Resolution in the Department of Finance and Commerce No. 2566,‡ dated the 20th August 1883.

RESOLUTION.—By Resolution No. 2566, dated 20th August 1885, certain modifications were introduced into the conditions under which Stock notes, bearing interest at four per cent. per annum, were issued; and in paragraph 2 of that Resolution it was said:

It cannot be denied that sale of the notes, and their popularity as an investment with the classes by whom it was hoped that they would be bought, have been much less than was anticipated. The Government of India, however, are of opinion that these results may be attributed in some measure to causes in existence at the time of the issue of the notes, the operation of which has in part ceased, and of which the effect will not be indefinitely prolonged. The continuance of the sale of notes, if for the present not productive of much advantage, is not calculated to cause detriment or injury to the public or to the financial interests of Government. It may be still hoped that, subject to certain modifications, this mode of investment will become more popular, and that the advantages which unquestionably attach to the system, when successfully worked, may be in course of time obtained. The Governor General in Council has therefore decided to continue for the present the sale of the notes, subject to certain changes in the rules which, it is hoped, will render the notes more generally acceptable.

2. Nearly three years have elapsed since these modifications were introduced; but the amount of the annual sales is still very small, and the public continue to look upon the system with disfavour. It may be said that the public have never adopted these securities at all as a regular form of investment, and complaints have occasionally reached the Government, which on enquiry are shown to be well founded, of hardship resulting from the depreciation of the notes and from the difficulty of realizing them at any price. The Govern-

ment, having now re-examined the subject, has, with regret, been forced to the conclusion that the experiment ought now to be abandoned.

3. It has accordingly been decided to discontinue the further sale of Stock notes and to withdraw as far as possible those in circulation, amounting approximately to Rs. 16,20,000, by substituting for them Government Promissory notes of the 4 per cent. Loan of 1842-43.

4. The Comptroller-General is, therefore, authorised to receive applications, at any Government treasury in India, for the conversion into Government Promissory notes of the 4 per cent. Loan of 1842-43 of any amounts of Stock notes tendered in even hundreds of Rupees, on the following terms:

- (a) the Promissory notes are to be issued at a premium of 8 annas per cent.;
- (b) tenderers will, on delivering the Stock notes, be paid interest on them for the half-year ending July 31st, 1888 (*i.e.*, Rs. 2 per cent.); but from the amount of this interest a sum of 8 annas per cent. on the value of the Stock notes will be deducted on account of the premium payable by the holders in accordance with the condition (a);
- (c) the interest on the Promissory notes issued in exchange will run from the 1st August 1888.

5. In the case of notes of less value than Rs. 100 the Comptroller-General is authorised further to purchase outstanding notes at the rate of Rs. 100 for every Rs. 100 Stock notes tendered for sale at any treasury, and to pay to the proprietors tendering them the interest due on the notes up to date of purchase.

6. Notes purchased by the Comptroller and Auditor General under the terms laid down in the preceding paragraph will, when a sufficient quantity has been accumulated, be converted into 4 per cent. Promissory notes, on the terms defined in paragraph 4. These Promissory notes will be held by the Comptroller-General on account of the Treasury, and will be gradually absorbed in the operations of purchase of securities, which the Comptroller-General in his official capacity has to carry out. They will not be disposed of by the Comptroller-General except in this way and except as provided in the next paragraph, until six months at least have expired from the issue of this Notification.

7. The Head Commissioner of Paper Currency is hereby directed, under section 23 (2) of the Indian Paper Currency Act, XX of 1882, to purchase five lakhs of the said securities, if this amount is available. This purchase will be made at par.

8. The Governor General in Council reserves the right to withdraw the terms offered in this Resolution to Stock-note holders, whenever it may be deemed proper to do so.

9. The Comptroller-General is directed to make any subsidiary arrangements and to issue any subsidiary instructions he considers necessary for carrying out these orders.

ORDERED, that a copy of the above Resolution be forwarded to the Comptroller and Auditor General for information and guidance.

Ordered also, that the Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

Merchant Shipping (Colonial) Act, 1869.

