Government Notifications, Appointments, &c.

NOTIFICATIONS.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 22nd May 1888.

No. 1709.—The following draft rules for Aden under Section 31 of the Bombay Boiler Inspection Act, 1887, are published for general information. Persons who have any objections to urge to the draft rules are required to forward their objections in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government, General Department, before the noon of 30th June 1888:—

Preliminary.

1. In these rules:

Definitions. (a) "the Act" means the Bombay Boiler Inspection Act, 1887;

(b) "section" means a section of the said Act;

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(c) the terms defined in section 3 shall be deemed to have, respectively, the same meaning as is given to them by the Act;

(d) words in the singular include the plural and *vice versa*.

Inspection.

2. The Boiler Inspection Office will be in the Aden Residency Office, and the Inspector shall attend thereat, whenever necessary, during usual office hours.

3. The Inspector shall act under the orders of the Political Resident and make all reports to that officer, through the First Assistant Political Resident.

4. The Inspector shall keep a diary of the work which he performs from time to time.

Inspector's diary.

In it he shall enter :

- (a) each place visited;
- (b) every work performed by him under the Act;
- (c) the fee recovered on account of each such work;
- (d) such additional particulars as he from time to time thinks necessary.

The Inspector shall submit a copy of the diary so kept by him every fortnight to the First Assistant Political Resident, for the information of the Political Resident and for record.

5. The Inspector shall keep an Index, Register and Dimension Sheets, in such order as the First Assistant Political

Other records to be kept by Inspector.

Resident, with the sanction of the Political Resident, shall authorize, of all boilers in Aden liable to inspection under the Act, and such other statements and records as the First Assistant Political Resident, under the orders of the Political Resident, shall from time to time direct.

6. The Inspector shall attend every meeting of a Commission appointed under section 5 and shall make such statements and submit such plans to the Commission as he thinks necessary or as shall be called for by the Commission.

7. The Inspector shall be provided with the testing pump, indicator and gauges necessary for testing boilers.

Testing apparatus to be provided for Inspector.

8. (1) The Inspector's examination of a boiler shall be both external and internal.

Provisions as to inspection of boilers.

- (2) If the owner or person in charge of a boiler examined fails to comply, in any material part, with :

- (a) the provisions of sub-section (2) of section 8; or

- (b) any requirement of the Inspector under sub-section (1) or (2) of the said section;

the Inspector shall defer his inspection and report the case to the First Assistant Political Resident for the orders of the Political Resident.

Inspection Fees.

9. Fees shall be levied under section 7 for the inspection of boilers according to the following scale, viz. :

Scale of fees under section 7.

For the inspection of each boiler attached to a prime-mover not exceeding 10 H. P. nominal	Rs. 15
Do. do. exceeding 10, but not exceeding 20	20
Do. do. 20, 30	30
Do. do. 30, 50	50
Do. do. 50, do.	50

The fees so levied shall be appropriated by the Inspector and shall constitute the emoluments of his office.

Commissions.

10. Commissions appointed by Government under section 5 will consist of one member. Each appointment and

Commissions to consist of three members.

the term for which it is to endure will be notified in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

11. The Commission shall assemble, at the request of the First Assistant Political Resident, at the Boiler Inspection Office, whenever necessary; and a clerk of the First Assistant Political Resident's office will act as clerk to the Commission.

12. The Commissioner shall be entitled to receive a fee of twenty rupees for each meeting at which any duty prescribed by the Act is performed by him.

Examiners.

13. The number of persons to be appointed to the Board of Examiners will be determined from time to time by Government. Their appointments and the terms for which they are respectively appointed, will be notified in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

14. The Board shall assemble, at the request of the First Assistant Political Resident, whenever necessary, at such time and place as the First Assistant Political Resident, acting under the orders of the Political Resident, may from time to time deem convenient for the examination of candidates.

15. Each Examiner shall be entitled to receive a fee of twenty rupees for each meeting of the Board, at which any duty prescribed by the Act is performed and which he attends from the beginning to the end thereof.

Examinations.

