##### WEST COAST OF INDIA.

*Bombay Harbour—Intended removal of  
North Patch Buoy.*

Information has been received from the Port Officer, Bombay, that it is intended to remove, on or about the 1st May 1892, the red and black buoy, with globe marking the *North Patch*, in Bombay Harbour, as it is no longer of any use to Mariners.

No. 21.—The following draft of Rules which it is proposed to make under Section 21 of the Inland Steam Vessels' Act, 1884, as amended by subsequent enactments, to regulate the making of surveys at the Port of Bombay under the said Act, is hereby published in accordance with Section 69 (1) of the said Act for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby. Notice is hereby given that the draft will be taken into consideration on and after the 1st day of May 1892, together with objections and suggestions with respect thereto addressed to the Secretary to Government in the Marine Department and received before the said date:—

1. An application for the survey of a steam-vessel at the Port of Bombay will be attended to, if not less than 3 clear days before the day on which it is desired that the survey shall take place, it is lodged, together with the fee, at the Port Office between the hours of 10 A. M. and 5 P. M. on any day except Sundays or holidays, on a printed sheet in the form No. 1 hereto annexed, which will be supplied at the Port Office for the purpose.
2. Upon receipt of an application in the form aforesaid, duly filled in, the Port Officer will, in communication with the Surveyors, fix a date and hour at which the survey shall be commenced, and will forward to the applicant an intimation of the date and hour so fixed, together with a list of the requisite preparations for the survey of the steam-vessel. The said intimation and list shall be in the form No. 2 hereto annexed.

The Port Officer shall usually arrange for surveys being made in the order in which applications therefor are received.

3. If every part of the steam-vessel is not ready for survey at the time so appointed, or if the requisite preparations have not been made in accordance with the list forwarded to the applicant under the last rule, the Surveyor may fix some other convenient time for the survey.

If the Surveyor is unavoidably prevented from being present at the time fixed, the earliest possible intimation shall be sent to the applicant, and some other time, convenient to the applicant and to the Surveyor, shall be fixed for the survey.

4. Owners and Masters will be able to avoid inconvenience and delay in fixing the time for the survey of vessels in dock or undergoing repairs by prompt intimation to the Port Officer if the vessels have afterwards to be surveyed.
5. If a Surveyor finds that any defect exists in the hull, machinery or equipments of a steam-vessel, he shall, before refusing to give a declaration regarding the vessel under Section 9 of the Act, address a letter in the

form No. 3, hereto annexed, to the Owner or Master of the steam-vessel, pointing out such defect and also pointing out the repairs, &c., necessary to make good the same.

If the Surveyor be subsequently informed by the Owner or Master that the requisite repairs, &c., have been executed, he shall, with the approval of the Port Officer, pay one or more extra visits to the steam-vessel, and thereafter either give or refuse a declaration as he shall think proper.

6. Every declaration of survey furnished under Section 9 of the Act shall be in form No. 5, hereto annexed, and shall contain the several particulars therein prescribed.
7. Certificates of survey shall be in the form No. 6 attached to these rules or in such other form as the Governor General in Council may hereafter direct.
8. The duties of a Surveyor making a survey shall be regulated by the instructions published in the United Kingdom for the guidance of the Surveyors appointed by the Board of Trade, but all references required by those instructions to be made to the Board of Trade and its officers shall, in the Presidency of Bombay, be made to Government through the Port Officer of Bombay.
9. Whenever two Surveyors are employed by order of Government under Section 18 of the Act, instead of one only, to make a survey, and whenever two Surveyors are directed by Government under Section 19 of the Act to make a second survey, one of the said Surveyors shall be a Shipwright Surveyor and the other an Engineer Surveyor, and they shall respectively perform the portion of the duties which appertain to the Shipwright's and Engineer's Departments, and in any case in which doubt shall exist, their respective duties shall be specifically determined by the Port Officer of Bombay.
10. A fee at the following rates shall be payable in respect of surveys:—

For steam-ships of which the gross tonnage—

The fee payable shall be deemed to cover three visits of a Surveyor.

