DANGER TO NAVIGATION.

It is hereby notified for general information that the British Brig *Sultan Secunder*, timber laden, was abandoned in a water-logged condition in about latitude 15° 40' N., longitude 96° 7' E. Her deck and masts are above water.

Ship Masters are warned accordingly, and a good look-out should be kept, as the derelict is drifting with the tides with topsails and foresail set.

No. 5.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 57 of the Karáchi Port Trust Act, 1886, the Governor in Council is pleased to approve the following bye-laws made by the Trustees of the Port of Karáchi for the regulation of the Wharves, Piers, Jetties, &c., of the Karáchi Port Trust, viz. :—

1. In these bye-laws the term "wharf" includes any pier, jetty or place authorized by Government for the landing or shipment of goods under the Karáchi Port Trust.

2. The wharves, quays and stages on and from which goods shall be landed from or shipped in vessels within the port are declared to be the following :—

●—KEAMARI BANDAR, comprising—

(a) *Erskine Wharf.*

(b) *Passenger Pier.*

- (c)—*Commissariat Pier.*
- (d)—*Merwether Pier.*
- (e)—*Jetties between the Merwether Pier and Railway Pier.*
- (f)—*Railway Pier.*
- (g)—*Railway Wharf.*
- (h)—*Petroleum Pier.*

2.—NATIVE JETTY.

3.—NAPIER MOLE BOAT WHARF.

4.—KHUDDA BANDAR.

5.—LYARI HARD.

6.—MANORA BEACH, comprising—

- (a)—*Quarantine Pier.*
- (b)—*Tipping Pier.*
- (c)—*Pilot Pier.*
- (d)—*Water Pier.*
- (e)—*Humby Pier.*
- (f)—*Telegraph Pier.*
- (g)—*Telegraph Coal Pier.*
- (h)—*Sub-Marine Defence Pier.*
- (i)—*Manora Beach.*
- (j)—*Harbour Works Pier.*
- (k)—*Port Trust Coal Pier.*
- (l)—*Military Pier.*

7.—BABA ISLAND.

3. No person shall throw or cause to be thrown into the Harbour any filth or rubbish, and, except with the permission of the Wharfage Officer, no person shall deposit ballast, baskets, bottles, ashes or other loose or broken material or rubbish on the premises of the Board.

4. Except with the permission of the Wharfage Officer, no officer in charge of a vessel shall load from, or discharge on, to the premises of the Board, ashes, ballast, bricks, cinders, coal, dust, lime, rubbish, shingle, stones, tiles or any other loose or broken material.

5. Except in such place as the Wharfage Officer may, in each case, direct, no person shall store or cause to be stored on the premises of the Board any package containing matches, acids or other goods liable to ignition or of a dangerous nature, or which are likely to damage other goods, and which do not come under the provisions of the Explosives Act or landing places for which have not been notified under the Sea Customs Act.

6. No person shall remove from the premises of the Board any goods unless they are covered by a Customs pass and Port Trust Wharfage receipt, which shall be produced by him.

7. No goods shall be landed at, or shipped from, any of the places mentioned in Bye-law No. 2 or removed therefrom, without the production of the Customs Entry and the Wharfage Pass. (Appendix B.)

8. If packages which have been landed by the Board are opened by the consignees, on the premises of the Board, without previous notice to the Board of any allegation that they have been damaged, the consignees shall forthwith remove the same; and if such packages are left on the premises of the Board, the Board will undertake no responsibility for their safe custody or condition thereafter.

9. No person, unless granted a written permit by the Wharfage Officer or Pier Master,

shall take on to the premises of the Board, carpenter's tools or other instruments used for opening cases, and no carpenter or cooper shall work on the premises of the Board without the permission of the Wharfage Officer.

10. Working hours at the wharves, quays, and stages, within the premises of the Board, shall be from sunrise to sunset, except on holidays and Sundays.

The holidays recognised by the Board will be Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, and the Sovereign's Birthday, and any fast or thanksgiving days ordered by Government, and any special occasions sanctioned by the Board.

In computing the days for charging rents on goods, Sundays and the holidays above mentioned and also (in the case of dutiable goods only) any other days, on which imperial duty may not be received by the Collector of Customs, will be omitted. The day on which goods are landed will not be counted as one of the "free days."