The annexed Order in Council dated the 15th day of September, 1887, revokes all Orders previously issued relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency, and consolidates all the regulations now in force relating to their use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension.

As the Colonial Certificates of Competency referred to in the said Order in Council are to have the same force as the similar Certificates granted by the Board of Trade in the United Kingdom, such a Colonial Certificate must be accepted as occupying in every respect the place of one of the latter, and as entitling its *bona fide* holder to act in the capacity stated in it, or any inferior (but not a superior) capacity in any British ship, all over the world without the possession of a Board of Trade Certificate.

Colonial Certificates will have to be used, produced, and delivered at the times and on the occasions at and on which Imperial Certificates of Competency would have to be used, produced, and delivered.

When it appears from a Certificate (Imperial or Colonial) officially produced to the Officer that its owner possesses other Certificates, their production also should be required, and if they are not produced their owner's explanation in writing should be demanded and forwarded to the Registrar-General of Seamen with the least possible delay.

Officers in British Possessions abroad are empowered by Regulation 9 attached to the Order in Council to demand, and if necessary detain, any such Colonial Certificate which they have reason to believe has been improperly issued, or has been forged, altered, cancelled, suspended, or to which the person using it is not justly entitled.

Whenever this power is exercised a report of the facts and circumstances must be sent by the Officer, with the least possible delay, to either the Board of Trade or the Government of the Possession in which the Certificate was originally granted or may purport to have been granted, accordingly as communication may be easier and quicker.

As the withdrawal of a Certificate would in some cases entail inconvenience, not only upon its possessor but also upon the owners of the ship and cargo, it is scarcely necessary to caution Officers that the exercise of this power should only be resorted to when the evidence is perfectly clear; and if the ship is bound to the United Kingdom, and the report above mentioned has been sent to the Possession in which the Certificate was originally granted, the Board of Trade should nevertheless be informed of the facts.

Every case of death of a Colonial Certificate-holder which may come to the Officer's knowledge should be reported without delay to the Government of the Possession in which the Certificate was granted.

The attention of Officers and Functionaries in British Possessions abroad engaged in the conduct of Official Inquiries in wreck and discipline cases is directed to the fact that the Certificates to which the Order in Council applies will be liable to cancellation and suspension in precisely the same way as Certificates granted by the Board of Trade under the Merchant Shipping Acts, and by the same Boards, Courts, and Tribunals. The provisions of 'The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854,' and 'The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862,' as to Courts of Inquiry will therefore be applicable to the Colonial Certificates in question, with the exception of the provisions specified in the Order in Council.

Attention is further directed to the provision now for the first time inserted in Regulation 6 attached to the Order in Council, under which Colonial Authorities are empowered to issue a lower grade of Certificate in lieu of a Certificate cancelled or suspended by an official Court of Inquiry, if the Court of Inquiry make a recommendation to that effect.

It will be noticed that Regulation 8 attached to the Order in Council provides that the cancellation or suspension of a Certificate shall involve cancellation or suspension of all the other Certificates (if any) possessed by its owner. With the view of carrying this Regulation strictly into effect, it will be desirable that the Court should endeavour to ascertain and should specify in their decision the particulars of all the Certificates possessed by any person whose conduct is the subject of an investigation by them.

In cases of cancellation or suspension of such Colonial Certificates, copies of the report of the Court and of the evidence, together with the respective Certificates, should be sent to the Governments of the British Possessions by whom the several Certificates possessed by the offender were originally granted. A full report upon the case and the evidence should, at the same time, be sent to the Board of Trade, as required by the Act, and the sentence, giving the number of each Certificate dealt with, and the Possession in which it was granted, should be mentioned in it.

The holders of Colonial Certificates which are cancelled or suspended should be referred to the Government of the Possession in which the Certificate was originally granted, instead of to this Board, if they desire to appeal from the sentence or to apply for a mitigation of it.

These instructions must be understood as having reference only to the Certificates referred to in the said Order in Council.

