No.7431.—The following Rule made by Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature at Bombay, and issued as an experimental rule for one year from the 1st January 1892, in substitution for Rules III, IV and V, Criminal Circular No. 31, en pages 21 and 22 of the Criminal Circulars for the Thana Sessions Division inder the sanction contained in Government Noti-

tained in Government Notification\* No. 6709 dated the 16th December 1891, has been sanctioned by His Ex-

cellency the Governor in Council as a General Rule for the Thána Sessions Division under 24 and 25 Vict., C. 104, S. 15, from the 1st January 1893 :--

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"Whenever a Magistrate in the course of enquiry into a case determines to commit it for trial by the Court of Session, he shall send intimation to the Sessions Judge naming the offence, or offences, with which the accused person or persons will be charged, the number of probable witnesses, and the locality from which they come, and the probable date by which the case will be ready for trial. The Sessions Judge will then, with due regard to the convenience of the witnesses in the case and other cases pending or to be tried in his Court, fix the earliest day possible for which the commitment should be made and forthwith inform the committing Magistrate of the date so fixed. Such day may be in the ordinary monthly Sessions or at a Special Sessions for which due arrangements should be made. If a Magistrate discharges or determines himself to try the accused person or persons in any case so reported, he should immediately intimate the fact to the Sessions Judge."

# Sir,

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 217, dated the 17th September 1892, to the address of the Secretary to the Government of India, Home Department, forwarding a letter from the Honorary Secretaries, Sárvajanik Sabha, Poona, No. 247, dated the 26th July 1892, addressed to this Department, praying that the Governor Gene-ral's assent may be withheld from the Bill to amend the Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878, the authentic copy of which, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor General signified thereon, was returned to you with my letter No. 1535, dated the 15th ultimo.

2. Representations in regard to the Bill have

also been received from the persons named in the margin.

3. The Bill has attracted a good deal of attention in the Bombay Presidency, and with re-ference to this fact and the memorials that have been received it is considered desirable to state briefly

the considerations which have led His Excellency the Governor General to decide that it should be allowed to become law.

That the habit of drinking to excess is widely prevalent among the people of Thána, and of part doubt, and is generally acknowledged by the pub-lic bodies which have opposed the Bill. During the year 1890-91 the people of Thána consumed 22'8 drams of licit liquor, of 25° U. P., per head, as compared with 4.6 drams consumed in Násik, 1.6 in Ahmednagar, 7.0 in Poona, and 0.9 in Sátára. In Kolába, where the habit of intemperance prevails in a part of the district only, the average consumption was 12.6 drams per head.

5. In addition to the licit consumption, however, a very large quantity of illicit liquor is also consumed in these two districts. The following table shows the number of offences against the A'bkári laws detected during each of the last ten years. The figures do not include Sind :----

Norz .- It is stated that about 90 per cent. of these offences were of distillation of mhowra.

The population of Thána and Kolába, 7. according to the census of 1891, represents 8.8 per cent. of the population of the whole Presidency, excluding Sind. The figures therefore show that in proportion to population the combined districts of Thana and Kolába are responsible for from 3 to 4 times as many offences of all kinds against the A'bkári laws as the rest of the Presidency, and from 6 to 8 times as many cases of illicit distillation. It is impossible that this state of things should be ••• allowed to continue.

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8. It is evident, moreover, that the efforts of the Bombay A'bkari Department, during the past ten years, working under the present law, have entirely failed, not merely to reduce the number of A'bkari offences in Thana and Kolaba to the level that obtains in other districts, but even to keep them in check. A small improvement was effected in 1884-87, though even then the number of cases of illicit distillation was more than 5 times as great as in the rest of the Presidency. But excluding the two years 1888-90, during which the price of licit liquor was temporarily enhanced, and a violent outbreak of illicit distillation ensued, it will be seen that the number of offences during 1890-91 and 1891-92 was greater than in any other year of the past decade. The figures for the year 1891-92, which ended on the 31st July 1892, could not be laid before the Legislative Council while the Bill was under consideration, for the reason that the year had still some time to run. They have since · been ofstained. They show a serious increase over those for the previous year, and indicate that the prevalence of offences against the A'bkári laws is considerably greater now than it was ten years ago, and is nearly double what it was six years ago. This lamentable result has ensued, notwithstanding that during the last two years special punitive police have been quartered on the districts of Thána and Kokiba at a cost of Rs. 20,000 per annum, a measure which the Government of Bombay rightly regards as open to serious objection.

