No. 3037.—In continuation of Government Notification No. 655 dated the 28th January

1888, published at page 100 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of the 2nd February 1888, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to empower the three Nāib Subhās of the Navsāri Division of His Highness the Gāikwār's territory and the Vahivatdār and 1st Kārakūn of the Mahāls of Navsāri, Gandevi, Moha, Palsana, Kathore, Kurnrej and Velacha to grant transport permits mentioned in Government Notification No. 8827 dated the 28th December 1887. His Excellency the Governor in Council is also pleased to exempt from duty liquor manufactured at His Highness' distillery at Navsāri which is transported from one part of His Highness' territory through any part of British territory situated within the district of Surat to any other part of His Highness' territory.

No. 3041.—Whereas it appears to the Governor of Bombay in Council that land is required to be taken by Government at the public expense for a public purpose, viz., for the construction of Police Lines at Roha, taluka Roha, district Kolaba; it is hereby declared that for the above purpose the land specified below is required within the limits of the aforesaid village of Roha:—

No. 3375.—The following Notification by the Government of India in the Foreign Department is republished for general information:—

"Simla, the 11th May 1888.

No. 1827-I.—Whereas the Chiefs of Morvi, Wankaner, Wadhwan, Lakhtar, Savla, and Muli in Kathiawar have granted to the British Government the civil and criminal jurisdiction exercised by them within the lands which lie within their respective territories and are occupied by the Morvi State Railway (including the lands occupied as stations, out-buildings and for all other railway purposes); and whereas the Governor-General in Council has now full civil and criminal jurisdiction in the aforesaid lands:—In exercise of this jurisdiction, and of the powers conferred by sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, 1879, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-

General in Council is pleased to issue the following orders:—

Criminal Law, Procedure and Jurisdiction.

1. The provisions, so far as they may be applicable, of the Indian Penal Code (Act XLV of 1860), as amended for the time being by subsequent Acts, the Whipping Act (Act VI of 1864), sections 1—6, both inclusive, the Code of Criminal Procedure (Act X of 1882), as amended for the time being by subsequent Acts, and the Bombay District Police Act (Bombay Act VII of 1867), section 26, are hereby extended to the aforesaid lands, subject in the case of the Code of Criminal Procedure to the following modifications, namely:—

(a) Trials before the Court of Session may, in the discretion of the Sessions Judge, be without a jury or the aid of assessors.

(b) Sentences of transportation or imprisonment for more than seven years passed by the Court of Session shall be referred for confirmation to the Governor of Bombay in Council. In any case so referred the Governor of Bombay in Council may either confirm the sentence or pass any other sentence warranted by law, or may annul the conviction and order a new trial on the same or an amended charge, or may acquit the accused person.

(c) Appeals from Magistrates of the second class shall lie to the Court of Session and not to the District Magistrate.

2. (i) The Assistant Political Agent in Jhalavad for the time being, the Deputy Assistant Political Agent in Jhalavad for the time being, and the District Thandadar at Wadhwan for the time being, shall respectively exercise the powers of a District Magistrate, a Magistrate of the first class, and a Magistrate of the second class (with power to commit for trial to the Court of Session) as described in the Code of Criminal Procedure within the aforesaid lands.

(b) The Judicial Assistant for the time being in Kathiawar and the Governor of Bombay in Council shall respectively exercise the powers of a Court of Session and a High Court, as described in the Code of Criminal Procedure, in respect of all offences over which jurisdiction is exercised by the said Magistrates within the aforesaid lands.

3. Nothing hereinbefore contained shall apply to proceedings against European British subjects or persons jointly charged with European British subjects.

Civil Jurisdiction and Procedure.

4. The Judicial Assistant in Kathiawar for the time being, the Assistant Political Agent in Jhalavad for the time being, the Deputy Assistant Political Agent in Jhalavad for the time being, and the District Thanadar at Wadhwan for the time being, shall respectively exercise within the aforesaid lands the same civil jurisdiction as is

exercised by them within the limits of the Kathiawar Political Agency under the rules for defining the jurisdiction, original and appellate, to be exercised by the Civil Courts of the Political Agency in Kathiawar published at page 312 of the *Kathiawar Agency Gazette* dated the 27th December 1883.

5. In the administration of civil justice in the aforesaid lands, the rules referred to in the last foregoing paragraph and the Code of Civil Procedure shall be taken as general guides.

Subsidiary Rules relating to Public Conveyance, Section 14 Act VI of 1863.

1. Return fare, if the conveyance is specially engaged for the double journey, to be paid at half the rates shown in the annexed schedule.

2. Detention charges:

Bullock cart 2 annas per hour, all other conveyances 4 annas per hour, provided the total fare (including detention charges) does not exceed the fare payable for a whole day.

