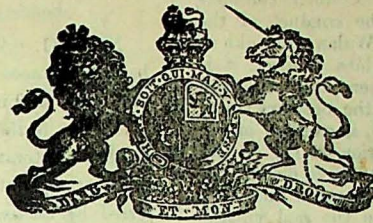

Summary of reports on agricultural conditions and prospects in India for the month of May (published in continuation of the summaries for March and April contained in the despatches to the Secretary of State which appeared in the 'Gazette of India' of the 25th June*).

1. The position is very much what was predicted in the summary for April. In districts which have received the earlier showers of the monsoon in sufficient quantity agricultural operations have been more or less resumed. In those which have received little or no rain the numbers on relief-works have continued slowly to increase. During May the monsoon did not give so much rain as was hoped to the Madras Presidency, but the exceptional cyclone which travelled from the West Coast to the North-West Hymalayas in two days produced unexpected rainfall in the tracts through which it passed, and had considerable influence in attracting labour from the relief-works to the fields. Briefly reviewing the agricultural condition in the various Provinces at the end of May, it may be said that the position in Bombay had materially improved; that in Madras some of the affected tracts had been relieved by rain, while in the rest no serious change for the worse had occurred. In Burma the area officially reported as affected by scarcity had contracted. In Bengal, although the number on relief-works had increased, many of the affected tracts had been considerably benefited by rain. In Ajmere and Rajputana the position remained much as before. In no other part of India was there any real cause for anxiety.

2. The following is a brief abstract province by province of the more important facts noticed in the provincial reports for May or brought to knowledge during June:

In Madras, although the rainfall of May was much below the average expected, there has since the close of the month been heavy and general rain in three of the affected districts, and useful showers have fallen elsewhere. During the period under report prices were slightly easier, trade was active, and there was no evidence of any diminution in the food-stocks. No unsatisfactory reports as to the condition of the people either in their villages or on the relief-works have been received, except from Bellary and Salem.

It is now reported that the increased mortality in February last was wholly due to small-pox, while that of March and April is mostly ascribed to the same cause and to fever.

In *Bombay* the affected area has been reduced by the exclusion of the districts of Sholápur, Poona, and Sítára, where it is reported that no further cause for anxiety remains. In the other three affected districts the general condition and prospects are not unsatisfactory. Good and sufficient rain has fallen throughout them, and agricultural operations are in progress. The Bombay Government has abolished the special appointment of Famine Under-Secretary which was created in February last to deal with the work due to the scarcity.

In *Bengal* the prospects of the country have been generally improved by the rain which fell in May, and field work has been resumed in several of the affected districts. Further improvement has occurred during the current month, and there has been a material decrease in the numbers on relief-works. The mortality in April was abnormal in three districts, but is ascribed to fever and small-pox, and not in any way to the scarcity or to want of relief.

In the Himalayan tracts of the *North-Western Provinces and Oudh* the physical condition of the people remains generally good. There was an increase in the death-rate in April, but it was due to fever and bowel-complaints and not to the distress. There was no change in the prospects of the affected districts during May.

There is very little cause for apprehension in the *Punjab*. The scarcity in the hills is not giving rise to any pronounced distress, and the only district (Rawalpindi) in which the possibility of a demand for relief-works was anticipated has received good rain in the current month.

In *Burma* the condition of the affected districts continues to improve, and a further considerable decrease in the area officially shown as affected took place in May. The public health is satisfactory, and in no district has the death-rate been affected by the scarcity. Prices fell during the month. Large stocks of rice are believed to be held in the upper division of the Province, to which the distress is confined, while importations from Lower Burma continue to be brisk.

In *Ajmere-Merwara* there was again no important change during May. An epidemic of cholera has unfortunately visited the district, causing a large number of deaths; but, apart from this, the health and condition of the people were fairly good. The Chief Commissioner has recently submitted a revised programme of relief-works sufficient to provide for all emergencies for the next three months. The numbers on relief-works continue large.

As regards the Native States where scarcity exists, it is reported that in *Mysore* the condition continues to improve, and the numbers on relief-works are steadily decreasing. In the *Rajputana States* there was no material change during May. In the *Southern Mahratta States* the monsoon has set in favourably, and a considerable decrease in the number on relief-works is anticipated.

The large number relieved in *Kolhápúr* is due to exceptional action adopted by the Darbár. This circumstance is mentioned in order to explain the exceptional character of the statistics from Kolhápúr, where the position is in reality no worse than in the adjacent country. Some distress is also reported to exist in the Tehri State (Garhwal), but the situation does not give any cause for anxiety.

In the event of any such cargo, goods or substance being thrown or allowed to fall as mentioned in the foregoing bye-law, the master of such vessel as aforesaid and the stevedore and ship's officer in charge or in any other case the person in charge of the said cargo, goods or substance as mentioned in the foregoing bye-law, shall immediately take measures to have the said cargo, goods or substance taken out of the water, and in the event of failure to do so within eighteen (18) hours from the receipt of notice by the Dock Superintendent calling upon any such party or parties to take such steps as aforesaid, the master of the said vessel and the party or parties aforesaid shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 100, and the Dock Superintendent may remove such cargo, goods and substance at the expense of such defaulting party or parties as aforesaid and such expenses

shall be recovered from such party or parties. In the event of any such cargo, goods or substance being thrown or falling as aforesaid, the master of the said vessel and the party in whose charge the cargo, goods or substance were at the time shall be responsible for all damage which may occur in consequence.

"34C. In the event of any cargo, goods or substance being thrown or allowed to fall as mentioned in the foregoing bye-laws, the master of the vessel as aforesaid and the stevedore and ship's officer in charge of the unloading or loading as aforesaid, and in any other case the person who for the time being had charge of the cargo, goods or substance, shall forthwith give notice of the occurrence and furnish all particulars connected therewith to the Dock Superintendent.

"The word 'Prince's' to be struck out from bye-law No. 54.

"In bye-law No. 84 the word 'bridge' to be cancelled wherever it occurs and the words 'bridges and caissons' substituted.

"The words 'without authority' to be inserted between the words 'shall' and 'be' in the first line of bye-law No. 128."

And whereas by the Basses Lights Acts 1869 and 1872 and the Public Works Loans Act 1881 it is provided that so long as any money is due to the Public Works Loan Commissioners on account of any loan under those Acts, the dues payable in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse and the Little Basses Lighthouse, or the Minicoy Lighthouse, shall be altered only with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that all advances made by the Public Works Loans Commissioners for the purposes mentioned in the said Acts have been repaid, and that it is expedient that the amount of the dues hereinbefore referred to should be varied in manner hereinafter mentioned:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Acts, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that from and after the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, or from the time of the receipt of notice of this Order, if that be later, by the officers authorized to collect light dues, the dues heretofore levied in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse, the Little Basses Lighthouse, and Minicoy Lighthouse under the said Order in Council of the twenty-second day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three shall be subject to an abatement or discount of fifty per centum.

As several enquiries have been made by officers as to whether charges on account of Rubber Stamps and Ink will have to be borne by them, I

have the honour to invite attention to Rule 5 of the 'Stationery Supply Rules' published with this office Circular No. 1360, dated 30th March 1892, at page 384 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated 5th May 1892, Part I, which runs as follows :—

"5. Bills for rubber stamps are not to be paid for direct by indenting officers."

Charges on account of all rubber stamps, ink, &c., required by officers in this Presidency are, under orders from Government, to be disbursed by this office. All Treasury Officers are accordingly requested not to pass bills for these articles if any are presented at their Treasuries.