Whereas by the 'Merchant Shipping (Colonial) Act, 1869,' it is (amongst other things) enacted,

that where the Legislature of any British Possession provides for the examination of, and grant of Certificates of Competency to, persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and the Board of Trade reports to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the Certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualification and competency as those granted under the said Acts, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons and in the like manner, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council:—

1. To declare that the said Certificates shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts;
2. To declare that all or any of the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates of Competency granted under those Acts shall apply to the Certificates referred to in the said Order;
3. To impose such conditions and to make such regulations with respect to the said Certificates, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof, as to Her Majesty may seem fit, and to impose penalties not exceeding fifty pounds for the breach of such conditions and regulations.

And that upon the publication in the *London Gazette* of any such Order in Council as last aforesaid, the provisions therein contained shall, from a date to be mentioned for the purpose in such Order, take effect as if they had been contained in the Act, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to revoke any Order made as aforesaid:

And whereas by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1876, it is provided that Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, revoke, alter, or add to any Order in Council made by Her under the Merchant Shipping Acts:

And whereas by various Orders in Council Her Majesty was pleased to declare that, subject to certain exceptions, conditions, and regulations therein contained or set out in the Schedules thereto, the Colonial Certificates granted as follows, viz.:

1. On or after the 19th day of August, 1871, by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in Canada, to persons intending to act as Masters, or Mates on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the 19th day of August 1871;
2. On and after the 12th day of May 1874, by the head of the Government of the Possession of Malta and its Dependencies, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the said 12th day of May 1874;
3. On and after the 1st day of April 1876, by the Steam Navigation Board of Victoria, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers of British sea-going Steam Ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the 12th day of February 1876;

4. On and after the 1st day of April 1876, by the Governor for the time being of the Possession of New Zealand, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the 12th day of February 1876;

5. On and after the 1st day of April 1876, by the Marine Board of the Possession of New South Wales, to persons intending to act as Masters, First Mates, Second Mates, First Class Engineers, or Second Class Engineers on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the 12th day of February 1876;

6. On and after the 1st day of April 1876, by the Marine Board of the Possession of South Australia, to persons intending to act as Masters, First Mates, Only Mates, Second Mates, First Class Engineers, or Second Class Engineers on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the 12th day of February 1876;

7. On and after the 1st day of April 1876, by the Governor of the Possession of Tasmania, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the 17th day of May 1876;

8. On and after the 27th day of June 1876, by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Possession of Bengal, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the said 27th day of June 1876;

9. On and after the 14th day of May 1877, by the Governor of the Possession of Newfoundland, to persons intending to act as Masters or Mates on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the said 14th day of May 1877;

10. On and after the 11th day of July 1877, by the Governor of the Possession of Bombay, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the said 11th day of July 1877;

11. On and after the 1st day of October 1877, by the Marine Board of the Possession of Queensland, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the 26th day of March 1878;

12. On and after the 1st day of January 1884, by the Governor of the Possession of Hong Kong, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the 31st day of December 1883;

13. On and after the 1st day of January 1887, by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in the Possession of Canada, to persons intending to act as First Class Engineers or Second Class Engineers of sea-going British ships, and referred to in an Order in Council dated the 10th day of November 1886,

should be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts, and subject to the conditions and regulations imposed and made by the Board of Trade, and set out in the Schedules to the said recited Orders in Council respectively:

And whereas by Orders in Council of the 29th day of June 1882, and the 10th day of November 1886, Her Majesty was pleased to rescind the said Conditions and Regulations (except in so far as the same related to Certificates of Competency granted to Masters, Mates, or Engineers by the Governor of Hong Kong), and to substitute therefor the Conditions and Regulations set out in the Schedule to the said last recited Order in Council, and numbered 1 to 10 respectively, and to declare that the same should apply to all Colonial Certificates granted under any of the said recited Orders:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that it is expedient that the condition and regulation numbered six, set out in the Schedules to the said recited Orders in Council, should be altered so as to allow, upon the recommendation of the Court or Authority which cancels or suspends a Certificate, whether granted by the Board of Trade or by the Government of a British Possession, the grant, to persons whose Certificates have been cancelled or suspended under the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any Act or Ordinance for the time being in force in any part of Her Majesty's Dominions, of a Colonial Certificate of a lower grade without the previous sanction of the Board of Trade or of the Authority by whom such cancelled or suspended Certificate was originally granted, and that the conditions and regulations set out in the said recited Orders in Council should be rescinded and the said recited Orders in Council revoked, and a new Order in Council containing such modified and amended conditions and regulations substituted in lieu thereof:

