No. 5587.—The following Notification by the Government of India, Legislative Department, is republished for general information:—

"Simla, the 3rd October 1890.

No. 21.—The following Statute, 53 and 54 Vict., Cap. 51 (with so much of the Schedule thereto as affects Statutes in force in India), is published for general information:

STATUTE LAW REVISION (No. 2) ACT, 1890.

An Act for further promoting the Revision of the Statute Law by repealing enactments which have ceased to be in force or have become unnecessary.

[18TH AUGUST 1890.]

WHEREAS it is expedient that certain enactments which may be regarded as spent, or have ceased to be in force otherwise than by express specific repeal by Parliament, or have, by lapse of time or otherwise, become unnecessary, should be expressly and specifically repealed.

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1. The enactments described in the Schedule to this Act are hereby repealed, subject to the provisions of this Act and to the exceptions and qualifications in the schedule mentioned, and every part of a title, preamble, or recital specified after the words 'in part namely', in connection with an Act mentioned in the said schedule may be omitted from any revised edition of the statutes published by authority after the passing of this Act, and there may be added in the said edition such brief statement of the Acts, officers, persons, and things mentioned in the title, preamble, or recital, as may in consequence of such omission appear necessary.

Provided that—

The repeal of any words or expressions of enactment described in the schedule shall not affect the binding force, operation, or construction of any statute, or of any part of a statute, whether as respects the past or future;

and where any enactment not comprised in the schedule has been repealed, confirmed, revived, or perpetuated by any enactment hereby repealed, such repeal, confirmation, revivor, or perpetuation shall not be affected by the repeal effected by this Act;

and the repeal by this Act of any enactment or schedule shall not affect any enactment in which such enactment or schedule has been applied, incorporated, or referred to;

nor shall such repeal of any enactment affect any right to any hereditary revenues of the Crown, or affect any charges thereupon or prevent any such enactment from being put in force for the collection of any such revenues, or otherwise in relation thereto;

and this Act shall not affect the validity, invalidity, effect, or consequences of anything already done or suffered,—or any existing status or capacity,—or any right, title, obligation, or liability already acquired, accrued, or incurred, or any remedy or proceeding in respect thereof,—or any release or discharge of or from any debt, penalty, obligation, liability, claim, or demand,—or any indemnity,—or the proof of any past act or thing;

nor shall this Act affect any principle or rule of law or equity, or established jurisdiction, form or course of pleading, practice, or procedure, or the general or public nature of any statute, or any existing usage, franchise, liberty, custom, privilege, restriction, exemption, office, appointment, payment, allowance, emolument, or benefit, or any prospective right, notwithstanding that the same respectively may have been in any manner affirmed, recognised, or derived by, in, or from any enactment hereby repealed;

nor shall this Act revive or restore any jurisdiction, office, duty, drawback, fee, payment, franchise, liberty, custom, liability, right, title, privilege, restriction, exemption, usage, practice, procedure, form of punishment, or other matter or thing not now existing or in force;

and this Act shall not extend to repeal any enactment so far as the same may be in force in any part of Her Majesty's dominions out of the United Kingdom, except where otherwise expressed in the schedule.

2. If and so far as any enactment repealed by

this Act applies or may be applied in local courts, the Council applied to the court of the county palatine of Lancaster or to any inferior court of civil jurisdiction, such enactment shall be construed as if it were contained in a local and personal Act specially relating to such court and shall have effect accordingly.

3. All enactments relating to turnpike trusts or

turnpike roads in England and Wales, and not relating to other highways, may be omitted from any edition of the Statutes published by authority after the passing of this Act as if they were contained in local and personal Acts.

4. This Act may be cited as the Statute Law Revision (No. 2) Act, 1890.

SCHEDULE.

This schedule is to be read as referring to the Revised Edition of the Statutes prepared under the direction of the Statute Law Committee in all cases of Statutes included in that edition.

Enactments which have been already repealed are, in a few instances, included in the schedule, in order to avoid the necessity of reference to previous Statutes.

No. 5623.—The following Circular framed by Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature at Bombay, making certain additions to the instructions laid down in the High Court's Criminal Circulars for filling in the Criminal Return II (Form B), published at page 92 thereof, has been sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Council under the provisions of 24 and 25 Victoria, Chapter 104, Section 15, and is published for general information :—

In the instructions laid down for filling in the Criminal Returns, page 92—Return No. II (Form B) Monthly Return of cases disposed of by the Magistrate of the District or Magistrates of the First Class under Chapter VIII-B of the Criminal Procedure Code (Security for Good Behaviour), add after the words "In Column 10 explanation should be given when there has been a detention by the police of more than twenty-four hours, and in Column 15 when there has been a delay of more than 15 days before the trying Magistrate," the words after a full point, "In Column 11 the section under which security is required or forfeited should be stated."

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 14th October 1890.

No. 4133.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 4 of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1887, the Governor in Council is pleased to declare the provisions of Section 3 of the said Act, with respect to wild birds, to apply to hares.

No. 4138A.—The following rules framed by the Cantonment Committee of Ahmedabad, in exercise of the power conferred by Section 3 of the Wild Birds Protection Act (XX of), 1887, and confirmed by the Governor of Bombay in Council, are published for general information :—

I.—For the purposes of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1887, in its application to the Cantonment of Ahmedabad,—

(a) "Wild bird" means grey partridge, black (or painted) partridge, quail, snipe, wild duck or wild goose.

(b) "The breeding season" means, in the case of a—

(1) Grey partridge, from 15th March to 15th September.

(2) Black (or painted) partridge, from 15th March to 15th September.

(3) Quail, from 1st May to 1st September.

(4) Snipe, from 1st April to 1st October.

(5) Wild duck, from 1st April to 1st October.

(6) Wild goose, from 1st April to 1st October.

(7) Hare, from 1st May to 1st October.

II.—(a) No one shall, within the limits of the said cantonment, possess or sell during its breeding season any wild bird or hare which has been recently killed or taken.

(b) No one shall import into the said cantonment the plumage of any wild bird or the fur of any hare during its breeding season.

III.—A breach of Rule II (a) or Rule II (b) shall be punished with fine which may extend:

(a) in the case of a first offence to five rupees in respect of every wild bird or hare possessed or sold in breach of Rule II (a), or of which the plumage or fur has been imported in breach of Rule II (b); and

(b) in the case of a subsequent offence, to ten rupees in respect of every such bird or hare, or plumage or fur.

No. 4138B.—The rules framed by the Karachi, Jacobabad, Ahmedabad, Larkhāna, Kambar, Rato-dero, Broach and Anklesvar Municipalities in exercise of the power conferred by Section 3 of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1887, which were published in the Government Notifications noted in the margin, were confirmed by the Governor in Council.