9. It has been alleged that the wide prevalence of illicit distillation in these districts is due, not to the natural facilities which they offer for procuring mhowra flowers, but to the high rates of still-head duty levied by Government, and to the high selling price of licit liquor. This statement will not bear examination. For a number of years past the stillhead duty and the maximum selling price of liquor have been lower in Thána and Kolaba than in any neighbouring district, except Surat and Násik. In Nisik, where consumption is comparatively insignificant, the rates have been the same as in Thána and Kolába. In Surat the still-head duty has been the same, and the maximum selling price sightly lower; but the circumstances of this district are exceptional, owing to its situation with regard to the frontier of Baroda and three smaller Native States. In Ahmednagar, Poona, Sátára and Bombay, both still-head duty and the maximum selling price of liquor have long been higher than. in Thána and Kolába, (except in 1858-53), yet in these districts, as well as in Surat and Násik, illicit distillation has been kept well in check. It is evident that the abnormal prevalence of illicit distilla-'tion in Thána and Kolaba is due to other causes ; and His Excellency has no doubt that prominent. among these is the readiness with which the materials can be procured in those districts.

10. The Governor General has given careful consideration to the statements that have been put forward to the effect that in the districts concerned mhowra flowers are commonly used as an article of food by men and cattle. On this head a large mass of evidence has been collected, an examination of which has satisfied His Excellency that the flowers are not used as a staple article of food. They are used by some of the hill tribes to supplement their ordinary food as a relish, and also as medicine, to a very small extent. The legitimate use of the flowers for these purposes is, in His Excellency's opinion, sufficiently provided for in the Bill. The fact that mhowra flowers are nearly as expensive as rice, and are considerably more expensive than nágli, is conclusive against their being used as food for cattle. Special weight attaches to the testimony of the Honourable Mr. Wadia, C. I. E., who made personal local enquiries on the subject, and who failed to induce members of the hill tribes to eat the flowers, except in very small quantities, even by the offer of payment. Weight is also due to the opinion of the Honourable Mr. Nulkar, who, as a former President of the Poona Sarvajanik Sabha, had opposed the Mhowra Bill of 1882. The gentleman, in his speech on the second reading of the present Bill, said :

<sup>4</sup> I have no hesitation in saying that, in the districts concerned, mhowra flowers do not form a material portion of human food, and only rich or well-to-do people can afford to feed their cattle with it .... Any person who is accustomed to wade through such a mass of conflicting evidence and to endeavour to draw fair conclusions on the probabilities of the case, cannot fail to see that the chief use for which the article is prized in Thana is distillation.<sup>9</sup>

11. It has been urged by some of those who have opposed the Bill that the proper course is to provide additional facilities for procuring liquor at a moderate price, and to take steps to reduce the price of raw toddy. A fatal objection to such proposals is that they would tend to intensify the vice of intemperance to which many of the people of Thana and Kolaba are unhappily addicted, and which it is the main object of the present Bill to restrain. In these districts mhowra liquor is even now procurable at a lower price than in most of the surrounding districts. Raw toddy, the alcoholic strength of which is equal to that of London porter, is now sold at tree foot-booths at 4 pies per quart bottle in the Umbargaon Taluka, and at o pies per quart bottle in the remainder of the two districts. These low prices bring toddy within the reach of the poorest classes; and His Excellency could not approve any measures the object of which was to cheapen it still further.

The experience gained during the past ten 12. years has satisfied His Excellency that the existing law is insufficient to enable the officers of Government to cope with the widespread intemperance which prevails in the districts of Thana and Kolaba, or to repress the great and growing evil of illicit distillation. He considers that the measures embodied in the Bill, to which he has now given his assent, afford the best chance of dealing with those evils, and he is of opinion that the objections which have been adduced against it are not such as should prevail against the considerations which make in its favour. Unlike the Bill which was disapproved by His Excellency's predecessor on a previous occasion, the present measure has been adopted by the Bombay Legislative Council, not merely without a dissentient voice, but with the active support and approval of all the members, official and non-official alike. His Excellency trusts that this unanimous decision, arrived at after the fullest public discussion, will tend to reassure those who had regarded the measure adversely.

