Approaches to Bombay.

No. 30.—Fishing stakes are not allowed to be placed within the following prescribed limits :—
Within the space bounded on the east by the Fort limits.

Bounded on the north by Prongs Light-house, bearing east.

On the south by Kennery Light-house, bearing east.

Fishing stakes are not allowed to be placed within the ranges of the Prongs or Kennery lights outside the 10-fathom line of soundings.

Fishing stakes are fixed within the 10-fathom line to north and south of these limits within the ranges of the lights, and mariners are warned of the danger their vessels will be liable to if they should come inside the 10-fathom line south of Kennery and north of the Prongs Light-house.

No. 2537.—It is hereby notified that the Governor in Council proposes, in exercise of the power conferred by Section 214 of the Bombay Land Revenue Code, to insert the following rule after No. 50 of the Rules made by him under the said section and published in Notification No. 7368 of 1881 at pages 795–816 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1881, Part I. Persons who have any remarks or suggestions to make should communicate them in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, within one month from the date of this notification:—

"50A. No occupant of any land within the limits of the city or suburban municipality of Poona or of the cantonment of Poona or within one mile from the said limits may grow sugarcane therein, if the Collector, having regard to the situation and extent of such land or to any other material consideration affecting the same, and after consulting the Sanitary Commissioner, shall be satisfied that the growth of sugarcane in such land is dangerous to the health of residents within the area to which this rule extends, and shall, on this ground, by

order in writing addressed to the occupant of the land, prohibit the cultivation of the said crop therein:

"Provided that no order issued by the Collector under this rule in respect of any land in which a sugarcane crop is growing at the date of such order, shall come into effect until two years after the time when the said crop was sown."

Persons who have any objections to urge to the draft rules are required to forward their objections in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government, General Department, before the noon of 21st May 1888:—

DRAFT RULES.

In exercise of the power conferred by Section 31 of the Bombay Boiler Inspection Act, 1887, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules for the city of Bombay, viz.:—

Preliminary.

1. In these rules:

Definitions. (a) "the Act" means the Bombay Boiler Inspection Act, 1887;

(b) "section" means a section of the said Act;

(c) "the Collector" means the Collector of Bombay;

(d) the terms defined in section 3 shall be deemed to have, respectively, the same meaning as is given to them by the Act;

(e) words in the singular include the plural and *vice versa*.

Inspection.

2. The Inspector shall be entitled to receive such monthly salary as Emoluments of Inspector. Government shall from time to time determine, in return wherefor he shall devote his whole time and attention to the duties of his office.

3. The Boiler Inspection Office will be in the Boiler Inspection Office. Government Secretariat, and the Inspector shall attend thereat, whenever necessary, during usual office hours.

4. The Inspector shall act under the orders of the Collector, and make all reports to that officer.

5. The Inspector shall keep a diary of the work which he performs from day to day. In it he shall enter:

(a) each place visited;

(b) every work performed by him under the Act;

(c) the fee recovered on account of each such work;

(d) such additional particulars as he from time to time thinks necessary.

The Inspector shall submit a copy of the diary so kept by him every week to the Collector for his information and record.

6. The Inspector shall keep an Index, Register,

and Dimension Sheets, Other records to be kept by Inspector. in such order as the Collector shall authorize, of

all boilers in the city liable to inspection under the Act and such other statements and records as the Collector shall from time to time direct.

7. The Inspector shall attend every meeting of a Commission appointed

Duties of Inspector with respect to Commissions. under section 5 and shall make such statements and submit such

plans to the Commission as he thinks necessary or as shall be called for by the Commission.

8. The Inspector shall be provided with the testing pump, indicator

Testing apparatus to be provided for Inspector. and gauges necessary for testing boilers.

9. (1) The Inspector's examination of a boiler shall be both external and internal.

