No. 5665.—The following Notifications by the Government of India in the Foreign Department are republished for general information :—

“Simla, the 3rd September 1890.

No. 2919-I.—Whereas the Governor General in Council has power and jurisdiction within the Cantonment of Baroda : In exercise of such power and jurisdiction and of the powers conferred by Sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, XXI of 1879, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following orders :

PART I.

1. The provisions, so far as they can be made applicable in the circumstances for the time being,

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and as amended for the time being by subsequent enactments, of the Acts specified in the Schedule to this Part, are hereby applied to the said Cantonment.

2. For the purposes of the said Acts, the Agent to the Governor General at Baroda shall be deemed to be the Local Government.

3. For the purpose of facilitating the application of the said Acts to the said Cantonment, any Court in the Cantonment may construe any provision in any such Act with such alterations not affecting the substance as may be necessary or proper to adapt it to the matter before the Court.

PART II.

For the purposes of the exercise of civil jurisdiction within the said Cantonment—

(1) The First Assistant for the time being to the Agent to the Governor General at Baroda shall exercise the powers of a District Court, as described in the Code of Civil Procedure, with jurisdiction in all original suits, whatever be the amount or value of the subject-matter, and in all other cases in which jurisdiction is conferred on the District Court by the law for the time being in force in the said Cantonment.

(2) Appeals shall lie, subject to the provisions of the enactments for the time being in force in the said Cantonment, from the decrees and orders of the said District Court to the Agent to the Governor General at Baroda, who shall exercise the powers of a High Court for all purposes whatsoever connected with the administration of civil justice within the said Cantonment.

No. 64.—The following Notice to Mariners, dated 7th July 1890, issued by the Commissioners of the Port of Rangoon, is published for general information in continuation of Notification No. 45, dated 17th June last:—

"Notice to Mariners.

Burma—Gulf of Martaban—Rangoon River—Elephant Point.

In continuation of this Office notice dated the 23rd April 1890 (see page 393, Part V, *Burma Gazette*) this is to give further notice that the light furthest inshore has been raised 10 feet, and is now 20 feet higher than the light nearest the beach."

No. 66.—Under the provisions of Section 69 of the Inland Steam Vessels Act, 1884, the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby the annexed draft of rules proposed to be made under Section 50 of the said Act for the protection of inland steam-vessels from danger by explosion or fire in the Presidency of Bombay, and to give notice that the said draft will be taken into consideration on or after the 1st of November 1890. Objections or suggestions addressed to the Secretary to Government in the Marine Department with respect to the said draft, if received before the said date, will be considered by the Governor in Council:—

Draft.

Conditions on which dangerous goods may be carried on an inland steam-vessel.

1. Dangerous goods may be carried on board an inland steam-vessel on and subject to the following conditions:

- (a) It shall be the duty of the master of every inland steam-vessel to keep a copy of Sections 48 and 49 of the Act posted up in some prominent place therein.
- (b) No person shall bring on board or remove from an inland steam-vessel any dangerous goods between sunset and sunrise.
- (c) Every person bringing on board any dangerous goods shall, if so required by the master or any officer of the vessel, deliver up the same to the master of the vessel for safe custody.
- (d) No master of an inland steam-vessel shall allow any dangerous goods to be carried on board thereof except in a separate compartment provided for the storage thereof and rendered inaccessible during the voyage to the crew and passengers.
- (e) No person shall use and no master or officer of an inland steam-vessel shall permit any fire to be kindled or used on any flat or steam-vessel while any dangerous goods are being taken in or discharged.
- (f) No master of an inland steam-vessel employed as a coasting vessel shall allow dangerous goods of the following descriptions to be carried on board thereof in excess of the quantities hereinbelow specified, that is to say:

- (1) Explosives, as defined in Section 4, Sub-section (1), clauses (a) and (b) of the Indian Explosives Act, (IV of) 1884.

The quantities allowed, in the case of a boat, whilst carrying or plying for public passengers, by No. 5 of the Rules framed by the Governor General in Council under Section 5 of the Indian Explosives Act, 1884, and republished in the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1887, Part I, pages 511—521.

- (2) Petroleum, as defined in Section 3, clause (1), of the Petroleum Act, (XII of) 1886.