An additional fee at the rate of eight annas for every twenty tons, or fraction of twenty tons of the vessel's tonnage, but not, in any case, exceeding ten rupees, shall be payable for every extra visit that a Surveyor makes, with the approval of the Port Officer, before he is able to grant this declaration.

No. 927.—In exercise of the power conferred by section 35 of the Bombay Boiler Inspection Act, 1891, and in supersession of Government Notification No. 2474 of 26th June 1889 (published in the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1889, Part I, page 552), the Governor in Council is pleased to frame the following rules for every district or place in the province in Sind to which the said Act extends or has been or shall hereafter at any time be extended by the Governor in Council, viz.:—

##### Preliminary.

1. In these rules:

Definition.

(a) “the Act” means the Bombay Boiler Inspection Act, 1891;

(b) “section” means a section of the said Act;

(c) “the Collector” means the chief local officer in charge of the revenue administration of a district;

(d) the terms defined in section 3 shall be deemed to have, respectively, the same meaning as is given to them by the Act;

(e) words in the singular include the plural, and vice versa.



*Inspection.*

2. The Inspector shall receive as his remuneration such emoluments as Government may, from time to time, fix.
- Inspector's emoluments.
3. The Boiler Inspection Office for each district or place in which the Act is in force shall be in the office of the Collectors of Karáchi and Hyderabad, respectively, and the Inspector shall attend thereat, whenever necessary, during usual office hours.
- Boiler Inspection Office.
4. The Inspector shall act under the orders of the Collector, and make all reports to that officer.
- Inspector to act under the orders of the Collector.
5. The Inspector shall keep a diary of the work which he performs from day to day. In it he shall enter :
- Inspector's Diary.
- (a) each place visited ;
- (b) every work performed by him under the Act ;
- (c) the fee recovered on account of each such work ;
- (d) such additional particulars as he from time to time thinks necessary.
- The Inspector shall submit a copy of the diary so kept by him every week to the Collector for his information and record.
6. The Inspector shall keep an index, register, and dimension sheets, in such order as the Collector shall authorize, of all boilers liable to inspection under the Act and such other statements and records as the Collector shall from time to time direct.
- Other records to be kept by Inspector.
7. The Inspector shall attend every meeting of a Commission appointed under section 5 and shall make such statements and submit such plans to the Commission as he thinks necessary or as shall be called for by the Commission.
- Duties of Inspector with respect to Commissions.
8. The Inspector shall be provided with the testing pump, indicator and gauges necessary for testing boilers.
- Testing apparatus to be provided for Inspector.
9. (1) The Inspector's examination of a boiler shall be both external and internal.
- Provisions as to inspection of boilers.
- (2) If the owner or person in charge of a boiler examined fails to comply, in any material point, with :
- (a) the provisions of clauses (b) and (d) of sub-section (1) of section 9 ; or
- (b) any requirement of the Inspector under clause (a) or clause (c) of sub-section (1) of the said section ;
- the Inspector shall defer his inspection and report the case to the Collector for orders.

*Inspection Fees.*

10. Fees shall be levied for the inspection of boilers under sections 8 and 17 according to the following scale, viz. :—
- Scale of fees.

For the inspection of each boiler not exceeding 10 H. P. nominal ... ..	Rs. 15
Do. do. exceeding 10, but not exceeding 20 do. ... ..	20
Do. do. 20 do. ... ..	30
Do. do. 30 do. ... ..	40
Do. do. 50 ... ..	50

*Commissions.*

11. The person or persons appointed under section 5 on Commissions shall attend, at the request of the Collector, whenever necessary, at his office or at such other place within the Collector's charge or in Karáchi as the Collector may in each case think fit to appoint.
- Attendance on Commissions.
12. Each person so appointed shall be entitled to receive a fee of Rs. 30 for each day on which any duty prescribed by the Act is performed by him, provided that he has been engaged in such duties during three hours of such day.
- Emoluments of persons appointed on Commissions.

*Examiners.*

13. The number of persons to be appointed to the Board of Examiners will be determined from time to time by Government. Their appointments and the terms for which they are respectively appointed will be notified in the *Bombay Government Gazette* and in the *Sind Official Gazette*.
- Nomination of Board of Examiners.

