THE CHARITABLE ENDOWMENTS ACT, 1890.

In the matter of the Hyderabad Medical School Endowment Fund.

Whereas the Surgeon-General with the Government of Bombay and the Superintendent of the Medical School, Hyderabad, Sind, acting in the administration of the trust known as the Hyderabad Medical School Endowment Fund have applied to the Government of Bombay to modify the scheme notified under Government Notification in the Educational Department, No. 1071, dated 16th July 1897, published at pages 1332 and 1333 of the Bombay Government Gazette of 22nd idem, Part I, owing to the transfer of the accounts of the said school from the Personal Ledger Account to that of the Local Fund Account, specially created for the purpose with the sanction of the Government of India as required by the revised note to Article 266 of the Civil Account Code, to be administered by a Committee formed in accordance with the following modified scheme;

AND WHEREAS the following modified scheme has for this purpose been settled by the Government of Bombay in Council with the concurrence of the said Surgeon-General with the Government of Bombay and the Superintendent of the Medical School, Hyderabad, Sind;

Now under section 5 of the Charitable Endowments Act, 1890, it is hereby declared that the following modified scheme shall come into operation from the 4th day of August 1909 in supersession of the previous scheme for the administration of the said Fund as specified above:—

Scheme.

The annual income of the property vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the Bombay Presidency shall be administered by the Superintendent of the Hyderabad Medical School for the time being in accordance with the directions of the Committee appointed for the management of the Local Fund which shall consist of—

- (I) The Collector of Hyderabad,
- (2) The Civil Surgeon, Hyderabad, and

(3) The Educational Inspector in Sind, for the time being.

2. The Committee for the management of the Local Fund shall publish in the Sind Official Gazette at the close of each financial year a yearly account showing full particulars of all receipts and expenditure and in what manner the income has been administered.

No. 4926.—The following notification by the Government of India, Army Department, is republished:—

"No. 889, dated Simla, the 17th September 1909.

The following draft of a notification, which it is proposed to issue in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 25 and 26 of the Cantonments Act, 1889 (XIII of 1889), is published as required by section 27, sub-section (1), of the said Act, for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby, and notice is given that the draft will be taken into consideration by the Governor-General in Council on or after the 18th October 1909. Any objection or suggestion which may be received from any person with respect to the draft before the date fixed aforesaid will be considered by the Governor-General in Council.

Draft Notification.

In exercise of the powers confered by sections 25 and 26 of the Cantonments Act, 1889 (XIII of 1889), and in modification of the notification of the Government of India in the (late) Military Department No. 664, added the 16th June 1899, as subsequently amended, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct that the following amendment shall be made in the Cantonment Code, 1899, namely:—

In section 167, the second proviso shall be omitted and in the two subsequent provisos for the words 'thirdly ' and ' fourthly,' the words ' secondly ' and ' thirdly ' shall be substituted.

No. 4927.—The following notification by the Government of India, Army Department, is republished:—

"No. 890, dated Simla, the 17th September 1909.

TAXATION.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 26 of the Cantonments Act, 1889 (XIII of 1889), the Governor-General in Council is pleased to make the following rule for the service of notices in the Cantonment of Santa Cruz:

Rule.

- (1) The service of every notice, and the presentation of every bill under the Santa Cruz

 Service of notices, etc., addressed to Cantonment Taxation Rules, 1909, on any person or to any person to whom it is by name addressed, shall be effected by a Cantonment Authority in this behalf,
 - (a) by giving or tendering this notice or bill to the person to whom it is addressed; or
 - (b) if such person is not found, by leaving the notice or bill at his last known place of abode, if within the Cantonment limits, or by giving or tendering the notice or bill to some adult male member or servant of his family; or
 - (c) if such person does not reside within the Cantonment limits, and his address elsewhere is known to the Cantonment Authority, then by forwarding the notice or bill to such person by registered post, under cover bearing the said address; or

- (d) if none of the means aforesaid be available, then by causing the bill or notice to be affixed on some conspicuous part of the building, if any, to which the bill or notice relates.
- (2) When any notice under the said rules is required or permitted by or under the said rules to be served upon an owner or occupier of any building it shall not be necessary to name the owner or occupier therein, and the service thereof shall be effected either—
 - (a) by giving or tendering the notice to the owner or occupier, or if there be more owners or occupiers than one, to any one of them; or
 - (b) if no such owner or occupier be found, then by giving or tendering the notice to some male adult member or servant of the family of any such owner or occupier as aforesaid; or
 - (c) if none of the means aforesaid be available, then by causing the notice to be fixed on some conspicuous part of the building to which the same relates.
- (3) Every notice which the said rules require or empower the Cantonment Authority to give or to serve either as a public notice, or generally, or by provisions which do not expressly require notice to be given to individuals therein specified, shall be deemed to have been sufficiently given

or served if a copy thereof is put up in such conspicuous part of the Cantonment Office during such period, or is published in such local papers or in such other manner, as the Cantonment Authority in bye-laws in this behalf prescribes.