(2) If the owner or person in charge of a boiler examined fails to comply, in any material point, with:

(a) the provisions of sub-section (2) of section 8; or

(b) any requirement of the Inspector under sub-section (1) or (3) of the said section; the Inspector shall defer his inspection and report the case to the Collector for orders,

Inspection Fees.

10. Fees shall be levied under section 7 for the inspection of boilers according to the following scale, viz.:—

For the inspection of each boiler attached to a prime mover not exceeding 10 H. P. nominal	Rs. 15
Do. do. exceeding 10, but not exceeding 20	do. " 20
Do. do. 20, 30	do. " 25
Do. do. 30, 50	do. " 30
Do. do. 50,	do. do. " 40

Commissions.

11. Commissions appointed by Government under section 5 will consist of three members, one of whom shall be the President of the Commission. The appointments and the terms for which they are respectively to endure, will be notified in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

12. Members of Commissions shall assemble, at the request of the Collector, at his office, whenever necessary; and a clerk of the Collector's office will act as clerk to the Commission.

13. Every member of a Commission shall be entitled to receive a fee of thirty rupees for each meeting of the Commission at which any duty prescribed by the Act is performed by the Commission and which he attends from the beginning to the end thereof.

Examiners.

14. The number of persons to be appointed to the Board of Examiners will be determined from time to time by Government. Their appointments and the terms for which they are respectively appointed will be notified in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

15. The Board shall assemble, at the request of the Collector, whenever necessary, in the Collector's office or in such other place as the Collector may from time to time deem convenient for the examination of candidates.

16. Each Examiner shall be entitled to receive a fee of thirty rupees for each meeting of the Board, at which any duty prescribed by the Act is performed and which he attends from the beginning to the end thereof.

Examinations.

17. Examinations shall ordinarily be held once a month, on the second Wednesday in the month, but the Collector may, for sufficient reasons, fix any other day in any month for the examinations or if the fees of the candidates enrolled for examination in any month are insufficient to cover the Examiners' fees for that month, may postpone the examination.

18. The examinations will be of three kinds, viz. one for each of the three classes of certificates of competency which the Board is hereinafter empowered to grant.

19. Candidates at examinations will pay fees at the following rates, viz.:—

For a 1st Class Certificate Rs.	20
Do. 2nd do. ...	15
Do. 3rd do. ...	10

Unsuccessful candidates will not be entitled to a return of any portion of the fee paid by them; but the fee paid by any applicant who is not admitted to examination will be returned to him in full.

20. Every applicant for examination must lodge a written application at the office of the Collector not later than fifteen days before the date fixed for the examination, together with:

(a) testimonials of good character, sobriety and experience; and

(b) proof that he has completed twenty-one (or, in the case of a candidate for a 1st Class Certificate, twenty-two) years of age; and

(c) a receipt from the Bank of Bombay, for the amount of the fee prescribed in Rule 19 for the examination at which he wishes to appear.

21. No applicant will be admitted to examination whose testimonials of good character, sobriety and experience are not, in the opinion of the Board, trustworthy and satisfactory, or who fails to establish to the satisfaction of the Board that on the date of the examination his age is in excess of twenty-one or twenty-two years, as the case may be.

22. Every examination shall be of such a nature as to test the practical knowledge of the candidates and to ascertain their competency to manage boilers and prime movers.

QUALIFICATIONS TO BE REQUIRED OF CANDIDATES.

A.—Third Class Certificates.

23. A candidate for a third class certificate will not be admitted to examination, unless he proves to the satisfaction of the Board that previously to his application he has been three years employed in the management of engines and boilers, or produces a certificate from the Principal of the College of Science at Poona, stating that he has completed a three years' course in the workshops of that College and during that period has been constantly instructed in the management of engines.

24. The examination for third class certificates will be conducted *vide* Method of examination. *voce* and will be held, if possible, in a foundry, where the candidate's knowledge can be practically tested in the use of the steam, vacuum and water gauges.