NOW, THEREFORE, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, is hereby pleased—

1. To declare that the Colonial Certificates of Competency granted—

(a) by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in Canada from and after the 19th day of August 1871, to persons intending to act as Masters or Mates on board British sea-going ships, and from and after the 1st day of January 1887, to persons intending to act as First Class Engineers or Second Class Engineers on board such ships;

(b) by the Head of the Government of the Possession of Malta and its Dependencies from and after the 12th day of May 1874, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, that is to say:—To Masters of the First Class, or Masters of a Foreign-going ship, to Mates of the First Class or First Mate of a Foreign-going ship, to Mates of the Second Class or Second Mate of a Foreign-going ship, to Engineers of the First Class or First Class Engineers, and to Engineers of the Second Class or Second Class Engineers;

(c) by the Steam Navigation Board of Victoria appointed by the Government of the Possession of Victoria, from and after the 4th day of January 1870, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers of Foreign-going British steam ships;

(d) by the Governor for the time being of the Possession of New Zealand from and after the 1st day of May 1872, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board Foreign-going British ships;

(e) by the Marine Board of the Possession of New South Wales, from and after the 18th day of June 1872, to persons intending to act as Masters, First Mates or Second Mates, or as First Class Engineers, or as Second Class Engineers on board Foreign-going British ships;

(f) by the Marine Board of the Possession of South Australia from and after the 12th day of May 1874, to persons intending to act as Masters, First Mates, Only Mates, or Second Mates, or First Class Engineers, or Second Class Engineers on board Foreign-going British ships;

(g) by the Governor of the Possession of Tasmania from and after the 1st day of April 1876, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board Foreign-going British ships;

(h) by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Possession of Bengal from and after the 27th day of June 1876, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board Foreign-going British ships;

(i) by the Governor of the Possession of Newfoundland from and after the 14th day of May 1877, to persons intending to act as Masters or Mates on board Foreign-going British ships;

(k) by the Governor of the Possession of Bombay from and after the 11th day of July 1877, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board Foreign-going British ships;

(l) by the Marine Board of the Possession of Queensland from and after the 1st day of October 1877, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board Foreign-going British ships;

(m) by the Governor of the Possession of Hong Kong from and after the 1st day of January 1884, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board Foreign-going British ships,

shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts:

2. To declare that all the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates of Competency for the foreign trade granted under those Acts, except so much of the 139th section of 'The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854,' and of the 10th section of 'The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862,' as requires the delivery by the Board of Trade to any Master, Mate, or Engineer of a copy of any certificate to which he appears to be entitled as therein mentioned, and except so much of the third subsection of the 23rd section of the said last-mentioned Act as requires, at the conclusion of a case relating to the cancelling or suspending of a certificate such certificate, if cancelled or suspended, to be forwarded to the Board of Trade, and

except the whole of the provisions of the fourth subsection of the same section, shall apply to such Colonial Certificates of Competency; provided, however, that in the case of New Zealand the foregoing exceptions shall not interfere with or suspend the operation of an Act of the Legislature of New Zealand, intitled 'The Merchant Shipping Act Adoption Act, 1869' (32 & 33 Vict., No. 5):