Defective form not to invalidate notice.

(4) No notice or bill shall be invalid for defect of form.

No. 5291.—Whereas it is the intention of the Governor in Council under the provisions of section 14 of Bombay Act VI of 1863, as amended by Bombay Act V of 1887, to fix a scale of maximum fares for the hiring of public conveyances, for three passengers, driven by a motor and fitted with a taximeter, the following draft of a Table of Fares is published for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby, and notice is hereby given that the draft will be taken into consideration on or after the 10th October 1909.

Any objection or suggestion which may be received in writing by the Secretary to Government, Judicial Department, from any person with respect to the draft before the date fixed as aforesaid will be duly considered:—

I.—Day time (6 a. m. to 10-30 p. m.).

(a) Within a radius of 4 miles from the Victoria Terminus which will take in the following points:—

Malabar Hill, Breach Candy, Mahaluxmi, Race Course, Sambu Mahadev Pakhadi on Fergusson Road, Carrol Road and DeLisle Road Junction, Bombay Baroda and Central India Railway Workshops, Parel Laboratory, Sewry Cemetery and Colaba Point—

Annas 8 for the first mile.

Annas 4 for each subsequent half mile.

(b) For journeys or hiring beyond the 4 miles radius-

Annas 10 for the first mile.

Annas 5 for each subsequent half mile.

(c) Return journey to the Fort-

Annas 4 per mile if the cab has been discharged by a customer.

(d) Fare for detention of conveyance-

One anna for each two minutes.

II.—Night time (10-30 p. m. to 6 a. m.).

(a) Annas 12 for the first mile.

Annas 6 for each subsequent half mile.

(b) Return journey to the Fort— Annas 6 per mile.

> III.—In addition to the above, the driver of any taxicab shall be entitled to charge Annas 2 for each packet carried outside.

Norg. -Luggage carried on the car, so that the doors do not close over it, is deemed to be outside within the meaning of this clause.

No. 5305.—The following circular, framed by His Majesty's High Court of Judicature at Bombay under section 15 of 24 and 25 Vic., Chapter 104, has received the sanction of the Governor in Council and is published for general information :-

To be inserted at the end of clause (X) of Circular No. 105 at page 52 of the High Court Criminal Circular Order Book.

"Returns should be made to all orders, issuing from Appellate Courts other than the High Court, for the refund of fines inflicted by the Court of first instance by endorsement, if possible within a fortnight, certifying that the refund has been made on the letter accompanying the order of the Appellate Court."

No. 5318 .- In modification of Government Notification in the Judicial Department, No. 5079, April 1894, publishing the Table of Fares for public conveyances plying for hire in the town of Bijápur in the Bijápur District, the Governor in Ccuncil is pleased, under the provisions of section 14 of Bombay Act VI of 1863, as amended by Bombay Act V of 1887 (Public Conveyances Act), to prescribe, with effect from the 1st day of November 1909, the following revised Tables of Fares:—

No. 5318A .- In modification of Government Notification in the Judicial Department, No. 2800, dated the 8th May 1886, publishing the List of Stands and the Subsidiary Rules in respect of public conveyances plying for hire in the town of Bijápur in the Bijápur District, the Governor in Council is pleased, under the provisions of section 14 of Bombay Act VI of 1863, as amended by Bombay Act V of 1887 (Public Conveyances Act), to sanction, with effect frem the 1st day of November 1909, the following revised List of Stands and Subsidiary Rules:—

II Subsidiary Rules.

- 1. In these Rules-
 - (a) "Public conveyance" means a Victoria, Tonga or other wheeled carriage, with one or two horses or ponies, and a country cart or Shigram or Dhamni with one or two bullocks; and
 - (b) "Day" means the period from sunrise to sunset.
- 2. No pony shall be used in a licensed conveyance if below 12'2 hands in height.
- 3. For the purposes of these rules public conveyances shall be classified according to quality as hereinbelow specified:—
 - (1) First Class,
 - (2) Second Class, and
 - (3) Labour Carts.
- 4. A printed table showing the distances between important places shall be supplied to the driver of every public conveyance, who shall show it to any passenger, if required to do so.
- 5. The number of passengers excluding the driver, and the weight of the luggage allowed to be carried in addition to the full number of passengers, shall not exceed the limit laid down below in the case of the vehicles of the first and second class:—

In reckoning the maximum number of passengers, children in arms shall not be counted. Two children, not being children in arms but each being under the age of twelve, shall count as one passenger.