The quantities allowed, in the case of a ship permitted to proceed to the usual anchorage, by No. 5 of the Rules framed by the Governor in Council under Section 8 of the Petroleum Act, 1886, and published in the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1890, Part I, pages 341—4.

- (3) Sulphuric acid.—500 gallons.

- (g) As regards explosives and petroleum, all the provisions of No. 5 of the Rules framed by the Governor-General in Council under Section 5 of the Indian Explosives Act, 1884, and of No. 5 of the Rules framed by the Governor in Council under Section 8 of the Petroleum Act, 1886, which are referred to in clause (f), shall apply, respectively, to explosives or petroleum carried on an inland steam-vessel employed as a coasting-vessel.

2. Before an inland steam vessel proceeds on a voyage, it shall be the duty of the master and of every officer thereof to have its cargo, and the cargo of any flat which it is intended to tow, safely stowed away, hay or other inflammable material being properly covered with tarpaulins or other sufficient protection.

Protection of cargo from danger by fire.

Provisions as to use of lights.

3. No person shall use a naked light of any description in the hold or on the cargo deck of any inland steam-vessel. No person shall so use a closed light, except under the direction and supervision of an officer of the vessel.

4. No person shall make or use any fire on board an inland steam-vessel, and no master or officer of any such vessel shall permit the making or use of fire thereon, except in galleys or in regularly constructed fire-places.

5. (1) The owner and the master of every inland steam-vessel shall provide and keep in efficient condition on board thereof the following apparatus for the purpose of extinguishing fires:—

- (a) Hose sufficient to reach from the engines of the vessel to her stern and taffrail,
- (b) Fire-buckets in the proportion of not less than one for each of the crew.

(2) No master of an inland steam-vessel shall proceed on a voyage, unless the apparatus required by this rule is on board in efficient working order and in a position available for immediate use.

6. The master of every inland steam-vessel shall place an officer in charge of the fire-engines thereof. Such officer shall see that the fire-engines are always ready for immediate use.

7. It shall be the duty of the master of every inland steam-vessel to assign to each of the officers and crew a station to take up in case of fire and the duties each is in such contingency to perform.

8. Any person committing a breach of any of the foregoing rules shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to six months or with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees, or with both.

No. 67.—Under the provisions of Section 69 of the Inland Steam Vessels Act, 1884, the Governor in Council is pleased to publish, for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby, the annexed draft of rules proposed to be made under Sections 51 and 51A of the said Act, as amended by Act III of 1890, to regulate the carriage of passengers and for the protection of passengers in inland steam-vessels in the Presidency of Bombay, and to give notice that the said draft will be taken into consideration on or after the 1st of November 1890. Objections or suggestions addressed to the Secretary to Government in the Marine Department with respect to the said draft, if received before the said date, will be considered by the Governor in Council:—

Draft.

1. (1) The owner or master of an inland steam-vessel may refuse to admit on board thereof any person who, by reason of drunkenness or contagious or infectious disease or madness or other cause, is in such a state, or misconducts himself in such a manner, as is likely to cause annoyance or danger to other passengers on board.

(2) If any passenger on board an inland steam-vessel is drunk and disorderly, the owner or master may require him to leave the vessel at any convenient place.

Punishment of offences committed by passengers. 2. The following offenders, that is to say:

(a) any person who, being drunk, has been on that account refused admission into an inland steam-vessel by the owner or master thereof, and who, after having had the amount of his fare (if he has paid the same) returned or tendered to him, nevertheless persists in attempting to enter such vessel;

(b) any person who, being drunk and disorderly on board any such steam-vessel, is requested by the owner or master thereof to leave the

same at any place at which he can conveniently do so, and who, having had the amount of his fare (if he has paid the same) returned or tendered to him, refuses to comply with such request;

(c) any person on board any such steam-vessel who commits any act of indecency, or after warning by the owner or master, or any other officer of the vessel, molests or continues to molest any passenger;

(d) any person who, after having been refused admission into any such steam-vessel by the owner or master thereof or by any person in the employ of the owner thereof, on account of such vessel being full, and who, after having had the full amount of his fare (if he has paid the same) returned or tendered to him, nevertheless persists in attempting to enter the vessel;

(e) any person having got on board any such steam-vessel who, upon being requested on the like account by the owner or master thereof, or by any person in the master's employ to leave such vessel before the same has quitted the place at which such person got on board, and who after having had the full amount of his fare (if he has paid the same) returned or tendered to him, refuses to comply with such request;

