NOTIFICATIONS.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 26th August 1890.

No. 3425.—The following Rule should be substituted for Rule 25 of the Revised Rules for regulating the bestowal and continuance of Government grants-in-aid to charitable dispensaries and the administration of dispensaries to which such grants are made, which were published in the *Bombay Government Gazette* of 11th April 1889, Part I, pages 267 to 272:—

25. Every Government aided dispensary shall be open at any time to inspection by Deputy Sanitary Commissioners, District Revenue Officers and by the Civil Surgeon of the District.

Civil Surgeons shall visit every dispensary in their districts once a year.

The Sanitary Commissioner and Deputy Sanitary Commissioners shall inspect dispensaries while they are on their tours.

Stands.

1. The open space near the bridge on the road leading to Old Hubli commonly known as Hale-wur Halla; distance to the Railway Station half a mile.

2. The open space near the Bhoospet Houd; distance to the Railway Station half a mile.

3. The open space near the Fort in front of the Musjid Chauki commonly known as Durgad Baid; distance to the Railway Station about one mile.

Subsidiary Rules.

1. No carriage owner or attendant shall be compelled to convey any single person in his conveyance for any fare less than that fixed for the whole conveyance.

2. In any case in which any public conveyance is called from a stand or other place to any place at a distance exceeding half a mile, to take up a fare, one quarter of the full fare of such conveyance from the Railway Station to the town proper shall be paid to the driver in addition to the regulated fare for the conveyance.

3. In the enumeration of the number of passengers allowed, two children under 10 years shall be counted as one grown-up person.

No. 4629.—The following Rule framed by Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature at Bombay, Original Side, amending Rule 8 of the rules for the Sheriff (at page 96 of the High Court Rules, old edition) has been sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Council under Section 15 of 24 and 25 Victoria, Chapter 104, and is published for general information:—

It is ordered that Rule 8 of the Rules, for the Sheriff (at page 96 of the High Court Rules, old edition) be amended by substituting for the words "a Judge in Chambers" the words "the said Prothonotary". The Rule will then read as follows:

8.—If the Prothonotary shall certify that no person has within 12 months prior to the realization applied to the Court for execution of a decree for money against the judgment-debtor, the judgment-creditor may at once apply to the said Prothonotary for an order directing the Sheriff to pay to him the amount realized or so much thereof as may be sufficient to satisfy his Decree.

No. 4631.—The following Circular framed by Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature at Bombay, making an addition at the end of the note at the foot of page 93 of the High Court's Criminal Circulars, has been sanctioned by the Governor in Council under the provisions of 24 and 25 Vic., Chapter 104, Section 15, and is published for general information:—

3. (1) Subject to the provisions of the Act and of these rules,

(2) (a) No loan exceeding Rs. 2,500 shall be granted without the previous sanction of the Commissioner, and

(b) no loan exceeding Rs. 5,000 shall be granted without the previous sanction of Government.

(3) Government in the case of loans requiring their sanction, and each Commissioner in the case of loans requiring his sanction, may call for such detailed plans and estimates or for such professional opinion on the project, for the purpose of which the loan is required, as may seem necessary before according sanction thereto.

4. (1) Every application for a loan shall be made to the Collector, Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the sub-division or to the Mámlatdár of the taluka or the Mahalkari of the petha.

(6) If the loan exceeds Rs. 500, the Collector shall at once apply for and before making the grant obtain the sanction of the Commissioner:

Provided that no loan shall be given to any holder who is in arrears for land revenue or for any loan made to him under the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, or these rules, except under a detailed order of the Collector granting the loan.

7. Repayments of loans shall be made by such instalments including interest as the officer granting the loan may determine:
