WEST COAST OF INDIA.

Bombay Harbour—Intended removal of North Patch Buoy.

Information has been received from the Port Officer, Bombay, that it is intended to remove, on or about the 1st May 1892, the red and black buoy, with globe marking the *North Patch*, in Bombay Harbour, as it is no longer of any use to Mariners.

Bombay Castle, 15th March 1892.

No. 21.—The following draft of Rules which it is proposed to make under Section 21 of the Inland Steam Vessels' Act, 1884, as amended by subsequent enactments, to regulate the making of surveys at the Port of Bombay under the said Act, is hereby published in accordance with Section 69 (1) of the said Act for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby. Notice is hereby given that the draft will be taken into consideration on and after the 1st day of May 1892, together with objections and suggestions with respect thereto addressed to the Secretary to Government in the Marine Department and received before the said date:—

1. An application for the survey of a steam-vessel at the Port of Bombay will be attended to, if not less than 3 clear days before the day on which it is desired that the survey shall take place, it is lodged, together with the fee, at the Port Office between the hours of 10 A. M. and 5 P. M. on any day except Sundays or holidays, on a printed sheet in the form No. 1 hereto annexed, which will be supplied at the Port Office for the purpose.
2. Upon receipt of an application in the form aforesaid, duly filled in, the Port Officer will, in communication with the Surveyors, fix a date and hour at which the survey shall be commenced, and will forward to the applicant an intimation of the date and hour so fixed, together with a list of the requisite preparations for the survey of the steam-vessel. The said intimation and list shall be in the form No. 2 hereto annexed.

The Port Officer shall usually arrange for surveys being made in the order in which applications therefor are received.

3. If every part of the steam-vessel is not ready for survey at the time so appointed, or if the requisite preparations have not been made in accordance with the list forwarded to the applicant under the last rule, the Surveyor may fix some other convenient time for the survey.
- If the Surveyor is unavoidably prevented from being present at the time fixed, the earliest possible intimation shall be sent to the applicant, and some other time, convenient to the applicant and to the Surveyor, shall be fixed for the survey.
4. Owners and Masters will be able to avoid inconvenience and delay in fixing the time

for the survey of vessels in dock or undergoing repairs by prompt intimation to the Port Officer if the vessels have afterwards to be surveyed.

5. If a Surveyor finds that any defect exists in the hull, machinery or equipments of a steam-vessel, he shall, before refusing to give a declaration regarding the vessel under Section 9 of the Act, address a letter in the form No. 3, hereto annexed, to the Owner or Master of the steam-vessel, pointing out such defect and also pointing out the repairs, &c., necessary to make good the same.
 - If the Surveyor be subsequently informed by the Owner or Master that the requisite repairs, &c., have been executed, he shall, with the approval of the Port Officer, pay one or more extra visits to the steam-vessel, and thereafter either give or refuse a declaration as he shall think proper.
 6. Every declaration of survey furnished under Section 9 of the Act shall be in form No. 5, hereto annexed, and shall contain the several particulars therein prescribed.
 7. Certificates of survey shall be in the form No. 6 attached to these rules or in such other form as the Governor General in Council may hereafter direct.
 8. The duties of a Surveyor making a survey shall be regulated by the instructions published in the United Kingdom for the guidance of the Surveyors appointed by the Board of Trade, but all references required by those instructions to be made to the Board of Trade and its officers shall, in the Presidency of Bombay, be made to Government through the Port Officer of Bombay.
 9. No. 1217.—The following Bye-laws of the Bank of Bombay are published for general information :—

In exercise of the power conferred by Section 63 of the Presidency Banks Act, 1876, the Directors of the Bank of Bombay have, with the previous approval of the Governor-General in Council, signified in writing under the hand of the Secretary to the Government of India, in the Financial Department, made the following Bye-laws in supersession of all previous Bye-laws of the said Bank.

