You will have received from the Comptroller General a copy of his Circular letter No. 303, dated 21st August 1888, describing the procedure to be followed in dealing with Stock Notes, surrendered under Government of India Resolution, Financial Department, No. 4539, dated 17th August 1888, published at page 712 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated 23rd August 1888.

2. You should, by such means as suggest themselves to you, give as wide publicity as possible to the intentions of the Government of India about the conversion and encashment of Stock Notes.

3. Notes tendered to you under this Notification may be redeemed in cash, or accepted for conversion, under the following conditions.

Notes of the denomination of Rs. 100 can be received for conversion only, and not for purchase by cash payment. Notes of lower denominations may either be purchased by a cash payment, or, if aggregating Rs. 100, or any multiple of Rs. 100, may be received for conversion at the option of the holder, that is to say, if 15 notes of Rs. 12½ are tendered, the holder may claim payment in cash for the whole, or may obtain a Promissory Note for Rs. 100, and the balance Rs. 87-8-0 in cash.

4. When notes are purchased by a payment in cash—

(a) The amount of the principal of such Notes discharged will be debited direct in your Cash Book, the debit being supported by the payee's receipt, which will form a voucher to accompany your Cash Account.

(b) Interest on the Note paid in cash will be calculated up to, but exclusive of, the date of payment. The interest due up to 31st July will be half the amount printed on the coupon; for the broken period beyond the 31st July the amount must be calculated. The interest paid should be entered in your register, and the debit in the account supported by the payee's receipts.

(c) All Stock Notes, with their coupons attached, which have been redeemed for cash, should be stamped “Paid,” with the date, and they should be posted to me under registered cover every Saturday morning, with a covering list Form A, fifty copies of which are herewith sent.

(d) The first list should be sent to me on the 1st September. For the broken period of each month a Memo. should be posted to me on the 1st of the following month, that is to say, the transactions on the 29th September will be advised to me on the 1st October; those for 27th to 31st October, on 1st November, and so on; and you should be particularly careful that the totals of your several lists work up to the monthly total in your Cash Account, to ensure which being done, the Treasury Officer should certify to the agreement on the last list for each month.

5. The procedure to be followed when Stock Notes are tendered for conversion into Government Promissory Notes of the Four Per Cent. Loan of 1842-43 is as follows:—

- (a) The tenderer will be furnished with a receipt in Form B, fifty copies of which are herewith sent.
- (b) This receipt should be retained by the tenderer, and must be surrendered, when the Promissory Notes issued in exchange, are delivered to him, and the acknowledgment on the reverse of the receipt signed.
- (c) These receipts, after issue of the Promissory Notes, should be sent to this Office once a week.
- (d) Interest on these Notes will be paid for the period from 1st February 1888 to 31st July 1888, at two per cent. (or half the amount printed on the coupon as due on 1st February 1889), minus half per cent. deducted on account of premium. A separate receipt for the full interest, 2 per cent., should be taken from each tenderer, and the full amount charged in the Cash Book—the amount deducted as premium being credited separately.
- (e) If any interest is due for a period, prior to 1st February 1888, it should be paid under the rules contained in Civil Account Code, Chapter 13, rules 31 and 32. The coupon will be the only voucher for such payment, which should be kept quite distinct from the 2 per cent. paid under the last clause.
