EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 24th November 1909.

Applications are invited for one or two State Technical Scholarships from candidates in the Bombay Presidency who are willing to go to England to undergo a special course of study in—

- (1) Sugar-refining,
- (2) Electrical Engineering.

2. Each scholarship is of the value of £150 a year and is tenable for two years. On good cause being shown a scholarship may be continued for a third year.

3. Besides the stipend mentioned above, a selected scholar will receive a second class passage to England and a similar return passage to India, if he has duly complied with the regulations under which he holds the scholarship. He will also receive travelling allowance for *bonâ fide* journeys made in connection with his studies and approved by the head of the institution in which he is studying while in Europe. University or College fees will also be paid by Government.

4. Candidates for either of the above scholarships must state in their applications in what institutions they propose to study and what courses of instruction they propose to attend.

5. Preference will be given to candidates for the first scholarship who are Bachelors or Licentiates of Agriculture of the Bombay University or Licentiates in Technical Chemistry of the Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute, Bombay. Any practical work done in sugar-refining will be regarded as an additional qualification. Applications must be accompanied by the necessary certificates signed by the Principal, College of Science or Agricultural College, Poona, or the Principal, Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute, Bombay, and by Managers of Sugar-refineries. Except for very special reasons, applications from candidates over 30 years of age will not be considered.

Candidates for the second scholarship must produce a certificate either from the Principal, College of Science, Poona, or from the Principal, Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute, Bombay, that they are fitted to go through an advanced course of training in Electrical Engineering. For this scholarship preference will be given to candidates who are under 25 years of age.

6. A candidate's application must be accompanied by evidence showing that he is a *bonâ fide* native of the Bombay Presidency, that he is a man of good character, intelligent and industrious, and what is his exact age on the date of application. He should also submit a certificate of physical capacity to undergo the course of life and study which he will have to follow in England, signed or countersigned by a Presidency or Civil Surgeon.

7. Selected candidates must satisfy the Director of Public Instruction that they are well able to write, speak and understand English.

8. Selected candidates will be required to arrive in England by the middle of September. They will, while in England, be subject to the rules, so far as they are applicable, laid down by the Secretary of State for India for the guidance of the Government of India Technical Scholars, and to such further regulations as may, from time to time, be made for their guidance by the Secretary of State.

9. Applications will be received by the Director of Public Instruction up to the 1st February 1910 and they must be complete as regards all the conditions above defined.

10. All the certificates, etc., to be submitted with the applications should be in original with duplicate copies thereof.

11. After the selection of the scholar or scholars has been made, his name or their names will be notified in the *Bombay Government Gazette*, and he or they will then receive such further instructions as may appear to Government to be necessary.

Rules for Indian Government Technical Scholars in England.

1. The Secretary of State considers it desirable that all Government scholars should avail themselves of the information and advice which the Educational Adviser to Indian students is in a position to give them, and these rules are framed with that end in view. Government scholars, equally with private students, may consult the Educational Adviser upon any question, and will receive from him all possible assistance, and the Secretary of State hopes that they will communicate with the Educational Adviser, not only on the occasions when they are directed so to do in these rules, but also in any circumstances of difficulty and whenever they desire advice or information. Scholars will be regarded as being under the supervision and charge of the Educational Adviser, to whom they should in all cases address any communication they may have to make, and to whom also all reports or other communications having reference to scholars should be sent. The Educational Adviser will bring to the notice of the Secretary of State on behalf of any scholar any question requiring his decision, and will communicate to the scholar the orders passed by the Secretary of State.

2. Every scholar should, on reaching England, at once call upon the Educational Adviser* and report his arrival in writing.

3. Every scholar should, without any unnecessary delay, inform the Educational Adviser to which University or College he is about to proceed, and should at once take steps to enter himself thereat.

4. Every scholar must, within four weeks of reaching England, submit to the Educational Adviser for the approval of the Secretary of State a statement showing the general course of study he proposes to follow; and the course approved must not be changed without the sanction of the Secretary of State.

