No. 7789.—The Most Honourable the MARQUIS OF DUFFERIN AND AVA and EARL OF AVA, K.P., G.M.S.I., G.C.B., G.C.M.G., &c., is expected to arrive at the Victoria Terminus of the G. I. P. Railway in Bombay at 5 p.m. (Bombay time) on Wednesday the 12th December 1888, and will be received on arrival with all the honours due to the Viceroy of India.

2. His Lordship will be met on arrival by a deputation consisting of the Chief Secretary to Government, the Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor and an Aide-de-Camp to His Excellency.

3. On His Lordship's alighting from the train a Salute of 31 guns will be fired. A Guard of Honour of the Volunteer Corps with Band and Colours will be drawn up at the Station, and the road from the Station to the Money School will be lined by troops of the Garrison. A Guard of Honour of Bombay Infantry with Band and Colours will be drawn up at Government House, Malabar Point.

4. His Lordship will be received at the Station by His Royal Highness the Commander-in-Chief and Staff; by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Naval Forces in India, if in Bombay, by the Chief Justice of Bombay, the Lord Bishop of Bombay, the Members of Council, the Judges of the High Court, the Additional Members of the Council of His Excellency the Governor for making Laws and Regulations, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Bombay, the Secretaries to Government, the Senior Naval Officer at the Station in the absence of His Excellency the Naval

Commander-in-Chief, the Brigadier-General Commanding the Bombay District, the President of the Municipal Corporation, the Director of the Indian Marine, the Private Secretary and the Staff of His Excellency the Governor, the Municipal Commissioner of Bombay, the Sheriff of Bombay, the Under Secretaries to Government, and the Heads of Departments, Civil and Military, or by such of the above high officials as are now in the Presidency Town. The Consular representatives of Foreign Governments are invited to be present at the station.

5. All officers of Her Majesty's Services, Civil, Naval, Military and the Indian Marine, now in Bombay, and not otherwise on duty, are desired to attend.

6. The Railway Department should issue instructions for the necessary arrangements being made at the Railway Station for His Excellency's reception, and for the adequate provision of space for those invited or desired to attend.
