No. 463.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to substitute the following Rule for Rule 5, Part II, of the Rules relating to the appointment and examination of Cantonment Magistrates published under Government Notification No. 1394, dated the 12th March 1890 :—

A Civil officer, whether covenanted or not, placed in charge of a Cantonment Magistracy in addition to his own duties, is entitled to an acting allowance of Rs. 100 a month. But, as a rule, only Military officers should hold Cantonment Magistracies. A Military officer in military employ, who may officiate or hold charge as Cantonment Magistrate in addition to his own duties, is entitled to an acting allowance of Rs. 100 a month, as a charge against the Civil Department.

No. 510.—The Governor in Council is pleased, under Section 269 of the Code of Civil Procedure, to make the following Rules for the maintenance and custody, while under attachment, of live-stock and other moveable property attached under orders of the Presidency Small Cause Court:—

1. Live-stock and other moveable property taken in execution under a warrant of attachment shall either be deposited, by the bailiff by whom they were taken, in custody of the Appraiser of the Court, or be kept on the premises where they were taken, in charge of peons engaged by the Appraiser for that purpose.

2. The Judges, from time to time, and for such time as they shall think proper, may appoint such and so many persons for keeping possession, and so many of the bailiffs or other fit persons to be brokers and appraisers for the purpose of selling and valuing any live-stock or other moveable property taken in execution, as shall appear to them to be necessary.

3. No goods taken in execution shall be sold for the purpose of satisfying the warrant of execution except by one of the brokers or appraisers so appointed, and all such sales, when held at the Court House, shall take place on some fixed day of each week which the Court shall cause to be made generally known.

4. The costs to be demanded or taken for the sale and custody of goods shall be as follows:—

(a) *On the sale of live-stock or other moveable property.*

Nine pies in the rupee on the first Rs. 500 of the proceeds of the goods sold, six pies in the rupee on the second Rs. 500 of such proceeds, and four pies in the rupee on all such proceeds above Rs. 1,000, and, if special peons have been kept in charge of the goods, a further sum of annas four per day for each peon so kept.

(b) *For the custody of live-stock or other moveable property removed before sale.*

I.—Two pies in the rupee on the appraised value of the moveable property attached, other than live-stock, which shall have been in the custody of the Court for more than one clear day, and, if special peons have been kept in charge thereof, a further sum of annas four per day for each peon so kept.

II.—One anna and a half per day for each head of live-stock for such time as it has been in the custody of the Court, and, if special peons have been kept in charge thereof, a further sum of annas four per day for each peon so kept.

(c) If the live-stock or other moveable property attached has been advertised for sale under Section 289 of the Code of Civil Procedure, the costs of such advertisement shall be an additional charge.

5. Before making any order for the attachment of live-stock or other moveable property or at any time after any such order has been passed, the Court may require the person at whose instance the order of attachment is sought

or has been made to deposit in Court such sum of money as the Court may consider necessary—

(a) for the removal of the property to the Court premises and its maintenance, guarding and custody till arrival thereof:

(b) for the maintenance, guarding and custody of the property at the Court premises till it is sold or otherwise disposed of:

(c) for the maintenance, guarding and custody of the property at the place at which it was attached.

In case of failure to deposit such sum within the time required by the Court, the Court may either refuse to issue or may cancel the order of attachment as the case may be.

6. An account of the expenses actually incurred shall, on demand being made on or before the date of the sale, be furnished to the attaching creditor and to the person whose property was attached, and the amount that the Court, after hearing their objections to the account, if any, made within 3 days after furnishing the same, finds to be properly due, shall be deducted as a first charge from the proceeds of the sale of the property and paid to the attaching creditor along with any balance that there may be of the deposit.

7. If in consequence of the cancellation of the order of attachment, or for any other reason, the person whose property has been attached becomes entitled to receive back the live-stock or other property attached, it shall be given to him on payment of all charges found by the Court to have been properly incurred which have not been defrayed, or for the defrayal of which no money has been deposited by the attaching creditor, and in default of his paying the same within the time prescribed by the Court, the property, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be sold by auction, and after defraying the abovementioned charges and the expenses of the sale and advertisement thereof, the balance of the sale-proceeds and of the property shall be delivered to him.

8. The Judges may apply the sums raised by the preceding rules towards the payment of the contingent charges and remuneration of the said brokers, appraisers, and special peons in such manner as may appear expedient to the Judges.

No. 2.—His Excellency the Governor in Council proposes, in exercise of the powers conferred by Section 70 of the Bombay Irrigation Act VII of 1879, and in supersession of the addition made to para. 1, rule 1, and notified in Notification No. 12, dated 11th August 1885, in the *Bombay Government Gazette*, to make the following additions to the rules framed under the said section:—

I.—The following Rule shall be inserted after Rule 3 :

“3A.—If an applicant for water for irrigation is not the registered occupant of the land which he wishes to irrigate, or, in the case of alienated land, if he is not the holder, in whose name the land is entered in the Collector's records, the Executive Engineer, or other officer aforesaid, may decline to comply with the application, except on the execution of a security bond in the form of Appendix No. I.A. by two persons approved by him in this behalf.