5. Every scholar must give a written undertaking that he will devote himself exclusively, during the tenure of his scholarship, to the study of the subject for which his scholarship was granted, and that he will return to India on its termination, and there continue to devote himself to the industry which he has studied. Any scholar who neglects his studies, or tries to work for any other profession concurrently, will render himself liable to forfeiture of his scholarship.

6. Every scholar will be required to keep a concise daily diary, to be certified by the authority under whom he is working, and to be submitted at the end of each term through that authority to the Educational Adviser and to the Secretary of State for transmission to India. He must also submit, in the same way, from time to time, full notes of the work on which he is employed.

7. Scholars will be expected to continue their studies during the summer vacations of the Institutions where they are working, with the exception of three weeks in each year. Vacation study should, when possible, take the form of practical work.

8. Every scholar must, at the end of each term of residence at a University or College, submit to the Educational Adviser a certificate from the proper University or College authority, showing that his residence, conduct and progress in study have been satisfactory during the term.

9. Every scholar must at all times obey such instructions as he may receive from the Secretary of State, either directly or through the Educational Adviser.

10. Subject to a due compliance with the above conditions, the allowance, at the rate of £150 a year for two years, or three years if so determined, will be paid quarterly, in advance, by the India Office, commencing from the date of the scholar's reporting his arrival in England; but this allowance will be reduced by the amount of any other sum which may become payable to him out of the revenues of India in respect of residence at a University or College during the same period or any part of it, but not in respect of University or College fees, the cost of which will be separately defrayed by the Secretary of State.

The necessary travelling expenses of scholars, by second class, or by third class, if no second class be available, will also be separately defrayed by the Secretary of State; these should be claimed on forms obtainable from the Accountant General, India Office, S. W.

Charges for hotel bills are not defrayed.

11. Every scholar will forfeit his scholarship who, not being disabled by illness or prevented by any other cause which the Secretary of State may consider sufficient, fails to complete the required term of residence in England according to the terms and conditions approved by the Secretary of State under Rule 4, or who is guilty of misconduct or disregard of the orders of the Secretary of State. If a scholarship be forfeited, or if it be resigned before completion of its term, the scholar will lose his claim to a free return passage to India, and will further become liable to refund the cost of his free passage to England.

No. 4353.—The following draft of a notification which it is proposed to issue under the Agriculturists' Loans Act, 1884 (XII of 1884), is published for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby and notice is given that the draft will be taken into consideration by the Governor in Council on or after the 15th day of January 1910.

2. Any objection or suggestion which may be sent to the Chief Secretary to Government, Financial Department, by any person with respect to the draft before the date fixed aforesaid will be considered by the Governor in Council.

Draft Notification.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 4 of the Agriculturists' Loans Act, 1884 (XII of 1884), the Governor in Council is pleased to amend the special rules as to loans for the purpose of sugar-cane cultivation in the talukas of Purandhar, Bhimthadi and Indapur in the Poona District, published in Government Notification in the Financial Department, No. 3948, dated the 29th September 1903, as follows :—

Amendments.

In Appendices A and B to the said rules, after the clause beginning with the words "And as security....." the following shall be inserted, namely :—

"And I do hereby agree that it shall be lawful for the Secretary of State or his Special or other officers appointed in this behalf to sell the said crop or the jagri made therefrom and to do all acts necessary for the purpose of such sale without the intervention of the Court under section 69 of the Transfer of Property Act, 1882, in either of the following cases, namely :—

- (a) where the said loans or any part thereof have become due and notice in writing requiring payment thereof has been served on me and I have made default in payment for three months after such service, or
- (b) where some interest on the said loans amounting to at least 500 rupees is in arrear and unpaid for three months after becoming due."

INDIAN FOREST SERVICE.

REGULATIONS AS TO THE APPOINTMENT OF PROBATIONERS, 1910.

1. *Appointments.*—The Secretary of State for India in Council will, in the summer of 1910, make not less than ten appointments of Probationers for the Indian Forest Service, provided that so many candidates are considered to be in all respects qualified.

In making these appointments, he will act with the advice of a Selection Committee.

