“ PROGRESS OF EDUCATION IN INDIA DURING THE YEAR 1890-91.

No. ² Education.
57—68.

*Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Home Department (Education),—
under date Calcutta, the 9th February 1892.*

Read—

The several Reports on the progress of Education in India during the year 1890-91, with the orders passed on them by Local Governments and Administrations.

RESOLUTION.

The statistics of Education in British India during the year 1889-90 were published in Home Department Resolution No. ¹ Education ₃₇₋₄₈, dated the 11th February 1891. As intimated in Home Department Resolution No. ² ₇₉₋₅₉, dated the 11th February 1889, the state and progress of Education in India will be reviewed at length every fifth year. This was last done for the year 1886-87, and in publishing for general information the educational statistics for the year 1890-91, the Governor General in Council desires merely to call attention to their most prominent features, reserving detailed criticism for the next quinquennial review which will be issued after the receipt of the figures for the current year ending 31st March 1892.

2. The total number of Public and Private Institutions to which the Educational Reports relate rose from 134,710 in 1889-90 to 138,054 in 1890-91, but the increase was entirely confined to the former class of institutions, which increased from 94,163 to 99,775, while the latter decreased from 40,547 to 38,279. There was an increase in the number of public institutions for boys from 89,318 to 94,690 but a decrease in the number of private institutions from 39,465 to 36,967. Both classes of institutions for girls all increased, the former from 4,845 to 5,085, and the latter from 1,082 to 1,312. There were in all 3,368,930 boys at school and college during the year, as compared with 3,331,933 boys in 1889-90. The number of girls at school and college was in 1890-91, 313,777 and in 1889-90, 294,457.

3. The percentage of scholars on the total population of school-going age was 10·7 as compared with 11·4 in 1889-90. The percentage

of male and female scholars on the male and female population of school-going age was, respectively, 19·3 and 1·8, as compared with 20·7 and 1·9 in the previous year. The decrease is however nominal; as the percentages for the year under review have in the case of most Provinces been calculated on the increased figures of population as ascertained in the census of 1891. There were 3,682,707 pupils under instruction in the educational institutions of all classes at the close of the official year 1890-91, as compared with 3,626,390 at the close of 1889-90. The number attending public institutions increased from 3,091,504 in 1889-90 to 3,199,212 in 1890-91, while the number attending private institutions fell from 534,886 in the previous year to 483,495 in the year under report. From the statement given in the margin, which shows the average monthly attendance at the several classes of public institutions during the year, it will be seen that there was an increase in the monthly average number of pupils present at these institutions from 2,913,077 in 1889-90 to 3,022,308 in 1890-91. Statistics showing the average attendance at private institutions are not available. On the 31st March 1891 there were 12,165 scholars on the rolls of the Arts Colleges, as compared with 11,219 on the corresponding date in 1890. The number on the rolls of the Colleges or Departments of Colleges in professional training also increased from 3,049 at the end of the previous year to 3,424 at the end of 1890-91. There was a slight falling off in the number of pupils at secondary schools (468,536), as compared with the previous year (469,153); but there was a substantial increase (106,992) in the number on the rolls of primary schools, which rose from 2,587,694 at the close of 1889-90 to 2,694,686 at the close of 1890-91. The number of pupils in training schools (5,022), which had showed an increase of 49 at the end of 1889-90, as compared with the number at the end of 1888-89, decreased by 36 in the year under notice; but the number attending other special schools (15,451) was somewhat higher than at the close of 1889-90 (15,403).

4. The number of scholars on the 31st March 1891 studying English was 353,515 as compared with 352,356 on the 31st March 1890. In secondary schools there were 234,572 pupils learning English, and in primary schools 44,611, as compared with 287,122 and 43,910, respectively, at the close of 1889-90. The total number of scholars studying a classical language was 508,430 in 1890-91, against 536,551 in 1889-90: the numbers studying a vernacular in those years were, respectively, 3,338,019 and 3,226,537. There was a considerable decrease in the number of students at private institutions who were studying a classical language as well as of those who were studying a vernacular; but at public institutions the numbers were larger than in the previous year, the increase (123,306) in the number learning a vernacular being very marked.