- 6. The fares shown in the table are for the use of the conveyance, whether the full number of passengers is carried or not.
- 7. The fares shown in the table are for the single journey; for a return journey the fare shall be half that for the single journey, provided that the period of detention at the end of the outward journey does not exceed half an hour. If it exceeds half an hour, the driver shall be entitled to charge 4 annas extra for every hour or part of an hour of detention, in addition to the half fare for the return journey.
- 8. If a public conveyance engaged for the day be retained after sunset, the rates per hour for every hour of such detention shall be payable in addition to the rate for the day.
- g. In any case in which a public conveyance is called from a stand or the owner's stable to any place distant more than half a mile from such stand or stable, the driver shall be entitled to charge a annas in addition to the prescribed fare; the driver is also entitled, in addition to the prescribed fare, to a fare of 2 annas for each quarter of an hour of detention by the hirer at the commencement or end of a journey beyond the time necessary for the journey.
 - 10. The driver is not bound to carry in his conveyance any goods other than personal luggage.
 - 11. All tolls shall be payable by the driver.
- 12. All conveyances shall be supplied with two clear burning lights during the period between three-quarters of an hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, except when there is sufficient moonlight to render such lights unnecessary.
- 13. Licensees of public conveyances shall, when the yearly licenses and numbers are renewed, bring their conveyances and horses or ponies to the office of the District Superintendent of Police or to any one authorised by him in this behalf for inspection, and shall satisfy him that the conveyances, horses, ponies and harnesses are in all respects in sufficiently good order and otherwise fit for the purpose intended, and that the drivers are clean, steady and capable.
 - 14. Every driver shall, when engaged in his occupation, be cleanly and decently clothed.

No. 3367.—In accordance with No. 10 of the Rules prescribed in the notification of the Government of India, Finance Department, No. 6565-A, dated 24th October 1907, republished in Part I of the Bombay Government Gazette dated 7th November 1907, under Financial Department No. 4318, dated 4th idem, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following application from the President of the Bijapur Municipality for the grant of a loan of Rs. 1,76,000 under the provisions of the Local Authorities Loan Act, 1879:—

From—The President, the Vice-President, the Chairman of the Managing Committee and other Councillors of the Bijápur Municipality;

To-The Chief Secretary to Government, Financial Department, Bombay.

Municipal Office, Bijápur, 20th April 1909.

Sir,—We, the President, the Vice-President, the Chairman of the Managing Committee and other Councillors of the Bijapur Municipality, beg to request that, under the provisions of section 4 of the Local Authorities Loan Act, No. XI of 1879, Government will be pleased to grant to this Municipality a loan of Rupees one lac and seventy-six thousand for the purpose indicated below.

- 2. Conforming to the Rules made by the Government of India under section 5 of the said Act, published at pages 1833 and 1834 of the Bombay Government Gazette of November 1907, we beg to supply the following details:—
 - (1) The loan is required for constructing a large tank by putting a dam across the *Shindi* Nala near Bhutnal, about 4 miles from Bijapur, in order to provide an adequate and reliable water-supply for the town of Bijapur. The estimated cost of the work is Rs. 4,26,848.
 - (2) The amount of loan applied for is Rs. 1,76,000 (one lac and seventy-six thousand only).
 - (3) The rates, taxes and revenue of the Bijápur Municipality are offered as security for the loan.
 - (4) The law under which the abovementioned Municipal revenue is raised is the District Municipal Act III of 1901.
 - (5) The loan is required for a period of twenty years and is asked for in three instalments as under on the following terms:
 - (a) (i) One lac will be required by the 1st of August 1910.
 - (ii) Half a lac will be required by the 1st of December 1910.
 - (iii) Twenty-six thousand will be required by the 1st of March 1911.
 - (b) The loan will bear simple interest at 4 per cent. per annum.
 - (c) It is proposed to repay the loan by equal yearly instalments of Rs. 12,950 payable on the 1st of June each year commencing from the 1st of June 1912.
 - (6) Two statements A and B showing the revenue and expenditure of this Municipality for the last three years are appended.
 - (7) There are no prior charges on account of debt on the revenue of this Municipality.
- 3. The income of the Municipality is nearly always somewhat in excess of the expenditure. In the statements appended, the income for 1905-06 will be seen to be well over the expenditure. That for 1906-07 is less, but that was due to the failure of rains, which resulted in the fall of octroi income from Rs. 29,117 to Rs. 21,068, a difference of 8,000 nearly. On the other hand, the expenditure in 1906-07 was about Rs. 4,000 more than in 1905-06, owing to important additions being made to the Vegetable Market and Victoria Memorial Girls' School. But the proposed loan is to be met by raising an additional revenue from the following sources:—

Add to this the annual savings of Rs. 3,000 on the expenditure now incurred on water-supply, which will no longer be necessary on completion of the scheme. The total amount of Rs. 25,000 thus arrived at will be available annually towards the cost of the scheme. Deducting the cost of working the scheme which is estimated at Rs. 12,000 a year, the balance of Rs. 13,000 will go to repay the loan. There will thus be no difficulty in repayment.