3. For any distance not included in the annexed schedule the fares shall be fixed as follows:

Vehicles drawn by two horses...3 annas per mile or portion of a mile.

Do. do. one horse ...2 annas per mile or portion of a mile.

Do. do. bullocks ...2 annas do. do.

Labour carts1 anna and six pies.

Palanquins { With 4 Hamáls...2 annas do.

4. No owner or attendant of a public conveyance shall be compelled to carry a single passenger in his conveyance for any fare less than that to which he would be entitled for the full complement of passengers unless a proportionate fare is first agreed upon.

5. In any case in which a public land conveyance is called from a stand or from a distance to any place to take up a fare, the driver may charge half the fare shown in Rule 3 for the distance from the place whence he has been called to the place to which he has been summoned: this charge shall be in addition to the regulated fare.

6. Two children under six years of age are to count as one passenger.

Children in arms are to be carried free.

5. No charge for detention not exceeding 15 minutes is permissible, provided the total fare (including detention charges) does not exceed the fare payable for a whole day.

For any distance not included in the annexed schedule the fare shall be as follows :—

A Tonga shall not carry more than four persons including the driver, a Reckla not more than four excluding the driver.

N.B.—Two children under 12 shall count as one person.

No owner or attendant of a conveyance shall be compelled to carry one or two passengers for less than the rate fixed for a whole conveyance.

In any case in which a conveyance is called from a stand or the owner's stables to any place distant more than half mile, to take up a fare, the driver or owner shall be entitled to charge annas two (2) in addition to the regulated fare.

His Excellency the Governor in Council approves, until further notice, of the following Scholarships for each Collectorate or District of the Presidency:—

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2. The first Scholarship in each District is open to general competition, but the second Scholarship is reserved for candidates who belong to classes that are backward in English education.

3. The Scholarships are open to candidates from any school in the British Collectorate or District to which the Scholarships are attached: but no candidate will be allowed to compete who has not been a *bonâ-fide* student of the school for at least twelve months immediately preceding the examination.

4. The examination for the Scholarships will be held in the month of September of each year. No candidate above the age of 10 years on the 1st of September will be eligible for the open Scholarship, and no candidate above the age of 12 years on the 1st of September will be eligible for the close Scholarship.

5. The Scholarships will be awarded by a Committee, to be appointed by the Educational Inspector for each District, on the results of an examination held at centres which will be notified in the *Government Gazette*. The names of the successful candidates and the schools at which they were prepared will also be published annually in the *Government Gazette*.

* In large districts the number of Scholarships may be doubled. † Includes Aden. ‡ Includes Camp Baroda. § Includes Camp Deca.

6. Applications for permission to compete at the examination must be made in the printed form appended (*see* Appendix A). The form will be supplied by the Inspector on application. An examination fee of one rupee will be charged to each candidate.

7. The examination for the Scholarships will be in the subjects mentioned in Appendix B.

8. Each Scholarship will be of the value of Rs. 3 per mensem, and will be tenable for three years from the 1st of January succeeding the examination, conditionally on the regular attendance, good conduct and satisfactory progress of the holder at any public institution* in the Presidency, which is recognized by the Department as teaching a course prescribed by Government.

* A public institution is an institution which is open to Government inspection, and submits annual returns to the Educational Department.

No Scholarship shall be withdrawn from its holder for misconduct, or for any other cause, without the sanction of the Director of Public Instruction which should be obtained through the Educational Inspector. All scholars must be presented before the Government Inspector at the annual inspection of the schools which they attend.

9. The holder of a Scholarship will be liable at any time to be examined by the Educational Inspector or his Deputy, and on proof of unsatisfactory progress to be deprived of his Scholarship.

10. The Scholarship must be drawn quarterly in arrears, upon printed bills† signed by the holder and countersigned by the Head Master of his school; and the holder of a Scholarship cannot change his school without the sanction of the Educational Inspector.

11. Holders of Scholarships who attend Government schools will be required to pay the fees levied from other students.

N.B.—These rules apply to girls as well as boys.

Simla, the 11th May 1888.

No. 2471.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Sections 5 and 7 of the Local Authorities Loan Act of 1879, the Governor-General in Council directs that for clause 5 of Rule V of the Rules for the raising of loans by local authorities in

the open market published with Notification No. 2748,* dated 17th August 1883, the following clauses (5) and (5a) be substituted:—

(5) The dates between which the money borrowed is to be received.

[Note.—It is essential that the authority to borrow in the market should be limited to a reasonable time, as loans of any considerable amount cannot be held in suspense indefinitely. The dates, therefore, must be fixed with reference to this condition, and must not be so wide apart and so indefinite as practically to be no limitation.]

