No. 6473.—The following Notification by the Government of India in the Foreign Department is republished for general information :—

" Simla, the 18th September 1888.

No. 3732-I.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 8 of the Indian Christian Marriage Act, XV of 1872, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to appoint the officer holding, for the time being, the office of Cantonment Magistrate at Baroda and being a Christian, to be a Marriage Registrar in respect of the Cantonment of Baroda.

No. 6600.—The following Notification by the Government of India in the Foreign Department is republished :—

" Simla, the 25th September 1888.

No. 3817-I.—Whereas His Highness the Nawab of Junagad and His Highness the Thakur Sahib of Gondal have granted to the British Government all the criminal jurisdiction they possess within the portions of their respective territories which have been assigned or made over by them for the purposes of the Junagad State Railway ;

And whereas His Highness the Nawab of Junagad and His Highness the Thakur Sahib of Gondal have agreed that all suits of a civil nature brought against His Highness the Nawab of Junagad as the proprietor of the Junagad State

railway respecting the loss of or damage to goods or injury to persons within limits of that railway and cases of a civil nature arising out of the application of the Railway Act over those limits, shall be heard and decided in due course in the Kathiawar Political Agency Courts: Provided always that the Railway Manager shall represent the railway in such suits and not the proprietary State of Junagad, and that any decrees that may be passed shall be executed against the railway property and not against the said proprietary State: Provided also that all other civil jurisdiction within the limits of those portions of the said railway which pass through the territories of the States of Junagad and Gondal respectively shall continue and be exercised as heretofore by those States;

And whereas the Governor-General in Council has accordingly full criminal and certain civil jurisdiction as above defined within the limits of the aforesaid railway:

In exercise of this jurisdiction and of the powers conferred by sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, XXI of 1879, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to issue the following orders:

Criminal Law Procedure and Jurisdiction.

1. The provisions, so far as they may be applicable, of the Indian Penal Code (Act XLV of 1860), as amended for the time being by subsequent Acts, the Whipping Act (Act VI of 1861), sections 1 to 6, both inclusive, the Code of Criminal Procedure (Act X of 1882), as amended for the time being by subsequent Acts, the Bombay District Police Act (Bombay Act VII of 1867), section 26, and the Indian Railway Act (IV of 1879), as amended for the time being by subsequent Acts, are hereby extended to the limits of the aforesaid railway, subject in the case of the Code of Criminal Procedure to the following modifications, namely:

- (a) Trials before the Court of Session may, in the discretion of the Sessions Judge, be without a jury or the aid of assessors.
- (b) Sentences of transportation or imprisonment for more than seven years passed by the Court of Session shall be referred for confirmation to the Governor of Bombay in Council. In any case so referred the Governor of Bombay in Council may either confirm the sentence or pass any other sentence warranted by law, or may annul the conviction and order a new trial on the same or an amended charge, or may acquit the accused person.

2. The Railway Magistrate for the time being of the Bhowanagar-Gondal Railway shall exercise the powers of a Magistrate of the district within the limits of the aforesaid railway, and the Judicial Assistant for the time being in Kathiawar and the Governor of Bombay in Council shall respectively exercise the powers of a Court of Session and High Court, as described in the Code of Criminal Procedure, in respect of all offences over which jurisdiction is exercised by the said Magistrate within the aforesaid lands.

3. The provisions of the foregoing clauses shall not apply to proceedings against European British subjects, or persons jointly charged with European British subjects.

Civil Jurisdiction and Procedure.

4. The Judicial Assistant in Kathiawar for the time being, the Assistant Political Agent in Sorath for the time being, and the Deputy Assistant Political Agent in Sorath for the time being shall respectively exercise within the limits of the aforesaid railway in the case of suits against His Highness the Nawab of Junagad, as proprietor of the said railway, of the nature of those described in the preamble to this notification, the same civil jurisdiction as is exercised by them within the limits of the Kathiawar Political Agency under the rules for defining the jurisdiction, original and appellate, to be exercised by the Civil Courts of the Political Agency in Kathiawar, published at page 312 of the *Kathiawar Agency Gazette*, dated the 27th December 1883.

5. In the administration of civil justice within the limits of the aforesaid railway the rules referred to in the last foregoing paragraph and the Code of Civil Procedure shall be taken as general guides.

MADRAS COAST.

Leading Lights.

It is intended to exhibit, on and after the 15th of October 1888, from the Iron Pier, Madras Harbour, at a height of 30 feet above high water level, a red fixed light visible from seaward through an arc of 112°, viz. from N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. to S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., Mag. through West. Bearing and distance from Madras Lighthouse N. 38° E., 7 cables.

Also from the roof of the Port Office at a height of 60 feet above high water level, a green fixed light visible from seaward through an arc of 112°.

viz., from N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. to S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., Mag. through West. Bearing and distance from Madras Lighthouse N. 21° E., 6.45 cables.

These lights are intended as a guide to ships leaving the Harbour, and to ships making the Outer anchorage at night; when brought in line, they lead through the centre of the entrance of the Harbour, and should be visible in clear weather at a distance of 5 miles.

Buoys.

The two buoys at the entrance of the Harbour have been removed from the outside of the entrance and replaced inside: the northern one painted black, with a tripod, now lies in $7\frac{1}{4}$ fathoms water, 100 feet east of the remains of the end of the North Pier; the southern one painted red, with a tripod, now lies in $7\frac{1}{4}$ fathoms water 100 feet east of the end of the remains of the South Pier.

The above-mentioned buoys are illuminated when vessels leave the Harbour at night.

Two buoys painted red have been moored north of the Harbour for the use of vessels discharging cargo of a description which is not permitted to be discharged inside.

The positions of these buoys are as follows:—

Southern one in 5 fathoms, $2\frac{1}{2}$ cables north of the North Pier.

Madras Lighthouse bearing S. W. by S.

Sailors' Home Flagstaff W. by N. $\frac{3}{4}$ N.

Northern one in 5 fathoms, 6 cables north of the North Pier.

Madras Lighthouse bearing S. W. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S.

Sailors' Home Flagstaff S. W. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W."

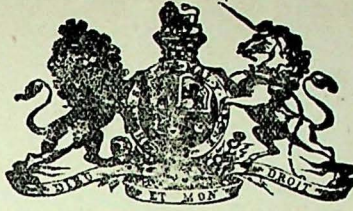
