REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 20th October 1888.

No. 7006.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 5 of the Indian Explosives Act IV of 1884 the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to make the following rules to regulate the transport of explosives from the port of Bombay to the island in the Thána river on which Messrs. Walsh, Lovett, Mitchell and Company have been permitted by Government to store explosives for the purposes of their contract in connection with the Tansa Water Works.

These rules are supplementary to those made

by the Governor General in Council and published under Home Department Notification No. 1417,* dated the 24th June 1887 :—

1. Explosives removed from the port of Bombay to the said island in the Thána river shall be transported to the place of final storage in the barges or lighters into which such explosives are transhipped from the importing vessel at Bombay.

2. The hatches of such barges or lighters shall be locked during transit and the key shall remain in custody of the police or other Government official in charge. Every hatch shall be covered with tarpaulins.

3. Every such barge or lighter shall have the word "Explosives" in white letters a foot long painted on a black ground on each side above the water line, and a red flag shall be kept hoisted between sunrise and sunset during the time any explosive is on board.

4. Every such barge or lighter shall, while explosives are on board, carry a masthead light

between sunset and sunrise, in addition to the side lights prescribed by the Admiralty Regulations.

5. No fire and, except such lights as are prescribed in the last preceding rule, no artificial light and no article which is liable to cause or communicate fire or explosion (such as charcoal, lucifer matches, articles for striking a light, petroleum to which the Petroleum Act or any Act repealing or amending the same applies, or any spirit or oil or substance that gives forth an inflammable vapour at a temperature below 100° Fahrenheit) shall be or be allowed to be brought, had, or used on or dangerously near to any such barge or lighter, while any explosive is on board, and no smoking shall be allowed in nor dangerously near to any such barge or lighter, while any explosive is on board.

6. No such barge or lighter shall, while any explosive is on board, be left without a sufficient crew under a competent tidal.

7. Every such barge or lighter shall, on arrival off the port of Thána, come to anchor half a mile below the Chendni Bandar and out of the fair way, until her papers have been examined by the Customs Collector.

8. No such barge or lighter shall proceed up the creek without the written permission of the Customs Collector.

9. No such barge or lighter shall at any time anchor in the river or creek at any spot between the place of first anchorage prescribed by Rule 7 and a place one mile above the Katva bridge, unless, on a grave emergency, it may be necessary for the safety of such barge or lighter or of any other vessel on cargo, to anchor at any such spot.

10. No such barge or lighter shall be under weigh between the places mentioned in Rule 9 at

any time, except within an hour and a half before, and an hour and a half after, high tide.

11. No such barge or lighter shall proceed between the places mentioned in Rule 9 unless in tow of a vessel propelled by steam power.

12. If any person commits a breach of any of the foregoing rules, he shall be punished with a fine which may extend to Rs. 1,000.

No. 7007.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 13 of the Opium Act, 1878, the Governor in Council, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, is pleased to make the following rules and to direct that they shall be inserted as sub-sections of No. 56 of the Rules under the said Act published at pages 704 to 715 of Part I of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated 4th June 1885:—

1. Every order for reward shall state exactly the sum of money awarded as a reward from—

(a) the value of the opium and other articles confiscated in the case, and

(b) the amount of fine imposed.

2. For the purpose of determining the amount of reward under head (a) above, the value of the opium shall invariably be calculated at the rate of Rs. 6 per lb. (unless the officer passing the order considers the opium to be decidedly valueless and records an opinion to that effect) and the value of other confiscated articles shall be appraised by him at his discretion.

3. Immediately after an order for a reward is passed, a warrant shall be issued on the Treasury for the prompt disbursement of the amount of reward adjudged under the head (a), Rule 1, and for the payment of the amount adjudged under the head (b) after the recovery of the fine shall have been certified by the Magistrate concerned, a copy of the warrant being at the same time given to the intended recipient.

4. The sufficiency of the amount adjudged as a reward in each case should be judged (a) by the importance of the seizure, and (b) by the dexterity displayed, and the trouble and risk undergone, by the informers, captors and others concerned, acting in good faith.

5. If the fine is not realised or only realised in part, the convicting Magistrate may, within a limit of Rs. 100, order payment of its full amount or of the unrealised balance, as the case may be, from the Treasury.

6. If an officer who passes an order for a reward considers the maximum amount of reward which he is competent to grant or the amount actually available for reward to be insufficient, or if the District Magistrate is of opinion that the reward granted in any case by a subordinate Court or officer is insufficient, the District Magistrate may, on the application of the officer concerned in the former case, and of his own accord in the latter case, apply for the sanction of the Commissioner to supplement the reward by a further reward under Rule 57 of the Opium Rules of such amount as the District Magistrate may

deem fit to recommend, submitting at the same time a clear statement of the case, and of the grounds for his recommendation. The Commissioner may sanction, modify or reject the District Magistrate's recommendation as he may think fit in each case.