(5a) The term of years for which the money is to be borrowed, the instalments, if any, in which it is to be repaid, and the amount of sinking fund, if any, provided for its repayment.

No. 30.—Fishing stakes are not allowed to be placed within the following prescribed limits:—

Within the space bounded on the east by the Fort limits.

Bounded on the north by Prongs Light-house, bearing east.

On the south by Kennery Light-house, bearing east.

Fishing stakes are not allowed to be placed within the ranges of the Prongs or Kennery lights outside the 10-fathom line of soundings.

Fishing stakes are fixed within the 10-fathom line to north and south of these limits within the ranges of the lights, and mariners are warned of the danger their vessels will be liable to if they should come inside the 10-fathom line south of Kennery and north of the Prongs Light-house.

Order made under Section 6 of the Indian Tramways Act, 1886, by the Governor of Bombay in Council, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, authorizing the Indian Railways Feeder Lines Company, Limited, to construct a tramway in the Násik District of the Bombay Presidency.

Preliminary.

1. This Order may be cited as the 'Násik Tramway Order, 1888.'
2. The several words and expressions to which meanings are assigned by the Indian Tramways Act, 1886, have in this Order the same respective meanings: Provided that in this Order, the expression 'the tramway' or 'the undertaking' shall mean the tramway and works and undertaking by this Order authorized.

Promoters.

3. The Indian Railways Feeder Lines Company, Limited, shall be the Promoters for the purpose of this Order and are in this Order referred to as 'The Promoters.'

Construction of Tramway.

4. The Promoters may construct and maintain, subject to the provisions of this Order, and in accordance with the plans and sections deposited for the purpose of this Order, the tramway hereinafter described, with all proper rails, bearings, offices, stables, carriage-houses, works and conveniences connected therewith or for the purposes thereof, and may work and use the same.

The tramway authorized by this Order is a single line, with necessary passing-places, to be laid on the provincial road from the Násik Road Station of the G. I. P. Railway Company to a point two hundred yards west of the Násik City Municipality Naka, known as Bhagur Darwaja Naka, a distance of less than five miles.

5. The Promoters may use, for the construction of the tramway, the portions of the provincial road, five and a half feet only in width, measured from the gutter or, where the road is in embankment, from the edge of such embankment on the north side of the road; and, for the purpose of constructing passing-places or of crossing bridges or culverts, may approach the centre of the road as far as shall in each instance be deemed necessary by the Government Engineer in executive charge of the road: Provided that if any addition to, or alteration of, any bridge or culvert is, in the opinion of the said Engineer, rendered necessary by the tramway, the same shall be carried out by and at the expense of the Promoters to the satisfaction of the Engineer aforesaid.

6. The portion of the road which the Promoters are not authorized by or under this Order to use for the purpose of the tramway shall be left free and unincumbered for ordinary traffic and no obstruction whatever shall be placed thereon or caused thereto, without the previous written consent of the said Engineer.

7. The Promoters may stack road metal and other materials for the construction or maintenance of the tramway within the road-limits on the north side of the road; and the said limits on the north side of the road shall not be used by the Engineer aforesaid for the purpose of stacking Government materials.

8. The Promoters may from time to time acquire such land, other than the portion of the provincial road which they are authorized by or under this Order to use, as they require for the purposes of the undertaking by agreement made through and with the concurrence of the Collector; and all expenses incurred by the Collector in connection therewith shall be borne by the Promoters. The Promoters may from time to time, with the approval of the Collector, sell or otherwise dispose of any such land which may not be necessary for such purposes; and they may construct on any such land or may take on lease any office, shed, stable, carriage-house or other building for the purposes of the undertaking.

9. The tramway shall be commenced on or before the _____ and shall be completed and opened for public traffic on or before the _____.

10. The tramway shall be constructed on a gauge of two feet six inches and no carriage used on the tramway shall project outwards beyond the inside edge of the rail more than two feet and six inches on each side.

11. The rails of the tramway shall be grooved rails and such as the Collector may approve, and shall be laid flush with the road.

12. Subject to the approval of the Collector, the Promoters may from time to time hereafter make all such crossings, passing-places, junctions and other works, in addition to those particularly specified in and authorized by this Order, as may from time to time be necessary or convenient to the efficient working of the tramway or for providing access to any stable, carriage-house or work of the Promoters.

Motive Power.

13. The carriages used on the tramway shall be moved by animal power only. No steam power or other mechanical power shall be used for this purpose, except under the authority of, and subject to such conditions as shall be prescribed in a further Order obtained under Section 8 of the Indian Tramways Act, 1886.

The maximum speed shall not exceed twelve miles an hour, or such other speed as may from time to time be authorized by the Governor in Council; and no vehicle shall pass through any movable facing point at a speed exceeding four miles an hour.