11. If an application to work at night, on Sundays or holidays be made to the Wharfage Officer, he will, on production of the necessary permission from the Customs Department, order all the necessary arrangements for the proper conduct of business, subject to such rates as may from time to time be prescribed under Section 43 of the Karachi Port Trust Act.

12. No person shall use any unprotected light or fire in any part of the wharfage premises, or smoke in any shed or warehouse set apart for the storage of goods.

13. Except with the previously obtained permission of the Port Officer, no person shall build any vessel or boat on any part of the foreshore within port limits.

14. No person shall land or store, or cause to be landed or stored, goods on any part of the foreshore within port limits, without the permission of the Board.

15. No person shall obstruct any road, thoroughfare, or pathway on the Port Trust Estate by piling thereon goods or other articles for storage, or in any other manner obstruct the same or hinder any traffic thereon.

Any Port Trust Officer may require any person causing such obstruction to remove or discontinue the same; and such person on failing to comply, within a time sufficient for the purpose with such requirement, shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by Bye-law No. 56, and the cause of obstruction may be removed by the Board or their officers, who will hold the person causing it liable for any expenses caused thereby.

16. No person shall deposit on any of the wharf roads, coal, coke, cinders, ashes or fuel after he has been directed by the Wharfage Officer not to do so.

17. No application for the use of a crane for a ship shall be granted, unless and until payment has been made for at least half a day, at the rate chargeable therefor, according to the scale fixed under Section 43 of the Act. Such charge will be payable on the grant of the application, whether the crane is actually used or not.

18. Should the application have been for the first half only of a day or night and the cranes be required for a longer period, another application must be made in writing to the Pier Master: if in the day, one hour before the end of the half day, or, if at night, two hours before the end of the half night.

19. To obtain the use of cranes required for the whole or half night, or for the whole or half of the following day, applications should be made not later than 4 P.M. to the Pier Master.

20. At least two hours' notice given to the Pier Master will be necessary to secure the use of the cranes on the day on which a vessel arrives.

21. Should cranes, for which application has been made for the whole day or night, not be required for more than the first half day or night, written notice must be given to the Pier Master at least one hour previous to the end of the half day or night, or the rate for the whole day or night will be charged.

22. No application for the use of the Board's cranes will be attended to unless made in writing on the usual form with counterfoil, and unless signed by the Agent, Charterer, Master or Ship's Officer on duty, showing the number and description of cranes required, from what time, and for how long.

23. The Pier Master will only supply slings for shifting or moving goods on the wharf. In all cases the vessel shall supply suitable slings or nets according to the cargo to be shipped or landed.

24. Tindals of vessels and Managers of Lighterage Companies must make their own arrangements for the proper slinging of cargo in lighters or boats, and for directing the crane drivers when discharging or loading, and the Board will not undertake any responsibility for the same.

25. Every officer and servant of the Board, on the outbreak of any fire in or near enough to endanger the premises of the Board coming to his knowledge, shall immediately report the same to the Pier Master, who shall turn out all available hands to help in putting out the fire.

A report shall also be made by the Pier Master to the Secretary.

26. The Pier Master or other officer appointed by the Board, when granting receipts under Section 37 of the Karachi Port Trust Act, shall note thereon the condition of goods that have been damaged, or appear to have been tampered with before landing.

27. All tolls, dues and rates levied under the said Act shall be paid in cash, at the office of the Trust at the Native Jetty, except in the case of fees levied on the Passenger Pier, which shall be paid to the Fees Collector at Kearnari or other officer appointed by the Board, or at such other place as the Board may in each special case appoint.

28. All vessels in the port requiring water may be supplied by the Port Trust water barges, and vessels lying at a wharf may be supplied by the Pier Master or other officer appointed by the Board, at such rates as may from time to time be fixed by the Board.

29. The Port Officer, or other officer appointed by the Board, shall raise, remove, or destroy any vessel wrecked or stranded within the limits of the port.

30. The following By-laws Nos. 31 to 46, both inclusive, apply only to the wharves included in Kearnari Bandar.

31. No person shall use a crane belonging to the Board or cause the same to be used for stowing or packing rails, girders, or bars on a truck, and no person shall attach the chain of any such crane or cause the same to be attached on board a vessel for the purpose of breaking out the cargo, or of removing the cargo from under the combings.

