NOTIFICATIONS.

MARINE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 15th January 1890.

Notice to Mariners.

No. 1.—The following Notice to Mariners, dated 1st January 1890, issued by the Port Officer, Aden, is published for general information :—

“On the 15th February 1890 the temporary light-vessel moored off Ras Morbut, Aden Harbour, will be replaced by the permanent light-ship. The vessel is moored in 18 feet at low water and shows, at an elevation of 39 feet above the sea, a flashing white light visible every minute. The vessel is painted red, but has no red ball at mast-head and exhibits no red flag during the day, as stated at page 90, Chapter IV, third Edition of the Gulf of Aden Pilot.”

No. 2.—The following Pilotage Bye-laws made by the Trustees of the Port of Karáchi under the provisions of Section 55 of the Karáchi Port Trust Act, 1886 (Bombay Act No. VI of 1886), have received the approval of Government as required by Section 57 of the Act :—

1. The direction and control of all Pilots maintained by the Board are vested in the Port Officer.

2. The Senior Pilot shall be the Assistant to the Port Officer for the performance of the outdoor duties of that officer.

Regarding the duties of the Senior Pilot.

3. The Senior Pilot shall keep a correct account of all moorings fixed and swinging with dates of examination. All moorings should be examined by divers at least once in six months.

4. The Senior Pilot shall superintend all transport work, landing and shipping explosives, treasure, &c.

5. He shall see that all vessels are properly berthed and moored in the harbour, and transport such vessels as may be ordered. He shall have the care and inspection of the Anchor Hoy and all other vessels, boats and the mooring buoys of the Board. He shall attend at the scene of any fire that may break out in the Port with all unemployed Pilots and Lascars (with pumps) who are to place themselves under his orders and render assistance; and, under the Port Officer, he shall have charge of the general conservancy of the harbour.

6. He shall keep a journal or diary of his daily employment which shall be submitted for the inspection of the Port Officer every morning.

General Rules for the Guidance of Pilots.

7. Every verbal order or instruction given by the Port Officer shall be promptly attended to and carried into effect by the Pilots, who shall be careful to conform to, and to make themselves acquainted with, all circulars and orders issued from time to time for guidance in connection with their duties.

8. No Pilot shall absent himself from the station (Manora) or his duty without permission, except in case of sickness.

9. Pilots returning from the performance of any duty between the hours of 10 A.M. and 5 P.M., shall report themselves personally to the Senior Pilot, and enter their names and the time of landing in a book kept for that purpose; all unemployed Pilots shall attend at the Office (at Manora) from 10 to 11 A.M. and from 4 to 5 P.M. daily for orders.

10. Pilots shall conduct themselves on all occasions in an orderly and civil manner; and when in charge of vessels they should meet the wishes of Commanders so far as can be done without endangering the safety of the vessel, and without leading to inconvenience or to the infringement of orders received from the department.

11. When on duty Pilots shall wear a uniform dress, consisting of a round single-breasted white or blue cloth or serge coat, to button, if required, close up to the throat by one row of Karáchi Port Trust pattern buttons; four in number and three buttons on sleeves, with blue cloth or serge or white trousers. If a cap be worn it shall be of the round crown, navy pattern with drooping peak, surrounded by a mohair band and the Karáchi Port Trust badge in front as per pattern in Port Office; and if a helmet—white regulation with a light blue puggerie.

12. Pilots should invariably appear respectfully and neatly dressed.

13. Each Pilot shall provide himself, have with him, and produce when necessary or demanded, an efficient watch and pair of binoculars; also his license, a tide table, the Port and Pilotage Regulations.

14. It is the duty of Pilots to take steamers to sea from clear berths, or to bring them into harbour on ordinary nights when the lights are visible and reasonably distant objects discernable, but they shall on no account run any risks by venturing within the leading marks, or keeping vessels under weigh when the lights cannot be seen, and whilst under weigh the lead shall be kept going and the soundings be carefully observed. And all signals made at signal station on shore are to be observed and attended to.

15. Immediately after a vessel may have caused or sustained damage, touched the ground, or got on shore while in their charge, Pilots shall furnish a clear and explicit report of the same to the Port Officer. Such report should state (a) the cause in the Pilot's opinion of such accident, damage, or grounding, (b) time of occurrence thereof, (c) bearings of known objects, (d) means used to get the vessel afloat or clear, (e) state of wind, weather and tide, (f) length of time vessel lay on the ground or in collision, and (g) nature of the ground. Such report should be submitted to the Commander or Officer in charge for his remarks and counter-signature; if such Commander or Officer refuses to countersign the report, the Pilot shall note that fact thereon. Pilots shall, unless unavoidably prevented, present such reports in person.