(f) any person who travels or attempts to travel in any such steam-vessel without having previously paid his fare and with intent to avoid payment thereof;

(g) any person who, having paid his fare for a certain distance, knowingly and wilfully proceeds in any such steam-vessel beyond such distance, without previously paying the additional fare for the additional distance, and with intent to avoid payment thereof;

(h) any person who knowingly and wilfully refuses or neglects, on arriving at the point to which he has paid his fare, to quit any such steam-vessel;

(i) any person who takes or attempts to take luggage with him in any such steam-vessel without having previously paid the freight, if any, payable on such luggage, and with intent to avoid payment thereof;

(j) any person who travels or attempts to travel on any such steam-vessel in accommodation of a higher class than that for which he has paid his fare, with intent to avoid payment of the fare payable for the accommodation he uses or attempts to use;

(k) any person on board any such steam-vessel who does not, when required by the owner or master or other officer of such vessel, either pay his fare or exhibit such ticket or other receipt, if any, showing the payment of his fare as is usually given to persons travelling by and paying their fares for such vessel, or who does not, when required, deliver up his ticket at the end of the journey;

(l) any person who, having a ticket for any such steam-vessel, transfers it to any other person with intent to evade the payment of fare by such other person to the owner of the vessel;

(m) any person who, on any such steam-vessel, uses or attempts to use a ticket on any day for which such ticket is not available, with intent to avoid payment of the fare;

(n) any person of the male sex who trespasses on any such steam-vessel into a compartment reserved for females and at the time being occupied by females;

(o) any person smoking or being in possession of a fire or light of any description in any part of any such steam-vessel, except where permitted by the owner or master thereof;

(p) any person committing a nuisance in any part of any such steam-vessel; and

(q) any person embarking on or disembarking from, or attempting to embark on or disembark from, any such steam-vessel while such vessel is in motion;

shall, for every such offence, be punished with fine which may extend to twenty rupees.

3. The punishment of any person for an offence under Rule 2 shall not prejudice the recovery from such person of any fare payable by him.

Punishment of an offender not to prejudice recovery of his fare.

4. No owner or master of an inland steam-vessel shall issue, or cause or allow any person in his employ or under his control to issue, any ticket or receipt which a passenger is required to obtain on payment, or exhibit as showing the payment of his fare, unless the amount of the fare paid is printed or legibly denoted on such ticket or receipt.

Amount of fare to be denoted on tickets or receipts.

5. No owner or master of an inland steam-vessel shall proceed there-with from any port, unless and until there is on board fresh water fit for drinking purposes and sufficient in quantity to supply the passengers thereon in the proportion of one gallon to each passenger, or shall refuse the supply thereof in such proportion free of charge to any passenger who demands the same.

Adequate supply of drinking water to be provided.

6. Any owner or master committing a breach of Rule 4 or 5 shall be punished with fine which may extend to fifty rupees.

Punishment for breach of Rule 4 or 5.

No. 68.—The following reductions made by the Trustees of the Port of Bombay in dock rates chargeable at the Wet Docks and approved by Government under Section 43 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, are published for general information:—

Item 106.—Copper Sheets—Export wharfage reduced from Rs. 1-12 to Rs. 1-4 ton.

Item 123.—Crockeryware—Export wharfage altered from a charge according to measurement on all cases to Re. 0-4-0 for a case up to 12 cubic feet and Re. 0-6-0 for a case up to 20 cubic feet, and cases above 20 cubic feet to be charged the usual measurement rates under items 397 to 401.

Item 159.—Glass Window—Export wharfage reduced from Re. 0-2-6 to Re. 0-1-9 a box.

Item 360.—Tin of kinds—Export wharfage reduced from Rs. 1-8-0 to Rs. 1-4-0 ton.

Item 389.—Yellow Metal Sheets—Export wharfage reduced from Rs. 2-0-0 to Rs. 1-4-0 ton.

Item 367.—Turmeric and Turmeric Powder—Export wharfage reduced from Rs. 1-8-0 to Rs. 1-4-0 ton.

No. 69.—The following Notice to Mariners, dated 28th ultimo, issued by the Officiating Port Officer, Rangoon, is published for general information:—

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 50 of 1889 on alteration in the character of the light on Savage Island, Port of Akyab, it is hereby notified that the new light will be exhibited on or about the 15th December 1890.

