No. 1546.—The following Circular, No. 15-8 dated 21st April 1892, from the Government of India, Revenue and Agricultural Department (Museums and Exhibitions), and its accompaniments are published for general information in continuation of Government Notification No. 1350, dated 26th idem :-

"SIR,-In continuation of the telegram from this Department dated 2nd instant, I am directed to

state that intimation has been received that the official opening of the Imperial Institute will not take place this year. It has been decided, however, by the Executive Council of the Imperial Institute to organize an Exhibition of Indian metal work during the summer, and to invite loans of artware specimens from manufacturers, dealers, and owners for the purpose. This Exhibition will be opened in June 1892.

2. The accompanying form and instructions have been received from Sir Frederick Abel, Secretary to the Council of the Imperial Institute, and I am to request that, with the permission of

they may be circulated to large merchants and dealers, and, if necessary, published in the local Gazette for the information and guidance of persons desirous of exhibiting. Arrangements should be made for the despatch of exhibits direct to the Secretary to the Imperial Institute, London, S. W., to whom the applications received may also be posted direct by the Local Government.

- 3. No charge will be made to merchants for space in the building. Large manufacturers and dealers will have to defray the cost incurred for the casing, &c., of their specimens, but in the case of artizans who contribute specimens for exhibitor, the Institute will defray the necessary outlay. All other expenses will have to be borne by Exhibitors.

 Any exhibits which may have already been collected under the terms of the circular instructions noted in the margin may be forwarded to the Imperial Institute.
- 5. I am to request that the Government of India may be informed by telegraph before the 15th proximo of the total amount of case-room that will probably be required for exhibits from Bombay.

REGULATIONS.

- 1. The Exhibition will be opened in or about the month of June 1892, and will remain open for a period of about five months.
- 2. Signs or descriptive labels, &c., must be submitted to and approved by the Executive Council before use.

- 3. All cases, tables, stands or other fittings must be provided at the cost of the Exhibitor.
- 4. The rooms in which the Exhibition will be held are 20 feet in height; designs to scale of all trophies, show cases, &c., must, previous to their erection, be approved by the Executive Council.
- 5. No means of securing or fixing cases or trophies can be permitted which will deface or in any way injure the walls of the rooms.
- 6. Exhibitors will be required to provide attendants for keeping their stands and exhibits properly cleaned and in good order, or must arrange to have this work done, at their expense, by the Executive Council. All stands should remain uncovered during the hours the Exhibition is open to the public.
- 7. It is probable that the hours during which the Exhibition will remain open to the public will be from 11 A.M. to 10 P.M. on all days except Wednesdays and Fridays, when the hour of closing will be 5 P.M. These arrangements are, however, subject to alteration. The Exhibition will not be open on Sundays.
- 8. No sales will be allowed to take place in the building, but authorised attendants or agents of Exhibitors may take orders for the delivery of duplicates.
- 9. No exhibit may be removed until the close of the Exhibition without permission of the Executive Council.
- 10. No article exhibited may be photographed, drawn, copied, or reproduced, in any manner whatsoever, without the special sanction of the Executive Council.
- 11. All packages containing goods intended for exhibition must be addressed to the Secretary, and bear the name of the Exhibitor by whom they are sent.
- 12. All goods intended for exhibition should reach the Institute buildings on or before the 1st of June 1892. Exhibits must be ready for inspection at least two days previous to the opening.
- 13. All arrangements for the unpacking, arranging and removal of exhibits must be made, and expenses borne, by the Exhibitors, or by arrangements in accordance with 6.
- 14. The Executive Council reserves to itself the right of refusing to admit any exhibit.
- 15. The Executive Council reserves to itself the sole right of publishing and selling a Catalogue, and for this purpose requests that a descriptive list, duly classified, of the goods intended for exhibition may be forwarded to the Secretary by the respective Exhibitors not later than the 1st of June 1892.
- 16. The Executive Council, while taking every precaution for the protection of articles in the buildings, cannot hold itself responsible for their loss or damage from whatsoever cause arising.
- 17. Only objects of British East Indian manufacture will be admitted. This rule can only be relaxed by special permission of the Executive Council.

18. All communications to be addressed to the Secretary of the Imperial Institute, London, S. W., and to have marked on the cover the words 'Indian Metal-work Exhibition.'"

No. 39.—In accordance with the provisions of Section 74 of the Bombay Port Trust Act the following Bye-law made by the Trustees of the Port of Bombay, in substitution of Bye-law No. 3 of the Bye-laws for Pilots of Coasting Steamers, approved by Government under Notification No. 72, dated 1st July 1891, is published for the information of all persons whom it may concern:—

Every such Pilot of coasting steamers shall hold a license to Pilot only those steamers that have berths duly allotted to them alongside the Harbour walls of the Prince's and Victoria Docks and the license shall only entitle him to pilot such steamers on the passage between the open sea and the berths in question and between such berths and the Dry Docks and Patent Slip north of Prince's Dock and shall be issued under the signature and seal, and be revocable at the order of the Trustees of the Port.

RESOLUTION—By the Government of India, Finance and Commerce Department.

Read again-

- (1) Revised rules for the guidance of depositors in the Post Office Savings Banks prescribed in the Resolutions in this Department Nos. 1729 and 232, dated respectively the 9th April 1888 and 11th January 1889; and
- (2) The rules* for the guidance of depositors in Presidency Savings Banks approved in the letter in this Department No. 1702, dated the 29th March 1889.

Read also-

Letter from the Comptroller and Auditor General, No. 21, dated the 4th July 1891.

RESOLUTION.—His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the following alterations in the two sets of rules read in the preamble:

I.—Strike out clause (e) of Rule 10.

II.—Insert the following after Rule 11:

Security Deposit Accounts.

11A. (i) Government servants and servants of Local authorities who are required by Government or by such authorities to deposit security, and contractors who are required by Government or Local authorities to deposit security, may be allowed a separate account for the security deposit only.

Note.—Local authority means any body corporate' Municipal Committee, or other persons legally entitled to the control or management of any local or municipal fund, or legally entitled to impose any cess, rate, duty, or tax upon any persons within any local area.

- (ii) A person undertaking more than one work or contract at the same time may be allowed a separate account in respect of each.
- (iii) The maximum limit for each separate account is Rs. 500, which may be deposited in a single sum or by instalments.
- (iv) A person may open a security deposit account either in his own behalf or on behalf of another person.
- (v) A security deposit account may be opened in the joint names of the persons undertaking the same work or contract.

11B. 'The depositor will be required to sign a letter (in the prescribed form) addressed to the Post Master undertaking not to make any claim on the Savings Bank for the principal of the sum

deposited except with the express written sanction of the person referred to in the letter to whom the security is pledged; not to object to the payment by the Bank of the principal to such person on his claiming it, and not to make any claim for interest after interest has ceased to accrue owing to the payment of the principal to such person, or from the date on which such person has sanctioned the repayment of the deposit.'

11C. The officer to whom the security is pledged as above may, with the consent of the person pledging the security, open an account for such security in his own name, e.g., 'Executive Engineer, A.—pore, on account of security of A. B.' In this case the deposit will be received from the officer to whom the security is pledged and the pass book will be issued to him.

11D. Interest on security deposits will accrue and be paid in the usual manner, subject to the conditions specified in the letter mentioned in Rule 11B.

ORDER.—Ordered, that this Resolution be communicated to the Comptroller and Auditor General and to the Director General of the Post Office in India.

Ordered also, that the Resolution be published in the Gazette of India for general information.
