The Governor General in Council has determined to borrow three hundred lakhs of Rupees, being the amount required for the public service.

The following Notification is therefore published:—

FOUR PER CENT. LOAN.

His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor General in Council has resolved to borrow three hundred lakhs of Rupees for the public service in the following manner.

2. Promissory Notes will be issued for the said amount in Form A. annexed to this Notification, being the form of the notes of *The Four Per Cent. Loan of 1st May, 1865*, of which Loan the notes to be now issued will form a part. All the conditions which apply to notes of *The Four Per Cent. Loan of 1st May, 1865*, will apply to the notes to be now issued.

3. Tenders for the whole or any part of the said amount of Rs. 3,00,00,000, will be received by the Comptroller-General from this date to noon of Tuesday, the 3rd of July next. Tenders must be in sums of 500 Rupees or multiples of 500 Rupees.

4. Each tender must be addressed, in the form annexed to this Notification, to the Comptroller-General, Calcutta, and enclosed in a closed cover, superscribed ‘*Tender for the Four Per Cent. Loan.*’ If the tenderer is not resident in India, he must name an agent resident in India to whom a letter of allotment may be issued if any part of the loan is allotted to such tenderer.¹

- (a) Each tender must be accompanied by a receipt from the Head Office of the Bank of Bengal, or Madras, or Bombay, or one of their Branches, or from an officer in charge of some Public Treasury, or by a cheque drawn in favour of the Comptroller-General on a Bank in Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay, or in favour of the Accountant-General, Bombay or Madras, on a Bank in Bombay or Madras respectively in respect of tenders received by him, or by² Government promissory notes, standing in the name of or endorsed to the tenderer or the person making the deposit, for not less than one-hundredth, or, if the tender be for less than Five Lakhs of Rupees, then for not less than one-fiftieth, part of the tender.

¹ Tenders made in accordance with these instructions will also be received by the Accountants-General, Madras and Bombay, on account of the Comptroller-General, Calcutta, on the 2nd July, and up to 11-30 or 11 o'clock local time (corresponding with 12 o'clock in Calcutta) on the 3rd July; provided that—

- (a) they are delivered personally or by clerk or messenger at his office (where a receipt will be given for them);
- (b) they are made on printed Forms, to be obtained at his office or at the local Presidency Bank;
- (c) each tender is for not less than Rs. 10,000;
- (d) that the deposit is either a promissory note, or a cheque on a local Bank in Madras or Bombay, respectively;
- (e) that the amount of the tender is made payable locally (i. e., either in Madras or Bombay) or in Calcutta; and he will return deposits on non-accepted tenders, and will issue allotment-certificates so far as the tenders are payable in Madras or Bombay.

- (b) Deposits, not being promissory notes, will, in the case of accepted tenders, be credited proportionally in part payment of the allotment-certificates issued in respect of the tender, and will bear interest for the purpose of clause 14 below from the date of the opening of tenders. When a tender is not accepted in full, the deposits, not being promissory notes, will be credited as far as possible proportionately in even tens of rupees in part payment of the allotment-certificates issued in respect of it. If any allotment-certificate is not fully taken up, the deposit credited in respect of it will be forfeited.
- (c) Promissory notes deposited in respect of any accepted tender will be held until all the allotment-certificates issued in respect of the tender are paid up, and will, if the allotment-certificates are not fully taken up, be appropriated by the Government and cancelled.

5. The rate at which a tender is made must not contain a fraction of an anna: if a rate containing a fraction of an anna is inserted in any tender, such fraction will be struck out and the tender treated as if the rate did not contain such fraction of an anna.

6. The rate at which each tender is made must be specified in rupees or rupees and annas: a tender in which no rate is thus specified, but a subscription is offered in some other terms, as, for example, at the recorded minimum, or at some specified percentage in addition to the recorded minimum, or at the average of the accepted tenders, will be rejected as null and void.

7. The minimum rate at which tenders will be accepted will be recorded under the signature of the Comptroller-General, and, before the tenders are opened, placed upon the table in a sealed envelope, but will not be declared unless some tender is rejected only because it is below the recorded minimum.