“If an order is made under this rule to furnish security, a note thereof shall be made in column 10 of the application.”

II.—The following paragraph shall be added to Rule 28 :

“The security bonds, if any, taken under Rule 3A. shall accompany the statement, and the names of the sureties and the dates of the bonds, respectively, executed by them, shall be entered in the last column of Return No. III.”

III.—The following Appendix shall be inserted after Appendix No. I. :

B. of _____, that he shall duly pay at the prescribed time or times every rate, charge, penalty or other sum whatsoever that shall become due by him in respect of the supply of water granted to him in pursuance of his said application ; and in case of his making default therein we, each of us, for himself, his heirs, executors and administrators agree to pay to the Secretary of State for India in Council such sum not exceeding in the aggregate rupees _____ as shall be demanded of us, or of either of us, or of any heir, executor or administrator of either of us, on account of any such rate, charge, penalty or other sum aforesaid ;

“and we do further agree and allow that the amount of any such rate, charge, penalty or other sum aforesaid may, if necessary, be recovered from either of us or from any heir, executor or administrator of either of us, as if the same were an arrear of land revenue due by us, or either of us to Government.

No. 3.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 70 of the Bombay Irrigation Act, 1879, the Governor in Council proposes to make the following additional rule to be inserted after No. 35 of the rules for the administration of canals, framed under the said Section and published in Notification No. 1 of 8th January, 1881 (*Bombay Government Gazette* for 1881, Part I, 10-23), viz. :—

“35A. (1.) The passing of any person or of any animal or vehicle in or across any bank or across canals, or in or across any bank or channel of a canal is prohibited at any place within such distance not exceeding _____ yards above or below a bridge or crossing expressly provided for this purpose or above or below a post set up by the Canal Officer in a conspicuous position in this behalf, as shall be indicated by the Canal Officer in a notice affixed to such bridge, crossing or post.

“(2.) In setting up posts and fixing distances under clause (1), the Canal Officer shall have careful regard—

(a) to the necessity for preserving the canal and its embankments at points where they would be likely to be endangered or damaged by the passing of persons, animals or vehicles therein or there across ;

(b) to the reasonable convenience of the people residing or holding land in the vicinity who require to cross the canal or to water their animals.”

"HOME DEPARTMENT.

TEXT-BOOK ON DOMESTIC ECONOMY AND
SANITARY SCIENCE.No. ^{5 Edn.}

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Home Department (Education), under date Calcutta, the 25th November 1891.

Read again—

Home Department Notification No. 344, dated the 17th September 1888, offering a reward of Rs. 1,000 for the best text-book on Domestic Economy and Sanitary Science for the use of the senior classes of English and Anglo-Vernacular Schools in India.

Home Department Resolution No. ^{4 Education}
197—207, dated the 11th July 1890, assigning the reward of Rs. 1,000 to Surgeon A. E. Roberts of the Indian Medical Service for the best essay on the subject.

RESOLUTION.

In the Notification read in the preamble the Governor General in Council offered a reward of Rs. 1,000 for the best text-book on Domestic Economy and Sanitary Science for the use of the senior classes in English and Anglo-Vernacular Schools, and by a Resolution dated the 23rd August 1889 His Excellency in Council appointed a Committee consisting of the Principal of the Medical College at Lahore, Surgeon-Major Stephen, Sanitary Commissioner of the Punjab, and Honorary Surgeon Rahim Khan, Khán Bahádúr, Lecturer on Materia Medica and Medicine at the Lahore Medical College, to examine and report on the works submitted by competitors. The Committee reported in May 1890 in favour of the work submitted by Surgeon A. E. Roberts of the Indian Medical Service, to whom the Government of India in their Resolution of 11th July 1890 allotted the reward of Rs. 1,000. The work has since been carefully revised by Surgeon Roberts, in communication with the Surgeon-General with the Government of India, with the object of making it suitable for educational purposes, and His Excellency in Council now commends it to Local Governments and Administrations for introduction as a higher text-book on Sanitary Science into their English and Anglo-Vernacular Schools.

PUBLIC DEBT.

Resolutions in this Department, No. 4539,* dated the 17th August 1888, and No. 3328,† dated the 7th August 1891.

RESOLUTION.—In the Resolution of August, 1891, the Governor General in Council was pleased to direct that Stock Notes tendered in even hundreds of rupees would be received for conversion into Government Promissory Notes of the Four per cent. Loan of 1842-43, on the terms described in the Resolution of August 1888, up to the 31st January 1892, the Promissory Notes being issued at a premium of eight annas per cent.

2. The Governor General in Council is now pleased to direct that Stock Notes may be received for conversion into Promissory Notes on the above terms for a further period of six months, that is, until the 31st of July next. On the expiration of this further period, however, the present terms will not be continued, and notes in even hundreds of rupees will be converted only at a premium of two rupees per cent. for the following six months.