No. 11462.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 7 of the Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879 (Bom. V of 1879), the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the village of Pachegaon, heretofore included in the Khánápur Táluka of the Sátára District, shall, with effect from the 1st day of February 1910, be excluded from the limits of that táluka and be included in the Sangola Táluka of the Sholápur District.

No. 11462(A).—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Indian Registration Act, 1903 (XVI of 1903), the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the village of Pachegaon, heretofore included in the Khánápur sub-district of the Sítára District, shall, with effect from the first day of February 1910, be excluded from the limits of that sub-district and be included in the Sàngola sub-district of the Sholápur District.

2. *Applications for Appointment.*—Applications for appointment must be made on a printed form to be obtained from the Secretary, Judicial and Public Department, India Office, Whitehall, London, S.W., and to be returned to him not later than Friday the 1st July 1910. Candidates must be prepared to present themselves for an interview with the Selection Committee within three weeks from that date.

3. *Age Limit.*—Candidates must be under the age of 23 years on the 1st July 1910.

4. *Nationality, &c.*—Every candidate must be a natural-born British subject. He must be unmarried, and if he marries before he reaches India he will forfeit his appointment. He must be of good physique, and must produce evidence of character to satisfy the Secretary of State for India in Council that he is suited for the Indian Forest Service.

5. *Qualifications.*—Preference will be given to candidates who can show that in addition to a good general education as described in the next paragraph they have passed with honours in a public examination for a degree in some branch of Natural Science held by a University in Great Britain or Ireland.

6. In case the number of duly qualified candidates, who have taken such a degree, is not sufficient to fill the number of appointments, the Secretary of State for India in Council will nominate candidates who bring evidence to show that they have received a good general education, and that they have a good knowledge of Chemistry and Mechanics and Physics as indicated in the appended Syllabus (Appendix I). A good general education should be understood to include, at the least, a fair knowledge of English Composition, Mathematics up to and including Plane Trigonometry, Latin, and either German or French. A knowledge of Greek is not necessary, but is left to the option of the candidates. The production of school certificates granted by the examining authorities of Universities, or of certificates that a candidate has passed the Matriculation Examination of a University, in the subjects named, or of other certificates held by the Secretary of State in Council to be equivalent, will be taken to show that a candidate satisfies the requirements of this clause. Candidates of this class must not be less than 19 years of age on the 1st of July 1910.

Should there be more candidates considered by the Selection Committee to be qualified in every respect than vacancies to be filled, the Secretary of State reserves the right to require them to pass a competitive examination conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners, on the results of which their final selection would depend.

7. *Medical Examination.*—Those candidates who are selected as Probationers will be required to undergo a strict examination by a Medical Board at the India Office, at which particular stress will be laid on good vision and hearing.

On passing this medical examination candidates will be deemed to be Probationers for the Indian Forest Service.

8. *Period of Probation.*—In the case of Probationers who have passed with Honours in Natural Science, as indicated in paragraph 5, the period of probation will extend over two years. In the case of students who have obtained a Diploma in Forestry the period may be two years or less, as may be specially arranged. The probationers will be required to undergo a special course of study at Oxford, and to become members of the University, if not so already. During the vacations they will receive, under suitable supervision, practical instruction in such British and Continental forests as may be selected for the purpose. Excursions are also made for purposes of study in term-time.

In the case of Probationers who have not passed with Honours in Natural Science, the period of probation will extend over about three years.

Probationers must obtain the Diploma of Forestry of the University of Oxford; those who have passed with Honours in Natural Science within two years, and the others within three years. The case of students who have already obtained at another University such a Diploma will be specially considered.

9. *Charges.*—The probationers will be required to defray all expenses of lodging, board, tuition, and excursions while at Oxford, and on practical instruction in Britain and on the Continent, with the exception of fees payable to local forest officers in Britain and on the Continent.