32. No one shall load or land, or cause to be loaded or landed from or on to a wharf, except under the personal superintendence of a stevedore, mukadam or contractor, permitted by the Board to work cargo on such wharf, or an experienced foreman employed by such stevedore, mukadam or contractor, or of a servant of the Trustees authorized to work cargo on shore.

33. No stevedore, mukadam or contractor, permitted, as aforesaid, to superintend the working of cargo, or servant of the Board authorized to work cargo on shore, shall allow any goods, whether in bags, bales, boxes or otherwise, to be slung without himself seeing that the following precautions for safety are adopted:—

(1) That the sling is laid down flat without turns or kinks preparatory to receiving the goods.

(2) After the sling has been made up and with the first strain on heaving up, that the running loop is well beaten down with a wooden bar so as to make the grip secure.

34. The Board will refuse to receive iron drainage pipes or any other goods which, from their want of proper distinguishing marks, there will be difficulty in delivering correctly to consignees, unless the Master of the vessel separates, before landing, or in the course of landing, the various marks and consignments, or unless the cost of sorting is paid.

35. No person shall discharge or load, or cause to be discharged or loaded, at any wharf or jetty any timber without the consent of the Wharfage Officer, and no owner of timber shall allow it to remain on any wharf or jetty more than 24 hours, after its removal has been ordered by the Wharfage Officer.

36. Goods landed at a wharf by the Board's their officers or servants, shall be delivered only on production of the bill of lading, endorsed by the Master or Agent, or of a delivery order from the Master or Agent of the vessel.

37. If there be any informality in the bill of lading or the bill of lading be wanting, delivery may be made on application, made in writing, showing the circumstances, and enclosing any documents which will show the title to the goods, but in no case will removal be permitted unless and until the applicant engages to indemnify the Board by bond or otherwise as may be directed (*vide* form of Bond, Appendix A).

38. If the bill of lading be at variance with the manifest as to the original consignee, the removal of the goods shall not be permitted until the discrepancy is satisfactorily explained to the satisfaction of the Board.

39. Consignees applying for delivery of goods shall fill up a form in duplicate (Appendix B) showing the description of goods, weights, numbers or measurements, which, accompanied by the Customs House bill of entry, shall be presented at the Port Trust office, where the landing, wharfage, and any other charges which may be due on such goods shall be recovered and receipt granted. This receipt, accompanied by the Customs bill of entry (which will be returned to the consignee), the bill of lading or the delivery order from the Master or Agent of the vessel, shall be handed to the Wharfage Officer, who, on being satisfied that the documents are in order, and on being furnished with an acknowledgment for the goods, will grant delivery and authorize the Gate-keeper to pass them.

40. The Board will not undertake any responsibility for any goods or packages which have been opened for appraisement by the orders of the Collector of Customs, or for any goods left on their premises after delivery has been taken.

41. No package, bale, case, &c., sent for shipment shall be received at the wharves, unless accompanied by an entry (Appendix B) detailing the date, name of vessel on which goods are to be shipped, the exporter's name, the marks, quantity or weight, and description of articles to be shipped.

42. The Board will not undertake responsibility in any way for goods alleged to be lost or damaged, *e. g.*, chafages, breakages, and short deliveries, of which notice has not been given them within one month from the date of landing or shipping as the case may be.

43. The Board will not undertake responsibility for any goods unless and until a receipt has been passed for the same by the Wharfage Officer, and the Board will not admit any claim on account of any deficiencies of merchandise, produced by natural or unavoidable causes, or for any losses or deficiencies of merchandise whatever, unless ascertained and pointed out to the Wharfage Officer previous to the goods being removed from the wharf premises.

44. The Board will not undertake to receive or deliver or to be responsible for packages containing bullion, specie, precious stones, gold dust, jewellery, or other property of considerable value, whether cargo or private property.

45. Goods for shipment will not be put on board unless the Customs export entry, the Board's receipt for wharfage, shipping and other charges which may be due thereon, and the shipping order, are produced.

