No. 2136.—Friday last the 16th instant, being the day of the funeral of His late Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Germany, the Governor in Council ordered, under instructions from the Government of India, that as a mark of respect to His Imperial Majesty's memory flags should be hoisted half-mast high throughout the day in all forts and stations of the Bombay Presidency, and that a salute of 91 guns, corresponding with the age of His late Majesty, should be fired at the Head-quarters Stations of Divisions and Districts where Artillery was available.

Sanction was accorded to the loan of Rs. 4,00,000, to enable the Karachi Municipality to carry out the following works of public utility within municipal limits, on condition that it should be repaid in 30 years by half-yearly instalments of Rs. 16,176-10-10:-

- (1) Water Works Extension.
- (2) Boulton Market.
- (3) Empress Market, Sadar Bazar.
- (4) Light Tramway.
- (5) Victoria Museum.

Out of the Rs. 5,00,000 sanctioned, Rs. 1,11,500 were raised in 1884-85. With the exception of No. 5, all the other works have been completed.

The loan was sanctioned for the improvement and extension of the harbour accommodation for native vessels and of dredging the approaches to the native jetty. The Board proposed to take up the loan in instalments during a period not exceeding two years from the commencement of the works, each instalment not to exceed Rs. 5,00,000, and the interval between each to be not less than three months, or more than one year. It is calculated that the loan will be discharged in not less than 30, and not more than 50 years, by half-yearly instalments of Rs. 10,000 principal with interest on the whole loan; the first instalment towards repayment of the principal to commence from 1st March or 1st September following the receipt of the last instalment of the loan.

Out of the sum of Rs. 10,00,000 sanctioned, Rs. 2,88,500 only were raised in 1884-85.

Insert the following as rule 3 under this section:—

3. Subject to the provisions of rule 2, the arrears of pension of a deceased pensioner may, if the amount does not exceed Rs. 500, be paid to the heirs of the deceased after such enquiry into the rights and title of the claimants as the Collector or other officer responsible for the payment may deem sufficient. If, however, there is any reasonable doubt in regard to the claim or title of the heirs, or if the amount due exceeds Rs. 500, the payment should be made only to the person duly authorised to receive assets belonging to the estate of the deceased.

The prize was awarded to P. Vathagheri Asari for a large panel the colour of which was

agreeable, the execution good and the design ingenious.

The large panel submitted by Ramanjulu Nayadu was also of considerable merit.

The Committee regret again to observe that a prize of this value has failed to induce a greater competition, no specimens having been received from districts especially noted for the production of this ware.

Printing on Cotton or Silk.—Seven specimens were submitted by Jhandoo, son of Khuda Baksh, cotton printer, Dehli Gate, Lahore, who was the only competitor. The Committee regret to say that all these prints were exceptionally bad; and the prize therefore is withheld. It is a matter of great surprise to the Committee that an industry so universal in India should have been practically unrepresented.

As these prizes, notwithstanding their value, have utterly failed to induce anything like competition or to promote the object for which they were intended, viz., to encourage the production of articles exemplifying in a high degree elegance in design and excellence in workmanship, it seems useless, in the opinion of the Committee, to continue the scheme further. They recommend, therefore, that the money and medals may be devoted to scholarships and prizes in connection with the School of Art.

PART I.

Notification.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 23rd March 1888.

No. 941.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I. of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 17th instant in the Port of Aden and at Perim as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Rangoon shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter R of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.

IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale :—

After eight days of voyage	...	...	six days of quarantine.
Do. nine do.	...	...	five do.
Do. ten do.	...	...	four do.
Do. eleven do.	...	...	three do.
Do. twelve do.	...	...	two do.
Do. thirteen do.	and upwards	...	twenty-four hours of quarantine.

V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden and Perim which may have communicated with vessels coming from Rangoon shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden and Perim from that Port.

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.