Maintenance of Tramway.

14. The Promoters shall at all times maintain and keep in good condition and repair, to the satisfaction of the Government Engineer aforesaid and so as not to be a danger or annoyance to the ordinary traffic, the rails and substructure of the tramway.

15. The Promoters shall maintain and keep in repair, to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council and so as not to interfere with the efficient drainage of the road, the portion of the provincial road extending from the drain or gutter or the edge of the embankment, as the case may be, on the north side of the said road to a distance of eighteen inches beyond the further rail. This portion of the road shall be metalled by and at the cost of the Promoters, who shall, also, at their own cost alter the position or level of the tramway and of this portion of the road to suit future alterations in the road, and forthwith repair, make good, and re-instate to the satisfaction of the Government Engineer aforesaid, any other portion of the road which shall at any time be in any way damaged by reason of any fault of the Promoters or of any accident to or upon the tramway. The gutter or drain on the north side of the road, as the same at present exists or shall hereafter be constructed at the cost of Government, shall likewise be maintained in efficient order by and at the cost of the Promoters.

16. Any road-metal or material excavated by the Promoters from the provincial road in the construction or maintenance of the tramway, may be applied by them in or towards re-instating the said road or in or towards completing any work thereon required by this Order.

17. The Promoters shall adopt and apply such improvements in the tramway and in the carriages used thereon and in the fittings, appliances and apparatus of such carriages as the Governor in Council may from time to time consider necessary or desirable for the safety or convenience of the public.

Traffic upon the Tramway.

18. The tramway may be used for the purpose of conveying passengers, passengers' luggage, animals, goods, materials and parcels.

19. The Promoters shall not be bound to carry, unless they think fit, any animals, goods or minerals or any parcel weighing more than four standard Indian Railway maunds or measuring more than six feet by four feet by two feet; but they shall be bound to carry passengers and passengers' luggage and parcels within the weight and dimensions above specified.

20. In case the Promoters carry animals, goods, minerals or parcels other than passengers' luggage, they may, and if required by the Governor in Council, shall carry the same in separate carriages or separate parts of carriages set apart for that purpose.

21. Every driver of a carriage on the tramway shall be provided, whilst on duty, with a special bell, whistle or other apparatus to be sounded as a warning when necessary.

22. Every carriage used on the tramway shall be constructed of a pattern approved by the Governor in Council and so as to provide for the safety of passengers and for their safe entrance into, exit from, and accommodation in, such carriage and for their protection from the wheels.

23. Each carriage or vehicle used on the tramway shall be fitted with an efficient brake which can be conveniently worked from either end of the same.

24. The Collector or the Government Engineer aforesaid may, whenever he thinks fit, prohibit the use on the tramway of any carriage which, in his opinion, is not safe for use thereon. Every such prohibition shall hold good until the same is either confirmed, set aside or modified by the Governor in Council, and the Promoters shall be bound by any order passed by the Governor in Council respecting any such carriage.

Levy of Tolls.

25. The tolls authorized to be levied shall be paid to such persons and at such places upon or near to the tramway and in such manner and under such regulations as the Promoters may, by notice annexed to the list of tolls exhibited under sub-section (2) of Section 15 of the Indian Tramways Act, 1886, with the previous sanction of the Governor in Council, appoint.

Miscellaneous.

26. The Promoters shall not transfer the undertaking or any part thereof by sale, mortgage, lease, exchange or otherwise, except with the previous sanction of, and on such conditions as may be approved by, the Governor in Council.

27. The Promoters shall afford the Municipality of Násik all reasonable facilities for the collection of octroi and other municipal taxes, if any, leviable on goods and passengers carried by the tramway.

28. The undertaking and all works, stock and appliances appertaining thereto shall at all times be open to the inspection and examination of the Collector and of the Government Engineer aforesaid, and the Collector may at any time refer any matter relating to the undertaking for opinion to the Consulting Engineer for Railways to the Government of Bombay.

29. In the event of any work required by the Indian Tramways Act, 1886, or by this Order to be done by the Promoters not being done by them, the Governor in Council may cause a notice to be served on the Promoters requiring them within a reasonable period to be prescribed in the said notice to execute the said work; and if within the period so prescribed such requisition is not complied with, the Governor in Council may cause such work to be done and the cost thereof shall be recoverable from the Promoters under Section 36 of the said Act.

30. If the Promoters fail to observe any condition or direction contained in or made under this Order, they shall for each such offence be liable to a penalty which may extend to two hundred rupees and, in the case of a continuing offence, to a further penalty which may extend to fifty rupees for each day after the first during which the offence continues.

Every penalty recovered under this clause shall be applied as the Governor in Council from time to time directs."