46. No person shall lay or cause to be laid any goods on the wharves before the ship is ready to receive them, or store or cause to be stored any goods except in sheds or places set apart for them.

47. Tindals of foreign or native craft and of cargo boats shall not, without the permission of

the Port Officer, beach their vessels or boats on the Manora or Keamari Beach or Lyari Hard, for the purpose of oiling, repairing, or lying up for shelter.

48. The Inspector at the Petroleum Godown shall not permit any petroleum to be landed or shipped, unless wharfage entries, passed by the Secretary or Superintendent, Wharfage Office, are presented to him.

49. No consignee or shipper of petroleum shall knowingly disobey any order of the Inspector as to the shunting of trucks and wagons on the Petroleum Godown and Pier lines, or as to the stacking of cases of petroleum.

50. No person shall stack any case of petroleum on a stack that has reached 15 cases in height.

51. No person in charge thereof shall leave trucks containing petroleum alongside the godowns beyond the time necessary for loading or unloading such trucks.

52. No person having the charge or control thereof shall leave trucks containing petroleum on the Petroleum Pier after sunset.

53. All repairs to cases and tins shall be carried out by owners at such time and place as the Inspector may direct.

54. No person shall smoke or bring any light of any description into the godowns or on the premises, or near trucks or wagons containing petroleum.

55. The mukadams and coolies of consignees or shippers shall obey the orders of the Inspector, who shall, in the event of his orders not being obeyed, stop all landing, stacking or removing of cases, and make a report to the Secretary at once, giving all particulars.

56. Any person infringing any of the By-laws Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 32, 33, 35, 47, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53 and 54, shall be punished with a fine which may extend to Rupees one hundred, or, in the case of continuing infringement, with a fine which may extend to Rupees fifty for every day after notice shall have been given by the Board to the person guilty of such infringement.

No. 270.—The following rules for the Kázi Shahabudin Scholarships have been sanctioned by Government with the approval of the donor until further orders, and are published for general information :—

1. Sixteen scholarships have been founded by Khán Bahádur Kázi Shahabudin, C.I.E. Four of these scholarships are offered annually. Each scholarship will be tenable for four years, and will be of the value of Rs. 10 per mensem for the first and second years, and of the value of Rs. 15 per mensem for the third and fourth years.

2. The scholarships are open to Musáلمان candidates who have passed the entrance examination

* A public institution is an institution which is open to Government inspection and submits annual returns to the Educational Department.

† The Central Division comprises the Collectorate of Poona, Sholápur, Sátára, Khándesh, Ahmednagar and Násik; the Northern Division, Thána, Surat, Broach, Kaira, Ahmedabad and the Panch Maháls; and the Southern Division, Ratnágiri, Kolába, Dhárwar, Belgaum, Bijápur and North Kánara.

immediately preceding the entrance examination he has passed. If possible ‡ each Division shall have one scholarship each year, the fourth scholarship being given to the best candidate remaining over.

3. The scholarships shall be awarded by the Director of Public Instruction, who in awarding the scholarships shall consider the merits of the candidates as shown in the entrance examination. The Director may also take into consideration the poverty of the candidates and their need of assistance in the prosecution of their studies, and may award an Honorary Scholarship to a claimant who is not in need of assistance, and give the scholarship to the next claimant. Provided always that the holder of any other scholarship specially founded for the benefit of Mahomedan students shall be debarred from holding concurrently one of the Kázi Shahabudin Scholarships. The names of successful candidates and of the schools at which they were prepared shall be published annually in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

4. Applications for the scholarships must be made to the Director in the printed form appended (see Appendix A). These applications must reach the Director within a fortnight of the declaration of the results of the entrance examination.

5. Each scholarship will be tenable for four years from the 1st of January succeeding the entrance examination passed by the successful candidate, conditionally on the regular attendance, good conduct and satisfactory progress of the holder at any College affiliated to the University of Bombay. No scholarship shall be withdrawn from its holder for misconduct, or for any other cause, without the sanction of the Director.

6. The scholarships must be drawn quarterly in arrears, upon printed bills signed by the Principal of the College and countersigned by the Director; and the holder of a scholarship cannot change his College without the sanction of the Director.

N.B.—These rules apply to girls as well as boys.