5. The race and religion of the pupils and the proportion of each class to the total number during the past two years may be thus compared:—

6. The total expenditure (direct and indirect) on Education rose from Rs. 2,76,58,697 in 1889-90 to Rs. 2,88,81,963 in the year under review. The direct expenditure, which was Rs. 2,21,80,378 in the preceding year, increased to Rs. 2,28,94,192. This increase was mainly due to increased expenditure on secondary and primary education, the amounts spent under these heads in 1890-91 having been Rs. 94,02,372 and Rs. 91,43,637, respectively, as compared with Rs. 92,89,874 and Rs. 86,76,796 in 1889-90. Of the total amount directly expended on Education, Rs. 19,56,886 were spent on Arts Colleges for male, and Rs. 4,724 on Arts Colleges for female students, as compared with Rs. 19,62,361 and Rs. 11,164 the previous year. The cost of training schools was Rs. 5,94,506 in 1889-90 and Rs. 6,28,777 in 1890-91. The cost of maintaining other special schools in those years was Rs. 9,53,911 and Rs. 9,72,634, respectively. The indirect expenditure on Education, which covers the cost of direction, inspection, scholarships, buildings and miscellaneous items, and which in 1889-90 was Rs. 54,78,319, reached Rs. 59,87,771 in 1890-91. The largest increase occurred under the heads "Buildings" and "Inspection."

7. Of the total expenditure on Education during 1890-91, Rs. 81,61,391 were paid from Provincial Revenues, Rs. 50,50,315 from Local Funds, Rs. 13,36,350 from Municipal Funds, and Rs. 83,55,644 from fees, the balance being met from miscellaneous sources, such as subscriptions, endowments, &c. The following statement compares the sums paid from each of these sources and the proportion of each sum to the total cost of Education in 1889-90 and 1890-91:—

8. The summary of the statistics relating to Education in 1890-91 given above shows that the results have been generally satisfactory, but the Governor General in Council desires again to call attention to the small proportion of the expenditure contributed from Municipal Funds; and he is constrained to record his opinion, derived from a perusal of the various Municipal and Local Fund Reports, that the support given by these bodies to primary education is in many cases altogether inadequate. The expenditure on Education met from miscellaneous sources shows an increase over the figures of 1889-90, but its proportion to the total cost during the year is somewhat lower than in the preceding year.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to all Local Governments and Administrations, and to the Revenue and Agricultural Department for information. Ordered, also, that the Resolution be published in the Supplement to the *Gazette of India*.

Information has been received through the Political Agent, Káthiáwár, that the old wooden buoy marking Oata Shoal lying S.E. of Verával Light-house is removed and has been replaced by an iron buoy painted red in the same position in 2 fathoms.

The old wooden buoy, painted white, has been shifted about 1½ cables to the North of the new buoy and lies to the East of the Light-house.

These buoys are moored in position during the N. E. Monsoon, that is, between the 1st September and 31st May each year.

I have the honour to request on behalf of the Trustees of the Port of Karáchi the favour of the sanction of Government to the raising of a loan of Rs. twenty lákhs (20,00,000), under Government of India Notification No. 16, dated 1st January 1889, under Act XI of 1879, the Local Authorities Loan Act, published at page 38 of the *Sind Official Gazette* of the 17th January 1889, for the construction of extra wharfage accommodation and the establishment of an Import and Export Yard, as per accompanying statement, which gives the particulars required by rule 5 of the rules relating to loans so raised.

2. A copy of the report of the Sub-Committee of Trustees appointed to consider the question is submitted, from which it will be seen that the financial position of the Trust would warrant the Board in applying for permission to take up a loan of twenty-five lákhs of rupees, but the Trustees consider that provision by loan is not in the immediate present necessary for a Graving Dock, or for renewal of Dredging plant.

No. 14.—The following Notice to Mariners issued by the Port Officer, Rangoon, on the 13th instant, is published for general information :—

Danger to Navigation.

The Commander of the S. S. “Kasara” reports having passed a large wooden lower mast with top-over mast-head about 4 miles south by west of Krishna Light.

