SIR,

Errors and omissions on the part of Shipping Agents and others in Bombay and Calcutta in the preparation of export manifests of the cargoes of British steamers bound to Jedda having lately become very frequent, causing disputes and losses, I venture to suggest in the interests of British trade which form the bulk of imports at this port, that the attention of shipping companies should be directed to the necessity of care being exercised in the preparation of these documents.

According to the Turkish Customs regulations in force, duty is claimed from the ship or agent here on all goods found deficient according to manifest, the same having been apparently short-shipped at the other side. Again, double duty is exacted on all goods not included in the manifest, although duly provided in the bills of lading signed in India.

A case in point has just occurred here in which the export manifest of a British steamer arrived from Calcutta was found to contain, twice over, an item of 4,417 bags of rice, each item being differently expressed in the respective parts of the manifest, while the consignee of an important consignment of silks, &c., is called upon to pay double duty because the goods were omitted altogether from the manifest, although bills of lading were duly signed and delivered in Calcutta to the shipper.

No. 1963.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 5th instant in the Port of Aden and at Perim as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Singkel Islands off Sumatra shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter R of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.
- IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale:—

After eight days of voyage	...	...	six days of quarantine.
Do. nine do.	...	...	five do.
Do. ten do.	...	...	four do.
Do. eleven do.	...	...	three do.
Do. twelve do.	...	...	two do.
Do. thirteen do.	and upwards	...	twenty-four hours of quarantine.

- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.
- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

- VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden and Perim which may have communicated with vessels coming from Singkel Islands off Sumatra shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden and Perim from that Port.
- X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.

No. 3028.—The Governor in Council has received with deep regret intimation that Sir Frank Henry Souter, Knight, C.S.I., C.I.E., Commissioner of Police, Bombay, died suddenly at Ootacamund on Tuesday the 5th instant. Sir Frank Souter joined the service of the Bombay Government in 1854 as Superintendent of Police in Dhārwar and continued to serve in the same Department until his death. He received the repeated thanks of Government for distinguished service in the arrest of the Chief of Nargoond in 1858, in the destruction of the gang of dacoits under Bhagoji Naik in the Násik District in 1859 when he fought with conspicuous gallantry, and on other occasions. He was appointed Commissioner of Police in Bombay in 1864, and contributed in a large measure by his own personal gallantry and tact to the restoration of tranquillity when the city was disturbed by serious riots in 1874. On several occasions his administrative services have been acknowledged by Government in reviewing the annual reports. His wide experience in detective work led to his selection for special duty at Baroda in the investigation of the charges brought against the late Gaekwar, and was applied with unvarying success to the discovery of serious crime in the city of Bombay. His advice was frequently sought by Government in connection with police inquiries outside that city, while he also lent his services to Government on Boards of Examination, and on several Committees of Inquiry. In Municipal and other matters affecting the interests of Bombay he for many years took a leading part, and his loss will be felt as a public calamity not only by Government, but also by the inhabitants of the city of Bombay.

2. His perfect knowledge of the vernaculars, his kindliness of heart, and his personal courage inspired his subordinates with confidence, and his name will long be held in affectionate remembrance by those who served under him. His services were recognised by Her Majesty the Queen-Empress on three occasions; and the Governor in Council deploras the lamentable event which has removed so distinguished a servant of Her Majesty from the enjoyment of the fruits of his labours and of the honourable retirement to which he looked forward.

Statement showing particulars pursuant to Rule V of the Rules published by the Government of India for the raising of Loans by Local Authorities.

I. The loan is required for the construction of works as per Statement A hereto annexed. The estimate of the cost of the works is Rs. 11,82,000 (Markets Rs. 5,00,000 and Drainage, Water and other Miscellaneous works Rs. 6,82,000).

II. The amount which it is proposed to borrow is Rs. 11,82,000.

III. It is proposed to borrow the said sum on the security of the general revenue of the Bombay Municipality aggregating nearly on the average of the three years ending 1886-87 (the figures for 1887-88 can only be given a month or two hence), over 45½ lakhs, as per supplemental Statement A hereto annexed, the last year's income, like that for 1886-87, being over 49 lakhs.

IV. The laws under which funds, duties, taxes, rates, cesses, &c., are levied, received or held, are Act IV of 1857 and Bombay Acts VI of 1863, III of 1872, IV of 1878, V of 1878, VI of 1882, and II of 1886.

V. The loan is required for a period not exceeding forty years.

It is proposed to raise the loan in three instalments, viz. :—

No. 3038.—The Governor in Council is pleased, under the provisions of 24 and 25 Victoria, Chapter 104, Section 15, to sanction the following Order made by the Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges of Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature, Bombay, and to publish it for general information :—

“ Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature, Appellate Side, Bombay, 3rd February 1888.

No. 177.—The Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges are of opinion that no advantage commensurate with the labor involved would be secured by requiring the Presidency Magistrates to submit returns, as Provincial Magistrates do, of all cases decided by them. In 1886 the number of cases so decided was 39,132; the labor of preparing in the Magistrates' offices returns of so many cases, and of examining them in the High Court would be immense. It must be remembered that the Presidency Magistrates work under very different conditions from those imposed on the majority of Provincial Magistrates. In Bombay, intelligent public criticism of the daily proceedings in the several Courts provides a wholesome check on any abuse or capricious exercise of authority, while aggrieved persons can readily apply for redress to the High Court. The strict supervision which the High Court exercises over the Courts of Provincial Magistrates is not therefore required in the case of the Presidency Magistrates.