8. Tenders will be opened publicly by the Comptroller-General at the Treasury Buildings, Calcutta, at noon (Calcutta time) on Tuesday, the 3rd July next, and those received under the terms of the foot-note under clause 4 will be similarly opened by the Accountant-General, Madras, at 11-30 (Madras time), and by the Accountant-General, Bombay, at 11 o'clock (Bombay time), on the same day; but the contents of the tenders will not be disclosed otherwise than as provided in clause 10.

9. Tenders at the recorded minimum rate, and at rates above the recorded minimum rate, will be accepted in the order of the rates tendered, beginning with the highest rate; the amount allotted at the lowest rate at which tenders are accepted will be divided amongst those who have tendered at this rate, in proportion, as nearly as may be found convenient, to the amounts of their tenders: provided that no allotment will be issued if the amount distributable on any tender is less than Rs. 350.

10. To each tenderer (or to his agent) whose tender is accepted in whole or in part, such number of allotment-certificates as may be necessary to make up the aggregate amount allotted to him will be issued by the Comptroller-General¹ as soon as possible after the 3rd July; and an alphabetical list of the names of those to whom such allotment-certificates are issued will be posted, for general information, at the Head Offices of the Banks of Bengal, Madras, and Bombay.

11. If the allotment made on any tender is less than Rs. 3,000, then the whole of the allotment-certificates (after credit of the deposit under clause 4 (b)) will be made payable upon the 14th August.

Otherwise the whole amount of each allotment will be divided into three instalments, as follows:

‘Note.—For the purpose of determining whether leave may be granted to such an Officer, and the amount of the leave allowances, Continuous Service and Active Service include any previous service which would be treated as such under these Rules.

‘Rules (g) and (i) above apply to Military Officers subject to Civil Rules.’

PAY AND ACTING ALLOWANCE CODE.

Pages 289–292.

SECTIONS 45 TO 47.

Substitute the following for these Sections:

45. In the case of progressive appointments, acting allowances are fixed as follows:

(a) An officer whose substantive pay is progressive, and who acts in an office of which the pay is fixed.

In this case the officer's acting allowances will be calculated as if his substantive pay were a fixed one, equal to the amount at which from time to time it stands.

(b) An officer whose substantive pay is fixed, and who acts in an office of which the pay is progressive.

In this case the officer's acting allowance will be calculated upon the pay to which he would from time to time have risen if he had held the officiating appointment substantively.

(c) An officer whose substantive pay is progressive, and who acts in an office of which the pay is progressive.

In this case the officer will draw—

(1) His substantive pay, with the increments thereof as they fall due.

(2) The acting allowance which he would have drawn if the substantive and officiating appointments were both on fixed pay equal to the minimum: provided that the maximum limit of salary shall be not the said minimum pay of the officiating appointment, but the pay to which the officer would have risen if his officiating tenure had been substantive.

*Example (a).—*An officer who is substantively in the Rs. 170 stage of an appointment of Rs. 150—10—200 is appointed to act in an office of which the pay is Rs. 200—8—240. His salary is thus fixed—

	Rs.
Pay	170
Acting allowance, $\frac{1}{2}$ of Rs. 200	40
Total	210

But this is limited the first year to Rs. 200.

Next year he gets pay Rs. 180 + acting allowance Rs. 40,—total Rs. 220. But this is limited for a year to Rs. 208.

*Example (b).—*A Covenanted Civil Servant, substantively in the Rs. 1,200 stage of an appointment of which the pay is Rs. 1,000—50—1,250, acts in an appointment of Rs. 1,500—50—1,750. His salary is—

Acting allowance, $\frac{2}{3}$ (Rs. 1,500—1,000)	333 $\frac{1}{3}$
Total	1,533 $\frac{1}{3}$

Limited the first year to Rs. 1,500.

In future years he gets Rs. 1,583 $\frac{1}{3}$, which is the limit of salary in this case.