NORTH MUSAWWA CHANNEL.

Difnein Island Light.

Information has been received through the Political Resident, Aden, that on the 19th January 1892 the Difnein Island Light was replaced by a new 5th Order Dioptric Light, visible through an arc of 270°, or from the bearings of N. 21° W. through East to S. 69° W. It is elevated 61 feet above mean sea level, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 10 to 12 miles.

The Sheikh-ul-Abu Light will be re-exhibited shortly (the bearings are magnetic).”

3. Copies of letters dated 29th and 30th July last from the Chamber of Commerce representative members, and the Chairman of that Body, respectively, are also submitted as shewing the views entertained by the mercantile community of the necessity for increased accommodation.

4. The Board would ask that the earliest consideration possible may be accorded to their application, because owing to the price of Government paper and the cheapness of money they are advised that the present time would be most advantageous for financing the loan.

Statement shewing particulars pursuant to Rule 5 of the rules published by the Government of India for the raising of loans by Local Authorities.

I. The loan is required for the following works :—

1. Extension of wharves northwards by four berths of 450 feet each. The estimated cost of which is Rs. 14 lakhs.
2. The establishment of an Import and Export Yard near the North-Western Railway Bandar Head Station with suitable sheds and sidings. The estimated cost of which is Rs. 6 lakhs.

II. The amount which it is proposed to borrow is Rs. 20 (twenty) lakhs only.

III. It is proposed to borrow the said sum on the security of the general revenues of the Karáchi Port Trust, aggregating over Rs. 6,80,000, on the average of the 3 years ending 1890-91 as per Statement A. hereto annexed. The current year's income is estimated at Rs. 7,70,346, of which Rs. 6,32,254 has been received up to and for the 8 months ending 30th November 1891.

IV. The laws under which fees are levied, received or held, are Bombay Act VI of 1886, Act VII of 1882, and Act X of 1889.

V. The loan is required for a period not exceeding 30 (thirty) years. It is proposed to raise the loan in instalments as under, viz :—

- 25 per cent. on application.
- 25 per cent. on allotment.
- 25 per cent. three months from date of allotment.
- 25 per cent. six months from date of allotment.

Tenderers paying up in full will receive interest from date of allotment. Interest will run from date of allotment and will be paid half-yearly at four per cent. per annum (Rs. 40,000 + Rs. 40,000) = Rs. 80,000 per annum, and a sum of Rs. 36,000 will be set aside annually as a sinking fund which with interest accumulations will pay off the whole loan on the 30th September 1922.

VI. The yearly proceeds of each separate source of income are shewn in Statement A. hereto annexed.

VII. The expenditure incurred by the Trust in each of the three years 1888-89, 1889-90, 1890-91 is shewn in Statement B. hereto annexed.

SIR,

On behalf of the members of the Karáchi Chamber of Commerce we have the honour to bring before you and before the Board of Trustees the necessity of an extension of the Ship Wharves at Keamari.

It is the unanimous opinion of the Chamber, that in order to cope with the growing trade of this Port, it would be very advisable for the Trust to give this question a very early consideration. The rush for berths at the Merewether Pier and Erskine Wharf during the last month may have been unusual as com-

pared with former years, but we believe that, with the continuous and steady increase of cultivation in Sind and the Punjab, and the consequent increase in the grain and seed trade, there will continue to be a rush on the wharves during the exporting season.

On a representation of the Chamber of Commerce, urging the necessity of greater facilities for Import goods, the Board have now under consideration a scheme for the landing of general Import cargo at the wharves. This scheme alone would make a further extension necessary, and the sooner the matter is taken in hand the better it would in our opinion be.

We believe that at present the hydraulic power available at Keamari is far in excess of the actual requirements, six vessels being easily worked from the Erskine Wharf Engines alone. The Merewether Pier Engine being thus available an extension to some extent would be comparatively inexpensive in capital cost as well as in working. We shall thank you to place the matter before the Board at the earliest date convenient.

You may therefore safely assume that an extension will meet with the success that is attending you at Keamari, and the Chamber will be pleased to hear that you have been able to give effect to the suggestions that have been laid before you.