3. To impose and make the conditions and regulations set out in the Schedule A. hereto, numbered 1 to 10 respectively, with respect to the said Colonial Certificates of Competency, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation and suspension thereof, and to impose for the breach of such conditions and regulations the penalties therein mentioned.
4. To revoke the conditions and regulations, numbered 1 to 10 respectively set out in the Schedules to the said recited Orders in Council, and to substitute therefor the conditions and regulations set out in the Schedule A. hereto, numbered 1 to 10 respectively, and to declare that, from and after the time when this Order takes effect, the conditions and regulations set out in the Schedule A. hereto shall apply to all Colonial Certificates that may have been or shall be hereafter granted as aforesaid.
5. To declare that this Order shall take effect in each of the said Possessions immediately it is published in the said Possessions enumerated in the Schedule B. hereto, and that all Certificates granted in the said Possession subsequently to the dates named in the Schedule B. and before this Order comes into force shall have the same effect, and be of the same value, and confer the same privileges on the holders thereof as if granted under this present Order.
6. To direct that the said herein-before recited Orders in Council shall be revoked in each of the said possessions on the day on which this Order takes effect therein as provided in the preceding paragraph (5) hereof: provided, however, that the revocation of the said Orders in Council shall not affect or invalidate any Colonial Certificate of Competency previously granted thereunder, or affect the validity or invalidity of anything done under the said Orders in Council before this Order takes effect.

SCHEDULE A.

CONDITIONS and REGULATIONS with respect to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation and suspension of COLONIAL CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY.

Interpretation clause.

In the construction and for the purposes of these conditions and regulations, the following terms shall have the respective meanings herein-after assigned to them, that is to say:—

'Colonial Certificate of Competency' shall mean a Certificate of Competency authorised

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to be granted by the Legislative authority of a British possession to Persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers of British ships on similar principles and conditions as those granted under the Imperial Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

'Authority' shall mean the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Administrator, Head of the Government, Minister, Board, Body or Corporation of or in any British Possession for the time being authorised by the Legislature of such Possession to grant Colonial Certificates of Competency.

REGULATIONS and CONDITIONS.

Form of Certificate.

1. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be on parchment, and as nearly as possible similar in shape and form to the corresponding Certificate of Competency for the Foreign Trade granted by the Board of Trade under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

Name of Possession to be inserted.

2. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall have the name of the British Possession in which the same is granted, inserted prominently on its face and back.

Certificates to be numbered consecutively.

3. The Colonial Certificates of Competency granted in each British Possession shall be numbered in consecutive order.

Lists of Certificates granted, cancelled, &c., to be sent to Registrar General of Seamen.

4. The Authority in each British Possession shall furnish the Registrar General of Seamen in London, from time to time, with accurate lists of all such Colonial Certificates of Competency as may be granted therein or as may for any cause whatsoever be cancelled, suspended, renewed, or re-issued; and shall also furnish him with duplicates of the applications for examination made by the persons to whom such Certificates are granted.

Certificates to be granted only upon proof of service at sea

5. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be granted only upon proof that the previous service at sea of the person applying for the same has been such as is required by the regulations for the time being in force in the United Kingdom with respect to certificates of the like grade.

Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation, or upon any false, incorrect or insufficient proof, certificate, or report of service, qualification, conduct, or character shall be regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates not to be granted when former are cancelled.

6. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall not be granted to any person who may have had a certificate, whether granted by the Board of Trade or by the Government of a British Possession, cancelled or suspended under the provisions of the said Acts or of any Act or Ordinance for the time being in force in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, unless the same is a certificate of a lower grade than the one so cancelled

or suspended and is issued upon the recommendation of the court or authority which cancelled or suspended the original certificate, or unless the period of suspension has expired, or unless intimation has been received from the Board of Trade, or the authority by whom the cancelled or suspended certificate was originally granted, to the effect that no objection to the grant of such Colonial Certificate is known to exist, or unless a new certificate has been granted to him by such board or authority; and in the last-named event no such Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be for a higher grade than the certificate so last granted as aforesaid.

Colonial Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates improperly granted may be cancelled without formal investigation.

7. A Colonial Certificate of Competency which appears from information subsequently acquired, or otherwise, to have been improperly granted whether in the above or in any other respect, may be cancelled by the authority by which the same was granted, or by the Board of Trade in the United Kingdom, without any formal investigation under "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and the holder of such certificate shall thereupon deliver it to the Board of Trade or such authority or as they or either of them may direct, and in default thereof shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping are thereby made recoverable.

Cancellation, &c. of a Certificate shall involve cancellation of all the other Certificates possessed by its Owner.