13. I am to request that, with the permission of the Governor in Couucil, an expression of the Governor General's views may be communicated to the memorialists, and that this letter may be published in the Bombay Government Gazette.

I have the honour to forward the monthly reports submitted by the Collectors of Belgaum, Bijápur and Dhárwár under the Famine Relief Code, Appendix 1V, for the month of January 1892, and to make the following remarks.

Clause III.- No change is reported in the area affected as given in paragraph 15 of my report 2. No. F , dated the 16th ultimo.

Clause IV (a) and (b).-Information under this clause has been given in my report referred to 3. above.

Clause V.-As yet no poor houses have been opened and no gratuitous relief is being granted. 4. The following table shows particulars of relief works opened or announced as ready to be opened in the three districts: -

The Collectors of Belgaum and Bijapur have given reasons for the fact that there is as yet no particular recourse to relief works. Judging by the newspapers the affected parts of this Division are not exceptional in this respect; as, in the Bellary District, which borders on Dhárwár, the harvest operations still prevent people flocking to relief works in any appreciable numbers.

I may mention that a few days ago, at Murgod, in the Parasgad Taluka, I came across a body of fifty or sixty people, who have come down to these parts from the Sátára District, in the hope of obtaining employment.

5. Clause VI.-In Bijápur prices have appreciably become easier in six out of thes eight talukas; this is specially noticeable in the Bijápur Táluka itself, where jowári, which at the beginning of the month was selling at 28 lbs. to the rupee, has now fallen to 35 lbs. In Dhárwár also prices have fallen through-out, except in the Navalgund Táluka. In Belgaum, jowári is selling about one pound cheaper than before.

# 6. Clause VII.-No particular remarks seem called for here.

7. Clause VIII.—The Collectors were instructed to give, in each monthly report, information as to the general progress of the revenue collections. It is satisfactory to be able to note that the collection of the first kharff instalment is well in hand. From Dhárwár Mr. Crawley-Boevey reports that even postponements will probably have to be given in only comparatively few cases. In Bijápiur 80 per cent. has been collected without the slightest pressure, and it was expected that a considerable amount of what remained outstanding would be paid in a few days. In Belgaum it is expected that perhaps Rs. 10,000 to Rs. 15,000 may have to be suspended in consequence of cultivators having left their villages.

# Monthly Report for the Belgaum District under the Famine Relief Code, Appendix IV, Clause II, for the month of January 1892.

Clauses III and IV.—Information already supplied; no change except that under clause IV (a) the original estimate of numbers expected on relief works up to end of January was over-estimated; the total number actually employed at the end of January at famine wages on both Public Works Department and Civil Works being about 1,500.

Clause V.—A Public Works Department famine camp was opened at Athni on 2nd January and one at Tigadi in Gokák Táluka on January 26th. No labourers have joined the Athni Camp, as all objected both to the wage and to living in camp.

On ordinary Local Fund Works in Athni Táluka at famine wages, Civil Agency, there were 1,322 labourers at the end of the month.

In Gokák Táluka the numbers were—Public Works Department at Tigadi Camp 19; on Civil Agency Local Fund Repair Works 117.

In Parasgad Táluka there are contracts going on on the Manoli-Dhárwár road. The contractors employ labourers at rates far beyond the Famine Code rates and no famine works proper have been opened, there being no demand for labour at famine rates.

Clause VI.—There has been no great rise or fall of prices. Jowári is about a pound to the rapee cheaper than in the beginning of the month and is now sold at from 28 to 30 lbs. to the rupee.

Clause VII.—There has been hardly any expenditure during the month, except on the Leeal<sup>\*</sup>Fund ordinary repair works, and in forming the huts for the two Public Works Department Camps at Athni and Tigadi.

Clause -VIII. - No land revenue has been suspended. Most of the first instalment has been collected. ed. About Rs. 40,000 only remain uncollected, and about 25,000 of this will be collected. Perhaps from 10,000 to 15,000 of this first instalment may have to be suspended owing to cultivators leaving their villages.