In the meantime and till you have an increased number of berths, it is the opinion of the Chamber that in the interests of trade it is absolutely necessary under existing circumstances that all steamers plying to this Port, may they be "Liners" or outsiders, should be placed on the same footing with regard to obtaining berths at the wharves, and that your Trust should adhere to the principle to berth vessels at the wharves in order of their arrival.

In conclusion I would beg to say that I cannot allow this opportunity to pass without expressing to you how fully the members of the Chamber recognize the value of the facilities your Trust has created, and how much is due to your unceasing efforts to make the most of what is at your disposal for the good of trade.

REPORT.

The Sub-Committee appointed to consider the question of ways and means in view of an extension of wharfage, and a comprehensive scheme to discharge Imports at Keamari, and delivering them, with the aid of the Railway at a proposed Import Yard near the Bandar Head Station, submit the following report:—

1.—*The position of the Trust with regard to a fresh loan for the purposes indicated.*

As will be seen from the annexed statement and Memoranda (Appendix A) the net surplus revenue of the Trust (excluding money expended on Capital Works and on improvement dredging of the Harbour) has been as follows:—

Considering that the Erskine Wharf was not in full working in 1888-89 (nor in 1889-90 for the full financial year) a sound deduction could not be drawn from an average of the three years' figures. The Committee are of opinion that an average of the years 1889-90 and 1890-91 would be more than safe, and that the Trust could safely calculate upon a net surplus revenue of Rs. 1,40,000 with the existing facilities.

The Committee do not lose sight of the fact, that on and from 31st March 1892, the yearly instalment for repayment of the 15½ lakhs loan (excluding interest, which has been a revenue expenditure in the past) will have to be provided for, the annual instalment of which will amount to Rs. 25,000 (on the average of 30 years). Against this repayment, the Trust will have, as an increased source of revenue, the income to be derived from the Craneage fees now awaiting Government sanction for introduction. These the Committee estimate at about Rs. 25,000, and they form a rough set-off against the above.

The above figures of revenue shew that every extension of wharfage has yielded to the Trust an increased return as the works have been completed, and it may with confidence be anticipated that a new extension will further enhance the revenue. More especially as the existing facilities have proved insufficient to meet the trade. Within the past 6 months no less than 52 vessels have been detained in the stream awaiting berths from 1 to 7 days, averaging to each vessel a clear detention of 3 days after arrival in harbour. Moreover, many vessels have been compelled to load in the stream, owing to their inability to secure accommodation at the pier or wharves.

The Committee are of opinion that in the circumstances above shewn, the financial position fully justifies the Trust undertaking the obligations of a further loan, with the object of providing the facilities which are absolutely necessary to meet the increasing demands of trade.

The Committee are of opinion that the Board of Trustees are in a position to approach Government for the grant of a fresh loan of Rs. 25 lakhs, the cost of which for interest and repayment at total 6½% per annum would be Rs. 1,56,250, a sum which, according to the above report, it is obvious to the Committee, can easily be met from the present and prospective resources of the Trust.

2.—*The Extension of the Wharves at Keamari.*

The Committee recommend an extension of the wharves by 4 berths of 450 feet each, in the direction of the Native Jetty, where reclamation is now in progress. The estimate for this extension is Rs. 14 lakhs.

3.—*Import Yard near the Bandar Head Station.*

The Committee are of opinion, that for the successful working of the Import Yard it is necessary that the North-Western Railway should undertake the hauling of the goods from Keamari at the lowest possible cost. Taking the cost of water carriage from vessels to the Native Jetty, including tallying and delivering and risk, at 8 annas per ton, as a point below which remunerative competition would cease, it must be ascertained at what lowest rate the Railway will haul the goods from the vessel to the Import Yard, and it must be borne in mind that the North-Western Railway carry wheat now at 3½ pie per ton per mile, and that they work wheat in the Keamari Yard at 1½ annas per ton.

In order to secure the whole of the trade, the Trust may probably have to accept as low as 6 to 8 annas per ton, and taking into consideration the cost of establishment, tallying, coolies, and responsibility, not more than 2 annas per ton could probably be paid for haulage. The Railway should be approached on this subject.