8. Every decision with respect to the cancellation or suspension of a certificate pronounced by any board, court, or tribunal under the provisions of the said Acts, shall, unless otherwise directed, extend equally to all the Colonial Certificates at the time possessed by the person in respect of whom the decision is made, as well as to all Certificates granted to him under any of the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and whether such certificates be specified in such decisions or not.

Certificates believed to be fraudulent may be demanded.

9. Any officer of the Board of Trade, or the Registrar General of Seamen, or any of his Officers, or a Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office, or a Consular Officer, or duly appointed Shipping Officer in a British Possession may demand the delivery to him of any Colonial Certificate of Competency which he has reason to believe has been improperly issued, or is forged, altered, cancelled, or suspended, or to which the person using it is not justly entitled, and may detain such Certificate for a reasonable period for the purpose of making inquiries respecting such issue, forgery, alteration, cancellation, suspension, or possession, and any person who, without reasonable cause, neglects or refuses to comply with such demand shall incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or its equivalent in local currency, which

shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping are thereby made recoverable.

Suspended Certificates to be re-issued only by Colony by which originally granted.

10. A Colonial Certificate of Competency which has from any cause been cancelled or suspended, shall be renewed or re-issued only by the authority by which the same was originally granted.

RESOLUTION—By the Government of India, Public Works Department.

Special Rules for the retirement of Officers of the Indian Telegraph Department.

Read again—

Government of India, Public Works Department,
Resolution No. 136 T.E., dated 21st October 1887.

Read also—

Despatch No. 6 of 8th June 1888, from Government of India to Secretary of State.

Telegram of 3rd August 1888, from Secretary of State.

OBSERVATIONS.—The practical application of the special retirement rules for the Indian Telegraph Department, which were promulgated in the Resolution read above, has shown that they produced some anomalies, and that their effect has been less favourable than was anticipated, when the Resolution was published, to the officers whose position it was desired to benefit.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor-General in Council is pleased to issue, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, the following rules, which are supplementary to the rules in Resolution No. 136 T. E., dated 21st October last :

- I.—Any officer of the Indian Telegraph Department who had less than 20 years' service counting for pension on the 31st March 1888, will be eligible to retire from the Department when he attains to 20 years' pensionable service, with the pension due to him under the rules in force (on medical certificate or otherwise), together with an extra pension of Rs. 1,000 per annum.
- II.—Officers who are eligible to retire immediately under the above rule, should, if they wish to avail themselves of it, take steps which will ensure their applications reaching the Government of India within six months of the date of this Resolution.
- III.—Others, who may subsequently become eligible, must, similarly, present their applications within six months of the day when they attain to 20 years' pensionable service.
- IV.—Sections III, IV, and V of Resolution No. 136 T.E. (with the alteration of the date in V to the 1st February 1889) are applicable to these orders. They are reprinted below for facility of reference.
- V.—No officer who is, or will become, entitled to retire under this Resolution will be

allowed, after its issue, to take any furlough (other than on medical certificate) which will cause the total amount of furlough taken during his service to exceed two years; unless, before taking such furlough, he foregoes the right of applying to retire under the terms of this Resolution.

VI.—These rules, if not previously cancelled, will cease to be operative as soon as the whole of the officers appointed in 1871-72 have become eligible to retire under them.

Extract from Resolution No. 136 T.E., dated 21st October 1887.

III.—When an officer has tendered his resignation through his superior officer, it is obligatory that the application should be submitted for the orders of the Government of India; and it cannot be cancelled except with the approval and sanction of Government.

IV.—The Governor-General in Council reserves the right to accept or to refuse any application for retirement under these terms, or to postpone the date on which such retirement is to take effect, according to the interests of the public service.

V.—This Resolution is intended only to have a temporary effect. The Governor-General in Council may revoke it whenever, after the 1st April next, it appears desirable in the interests of the public service to do so.

ORDER.—Ordered, that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Department of Finance and Commerce for further orders.