14. The Board shall assemble, at the request of the Commissioner in Sind, whenever necessary, at such place as the said Commissioner may from time to time deem convenient for the examination of candidates.
- Meetings of the Board.

15. Each Examiner shall be entitled to receive a fee of thirty rupees for each meeting of the Board at which any duty prescribed by the Act is performed and which he attends from the beginning to the end thereof.
- Emoluments of Examiners.

*Examinations.*

16. Examinations shall ordinarily be held once a month on the second Wednesday in the month, but the Commissioner in Sind may, for sufficient reasons, fix any other day in any month for examinations, or, if the fees of the candidates enrolled for examination in any month are insufficient to cover the Examiners' fees for that month, may postpone the examination.
- Dates of Examination.
17. Examinations for certificates of competency will be of three kinds, viz., one for each of the three classes of certificates of competency which the Board is hereinafter empowered to grant.
- Examinations to be of three kinds.



18. Candidates at examinations will pay fees at the following rates, viz. :—

For a First Class Certificate ... ..	Rs. 20
Do. Second do. ... ..	15
Do. Third do. ... ..	10

Unsuccessful candidates will not be entitled to a return of any portion of the fee paid by them; but the fee paid by any applicant who is not admitted to examination will be returned to him in full.

19. Every applicant for examination must lodge a written application at the office of the Collector not later than fifteen days before the date fixed for the examination, together with:

- (a) testimonials of good character and sobriety; and
- (b) proof of service or a certificate of employment such as is required by Rule 22, 25 or 27 as the case may be; and
- (c) proof that he has completed twenty-one (or, in the case of a candidate for a first class certificate, twenty-two) years of age; and
- (d) a receipt from such bank or officer as the Collector may direct such fees to be payable to, for the amount of the fee prescribed in Rule 18 for the examination at which the candidate wishes to appear.

20. No applicant will be admitted to examination whose testimonials or other documents or proofs produced by him in accordance with Rule 19 are not, in the opinion of the Board, trustworthy and satisfactory.

21. Every examination shall be of such a nature as to test the practical knowledge of the candidates and to ascertain their competency to manage boilers and prime-movers.

#### QUALIFICATIONS TO BE REQUIRED OF CANDIDATES.

##### A.—Third Class Certificates of Competency.

22. A candidate for a third class certificate of competency will not be admitted to examination unless he proves to the satisfaction of the Board that previously to his application he has been three years employed as a fireman on engines and boilers, or produces either

- (a) from the Principal of the College of Science at Poona, or
- (b) under the signature of the Director of Public Instruction, as the Full Technological Certificate of the Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute at Bombay, a certificate stating that such candidate has completed in the work-

shops of such College or Institute a three years' course and during that period has been constantly instructed in the management of engines.

23. The examination for third class certificates will be conducted *vid* Method of Examination. *voce* and will be held, if possible, in a foundry, where the candidate's knowledge can be practically tested in the use of the steam, vacuum and water gauges.

24. In order to be entitled to a third class certificate of competency a candidate must:

- (a) satisfy the Board that he fully understands the working and management of boilers, the use of the salinometer, and the separate use of gauge glass-cocks, blow-off and scum cocks, &c.;
- (b) be able to explain to some extent the actual working of engines and the separate uses of feed-pumps, slide-valves, pistons, &c.
- (c) be able to show to the satisfaction of the Examiners how he would act in case of a breakdown of any portion of the machinery, &c.

##### B.—Second Class Certificates of Competency.

25. A candidate for a second class certificate of competency will not be admitted to the examination, unless he proves to the satisfaction of the Board that, previously to his application, he has served for not less than three years in a factory or workshop where steam power was used or engines or boilers were made or repaired, or produces either

- (a) from the Principal of the College of Science at Poona, or
- (b) under the signature of the Director of Public Instruction, as the Full Technological Certificate of the Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute at Bombay,

a certificate stating that such candidate has completed in the workshops of such College or Institute a three years' course, and during that period has been constantly instructed in the management of engines.

