No. 69.—The following Notice to Mariners, dated 28th ultimo, issued by the Officiating Port Officer, Rangoon, is published for general information :—

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 50 of 1889 on alteration in the character of the

light on Savage Island, Port of Akyab, it is hereby notified that the new light will be exhibited on or about the 15th December 1890.

The light is a first class dioptric one fixed and flashing at intervals of one minute and visible in clear weather from 16 to 18 miles, its arc of visibility being 264° from seaward.

No. 70.—Under the provisions of Section 73 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, the following bye-laws have been made by the Trustees of the Port of Bombay :—

“In the case of goods brought by vessels sailing under a General Pass granted by the Collector of Customs, before any such goods are landed at the Trustees’ Bandars, *i.e.*, at their wharves, piers and landing-places, other than the wharves, piers and landing-places at Prince’s and Victoria Docks, or having been landed before such goods are removed from the Trustees’ premises, the owners or importers of the goods shall prepare a declaration note, in duplicate, in the form shown in Schedule A, stating the number, marks and description of the packages, and the sort and weight of the goods intended to be landed, and comply with the following bye-laws.

"This declaration note shall be handed by the owners or importers to the 'Trustees' officers at the Mody Bandar Traffic Office for examination.

“The duplicate will be retained in that office and the original returned to the owners or importers, who must present the said original declaration note to the officers employed in the collection of the Trustees’ charges at the Bandars, where the goods have been, or are intended to be, landed, and pay the Trustees’ charges on the goods specified in the note before such goods shall be removed from the Trustees’ premises, and on such removal of the goods shall surrender the note to the said officers.”

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 11th September 1890.

No. 4997 A.—In exercise of the authority conferred by Clause 3 of Section 6A of Act XXXVI of 1858 (The Lunatic Asylums Act) as amended by Act XVIII of 1886, and with the previous approval of the Governor-General in Council, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules as to the place of detention and the care and treatment of supposed lunatics detained under clauses 1 and 2 of the said section :—

- (1) A person ordered to be detained under Section 6A of the Act in any district where there is a Lunatic Asylum should be sent to such Asylum.
- (2) If there is no Lunatic Asylum within the district the supposed lunatic should be sent to a jail, lock-up, hospital or dispensary, as may seem most appropriate to the Magistrate or the Commissioner of Police, regard being had to the supposed lunatic's apparent condition and the means of accommodation and guarding and the facilities of skilled observation available in each case.
- (3) The Magistrate or the Commissioner of Police may, in his discretion, make special provision for the guarding of the supposed lunatic by police officers.

No. 8043.—The following draft rules under the provisions of Section 10 of the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, are published for general information. Persons who have any objections to urge

to them are required to forward their objections in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, on or before the expiry of one month from the date of this Notification :—

In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 10 of the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to make the following rules in supersession of Nos. 3 and 19 of the rules heretofore in force under the said section, and published at page 200 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1886, Part I :

(In supersession of Rule No. 3 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency)—

3. (1) Subject to the provisions of the Act and of these rules,
 - (a) Collectors may, without the sanction of the Commissioner of the Division, grant loans not exceeding Rs. 2,500 each in amount;
 - (b) Assistant and Deputy Collectors in charge of talukas, subject to the provisions of Chapter XIII of the Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, relating to revision and appeal, shall, unless the Collector otherwise direct, exercise as regards such talukas all the powers by these rules conferred on Collectors, and may in any case, without the sanction of the Collector, grant loans not exceeding Rs. 1,000 each.

Provided that :

- (a) the aggregate of the loans granted in any one year must not, without the sanction of the Commissioner of the Division, exceed the sum assigned by him to that district for such year, and
- (b) every Collector shall submit to the Commissioner of his Division, on each of the dates marginally noted in every year, a quarterly statement showing every loan exceeding Rs. 500

in amount, made in his district, not included in a previous statement.

Every authority other than the Collector, on granting a loan exceeding Rs. 500 in amount, shall report the same to the Collector in time to admit of its being included in the quarterly statement then next to be submitted.

(2) (a) No loan exceeding Rs. 2,500 shall be granted without the previous sanction of the Commissioner, and

(b) no loan exceeding Rs. 5,000 shall be granted without the previous sanction of Government.

(3) Government in the case of loans requiring their sanction, and each Commissioner in the case of loans requiring his sanction, may call for such detailed plans and estimates or for such professional opinion on the project, for the purpose of which the loan is required, as may seem necessary before according sanction thereto.

(In supersession of Rule No. 19 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency)—

19. Payment of instalments may be suspended by order and at the discretion of the Collector on his being satisfied that there is good and sufficient reason for granting such indulgence.