10. *Allowances.*—The Secretary of State for India in Council will pay to each probationer possessing a degree in Natural Science, or a Diploma in Forestry, the sum of 120*l.* annually, or a total of 240*l.* (besides the fees to local officers mentioned above). These payments will be made on the following dates in each year:—

On the 1st December	£ 30
On the 1st March	30
On the 1st June	60

In the case of probationers who have not passed with Honours in Natural Science or obtained a Diploma in Forestry before being appointed probationers, the Secretary of State in Council will give the same total allowance of 240*l.* (in such instalments as may be required to meet the expenses of the practical work) and will defray (as above) the fees payable to local forest officers.

The grant of the allowances is subject to the following conditions:—

(a) that the progress of the probationer in his studies is satisfactory;

(b) that the probationer gives security to refund the payments in case he fails to join the Indian Forest Service at the end of the period of probation.

11. *Conduct.*—Every Probationer will be required to conduct himself during the period of probation in a manner satisfactory to the Secretary of State, and to give evidence of satisfactory progress in his studies in such a manner as may be required, failing which, or in the event of serious misconduct, he will be liable to have his name removed from the list of Probationers.

12. *Appointment and Seniority.*—Probationers who obtain the Diploma of Forestry, and are of sound constitution and free from physical defects which would render them unsuitable for employment in the Indian Forest Service, will be appointed Assistant Conservators in the Indian Forest Department. Their position in the provincial Forest Lists will be determined by the results of the examinations held during their probation; but in making selections for the post of Conservator, officers of the same year are reckoned as equal in seniority.

They will be allowed at the end of the period of probation to state their preference in respect to the Provinces to which they desire to be allotted; but the distribution will be made to the several Provinces according to the needs of the public service, at the discretion of the Secretary of State for India. Officers are, however, at all times liable to be transferred from one Province to another at the pleasure of the Government of India.

13. *Riding.*—Every Probationer, before proceeding to India, will be required to satisfy the Secretary of State, in such manner as may be determined, of his ability to ride.

14. *Articles of Agreement.*—Within a month of his nomination as Assistant Conservator, each nominee must sign articles of agreement describing the terms and conditions of his appointment; he must embark for India when required to do so by the Secretary of State, and must engage his own passage. Failure to embark at the stated time will, in the absence of satisfactory explanation, lead to forfeiture of appointment.

15. *Salary.*—An Assistant Conservator of Forests will draw pay at the rate of Rs. 380 a month (equivalent to 30*l.* a year, when the rupee is at 1*s.* 4*d.*) from the date of his reporting his arrival in India.

16. *Promotion, Leave, Pension, and Provident Fund.*—Promotion, leave, and pension will be governed by the Regulations laid down by the Government of India, and applicable to Forest officers, such regulations being subject to any modifications or alterations which may be made in them from time to time by the Government of India, and their interpretation in case of any doubt arising being left to that Government. A copy of the existing regulation can be seen on application at the India Office.

Certain information regarding appointments in the upper controlling staff of the Indian Forest Service, the pay of which has been recently improved, will be found in Appendix II; a summary of information regarding Leave is contained in Appendix III; and regarding Pensions and the Provident Fund in Appendix IV.

APPENDIX I (referred to in paragraph 6).

SYLLABUS OF SPECIAL SUBJECTS FOR CANDIDATES WHO HAVE NOT PASSED WITH HONOURS IN A PUBLIC EXAMINATION IN NATURAL SCIENCE.

I.—CHEMISTRY.

The simpler chemical and physical properties of common substances, such as lime, salt, sugar, water, air.

The preparation (excluding details of technical processes) and properties of the following substances:—

The metals, tin, lead, iron, copper, zinc, magnesium, calcium, potassium, sodium; their simpler and more important compounds, especially such as occur naturally, and such compounds and alloys as are used in the Arts.

Hydrogen, oxygen, water, ozone, hydrogen-peroxide.

Nitrogen, ammonia, ammonium salts, nitrous oxide, nitric oxide, nitrogen peroxide, nitrates.

Carbon, carbon dioxide, carbonates, carbon monoxide.

Chlorine, bromine, iodine, chlorides, bromides, iodides, chlorates, hypochlorites.