26. In order to be entitled to a second class certificate of competency a candidate must:

- (a) write a legible hand and understand the first five rules of arithmetic and decimals;
- (b) show a knowledge of the construction of boilers and of the methods of staying them, and of the use and management of the different valves, cocks, pipes and connexions;
- (c) show a knowledge of the construction of engines in general use and of the details of their different working parts, both external and internal, and of the use of each part;
- (d) be able to show to some extent how defects from accidents, decay, &c., may be corrected and how a temporary or permanent repair of



machinery should be effected in case of any derangement or total break-down ;

(e) be able to show to some extent the causes and effects of, and the usual remedies for, incrustation and corrosion ;

(f) be able to show that he understands the use of the thermometer and salinometer.

*C.—First Class Certificates of Competency.*

27. A candidate for a first class certificate of competency will not be admitted to examination unless :  
Requisite previous training of candidates.

(a) he is in possession of a second class certificate of competency and proves to the satisfaction of the Board either that he has actually served for twelve months as engineer in charge of boilers of a class for which a second class certificate is necessary or that since obtaining such certificate he has worked for twelve months at the making and repairing of engines or mill machinery ; or

(b) if he is not in possession of a second class certificate of competency, he proves to the satisfaction of the Board that he has served for five years in Europe as a leading engineer in engine works or as engineer in charge of mill machinery of 60 horse-power, nominal, or upwards.

28. In order to be entitled to a first class certificate of competency a candidate must, in addition to the qualifications required of a candidate for a second class certificate :

(a) be conversant with the mensuration or superficies and solids and the extraction of the square root ;

(b) be able to make rough drawings of the different parts of engines and boilers ;

(c) show some knowledge of the general properties borne by the principal parts of the machinery to each other ;

(d) be able to take off and calculate indicator diagrams ;

(e) be able to calculate safety-valve pressure and the strength of boilers ;

(f) be able to explain the method of testing and altering the slide-valves, and of testing the fairness of the various shafts and of adjusting them ;

(g) be conversant with surface condensations, superheating and the working of steam expansively.

29. (1) Each candidate will in the first place be called upon to give written answers within a prescribed time to ten questions from the "Elementary Questions," issued by Government. If his answers to these are not satisfactory, his examination will not be proceeded with, and he shall be declared to have failed.

(2) If the candidate's answers on the above papers are satisfactory, the examination will proceed as follows, viz. :—

(a) a paper of ten questions in arithmetic will be set to be answered within a proscribed time ;

(b) the candidate will be called upon to make, within a proscribed time, a rough drawing of some part of a boiler or engine ;

(c) the candidate will be examined *visà voce* on the subjects specified in clauses (c) to (g), both inclusive, of Rule 28 and on the papers which have been set to him.

(3) Answers to written questions must be worked out in the presence of at least one of the Examiners.

(4) Each candidate's answers to written questions must be given up on the expiry of the time proscribed, whether his answers are then complete or not.

(5) If a candidate's written answers, taken in connection with the *visà voce* examination, satisfy the Examiners of his capability to take charge of the boilers attached to a prime-mover of upwards of 60 horse-power, nominal, he shall be declared to have passed the examination ; otherwise he shall be declared to have failed.

30. When a candidate for a first class certificate of competency fails either in the elementary questions or in the subsequent portion of the examination, the Board of Examiners shall fix a period after the expiry of which he may again appear for examination and inform him thereof, and the candidate shall not be at liberty to appear again for examination until after the expiry of the period so fixed.

*Certificates of Competency.*

31. Certificates of competency shall be in the form of Appendix A or to the like effect.

32. Holders of certificates of the first class will be deemed to be capable, as First Class Engineers, of having charge of the boilers attached to a prime-mover of any horse-power. Holders of certificates of the third class will be deemed to be capable, as Third Class Engineers or Engine-drivers, of having charge of the boilers attached to a prime-mover not exceeding 20 horse-power, nominal.

33. Applications for certificates under section 22 shall be lodged with the Collector, together with the original certificates of other authorities relied upon by the applicants, and shall be laid
