-General.

18. When a man is newly enrolled in the corps, the value of the horse or camel allotted for his use, and of the equipment supplied to him as fixed by the District Superintendent under Rule 25, together with all expenses connected therewith from the time the post to which he succeeds fell vacant, shall be recovered from him by instalments, as hereinafter prescribed, and credited to the Fund.

19. On the occurrence of a casualty among the horses or camels, a new horse or camel will be purchased at the expense of the Fund by, or under the orders of, the District Superintendent.

In the case of a horse, the member who had the use of the horse shall, on receiving a new remount, pay a donation of Rs. 50 to the Fund by instalments, as hereinafter prescribed: provided that the amount of this donation shall be increased if the loss of the horse was, in the opinion of the District Superintendent, due to neglect or ill-treatment on the part of such member.

Should the cause of the casualty be the casting of a horse, the proceeds of the sale of the cast horse shall be credited to the Fund.

20. Sums due to the Fund from members of the corps under either of the last two rules or as outstanding debts shall be recovered by deduction from their pay in monthly instalments of such amount not exceeding Rs. 7 and not less than Rs. 4, as shall be determined in each case by the District Superintendent: provided that in time of famine, or extreme dearth of grain, the payment of such instalments may, with the sanction of the Inspector-General, be reduced or postponed.

21. Mounted Police Funds may also be used for the purchase of equipments, whether for the horses or camels, or for the men; all sums so expended being recovered from the men by easy monthly instalments in addition to the subscription and other instalments, if any, payable by them to the Fund. In no case shall the recoveries under Rules 13, 20 and 21 exceed a total of Rs. 9-8-0 per mensem.

22. Hay and other forage for the use of the Mounted Police may also be purchased and stacked at the cost of the said Funds, but the District Superintendent will be responsible for seeing that all monies expended from the Fund for this purpose are fully recovered in monthly payments from the men who make use of the forage.

23. The wages of one khajdar or syce for every ten horses at head-quarters and at each outpost, and one sweeper at head-quarters, may be defrayed from the Fund.

24. When the balance at the credit of the Fund admits of it, a portion, with the sanction of the Inspector-General, may be spent for saddles, &c., for the benefit of those contributing to it.

25. When any member of the corps dies, resigns, or is discharged, the District Superintendent shall determine what is the value of the horse or camel in his charge and of his still serviceable equipments; and such member or his heir will receive from the Fund a sum equal to the value so fixed minus any subscription or instalment due by him to the Fund under these rules: Provided as follows (namely):—

- (1) When any member of the Mounted Police is without a horse at the time of his death,

resignation or discharge from the Force, the District Superintendent shall, subject to the sanction of the Inspector-General, direct that an allowance of such amount as he shall think fit be paid from the Fund to such member or his heirs;

- (2) If a member be dismissed from the Force for misconduct, he may, at the discretion of the District-Superintendent of Police, and subject to a right of appeal to the Inspector-General, forfeit his right to receive anything under this rule, and his horse or camel and equipments, if any, may either be sold and the proceeds thereof credited to the Fund, or be made over to his successor, and the value thereof recovered from the latter and credited to the Fund as the District Superintendent shall determine.

26. No horse or camel belonging to the corps may be sold, exchanged or otherwise disposed of, except by, or under the orders of, the District Superintendent; and any member who raises, or attempts to raise, money on the security of the animal in his charge or of any equipment, or other thing appertaining to him in his capacity of Police Officer, will be liable to instant dismissal for misconduct, and his right to payment from the Fund under the last preceding rule may be forfeited.

27. No person shall be enrolled in the Mounted Police, unless he first executes an agreement in the form hereto annexed, and every existing member shall, within one month from the date of these rules being approved by Government, execute a similar agreement.

The stamp* required for such agreement shall be paid for by such person.

"No. 267, dated 11th June 1890.—With reference to section 47 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, the Governor-General in Council is pleased, in the case of a railway administered by the Government, to appoint the Director-General of Railways as the officer who is to make general rules under that section."

"No. 268, dated 11th June 1890.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 144 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to delegate to Local Governments, in regard to railways under their control, and to the extent and subject to the conditions hereinafter specified, the following powers and functions which are now vested in him under the said Act; the powers and functions hereby delegated being liable to be revoked or varied, and the exercise and discharge thereof to be controlled, as the Governor-General in Council may from time to time think fit:

(1) Sections 7, 9 and 11.—All the powers and functions of the Governor-General in Council, subject to the proviso that the exercise and discharge of such powers and functions will not entail any expenditure in excess of the general powers of sanction of the Local Government concerned.

(2) Section 48.—All the powers and functions of the Governor-General in Council, only in cases where the railways concerned are under the control of one and the same Local Government.

(3) Section 54.—All the powers and functions of the Governor-General in Council.

(4) Section 5; section 51, clauses (a), (b), (c), (d) and (e); and section 55.—All the powers and functions of the Governor-General in Council.

(5) Section 63.—The power of determining the vernacular languages in which the maximum number of passengers to be carried in each compartment shall be exhibited.

(6) Section 83.—The power of notifying the Magistrates and Police-officers to whom notices of railway accidents are to be given."

"No. 270, dated 12th June 1890.—Under section 135 of the Indian Railways Act, 1890, the Governor-General in Council is pleased, pending further orders under that section, to declare every railway administration to be liable from and after the 1st May 1890 to pay every tax which it was lawfully required by or on behalf of any local authority to pay in aid of the funds of such authority during the year ended on the 30th April 1890."