The light is a first class dioptric one fixed and flashing at intervals of one minute and visible in clear weather from 16 to 18 miles, its arc of visibility being 264° from seaward.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 25th August 1890.

No. 6043.—The following draft rules under the provisions of Section 10 of the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, are published for general information. Persons who have any objections to urge to them are required to forward their objections in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, on or before the expiry of one month from the date of this Notification:—

In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 10 of the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to make the following rules in supersession of Nos. 3 and 19 of the rules heretofore in force under the said section, and published at page 200 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1886, Part I:

(In supersession of Rule No. 3 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency)—

3. (1) Subject to the provisions of the Act and of these rules,

(a) Collectors may, without the sanction of the Commissioner of the Division, grant loans not exceeding Rs. 2,500 each in amount;

(b) Assistant and Deputy Collectors in charge of talukas, subject to the provisions of Chapter XIII of the Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, relating to revision and appeal, shall, unless the Collector otherwise direct, exercise as regards such talukas all the powers by these rules conferred on Collectors, and may in any case, without the sanction of the Collector, grant loans not exceeding Rs. 1,000 each.

Provided that:

(a) the aggregate of the loans granted in any one year must not, without the sanction of the Commissioner of the Division, exceed the sum assigned by him to that district for such year, and

(b) every Collector shall submit to the Commissioner of his Division, on each of the dates marginally noted in every year, a quarterly statement showing every loan exceeding Rs. 500 in amount, made in his district, not included in a previous statement.

Every authority other than the Collector, on granting a loan exceeding Rs. 500 in amount, shall report the same to the Collector in time to admit of its being included in the quarterly statement then next to be submitted.

(2) (a) No loan exceeding Rs. 2,500 shall be granted without the previous sanction of the Commissioner, and

(b) no loan exceeding Rs. 5,000 shall be granted without the previous sanction of Government.

(3) Government in the case of loans requiring their sanction, and each Commissioner in the case of loans requiring his sanction, may call for such detailed plans and estimates or for such professional opinion on the project, for the purpose of which the loan is required, as may seem necessary before according sanction thereto.

(In supersession of Rule No. 19 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency)—

19. Payment of instalments may be suspended by order and at the discretion of the Collector on his being satisfied that there is good and sufficient reason for granting such indulgence.

No. 6043A.—The following draft rules under the provisions of Section 4 of the Agriculturists' Loans Act, 1884, are published for general information. Persons who have any objections to urge to them are required to forward their objections in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, on or before the expiry of one month from the date of this Notification:—

Under the provisions of Section 4 of the Agriculturists' Loans Act, 1884, the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council, to make the following rules in supersession of Nos. 4, 7 and 11 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency under the said section and published at page 81 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1886, Part I:

(To be substituted for No. 4 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency under the said section)—

4. (1) Every application for a loan shall be made to the Collector, Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the sub-division or to the Mámlatdár of the taluka or the Mahálkari of the petha.

(2) If the application is made to the Collector, Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the sub-division, such officer may, after making such enquiry as he may deem necessary, grant the loan applied for.

(3) If the application is made to the Mámlatdár or Mahalkari, such officer, after making personal enquiry as to the character of the applicant, his ability to give security and the fitness of the application,

(a) may, if the loan applied for does not exceed Rs. 50, and if he is satisfied with the result of such enquiry, grant the loan without the sanction of any superior officer, and

(b) shall, if the loan applied for exceeds Rs. 50, submit without unnecessary delay the application with his report to the Assistant or Deputy Collector, who shall pass such order thereon as he may deem proper.

(4) Assistant and Deputy Collectors in charge may, without the sanction of the Collector, grant applications for loans not exceeding Rs. 200 each.

(5) If a loan applied for exceeds Rs. 200, the Assistant or Deputy Collector shall at once apply for and before making the grant obtain the sanction of the Collector; and

(6) If the loan exceeds Rs. 500, the Collector shall at once apply for and before making the grant obtain the sanction of the Commissioner:

Provided that no loan shall be given to any holder who is in arrears for land revenue or for any loan made to him under the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, or these rules, except under a detailed order of the Collector granting the loan.