25. In order to be entitled to a third class certificate, a candidate must:—

(a) satisfy the Board that he fully understands the working and use of safety valves;

(b) be able to explain to some extent the actual working of engines and the separate uses of feed-pumps, slide-valves, pistons, &c.

B.—Second Class Certificates.

26. A candidate for a second class certificate will not be admitted to the examination, unless he proves to the satisfaction of the Board that, previously to his application, he has served for not less than three years in a factory or workshop, where steam-power was used or engines and boilers were made or repaired, or produces a certificate from the Principal of the College of Science at Poona, stating that he has completed a three years' course in the workshops of that College and during that period has been constantly instructed in the management of engines.

- (b) The change of system introduced during the current year by which it was decided that all new works costing more than Rs. 20,000 should be charged to Loan Funds, thereby releasing a sum of about 2 lakhs per annum, formerly charged to current revenue.

The total Revenue Estimate as passed by the Corporation for 1888-89 amounts to Rs. 46,46,750, and together with the estimated opening balance, the sum available for expenditure during 1888-89 is estimated at Rs. 51,89,750. This sum is sufficient to meet all the expenditure which I have recommended to the Corporation for 1888-89.

I trust that Government will now be pleased to sanction the proposal which I made in my letters No. 2131, dated 11th May 1887, i. e. to sanction the raising of the whole of the balance required for the Tansa Works instead of requiring the Municipal Commissioner to apply year by year for the sum required for that year's expenditure.

I have on former occasions, in my letters quoted marginally, brought to the notice of Government the great delay that is rendered necessary by the inevitable correspondence on the subject of these frequent loan applications, and I need not therefore trouble Government by reiterating the arguments in favour of granting sanction, once for all, for the whole sum necessary to complete the Tansa Lake Works.

I may only instance the case of the 7 lakhs' sanitary loan, applied for more than a year ago, final sanction to the raising of which has not yet been received. I do not overlook the fact that this delay is partly due to informalities of procedure on my part in the direction of raising a loan urgently required without waiting for the receipt of formal sanction; but on the other hand as it is impossible to stop important works in progress, when such informalities occur, it will inevitably happen again (as it happened in the case of the 7 lakhs' loan) that the Municipal Commissioner, rather than involve the Municipality in the great loss which would result from suspending operations of such magnitude, will be obliged to take upon himself the responsibility of raising loans to carry on the works.

In the case of the Tansa Works the complete project has been approved of by Government, and I respectfully urge that there is now no longer any reason for Government to withhold their sanction to raise the balance required to complete the 123 lakhs loan—the estimated cost of the project; this balance to be raised in such instalments between 1888 and 1892 as the Municipality may find necessary for the works.

Supposing, however, that Government find themselves unable to adopt this view, then I request that Government will accord sanction to raise 25 lakhs of the Tansa loan between 1st August 1888 and 15th January 1889 for expenditure in the end of 1888 and first half of 1889.

In connection with this I beg to draw attention to my letter No. 13705 of 16th December 1887 on the subject of leaving the Municipality free to raise the instalments of their loans on such dates as they may find advantageous, having regard to market rates, instead of being tied down by the terms of the application to raise their loans on particular dates fixed so long beforehand that the advantage of favourable terms of the market cannot be reaped.

For the reasons explained in that letter I trust that it may not be necessary to fix the dates and amounts of instalments for the raising of the 25 lakhs now.

Should this point, however, be decided against me, then to avoid delay I will mention the following dates:—

Statement showing particulars pursuant to Rule V of the Rules published by the Government of India for the raising of Loans by Local Authorities.

I. The loan is required for the construction of a lake in the Tansa Valley and other works incidental to bringing the water from the said lake into Bombay. The estimate of the cost of the work is Rs. 1,23,00,000.

II. The amount which it is proposed to borrow is Rs. 25,00,000, in addition to 47 lakhs already borrowed with the sanction of the Government of India.