I have estimated 1 to 11 lákhs of rupees in all, as likely to be suspended for all instalments.

Clause IX .- No other officers are required at present.

Clause X .- The area will remain affected till the rains of 1892 appear.

Monthly Report for the Bijapur District under the Famine Relief Code, Appendix No. IV.

1. Clause IV (a).-The information as to this was dealt with in my No. 37 of 5th ultimo, giving the report for December last, and I am not in a position to make any further remarks except that the harvest-

ing operations have given more employment than was anticipated, and that I consider my own estimates are, with a good average rains next year, not understated; and I anticipate now that fewer persons than I then thought will come upon works and will do so, and for a shorter period.

20 Clause IV (b).—The particulars mentioned in this paragraph were also very fully dealt, with last month; but I have been able during January to personally visit and inspect the Bagevadi, Muddebihil and Hungund talukas, and to correct to some extent the valuations of the crops I had formed at that time.

3. I find I was in error in stating that the cotton had completely withered up. In-the three talukas in question some, of course, has completely failed, but a very considerable portion (and the crop is largely sown in these three talukas) has produced a crop which I take to be, as a rule, about 3 or 4 annas of an average crop, some fields being better than this and others worse. In the Bágalkot and Bádámi tálukas also some cotton has similarly come to maturity, though perhaps the crop is not so good as what I have described, and the same is the case in Sindgi. In Bijápur and Indi alone cotton seems to have quite failed; and it is much less sown in these tálukas than in those further south.

4. As to the other crops on the whole I think they are slightly better, except in Bágalkot.and Bijápur, than I anticipated, and they are certainly distinctly better in most parts of Hungund, which seems to be the best off in the district.

5. Clause V.-No poor houses nor gratuitous relief has been started anywhere, but the Public Works Department have had work available in the Bijápur and Sindgi tálukas on the Bijápur-Sindgi road during the month. No one, however, has accepted work upon it at relief wages.

6. Towards the close of the month they have also had work ready in the Bádámi Táluka on the Kerur-Katgeri road; but according to the latest information I have received no labourers have yet joined.

7. The reasons for this are various. In the first place there has been a general harvest almost in every village, and in the vast majority of fields, though in many cases there was no grain, only withered folder to cut. This has, however, employed a great deal of labour: I should think probably half the usual amount. In the next place the well-to-do, partly from charitable motives and partly owing to the cheapness of labour, have chosen this time for a large number of agricultural operations (for some of which they have received or are receiving Government advances) and also for building houses, and this is giving a good deal of extra labour. There has also been some emigration, and the fact that prices have fallen and thereby the wages admissible under the Famine Code have diminished and appear so small in comparison with the ordinary wages paid to labourers, that people hold off and prefer using all their resources (naturally going further with cheaper prices) to taking to relief works.

8. Clause VI, Prices .- The prices of the three standard grains used as food in the district during the month are shown in the following statement :-

They rose slightly at the commencement of the month, but have fallen perceptibly towards the close. This is no doubt a good deal due to the fact that the instalments due to Government are being paid, but on the whole they must be considered as satisfactory, and are in most places much above famine rates.

9. Clause VII.—As no labourers have as yet joined the Public Works Department works, no expenditure on *relief labour* has been incurred, but no doubt in hutting, survey and other preliminaries expenditure has been incurred. I have, however, not got details of these, and as they must be inconsiderable I do not delay this report in order to ascertain the exact particulars.

As previously pointed out, Government have granted (Government Resolution No.  $\frac{\text{Local}}{1420 \text{ P}_{r}-111}$  of 23rd December 1891) Rs. 15,000 as a provincial grant to the Kerur-Katgeri Railway feeder road and also (Government Resolution No.  $\frac{\text{Local}}{1517 \text{ P}_{r}-93}$  of 16th November 1891) expenditure on the Bijápur-Sindgi road pending allotment.

10. They have further granted (Government Resolution No. 56 of 6th January 1892) Rs. 10,000 for water-supply in places where such scarcity is probable that persons or castes may not be otherwise able to get it. During the month no expenditure was incurred from this amount.