16. Examinations for third class certificate shall be held periodically on such dates as the First Assistant Political Resident, acting under the orders of the Political Resident, shall from time to time fix in this behalf and make publicly known.

17. Examinations at Aden will be for third class certificates only.

18. Candidates at examinations for third class certificates will pay a fee of Rs. 10.

Unsuccessful candidates will not be entitled to a return of any portion of the fee paid by them, but the fee paid by any applicant who is not admitted to examination will be returned to him in full.

19. Every applicant for examination must lodge a written application at the Boiler Inspection Office, together with :

- (a) testimonials of good character, sobriety and experience; and

(b) proof that he has completed twenty-one years of age; and

(c) the amount of the examination fee.

20. No applicant will be admitted to examination, whose testimonials

Applicant's good character, &c., must be satisfactorily established.

of good character, sobriety and experience, are not, in the opinion of the

Board, trustworthy and satisfactory, or who fails to establish, to the satisfaction of the Board, that on the date of the examination his age is in excess of twenty-one years.

21. Every examination shall be of such a

nature as to test the practical knowledge of the candidates and to ascertain their competency to manage boilers and

prime-movers.

22. A candidate for a third class certificate

Requisite previous training of candidates.

will not be admitted to examination, unless he proves to the satisfaction

of the Board that previously to his application he has been three years employed in the management of engines and boilers, or produces a certificate from the Principal of the College of Science at Poona, stating that he has completed a three years' course in the workshops of that college and during that period has been constantly instructed in the management of engines.

23. The examination will be conducted *visà*

voce and will be held, if possible, in a foundry,

where the candidate's knowledge can be practically tested in the use of the steam vacuum and water gauges.

24. In order to be entitled to a third class

certificate, a candidate must :

(a) satisfy the Board that he fully understands the working and use of safety-valves;

(b) be able to explain to some extent the actual working of engines and the separate uses of feed-pumps, slide-valves, pistons, &c.

Holders of certificates of the third class will be deemed to be capable, as Third Class Engineers or Engine-drivers, of having charge of a boiler attached to a prime-mover not exceeding 20 horse-power, nominal.

I am directed to forward the accompanying copy of a letter from the Government of the North-Western Provinces and Oudh, bringing to notice certain cases in which beer issued to troops was found to contain arsenic in solution, owing to the casks used by the brewers having been previously used for the storage of some preparations of arsenic. I am to request that, in accordance with the suggestion contained in the last paragraph of the letter, the attention of brewers, distillers and all traders using casks for the storage of articles intended for human consumption, carrying on business in the Bombay Presidency may, with the permission of His Excellency the Governor in Council, be drawn to the facts which have been disclosed, with a view to the exercise by them of the necessary precautions.

I am directed to state the following circumstances for the information of His Excellency the Governor General in Council.

2. In June last seventy men of the Manchester Regiment stationed at Agra were seized with violent illness after drinking beer issued to them from the Canteen. Shortly afterwards some men belonging to the Battery of Artillery in the fort at Agra were similarly attacked. A third case of soldiers becoming ill after drinking beer issued to them in their canteen was subsequently reported from Fatehgarh. On chemical analysis the beer from the suspected cask was found to contain arsenic in solution, and scrapings from the interior of the casks themselves yielded the tests for arsenic easily. The beer consumed formed part of a consignment from the local agency maintained by a firm of brewers in these Provinces.

3. The special Police enquiry which was made in the case led to the conclusion that some of the casks used by the brewers had been previously used for the storage of some preparations of arsenic. This conclusion has been proved to be correct on a further enquiry instituted by the firm alluded to, the result of which they have been so good as to place at the disposal of this Government. It appears that one of the casks, the beer stored in which was found to contain arsenic, was purchased from Messrs. Sporenberg & Co. of Calcutta, and that the cask when imported by that firm had contained a hide specific, of which one of the ingredients was arsenic. This fact, however, was unknown either to the brewing firm or to their agents in Calcutta for the purchase of casks. It is stated in the report referred to, that there is a standing order in Calcutta under which merchants importing poisonous preparations in casks are required to burn the empty casks, and the matter has been brought to the notice of the Government of Bengal.