Sulphur, sulphuretted hydrogen, sulphides, sulphur dioxide, sulphur trioxide, sulphites, sulphates.

Phosphorus, phosphoretted hydrogen, phosphorus trioxide, phosphorus pentoxide, orthophosphates, phosphorus trichloride, phosphorous pentachloride.

Silica.

The principles of chemical change; oxidation and reduction; combustion; flame. Allotropy. Methods of purifying bodies. Methods of determining the composition of air and of water. Laws of chemical combination. Diffusion of gases. The atomic and molecular hypotheses. The simpler methods of determining equivalents. General considerations used in determining molecular weights and atomic weights. Chemical notation.

Alcohol, ethane, and the simpler ethylic compounds, considered in detail as typical bodies. Methyl alcohol and methane, and benzylic alcohol and toluene, considered briefly as analogues of alcohol and ethane. Characters of primary normal alcohols in general, and of their corresponding hydrocarbons.

Acetic acid, aldehyd and the simpler acetic compounds, considered in detail as typical bodies. Benzoic acid and benz-aldehyd, and formic acid and form-aldehyd, considered briefly as analogues of acetic acid and aldehyd. Characters of normal mon-acids in general and of their corresponding aldehyds.

Oxalic acid and the simpler oxalic compounds. Characters of normal di-acids in general.

Processes (i) for the detection of carbon, hydrogen, nitrogen, sulphur in organic compounds; (ii) for the estimation of carbon, hydrogen, nitrogen in organic compound; (iii) for the production and analysis of the silver-salts of organic acids and the platinum-salts of organic bases; (iv) for the determination of vapour densities by the V. Meyer method.

The determination of the formula of an organic compound.

PRACTICAL WORK.

The Practical Work should include:—

Simple experiments and preparations illustrating the properties of the inorganic substances named above.

Simple quantitative experiments, such as the determination of the loss of weight on heating a body, the determination of the volume of gas evolved on the solution of zinc in acid. The volumetric estimation of acids and alkalies.

The qualitative analysis of simple salts containing not more than one of the following metals, and one of the following acid radicals:—Sodium, potassium, ammonium, calcium, magnesium, zinc, copper, iron, lead, tin, oxide, carbonate, chloride, sulphate, nitrate, sulphide.

II.—MECHANICS AND PHYSICS.

Mechanics.

The principles of the lever, the inclined plane, the composition of forces, and virtual work, their experimental investigation and application to machines and other simple cases of equilibrium, Centre of gravity, couple, torque, velocity ratio, mechanical advantage, efficiency. Application to liquids and gases. Density. Boyle's law. Pump, siphon, barometer, manometer. Body moving in a straight line so that its velocity changes proportionally with the time. Body moving uniformly in a circle. Motion of pendulum-bob. Momentum, force, impulse of a force, energy, conservation of energy.

Heat.

Simple thermometry. Simple methods of determining latent heats; specific heats; expansion of gases, liquids and solids; vapour pressures. Change of state. Simple experiments on conduction, convection and radiation. Mechanical equivalent of heat.

Sound.

Direct determination of the velocity of sound in air and in water; the effect of change of temperature on the velocity of sound in air; mode of propagation of sound in air. Simple methods of determining the pitch of a note. Characteristics of musical sounds.

Light.

Laws of reflection and refraction. Simple methods of determining refractive indices, and the focal lengths of mirrors and lenses. The simplest form of the compound microscope and of the astronomical telescope. Dispersion, the spectroscope, spectra of different kinds. Simple photometry. Elementary notions of the determination of the velocity of light.

Electricity and Magnetism.

Properties of electrified bodies. Methods of electrification. Electric induction. The gold leaf electroscope. Elementary quantitative notions of electrical quantity, capacity, potential, and specific inductive capacity. Condensers. Properties of magnets. Methods of magnetization. Magnetic induction. Simple methods of determining the declination and dip at a place and of comparing magnetic fields and moments. The construction of the batteries of Volta, Daniell, and Leclanché, and their theory. The secondary battery. The physical and chemical action due to a current. Simple galvanometers, ammeters, and voltmeters. Measurement of current-strength, electromotive force and resistance. The production of currents by electro-magnetic induction. The broad principles of the induction-coil and dynamo.