(For Rule 7 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency under the said section)—

7. Repayments of loans shall be made by such instalments including interest as the officer granting the loan may determine:

Provided that instalments may be suspended by order of the Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the sub-division on his being satisfied that there is good and sufficient reason for such indulgence.

(For Rule No. 11 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency under the said section)—

11. When a loan has been granted, the money should be paid by the disbursing officer to the holder of the land or his recognised agent, and a receipt taken; but when loans are required for the purchase of cattle, the Collector may take measures to purchase them and hand them over to the applicant.

No. 6268.—The following rule proposed to be substituted for Rule 10 of the rules under Section 6 of the Indian Ports Act, 1889, prescribed in Government Notification No. 1735 dated 5th March 1890, published at page 176 of Part I of the

Bombay Government Gazette dated 6th idem, is published for general information. Persons who have any objections to urge to it are required to communicate the same in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, before the 1st October 1890:—

No boat plying, whether for hire or otherwise, under these rules shall in any case go alongside any coasting or ferry steamer until such steamer shall have exhibited a signal, as described below, to signify that she is ready to receive and disembark passengers:

(a) *Signal between sunrise and sunset.*

The Rendezvous Flag (blue and white chequers: letter N of the Commercial Code) at the fore or main mast head or other conspicuous position, or

(b) *Signal between sunset and sunrise.*

A red light in the same position.

RESOLUTION.

In June 1889 the Comptroller General, with a view to saving the duplication of work which results from the maintenance of the Service Registers in Account Offices as well as the History of Services of Gazetted Officers, recommended that the Registers should be abolished and that the Histories of Services, prepared on a uniform plan and in a condensed tabular form, should take the place of the Service Registers. He also proposed that these Histories should be invariably prepared in the Account Office. Local Governments and Administrations were asked for their opinions on these proposals and to advise whether there was any advantage in retaining entries regarding privilege leave and temporary acting promotions.

2. The replies of Local Governments and Administrations read in the preamble show a general consensus of opinion that the History of Services should in future be prepared in the Account Office and in tabular form. The Governor General in Council accepts this view and directs that the Histories be in future prepared in the form appended to this Resolution.

3. The general opinion is that only privilege leave taken since an officer last returned from furlough need be shown in the Histories. This view has the concurrence of the Government of India.

4. Though there is some difference of opinion with regard to the entry of acting appointments, the view most generally accepted is that an acting promotion which involves a change of duties should be shown, but that grade promotions should be omitted. This view appears to the Governor General in Council to be reasonable, but, inasmuch as the Histories include a notice of the services of all Gazetted Officers in Civil Departments, it cannot be brought into practice without some modification. While therefore the appointment of an Assistant Magistrate and Collector or of an Assistant Engineer, 2nd grade, to officiate as a Joint Magistrate and Collector or an Assistant Engineer, 1st grade, respectively should not be entered, it will be desirable in the case of members of services which, like the Financial and Educational Departments, consist mainly of grades, the duties of which are not separate and distinct, to enter all acting promotions.

5. Particulars of literary works should be entered in notes at foot of the tabular statements. This information will have to be specially supplied to the Account Offices by officers who have produced literary works, and a note requesting them to communicate such intelligence to the Account Office should be prefixed to each History. The Government of the Punjab is of opinion that the numbers and dates of any official letters in which officers have received the special thanks of Government or the Secretary of State should be added as footnotes, and that the tabular statement should show in italics appointments to and promotions in Orders, such as C.S.I., C.I.E., and C.M.G. The Governor General in Council fears that it would be very difficult to distinguish between ordinary and special commendations, and considers that it would be preferable to omit mention of them altogether, lest the bulk of the Histories should be unnecessarily increased. Information in regard to the different Orders should, as suggested by the Punjab Government, be given in italics.

6. The Punjab Government has hitherto provided for the inclusion in the Histories for that Province of information showing (a) the place of education and academical degree, if any, in the case of European and Eurasian officers; (b) caste, tribe, home of the family if in India; and academical degree, if any, in the case of native officers. There is no objection to the inclusion of this information in the Histories for that or any other Province in which the Local Government or Administration considers

it desirable, but no other additions to the information contained in them should be made without the approval of the Government of India.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to all Local Governments and Administrations for information and guidance; that a copy be forwarded to all Departments of the Government of India for information; and that it be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.