4. I am to add that the attention of the Brewing Companies in these Provinces has been drawn to the facts which have been disclosed in this enquiry, with a view to the exercise of such precautions by them as the facts stated in this letter may suggest; and to suggest that, with the permission of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, brewers carrying on business in the territories under other Governments may be similarly cautioned."

No. 1837.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 24th instant in the Port of Aden and at Perim as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Saigon shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter R of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If com-

munication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.

- IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale :—

After eight days of voyage	...	...	six days of quarantine.
Do. nine do.	...	...	five do.
Do. ten do.	...	...	four do.
Do. eleven do.	...	...	three do.
Do. twelve do.	...	...	two do.
Do. thirteen do.	and upwards	...	twenty-four hours of quarantine.

- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

- VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

- IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden and Perim which may have communicated with vessels coming from Saigon shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden and Perim from that Port.

- X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.

No. 3331.—In accordance with the provisions of Section 18, Sub-section (1) of the Indian Explosives Act, 1884, and the directions contained in the Notification of the Government of India in the Home Department No. 1964, dated 2nd September 1887, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby the follow-

ing draft of rules, supplementary to those made

by the Governor General in Council in Notification* No. 1417, dated 24th June 1887, for regulating the transport of

explosives from the port of Bombay to the island in the Thana river on which Messrs. Walsh Lovett, Mitchell and Company have been permitted by Government to store explosives for the purposes of their contract in connection with the Tansa Water Works.

2. The draft rules will be taken into consideration on the expiry of one month from the date of the publication of this Notification:—

Draft Rules.

1. Explosives removed from the port of Bombay to the said island in the Táná river shall be transported to the place of final storage in the barges or lighters into which such explosives are transhipped from the importing vessel at Bombay.

2. The hatches of such barges or lighters shall be locked during transit and the key shall remain in custody of the police or other Government official in charge. Every hatch shall be covered with tarpaulins.

3. Every such barge or lighter shall have the word "Explosives" in white letters a foot long painted on a black ground on each side above the water line, and a red flag shall be kept hoisted between sunrise and sunset during the time any explosive is on board.

4. Every such barge or lighter shall, while explosives are on board, carry a masthead light between sunset and sunrise, in addition to the side lights prescribed by the Admiralty Regulations.

5. No fire and, except such lights as are prescribed in the last preceding rule, no artificial light and no article which is liable to cause or communicate fire or explosion (such as charcoal, lucifer matches, articles for striking a light, petroleum to which the Petroleum Act or any Act repealing or amending the same applies, or any spirit or oil or substance that gives forth an inflammable vapour at a temperature below 100° Fahrenheit) shall be or be allowed to be brought, had, or used on or dangerously near to any such barge or lighter, while any explosive is on board, and no smoking shall be allowed in nor dangerously near to any such barge or lighter, while any explosive is on board.

6. No such barge or lighter shall, while any explosive is on board, be left without a sufficient crew under a competent tidal.

7. Every such barge or lighter shall, on arrival off the port of Thána, come to anchor half a mile below the Chendni Bandar and out of the fair way, until her papers have been examined by the Customs Collector.

8. No such barge or lighter shall proceed up the creek, without the written permission of the Customs Collector.

9. No such barge or lighter shall at any time anchor in the river or creek at any spot between the place of first anchorage prescribed by Rule 7 and a place one mile above the Kalva bridge, unless, on a grave emergency, it may be necessary for the safety of such barge or lighter or of any other vessel on cargo, to anchor at any such spot.

10. No such barge or lighter shall be under way between the places mentioned in Rule 9 at any time, except within an hour and a half before, and an hour and a half after, high tide.

11. No such barge or lighter shall proceed between the places mentioned in Rule 9 unless in tow of a vessel propelled by steam power.

12. If any person commits a breach of any of the foregoing rules, he shall be punished with a fine which may extend to Rs. 1,000.

Draft of proposed Rule.