III. It is proposed to borrow the said sum on the security of the general revenue of the Bombay Municipality aggregating nearly, on the average of the past three years, over 45 and a quarter lakhs, as per supplemental Statement A, hereto annexed, the last year's income being over 49 lakhs.

IV. The laws under which funds, duties, taxes, rates, cesses, &c., are levied, received or held, are Act IV of 1857 and Bombay Acts VI of 1863, III of 1872 and IV of 1878, V of 1878, VI of 1882 and II of 1886.

V. It is proposed to raise the loan in three instalments on or about the following dates:—

Eight lakhs 15th August 1888.
 Eight lakhs 1st October 1888.
 Nine lakhs 15th November 1888.

It is proposed to make the following arrangements with regard to payment of interest and repayment of loan, viz:—

(a) Rs. 3,70,000 to be set apart annually, up to and including 1892, which sum will more than suffice to meet the interest charges on the portions of the loan raised from time to time up to 1892.

(b) From 1893 the instalment required to meet the Interest and Sinking Fund will be Rs. 6,91,207, or say Rs. 6,92,000, which will be annually included in the Budget.

Out of this, after paying interest half-yearly on the 1st October and 1st April in each year, the balance will either be invested as a Sinking Fund or appropriated to extinguishing a portion of the original loan by buying in Municipal Debentures.

Thus the whole loan will be repaid within forty years, from 1st January 1893, in not more than eighty instalments.

VI. The yearly proceeds of each separate source of income are shown in the supplemental Statement A. hereto annexed.

VII. All expenditure incurred by the Municipality in each of the three last preceding years—1884-85, 1885-86 and 1886-87—is shown in supplemental Statement B. hereto annexed.

VIII. All existing prior charges upon the funds of the Municipality are shown in the supplemental Statement C. hereto annexed.

CIRCULAR No. XVI (T.A.D.)

Dated 1st May 1888.

From—The ACCOUNTANT GENERAL, BOMBAY;
To—All HEADS of OFFICES and COLLECTORS.

Under Section 46 of the Civil Travelling Allowance Code (Provisional Issue), a Government servant, summoned to give evidence before a Court of Law, is entitled to travelling allowance from Government under the Civil Travelling Allowance Code, only if he is summoned in his official capacity to give evidence of facts which came to his knowledge, or of matters with which he has had to deal, in his public capacity.

2. When so summoned the travelling allowance is admissible—

(a) in a criminal case or a case before a Court-martial—unconditionally.

N.B.—In this case he should not claim any allowance from the Court as there is no object in drawing the money from Government funds only to refund it to Government.

(b) in a civil case—only if Government is a party.

3. In the latter case, as the party summoning him is, under the Civil Procedure Code, required to pay his expenses into Court before the summons is issued, the witness must obtain from the Court any travelling or subsistence allowance to which he is entitled under the Rules of the Court and the amount so obtained must be deducted from the amount of travelling allowance claimed from Government.

4. Bills for travelling allowance for attending to give evidence must be separate from ordinary travelling allowance bills and must be supported by certificates from the Courts in the annexed form. If any travelling allowance is drawn on this account on a general bill, containing other items, or, without the production of the required certificate, it will not be passed. Treasury Officers will be careful to refuse payments on bills, which do not comply with these instructions.

5. When a Government servant is summoned to give evidence in his private capacity he is only entitled to such allowances as the rules of the Court permit, and he must obtain them from the Court. If the Court pays him any sum by way of subsistence allowance or compensation, the amount of it as shown in the second entry on the certificate, must be credited to Government before full pay is drawn for the days of absence. The Head of the office from which an officer is summoned to give evidence must insist upon the production of the prescribed certificate from the Court before he draws that officer's pay for the month. The certificate will afford him all the information necessary for complying with the directions of this Circular.

6. The Form of Certificate prescribed by this Office Circular No. 46, dated 24th November 1885, is superseded and should no longer be used.

Treasury Officers will refuse payment of bills supported by a certificate in the old form.