1.—Except upon the security mentioned in the Presidency Banks Act, 1876, Section 36 (a) 1 to 5 inclusive, the Directors shall not discount bills for or lend or advance in any way to any individual or partnership firm to an amount exceeding in the aggregate at any one time Rs. 6,00,000;

And without the special instructions of the Directors, no advance exceeding Rs. 3,00,000, current at one time, shall be made to any individual or partnership firm except by way of discounting endorsed bills, or upon the security mentioned in Section 36 (a) 1 to 5 inclusive, of the Presidency Banks Act, 1876. But nothing contained in these Bye-laws shall be deemed to authorise the transaction of any kind of business other than that sanctioned in the Presidency Banks Act, 1876.

2.—Whenever the conduct of any Director, or an application for advance to any Director, or to any person being his co-partner, co-trustee, clerk or servant, or to a partner in any Company of which the Director may be a partner (except such Company be an Incorporated Joint Stock Company), shall form the subject of consideration or decision at any meeting of the Board, or Committee of the Board, such Director shall not sit, judge, or vote relative to such matter: and no Director shall vote regarding any application for a loan in which he is directly or indirectly interested.

And the Bank shall not make any advance to any officer of the Bank, save on the security mentioned in the said Section 36 (a) 1 to 5 inclusive.

3.—The half-yearly Balance Sheet of the Bank shall be in the following form, and shall contain the particulars therein described :—

4.—The Directors, at their Weekly Board Meeting, will appoint two of their number to form a Daily Committee for the ensuing week for the purpose of superintending the affairs of the Bank and advising with the Secretary and Treasurer regarding the current business at the Head Office and Branches.

5.—The Directors shall be entitled each to receive for their remuneration a sum not exceeding Rs. 30 (the remuneration of the Chairman being Rs. 60) for every attendance at a Board Meeting, and Rs. 15 for every attendance on the Daily Committee.

6.—The Board of Directors may delegate the powers vested in them by Bye-law No. 1 to committees, consisting of such members of their body as the Board think fit, and they may from time to time revoke the appointment of and discharge any such committee, either wholly or in part, and either as to persons or purposes; but every committee so formed shall, in the exercise of the powers delegated to it, conform to all such regulations as are prescribed for it by the Board. All acts done by any such committee, in conformity with such regulations, and in fulfilment of the purposes of its appointment, but not otherwise, shall have the like force and effect as if done by the Board.

7.—There shall be submitted to the Daily Committee an Abstract of the whole receipts and payments at Head Office of the preceding day, and particulars of all discounts, loans, or advances granted or applied for; also references from the Branches requiring to be dealt with at once and not within the scope of the ordinary authority of the Secretary, and such books or papers as may be called for. Each day's proceedings shall be signed in the minute book by the members of the Daily Committee attending.

8.—There shall be submitted to the Board at their weekly meeting a statement of the assets and liabilities of the Head Office and Branches as compared with the previous week, and a weekly statement showing in detail the whole of the transactions of each Branch up to the latest date practicable.

9.—Overdrafts without security, or overdrafts against security not recognized by the Presidency Banks Act, 1876, shall not be allowed: provided that the Secretary and Treasurer may, in his discretion, allow any person who keeps an account with the Bank to overdraw such account to the extent of sums not exceeding at any one time Rs. 2,000 in the whole.

10.—In no case whatever, without the sanction of the Board recorded in the weekly Proceedings, shall the Secretary commit the Bank to, or accede to any trust, assignment, or other arrangement by way of composition with insolvent or bankrupt debtors, or any deed whatsoever; but he may attend meetings of creditors with the sanction of the Daily Committee, or of any two of the Directors, and report progress to the Board.

11.—No other suspense account shall be allowed to be opened at Head Office except the one suspense account in the Banking Department. A statement of the account shall be included in reports submitted weekly to the Directors by the Chief Accountant. At each Branch also only one such suspense account shall be allowed, and a detailed statement of it shall be forwarded monthly to Head Office.

12.—There shall be paid, in respect of the transfer or transmission of any number of shares or amount of capital stock to the same person, a fee of one rupee per share or capital stock of equivalent value, and the same fee shall be paid on the renewal of any certificate worn out, defaced, or lost.