2. In order, however, to prevent, as far as possible, improper adjournments, and such great delay in the disposal of certain classes of cases as the Chief Presidency Magistrate has drawn attention to, it is desirable to require the Chief Presidency Magistrate to submit for his own Court and the Courts of the other Presidency Magistrates a Quarterly Return of pending cases (with explanations) in the appended form, which is based on Form D at page 49 of the Criminal Circulars. Their Lordships think that the regular examination of this Return in the High Court will tend materially to expedite the disposal of business in the several Courts. The form should therefore be sent to Government under 24 and 25 Victoria, Chapter 104, Section 15, for confirmation by His Excellency the Governor in Council and publication in the *Government Gazette*.

up of the same, so far as is practicable, with disinfecting powder and cloths and bandages during removal along public roads; and such removal shall, unless there be any sufficient reason to the contrary, be at night. These precautions shall be enforced in all cases where horses have to be moved for examination or disposal under the Act.

3. The owner or person in charge of a horse, which he believes, or has reason to believe, to be diseased, shall report the case within twenty-four hours to the Inspector or to a Police officer (who shall at once inform the Inspector) and may remove the animal to any isolated building within fifty yards of the stable or to a remote part of the building, enclosure or other place, where the animal has been standing; and shall keep it, as much as is possible, within these limits, away from other horses. He shall detain in the stable, until the granting of a license for removal, any horse which has been in contact with or near the diseased animal.

Except as provided in these rules, no person shall intentionally or negligently cause or permit any diseased horse to stray or to be worked, led, or driven, in a public thoroughfare, road, street or place.

4. Except as provided in section 11, no horse shall be removed from an infected building, enclosure, or other place, without license from an Inspector; and such license shall not be granted until the Inspector considers there is no danger of such horse becoming diseased and, on careful examination, has found it free from any indication of Glanders or Farcy and has seen that it (and such gear as it is wearing) has been washed over with a strong solution of phenyl or chloride of zinc or some other recognized disinfectant.

If considered necessary by the Veterinary Surgeon, license may be granted for use only on condition that the animal for the period of one week shall not be allowed to mix with other horses and shall be picketed apart.

5. The owner or person in charge of any building, enclosure, or other premises which have been occupied by any diseased horse shall within seven days carry out such disinfection of such building, enclosure, or other premises and destruction of dung, litter, and waste food gear, and other articles in or near to the premises, as may be prescribed by the Veterinary Surgeon.

In all cases dung, surplus food, and litter from the infected stable, also clothing and other gear which has been used by or been in contact with the diseased horse, shall be consumed or disinfected by fire; temporary building materials such as thatch of grass or leaves, bamboo walls and matting shall be burned, if the position admits of this being done with safety, and (after complete removal of all dung, temporary fittings and other articles for destruction by fire) the wood-work of the stable shall be thoroughly washed with boiling water, the walls, wood-work and ceiling shall be scraped and lime-washed with freshly mixed quicklime and water, to which shall be added crude carbolic acid in the proportion of half a pint to a bucketful of lime-wash, and the flooring shall be removed to a depth of two feet and not renewed for the space of two weeks, the

removed earth being burnt and replaced by fresh earth. The whole of the interior shall then be fumigated with burning sulphur, chlorine, carbolic vapour, or some other gaseous disinfectant.

6. On a certificate from the Veterinary Surgeon that a horse is diseased, it shall be destroyed humanely in the presence of the Inspector and the carcass disposed of by burning under supervision of the Police. Excepting with the sanction of the Police and for the purpose of burning it, no person shall remove the carcass or any portion of it.

7. In the event of disinfection of premises and destruction of gear, fittings, dung and other articles condemned by the Inspector not being carried out by the owner within the period of seven days, they shall be carried out by the Inspector under Police supervision and the expenses shall be recovered from the owner of the premises in the manner prescribed by section 9.

8. The Commissioner of Police may award to the Inspector, at whose instance any conviction is obtained under the Act, a sum not exceeding half the amount of any fine imposed.

In continuation of my Circular No. 8 (G.S.), dated 15th March 1888, I have the honour to append for your information a copy of a letter No. 274-D, dated 5th June 1888, from the Comptroller and Auditor General, Calcutta, explaining how the special non-transferable Government Promissory Notes held by Native Ruling Chiefs can be distinguished from the ordinary Government Promissory Notes.

Copy of a letter No. 274-D, dated 5th June 1888, from the Comptroller and Auditor General, Calcutta, to the Accountant General, Punjab.

I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter No. 6434-T.M., of the 12th ultimo, enquiring (i) whether the form of special notes authorised for Native Ruling Chiefs is readily distinguishable from ordinary forms and (ii) whether the word "non-transferable" is enfaced upon them.

2. In reply I have to say that the form of special note is not on the face of it readily distinguishable from that of the ordinary note as the shape, engine-turned pattern, signature, &c.

are the same in both, nor is the word "non-transferable" enfaced on it; but the terms upon which it issues are different from the ordinary form, as you will observe from the following which I note for your information:—

(i) After acknowledging receipt in the prescribed words of the amount of the loan the note promises to pay interest in the usual way to the Chief concerned, his *heirs and successors*.

(ii) Further engages to consider the interest as an annuity to the above for ever with the proviso that such annuity shall cease upon repayment of the said principal sum, also engages that such repayment shall not be made before the expiry of a notice of not less than three months to be given in the *Gazette of India*.

(iii) Also agrees on surrender of the special form of note to issue Promissory Notes in the usual form at any time to any one to whom the above may transfer the special note or any part of it.

As practical differences the most noticeable are:—

The Special Note is to A. B., his *heirs and successors*, instead of the ordinary form "*Executor or Administrators*."

The last paragraph of the Special Note contains the agreement to exchange for an ordinary note noticed above (No. iii).
