INDIA—BAY OF BENGAL—BURMA.

Arakan Coast. Intended alteration in the character of Oyster Island Light.

It is intended to alter the character of Oyster Island Light on or about the 20th May 1892. The new light will be dioptric occulting of the first order with an occulting period of 28 seconds light and 2 seconds dark.

The apparatus will illuminate all round the horizon, 345 degrees to be of white light and 15 degrees of red light, the latter covering Oyster Reef, on which the overturned Pile light-house stood prior to 1884, or between the bearings of N. 50° W. and N. 35° W. Magnetic from seaward.

The new light-house, 141 feet high and circular, is constructed of iron and will be painted in alternate bands of black and white. The tower is a true frustum of a cone, *i.e.*, it decreases in diameter gradually and evenly from base to top.

The focal plane of the light will be 130 feet above high water and the range of visibility will be 16 to 18 miles.

The new light-house is situated in Latitude 20° 11' 50" N., Longitude 92° 31' 51" E.

The existing light-house, which is a temporary wooden structure, will be removed and the old light discontinued.

The blue light which is burnt at present every half hour, will be discontinued as soon as the new light is exhibited.