13.—Every Director, Secretary and Treasurer, Auditor, Trustee, Member of a Committee, officer' servant, Agent, Accountant, or other person employed in the business of the Bank, shall, before entering upon his duties, sign a declaration pledging himself to observe a strict secrecy respecting all transactions of the Bank with its customers, and state of accounts with other Banks, firms, or individuals, and in all matters relating thereto; and shall by such declaration pledge himself not to reveal any of the matters which may come to his knowledge in the discharge of his duties, except when required or authorized so to do by the Board, or by any meeting, or by a court of law, and except so far as may be necessary in order to comply with any of the provisions of the Presidency Banks Act, 1876.

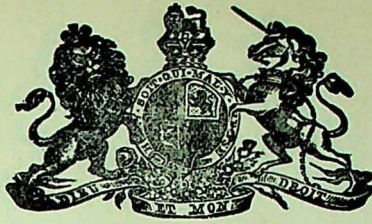

POLITICAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 1952.—Their Excellencies the Most Honourable the MARQUIS OF LANSDOWNE, G.C.M.G., G.M.S.I., G.M.I.E., and the MARCHIONESS OF LANSDOWNE, C.I., are expected to arrive at the Victoria Terminus of the G. I. P. Railway in Bombay at 6 P.M. (Madras time) on Wednesday the 30th March 1892, and will be received on arrival with all the honours due to the Viceroy of India.

2. The *Commissioner of the Central Division will attend on His Excellency at Bhusával when he enters the limits of the Presidency; and the Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor will join His Lordship's train at Kalyán. The Superintendent of Railway Police will be in attendance within the limits of his jurisdiction.

3. On His Excellency's alighting from the train at Victoria Terminus, a salute of 31 guns will be fired from the Parade Ground near the Victoria Station. A Guard of Honour of the G. I. P. Railway Volunteer Corps with Band and Colours will be drawn up at the station, and the road from the Western Entrance of the station through Hornby Road past the Frere Fountain and between the Post Office and the Secretariat Public Works Department will be lined by troops of the garrison. A Guard of Honour of Bombay Infantry with Band and Colours will be drawn up at Government House, Malabar Point. The Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor will arrange direct with the Military authorities on the subject of the European Guard to be mounted at Government House during the Viceroy's visit.

4. His Excellency the Viceroy will be received at the station by His Excellency the Governor with his Staff. Their Excellencies the Commander-in-Chief of the Bombay Army, and the Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Naval Forces in India, with their respective Staffs, the Honourable the Chief Justice of Bombay, the Lord Bishop of Bombay, the Ordinary Members of Council of the Government of Bombay, the Puisne

* In consequence of the hour at which His Excellency's train will reach Bhusával, the Viceroy has been pleased, as a special case, to excuse the Commissioner from attendance.

Judges of the High Court, the Additional Members of the Council of His Excellency the Governor for making Laws and Regulations, the Chief Secretary to Government, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Bombay, the Secretaries to Government, the Brigadier-General Commanding the Bombay District, the President of the Municipal Corporation, the Director of the Indian Marine, the Municipal Commissioner of Bombay, the Sheriff of Bombay, the Chairman of the Standing Committee, the Under Secretaries to Government and the Heads of Departments, Civil and Military, will be in attendance. The Consular representatives of Foreign Governments and the Most Revd. Archbishop Dalhoff are invited to be present at the station.

5. All officers of Her Majesty's Services, Civil, Naval, Military and the Indian Marine, now in Bombay, and not otherwise on duty, are desired to attend.

6. The Railway Department should issue instructions for the necessary arrangements being made at the Railway Station for His Excellency's reception, and for the adequate provision of space for those invited or desired to attend. His Lordship will proceed to Government House, Malabár Point, escorted by a detachment of His Excellency the Governor's Body Guard and of the Bombay Light Horse, along the route lined by troops.

7. The Commissioner of Police will arrange for the maintenance of order and for keeping the streets clear.

8. White uniform or where the officials mentioned do not wear such uniform, Full Dress will be worn.

9. By desire of His Excellency the Viceroy, his departure from Bombay will be private, and the Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor will make the necessary arrangements.