No. 6043A.—The following draft rules under the provisions of Section 4 of the Agriculturists' Loans Act, 1884, are published for general information. Persons who have any objections to urge to them are required to forward their objections in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, on or before the expiry of one month from the date of this Notification:—

Under the provisions of Section 4 of the Agriculturists' Loans Act, 1884, the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council, to make the following rules in supersession of Nos. 4, 7 and 11 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency under the said section and published at page 81 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1886, Part I:

(To be substituted for No. 4 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency under the said section)—

4. (1) Every application for a loan shall be made to the Collector, Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the sub-division or to the Mámlatdár of the táluca or the Mahálkari of the petha.

(2) If the application is made to the Collector, Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the sub-division, such officer may, after making such enquiry as he may deem necessary, grant the loan applied for.

(3) If the application is made to the Mámlatdár or Mahálkari, such officer, after making personal enquiry as to the character of the applicant, his ability to give security and the fitness of the application,

(a) may, if the loan applied for does not exceed Rs. 50, and if he is satisfied with the result of such enquiry, grant the loan without the sanction of any superior officer, and

(b) shall, if the loan applied for exceeds Rs. 50, submit without unnecessary delay the application with his report to the Assistant or Deputy Collector, who shall pass such order thereon as he may deem proper.

(4) Assistant and Deputy Collectors in charge may, without the sanction of the Collector, grant applications for loans not exceeding Rs. 200 each.

(5) If a loan applied for exceeds Rs. 200, the Assistant or Deputy Collector shall at once apply for and before making the grant obtain the sanction of the Collector; and

(6) If the loan exceeds Rs. 500, the Collector shall at once apply for and before making the grant obtain the sanction of the Commissioner:

Provided that no loan shall be given to any holder who is in arrears for land revenue or for any loan made to him under the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, or these rules, except under a detailed order of the Collector granting the loan.

(For Rule 7 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency under the said section)—

7. Repayments of loans shall be made by such instalments including interest as the officer granting the loan may determine:

Provided that instalments may be suspended by order of the Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the sub-division on his being satisfied that there is good and sufficient reason for such indulgence.

(For Rule No. 11 of the rules heretofore in force in the Bombay Presidency under the said section)—

11. When a loan has been granted, the money should be paid by the disbursing officer to the holder of the land or his recognised agent, and a receipt taken; but when loans are required for the purchase of cattle, the Collector may take measures to purchase them and hand them over to the applicant.

Para. 3.—Subject to the sanction of the Inspector-General of Registration, a Cash or Day Book may be destroyed after a lapse of six years from the date of the final entry appearing therein.

No. 3727.—The following rules framed by the Municipalities of Broach and Anklesvar in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of the Wild Birds Protection Act XX of 1887, are published for general information:—

Rule I.—(1) For the purposes of the said Act in its application to the Municipalities of Broach and Anklesvar:

(a) "Wild Bird" means Grey Partridge, Black Partridge, Quail, Snipe, Wild Duck, or Wild Goose.

(b) The "breeding season" means in the case of a—

(1) Grey Partridge, from 15th March to 15th September.

(2) Black Partridge, from 15th March to 15th September.

(3) Quail, from 1st May to 1st September.

(4) Snipe, from 1st April to 1st October.

(5) Wild Duck, from 1st April to 1st October.

(6) Wild Goose, from 1st April to 1st October.

Rule II.—(a) No one shall within the limits of the said Municipalities possess (or sell) during its breeding season any wild bird which has been recently killed or taken.

(b) [No one shall import into the said Municipalities the plumage of any wild bird during its breeding season].

Rule III.—A breach of Rule II (a) [or Rule (b)] shall be punished with fine which may extend—

(a) in the case of a first offence to five rupees [in respect of every wild bird possessed or sold in breach of Rule II (a) or of which the plumage has been imported in breach of Rule II (b)], and

(b) in the case of a subsequent offence to ten rupees [in respect of every such bird or plumage].

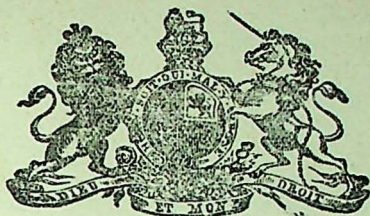

PART I.

Notification.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 20th September 1890.

No. 3796.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 16th instant in the Ports of Aden, Perim, and the Somali Coast as a temporary measure :—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Massowa shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter R of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.

IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale:—

After eight days of voyage	...	...	six days of quarantine.
Do. nine do.	...	...	five do.
Do. ten do.	...	...	four do.
Do. eleven do.	...	...	three do.
Do. twelve do.	...	...	two do.
Do. thirteen do.	and upwards	...	twenty-four hours of quarantine.

V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somáli Coast which may have communicated with vessels coming from Massowa shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somáli Coast from Massowa.

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.