The entire cost of the proposed project is, as stated above, estimated at Ps. 4,26,848. Of this a free grant of 2 lacs will be obtained from Government, and the District Local Board, Bijápur, have promised to contribute Rs. 50,000 in suitable instalments. For the rest, the loan herein applied for is required.

It was at first supposed that the entire project would cost not more than four lacs; but detailed estimates being made, the cost comes to Rs. 4,26,848. The loan amount has had therefore to be raised from 1½ lacs, as originally intended, to Rs. 1,76,000.

An extract from the proceedings of the Special General Meeting held on 8th February 1909, resolving that an application for the required loan be submitted, is herewith attached.

Bombay Castle, 22nd September 1909.

No. 66.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 6, sub-section (1), of the Indian Ports Act 1908 (XV of 1908), and in supersession of the rules published in Government Notification in the Marine Department, No. 52, dated the 8th May 1907, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules for the purpose of minimising the risk to shipping in Bombay Harbour owing to the transportation of dangerous petroleum within the Port of Bombay, namely:—

Rules.

- 1. In these rules --
 - (1) "dangerous petroleum" means dangerous petroleum as defined by the Indian Petroleum Act, 1899;
 - (2) "the Harbour" means and includes every portion of the Port of Bombay of which the Trustees of the Port have, under the provisions of the Indian Ports Act, 1908, been appointed conservators;
 - (3) "import" means to bring into the Harbour by sea; and
 - (4) "transport" means to remove from one place to another within the Harbour.
- 2. These rules shall not apply to ships importing dangerous petroleum nor to motor vessels on which dangerous petroleum is used for internal combustion only and is not carried as cargo.
- 3. No dangerous petroleum shall be transported except in iron or steel barges with closed decks approved by the Port Officer and provided with an anchor and sufficient chain as ground tackle.
- 4. Every barge having any quantity of dangerous petroleum on board shall exhibit a large-square red flag from a mast not less than 15 feet above the deck and in such position that it can be seen all round the compass.
- 5. No fire or light of any description and no matches or any detonating article or substance whatsoever shall be, or shall be taken, on board of any barge when any dangerous petroleum is on board.
- 6. Every barge, other than a motor-propelled barge, having dangerous petroleum on board shall be transported by a tug, and if steam be the motive power of such tug, the funnel top or tops shall be fitted with efficient spark protectors.
- 7. All towing hawsers shall be made of steel wire or chain and the scope between the stern of the tug and the stem of the nearest tow to her shall not be less than 100 feet.
- 8. Barges used for the carriage of dangerous petroleum may be propelled by motors fitted to such barges provided (a) that such barges are built in accordance with recognized rules for shipbuilding such as Liloyd's rules or those of the British Corporation and under the supervision of a responsible surveyor, (b) that the propelling power is situated in the afterpart of the vessel, the compartment in which it is fitted being separated from the hold used for cargo by a coffer-dam extending the full width of the vessel and of one frame space in length, (c) that the propelling power is sufficient to enable the vessel to traverse the distance from the loading to the discharging station within two hours, under ordinary conditions of weather, and (d) that such barges are approved of by the Port Officer conjointly with the Government Surveyor.

- 9. Dangerous petroleum shall not be loaded, unloaded or transported between the hours of sunset and sunrise.
- 10. The hatches of every barge having dangerous petroleum on board shall be and remain battened down and covered with tarpaulins from the time of her leaving the ship from which the petroleum was taken upto the time when she begins unloading, and in the event of such barge carrying dangerous petroleum failing to reach her destination and unload within the abovementioned time limit, she shall anchor at a place not further south than a line running due east of Dárukhána Bandar and at a distance of one mile from it at least and the crew shall immediately vacate the barge and board the mark boats from which they shall keep a careful watch. The position of the barge shall be marked by means of two boats, each carrying a bright light in the bows visible all round the horizon for one mile and a red light in the stern also visible all round the horizon: one of such boats shall be anchored ahead of the barge carrying dangerous petroleum and the other astern of her in such manner that, should either of such boats and such barge swing in opposite directions, a clear distance not less than 100 feet may be preserved between such boat and such barge.
- 11. The bilges of every barge which has carried a cargo of dangerous petroleum shall, immediately after the barge is unloaded, be thoroughly cleared of all traces of such petroleum and dried and the holds shall be thoroughly ventilated.