16. No Pilot shall take to sea any vessel which has been damaged or to which an accident has occurred, until ordered by the Port Officer to do so.

17. It will be the duty of Pilots to see that the arrival or departure report is duly and correctly filled up before they leave a vessel and that it is forwarded to the Port Officer without delay. An arrival report containing intelligence of exceptional importance, and arrival reports of mail steamers or vessels with passengers of considerable official or of high rank, or vessels with dangerous cargo on board, should be forwarded direct to the Port Officer; in all other cases the report should be left at the Manora office.

18. It shall be the duty of every Pilot on the facts coming to his knowledge to report without delay to the Port Officer (a) whenever any of the mooring buoys are missing, injured, or out of their proper places; or (b) if any vessel is placed improperly as to her draught of water or too near the moorings of other vessels; or (c) if any of the Port Rules are being or have been infringed; or (d) if any circumstances out of the ordinary course or any casualty occur on board vessels whilst in pilotage charge or have a Pilot on board.

19. When passing any vessel of war it is the Pilot's duty to request the Master to dip the colours, and on the approach of any man-of-war or other Government boat to board, to heave the vessel to, or cause the speed thereof to be sufficiently checked (when it can be done with safety) to enable the boat to get alongside without loss of time.

20. Pilots are forbidden to receive any gratification from Masters of vessels or others with whom they are brought in contact in the execution of their duties.

21. No Pilot shall claim salvage without the consent of the Trustees.

22. No Pilot shall be engaged in any other trade or employment.

Regarding Outward Pilotage.

23. On taking charge of an outward bound vessel the Pilot should not get the vessel under weigh unless the Master or his representative is on board in actual command and produces a port clearance. In the event of the Master or his representative leaving the actual command of the vessel before reaching such a position that the Pilot's services would be no longer necessary, the Pilot should proceed to the outer anchorage and there wait for the return of the Master to his command before proceeding to sea. The Pilot shall see that the vessel's national ensign is kept hoisted between sunrise and sunset, or until the vessel is beyond the harbour limits. He shall see that the lead line is correctly marked, and that the steering gear is in good order, he shall also ascertain the draught of water and freeboard, the time, bearing and estimated distance of the light-house on his leaving the vessel, and shall enter the same in departure report.

24. No Pilot in charge of a vessel shall leave her until she is well clear of all danger.

Regarding Inward Pilotage.

25. The Pilot shall, on boarding, note the time, the bearing and estimated distance from the light-house, entering the same in the arrival report. He shall (a) also ascertain the vessel's present and deep load draught of water, entering the same in the arrival report; (b) see that the anchors are clear, and cable ranged to the required length; (c) see that all flags and signals required by law or by rules having the force of law are duly hoisted and placed in such a position as to be clearly visible at the signal station.

26. The Pilot shall request the Commander to send on shore with as little delay as possible any despatches for Government, or Post Office packets that may be on board.

27. Harbour Masters and Pilots will be provided with a distinguishing flag, which is to be displayed, hoisted under the national flags of vessels of which they are in charge. The same flag hoisted under the pilot jack at any of the signal stations will be used in communication with the vessel.

*In the bye-laws providing for the Master being on board vessels entering, leaving, or moving in, the harbour, the word "Master" will be held to include the first or other officer duly authorized to act for a Master incapacitated by death or illness from performing the duties of his office.

Regarding Leave.

28. Leave of absence can never be claimed absolutely as of right; it will only be granted when the exigencies of the service permit.

29. Leave on medical certificate may be granted for two years in all, but not for more than one year at one time.

No. 3.—The following Notice to Mariners, dated 6th January 1890, issued by the Port Officer, Aden, is published for general information:—

Notice to Mariners.

"Intimation has been received from the Consul General for Italy that a light, visible at 6 miles distance to indicate the north entry of the Massowah Channel has been placed on the N.E. end of the Island of Difnein. The light is in latitude $16^{\circ} 37' 8''$ N. and longitude $39^{\circ} 18' 15''$ E. Arc of illumination 195° degrees, leaving a dark sector between the 65° and 250° ."

No. 4.—The following Notice to Mariners, dated 21st December 1889, issued by Her Majesty's Colonial Government, Ceylon, is published for general information:—

"Notice is hereby given that on and after December 25th, 1889, until February 28th, 1890, a red buoy, with a red flag and the words 'Torpedo Buoy' painted on it, will be placed in the entrance to Trincomalee Harbour between Ostenburg Point and Little Sober Island, and 260 yards from the former.

"The water in the triangle formed by this red buoy, the E. point of Small Sober Island and Clappenburg Point will be obstructed by mines.

"All vessels should pass between the buoy and Ostenburg Point."