11. Clause FIII.—As previously pointed out, no general suspensions of land revenue were considered necessary, the land revenue being collected in the ordinary way, but the Assistants had full power to suspend in all cases of poverty, and no forcible measures were to be taken to recover land revenue without individual enquiry.

. The first instalments of land revenue have, when due, been uniformly very fairly paid. The details are given below and show that over 80 per cent. has been paid without the slightest pressure : -

The above table will show that the retail prices of staplofood-grain (jowári) have very slightly risen in Navalgund, but have fallen in the other tálukas. The fall may have been caused by the grain newly harvested.

Clause VII.-No relief works out of Provincial funds have yet been deemed necessary to be undertaken, and how far such funds are available is not known.

Clause VIII.—The extent to which suspension of land revenue may be necessary cannot yet be ascertained. These numbers are considerably below what was expected, but the circumstance is a subject for congratulation. The principal causes which have led to it are (1) that the general outturn of the crops, though still below the standard which, according to the Famine Commissioners' report on the experiences of 1876-77, is indicative of the approach of severe famine, has been better than was estimated; so that a good deal of agricultural employment, which was not anticipated, has been available; (2) that the very large takavi advances made by Government have created a still further supply of private employment; and (3) that the unexpected easy prices of the staple grain, which are still continuing, have enabled the private employers of labour to give wages in excess of the rates that would be earned under the Relief Code, and have also enabled many people to hold out longer on their private resources without resorting to unusual means of subsistence at all.

4. Clause VI.—In Belgaum the prices of jowári have hardly altered. In Dhárwár they have fallen in two tálukas and are steady in the others. In Bijápur there has been a slight rise in two tálukas, but a perceptible fall in the others.

5. Olause VII .- No particular remarks seem called for here.

6. Clause VIII.—The current revenue collections have been going on satisfactorily, the first kharif
and rabi instalments having been mostly realized, and that without any pressure at all. Some postponements may become necessary in Belgaum and Bijápur, and perhaps in the Navalgund Táluka of Dhárwár;
but not to any really perceptible extent in comparison with the totals for collection.

Clauses III and IV.—No change. At the end of February, the average numbers on Professional and Civil Agency works together was 1,624.

The Desai of Kawjalgi in Gokák has lately opened a private relief work where 800 persons are employed. He is said to pay adult males 1 anna 6 pies per day. Much private work out of takávi is also going on.

• *Glause VI, Prices.*—The prices of jowári and bájri have hardly changed. Jowári now varies from 28 to 32 lbs. per rupee in different tálukas.

Clause VII.—The only expenditure on Public Works Department works during the month has been at Tigadi, where Rs. 167 have been spent.

The remaining labourers have been paid out of ordinary Socal Fund repair allotments.

Clause VIII, Suspension of Revenue .- No land revenue has been suspended.

Of the first kharif and first rabi instalments, amounting in all to about seven lákhs, all but about Rs. 31,000 have been collected.

Much of this balance of Rs. 31,000 will be collected soon; but in Athni Táluka from Rs. 10,000 to Rs. 15,000 may have to be postponed till next year owing to occupants having left their homes or being unable to pay up.

Perhaps 14 lákh in all may have to be suspended, including the second instalments not yet due.

Clause IX.—An additional Assistant Collector has been granted, and no more are required for the present. It is proposed to depute two Mámlatdárs on relief duty.

Clause X.-The area will remain affected till the rains of 1892 appear.

Monthly Beport of the Bijápur District for the month of February 1892, as directed in the Famine Relief Code, Appendix No. IV.

PARA. IV - (a) and (b).

This matter was fully dealt with in the monthly report for December 1891. In that report I gave the numbers of persons who would come on relief works upon various dates as anticipated by the various Mámlatdárs. The totals were as follows :--

At that time I stated that "I did not attach any very great value to these estimates, but that generally I expect that from 10,000 to 15,000 persons may require work for eight months, and 3,000 or so for a longer period." I stated then that I offered this opinion with great hesitation, and without much confidence in its correctness. As the amount of distress has been as yet much less than was anticipated, and as the crops have turned out, in places where the ground lay low, considerably better than was expected, I have again asked the Mámlatdárs to give me their opinions as to the numbers. All have given them most reluctantly and state that it is impossible to be at all certain how long people can manage to support themselves.