Also that copies be forwarded to the Director-General of Telegraphs and to the Accountant-General, Public Works Department, for information and guidance.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 2870.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 9th instant in the Port of Aden and at Perim as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Barus Island off Sumatra shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.

III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter R of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.

IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale :—

After eight days of voyage	...	...	six days of quarantine.
Do. nine do.	...	...	five do.
Do. ten do.	...	...	four do.
Do. eleven do.	...	...	three do.
Do. twelve do.	...	...	two do.
Do. thirteen do.	and upwards	...	twenty-four hours of quarantine.

V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden and Perim which may have communicated with vessels coming from Barus Island off Sumatra shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden and Perim from that Port.

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.

In directing your attention to the Notification of the Financial Department, No. 4138, dated 27th July 1888 (see *Gazette of India*), regarding the surrender of notes of the $\frac{4}{2}$ per cent. Loan of 1870 for transfer, I have the honour to request careful observance of the following points:—

- a. That all notes presented are duly receipted as required by the Notification; the completeness and regularity of the chain of endorsements being carefully examined, consolidation or sub-division of notes is permissible.
- b. The interest overdue on such surrendered notes or stock certificates and Rs. 1-5-3 per centum, being the further interest thereon in advance from 15th July 1888 up to and including the 31st October 1888, at the rate of four-and-a-half per centum per annum, should be paid at the time of surrendering the notes (or stock certificates) for transfer, whether the note has been enfaced for payment of interest at your Treasury or not. But if any doubt arise in the case of a note enfaced for payment of interest at another Treasury regarding endorsements or certificates entered upon the note, reference should be made to the Public Debt Office, Calcutta.
- c. Under a power-of-attorney to sell, endorse, and transfer, there can be no objection to the transfer of notes; but a cash payment on discharge of the note must not be made unless the power conferred on the attorney specially contemplates receiving cash payment.
- d. Under a power for the receipt of interest, a letter of instructions from the principal to his agent is necessary before a transfer can be permitted.
- e. One of several joint-proprietors of a Promissory Note can transfer it to another loan on receipting the papers for himself and co-proprietors.

f. The receipt of one of several joint-proprietors is insufficient for payment in cash of the principal of a note; all must join.

g. One of the several executors or administrators—

can transfer to the 4 per cent. Loan of 1865,

can receive cash payment of a loan advertised for transfer, provided there is nothing in the grant of letters of administration to the contrary.

h. An administrator or executor whose powers are limited to realization of interest cannot transfer from one loan to another, but the principal cannot be paid to him in cash.

i. All notes received should be forwarded without delay to the Public Debt Office, Calcutta; the name of the Treasury where it is presented being very distinctly entered on each, so that there may be no doubt as to where the new note is to be sent.

j. A temporary register should be opened, in which to enter the notes presented and forwarded and the new notes delivered in lieu.

k. If securities be tendered under clause 7 of the Notification, the certificate of absence from India and a certificate of the date on which they were tendered should invariably accompany the notes.

l. In accordance with clause 8 of the Notification, the payment of 2 annas per cent. is allowed to be made on the receipt of the person, whether proprietor or agent, who presents the note for transfer, and should be charged to "13—Interest."

m. No cash payments of the principal amounts may be made in the first instance at any Treasury, as under the Notification all notes or stock certificates will be discharged at the Public Debt Office, Bank of Bengal, Calcutta, on 27th October 1888, on which date all interest will cease.

n. If any notes are presented to you for discharge under the Notification, you will take the proper receipt on the back, and will register the notes in a special register showing (1) number of note, (2) amount, (3) name of holder, (4) interest due, (5) holder's signature, (6) date of transmission to Public Debt Office.

o. You need not require the holder's personal attendance, but you should obtain and keep his signature for identification when the order of payment is sent you.

p. When you receive the payment order from the Public Debt Office you should inform the holder, get his signature as receipt for the payment (no stamp is required), and make the payment.

q. The orders will be sent out by the Bank of Bengal on a transfer receipt form enfaced "Loan discharge" and advised in the usual way. You should not mix up the payments with the ordinary payments of remittance transfer receipts but should charge them separately in your accounts.