NOTE.—In calculating the salary of an officer in an acting appointment, the whole of the acting tenure, whether continuous or not, is taken into account.

46. If an officer is appointed substantively to a progressive appointment in which he has already officiated, his pay is fixed as follows:

(1) If the salary which he drew when last officiating is equal to one of the stages of

the pay of the appointment, his pay shall be fixed at that stage, and he shall count in that stage the time during which he has been drawing the said salary.

(2) If the salary which he drew when last officiating is intermediate between two stages, his pay shall be fixed at that amount for half the period during which an increment is earned, and on the first day of the month thereafter succeeding he shall be eligible to the next higher stage of the progressive pay.

Example.—An officer is on 20th June substantively appointed to an appointment of which the pay is Rs. 200—10—250, and in which he is already officiating—

(a) If his salary at the time of his appointment and from 1st March last has been Rs. 220, he continues to draw Rs. 220, and on 1st March next rises to Rs. 230.

(b) If his salary at time of appointment is Rs. 225, he will draw Rs. 225 till 1st January, and then will get Rs. 230.

47. An officer transferred substantively to a progressive appointment from an appointment in which he is drawing pay in excess of the minimum pay of the new appointment will, if the transfer is made by an authority to which both appointments are subordinate, or if the transfer is declared by the Local Government or by a Department of the Government of India to have been made for special reasons and in the interests of the public service, draw the nearest stage, or, if two stages are equally near, then the next higher stage of pay in the new appointment, but will count time for increments as if he had commenced on the minimum pay.

47A. Except as provided in Sections 46 and 47, an officer appointed substantively to an office of which the pay is progressive will begin with the minimum pay.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 9th June 1888.

No. 1963.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 5th instant in the Port of Aden and at Perim as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including huggalows or other native craft, arriving from Singkel Islands off Sumatra shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter R of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.

IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale:—

After eight days of voyage	...	...	six days of quarantine.
Do. nine do.	...	...	five do.
Do. ten do.	...	...	four do.
Do. eleven do.	...	...	three do.
Do. twelve do.	...	...	two do.
Do. thirteen do.	and upwards	...	twenty-four hours of quarantine.

V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden and Perim which may have communicated with vessels coming from Singkel Islands off Sumatra shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden and Perim from that Port.

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 3028.—The Governor in Council has received with deep regret intimation that Sir Frank Henry Souter, Knight, C.S.I., C.I.E., Commissioner of Police, Bombay, died suddenly at Ootacamund on Tuesday the 5th instant. Sir Frank Souter joined the service of the Bombay Government in 1854 as Superintendent of Police in Dhárwár and continued to serve in the same Department until his death. He received the repeated thanks of Government for distinguished service in the arrest of the Chief of Nargoond in 1858, in the destruction of the gang of dacoits under Bhagoji Naik in the Násik District in 1859 when he fought with conspicuous gallantry, and on other occasions. He was appointed Commissioner of Police in Bombay in 1864, and contributed in a large measure by his own personal gallantry and tact to the restoration of tranquillity when the city was disturbed by serious riots in 1874. On several occasions his administrative services have been acknowledged by Government in reviewing the annual reports. His wide experience in detective work led to his selection for special duty at Baroda in the investigation of the charges brought against the late Gaekwar, and was applied with unvarying success to the discovery of serious crime in the city of Bombay. His advice was frequently sought by Government in connection with police inquiries outside that city, while he also lent his services to Government on Boards of Examination, and on several Committees of Inquiry. In Municipal and other matters affecting the interests of Bombay he for many years took a leading part, and his loss will be felt as a public calamity not only by Government, but also by the inhabitants of the city of Bombay.

2. His perfect knowledge of the vernaculars, his kindliness of heart, and his personal courage inspired his subordinates with confidence, and his name will long be held in affectionate remembrance by those who served under him. His services were recognised by Her Majesty the Queen-Empress on three occasions; and the Governor in Council deplores the lamentable event which has removed so distinguished a servant of Her Majesty from the enjoyment of the fruits of his labours and of the honourable retirement to which he looked forward.