The figures now given are as follows :--

In the Muddebihál and Bágalkot tálukas the Mámlatdárs state these numbers will only come if the works are opened in their tálukas and in places that suit the people. I do not put any great confidence in these figures, but they show that the original anticipations of distress held by every one in the district have proved to have been greatly over the mark. The reasons are various. The crops were certainly slightly under-estimated, but still in five of the tálukas the average crop – now it is reaped – is considerably under a four-anna one, and in only one, Hungund, it possibly slightly exceeds 4 annas, an amount of crop which according to all accounts is one that should only accompany a severe fam ne.

Prices have, however, fallen steadily as soon as the holders of stocks, which were, and still are, large, found that large importations at once followed high prices.

Most of all however, the grants of takávi by Government have aided in preventing distress. These have been in all 91,000 odd rupees and most has been already distributed. This has been almost entirely utilized for small agricultural improvements, wells, embankments, destruction of grass, and has employed a very great deal of labour in the village itself. In this country I have already found that when a few persure begin any particular useful work, their example is followed, and, unaided by Government, very many

land-holders have been making improvements on their own account, while others have commenced improvements pending grants of takávi asked for from Government. The full amounts asked for, Government have been unable to grant; but if these are granted as soon as the year 1892-93 is commenced. I believe they will stave off distress to a very great extent, and will also improve the fertility of the district. If this should be followed by an early and abundant rains, I believe the numbers that will need Government assistance, will be very small, but on the other hand, should the monsoon burst late, and be a sparse one there will be very keen distress through the months from June to October.

Clause V. — It has not been found necessary to open poor houses, nor has any necessary for gratuitous relief arisen. Two relief works under Public Works Department management have been opened, and another one is ready for opening. On the first of these, the Bijápur-Sindgi road, no labourers have joined. On the other, the Kerur-Katgeri road in the Bádámi Táluka, a few women and children have accepted work, the numbers for the week ending February 13th, 20th and 27th being as follows :—

I have received three contributions from persons outside the district, amounting to Rs. 1,100, to be spent in charity. If no special kind of charity appears necessary, I mean to utilize these sums for the purchase of seed for poor agriculturists at the commencement of the rains.

## Monthly Report for the Belgaum District under the Famine Code, Appendix IV, Clause II, for the month of March 1893.

Clauses III and IV.--No change. At the end of March the numbers on Professional and Civil Agency works together were 947.

The civil works had been closed owing to completion and to the end of the financial year.

Clause V.—In the Parasgad Táluka the tank clearance at Chulki was commenced at famine rates  $\cdot$  on 8th March and the number at work at the end of the last month was 218.

In Athni Camp, although opened on the 2nd January, there were no people at work up to the last week. On Saturday last, viz., on the 2nd of this month, there were 116 people at work.

In Tigadi the number is largely increasing. On the 2nd April the number was 549. A Hospital Assistant has been attached to this Camp.

The civil works started out of Local Fund are almost completed and closed. The number of labourers at the close of March was only 64.

Clause VI.—The prices of jowári and bájri have hardly changed. Jowári varies from 28 to 32 lbs. per rupee in different tálukas.

Clause VII .- The expenditure on Public Works Department works during the month has been at

The remaining labourers have been paid out of ordinary Local Fund allotments.

In Chulki, táluka Parasgad, the expenditure is Rs. 144, and it is not settled to what head this should be debited.

Suspension of Land Revenue. Clause VIII .- No land revenue has been suspended.

I have nothing more to add to what has already been given in my last report. In the affected part of the district most of the villages are rabi and their second instalment is due in the current month.

In the rest of the district there is only a small balance uncollected.

Clause IX. – In addition to the Personal Assistant already granted, two Mamlatdárs have ed on relief duty. – Government Resolution No. 1998, dated 23rd March 1892. The affect divided into two circles, Northern and Southern, separated by the river Ghatprabha put in charge of one Mámlatdár. He, in addition to the dutics given in Section 27 has been ordered to inspect takávi works in his charge.