Of the various schemes laid before the Sub-Committee they consider the Port Engineer's plan, dated Manora, 14th September 1891, marked Appendix A-1, to be the most suitable.

As early as the scheme matures they would recommend the acquirement of the land now the property of Government, the Municipality and private individuals falling within the boundaries of the plan and the removal of the Custom-house to a suitable central site.

Of the proposed loan of 25 lakhs the above scheme will absorb—

The extension of Wharfage...	...	14 lakhs.

The balance of the loan, viz. 5 lakhs, the Committee consider may be required towards the construction of a Graving Dock or for renewal of Dredging plant, both objects deserving the serious consideration of the Board of Trust.

For a new Loan of 25 Lakhs of Rupees we would require for interest and repayment within 30 years at 6 per cent, say, Rs. 1,50,000.

Assuming that the actual maintenance dredging during 1888-89 amounted to Rs. 80,000, our surplus for 1888-89 would have been Rs. 65,000.

This includes Rs. 49,397 only for dredging under current revenue, but the Government grant having been discontinued, an additional sum of Rs. 56,987 was expended on dredging from unspent balance of previous years.

Assuming that half the latter amount was necessary for maintenance and half of Rs. 28,494 spent on improvements, the surplus would be, say, Rs. 1,00,000 after providing about Rs. 80,000 for maintenance dredging.

This provides for Rs. 47,579 dredging under current revenue, but as in the year 1889-90 a sum of Rs. 75,000 has been spent on dredging from the unspent revenue of previous years. Assuming again that of the total amount expended on dredging the sum of Rs. 80,000 was sufficient for maintenance and the rest debitable to improvements, we have to deduct from the above figure for dredging Rs. 30,000, further we have to deduct expenditure debited to the unspent balances of previous years, but which are properly chargeable to current revenue, viz :—

This gives a total of deductions to be made of Rs. 50,137, leaving in 1890-91 roughly speaking a surplus of Rs. 1,00,000.

An appended rough estimate from the Port Engineer shews that not more than Rs. 80,000 per annum will be required for maintenance dredging, and the Port Engineer believes that with the completing of the removal of Deep Water Point less dredging will be required in future years. The larger sums spent during the three preceding years are, it seems, amply explained by the considerably greater depth of water throughout the Harbour as shown in the last Harbour Survey Report.

The figures, as above given, tend to show that, with the opening of the Erskine Wharf (which was not completed in the year 1888-89), the trade in Keamari over those wharves and the revenue accruing to the Port Trust have considerably increased.

Without, however, calculating on a further increase of traffic with a further extension of wharfage we may safely assume that the Port Trust have a net surplus revenue per annum at present of Rs. 1,00,000, which would be available in case the Trustees negotiate for a further loan.

We have to add thereto the probable income which the Trust will derive from the Cranage fees which will be levied before long. This income I calculate at about Rs. 25,000.

On the other hand we shall shortly have to provide for the repayment of the 15½ lakhs loan (as soon as the same is completely taken up), and this provision would amount to about 1½ to 1¾ per cent. per annum, or, say, Rs. 25,000, leaving the available or visible present surplus at about one lakh.

For the present purpose it would, however, be unfair to take the above average for the Erskine Wharf which was not in full working order in 1888-89, the average for the past two years would, if anything be under the mark, unless the wheat trade dies away to a considerable extent. This average is Rs. 1,39,103, or, say, Rs. 1,40,000 per annum.

Assuming that money can be raised on loan at $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. and the sinking fund invested at 4 per cent., the interest payable would be $4\cdot50 + 1\cdot78 = 6\cdot28$, or Rs. 6,280 per lách.

With a revenue of Rs. 1,40,000 as above, a loan of 22·29 láchs could be raised.

The repayment of the $15\frac{1}{2}$ láchs loan has not been taken into consideration in the above.

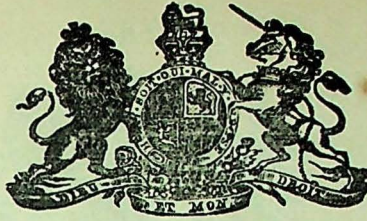