PRACTICAL WORK.

Simple experiments illustrating the principles stated above.

APPENDIX III.

(See paragraph 16 of the Regulations.)

LEAVE.

1. The following is a summary of the principal regulations relating to the leave admissible to officers appointed to the Indian Forest Service by the Secretary of State from the United Kingdom.

Long Leave.

2. Furlough and special leave with allowances (see paragraph 6) are admissible to an aggregate maximum amount of six years during an officer's service. The amount of furlough "earned" is one-fourth of an officer's active service, and the amount "due" is that amount less any enjoyed.

3. Furlough without medical certificate can, if due, be generally taken after eight years' active service, and again after intervals of not less than three years' continuous service. It is limited to two years at a time.

4. Furlough on medical certificate may be granted (a) to an officer who has rendered three years' continuous service, for not more than two years, but capable of extension up to three years; and (b) to an officer who has not rendered three years' continuous service, up to one year in any case, and up to such longer period, if any (but not exceeding two years in all), as the officer may have furlough "due" to him.

5. The allowances admissible during furlough are:—

- (1) During the first two years of furlough without medical certificate and during so much of furlough with medical certificate as may be "due"—half average salary, subject to certain maximum and minimum limits.
- (2) After the expiration of the period for which the foregoing allowances are admissible—one quarter, of average salary, subject to certain maximum and minimum limits.

Short Leave.

6. Special Leave may be granted at any time for not more than six months, with intervals of six years' service; allowances, calculated as during furlough, are given during the first six months only, whether taken in one or more instalments.

7. Privilege Leave is a holiday which may be granted to the extent of one-eleventh part of the time that an officer has been on duty without interruption; and it may be accumulated up to three months, earned by 33 months' duty. During privilege leave, the officer retains a lien on his appointment, and receives the salary which he would have received if on duty. An interval of not less than six months must elapse between two periods of absence on privilege leave.

The sanctioned appointments in the Imperial Forest Service are allotted to the various provinces as follows:—Burma, 66; Madras, 34; Bombay, 27; Central Provinces, 24; Bengal, 11; United Provinces, 19; Punjab, 12; and Eastern Bengal and Assam, 18.

* The officer holding this appointment draws in addition to the pay of his grade a minimum local allowance of Rs. 200 a month.

† Until he has passed the prescribed Departmental examinations, an Assistant Conservator may not draw pay at a higher rate than Rs. 460 a month. On passing the examinations he will resume drawing pay under the time scale at the rate to which his length of service entitles him.

‡ These draw a local allowance of Rs. 150 a month in addition to their grade pay, with the exception of the Principal of the College, in whose case the allowance is at the rate of Rs. 200 a month.

NOTE.—Under the improved scale of salary shown above, no Exchange Compensation Allowance is granted.

Privilege leave may be prefixed to furlough, special leave, or extraordinary leave without allowances. The whole period of leave thus taken in combination is known as combined leave. Combined leave may not be granted for a period of less duration than six months, nor, except on medical certificate, may it be extended beyond two years.

8. Subsidiary Leave in India for a minimum of 10 days, usually with half average salary, is granted to an officer proceeding on or returning from leave out of India, or on retirement, to enable him to reach the port of embarkation or to rejoin his appointment. It is admissible only at the end and not at the beginning of combined leave.

9. Short Leave is also granted to enable officers to appear at examinations, &c.

10. Extraordinary Leave without allowances may be granted in case of necessity, and, except in certain specified cases, only when no other kind of leave is by rule admissible. It may be granted in continuation of other leave.

General Rules.

11. Leave of absence, whether on furlough or on privilege leave, can never be claimed as of right and is given or refused at the discretion of Government.

12. After five years' continuous absence from duty, an officer is considered to be out of the employment of Government.

13. When leave allowances other than privilege leave pay are paid at the Home Treasury, or in a Colony where the standard of currency is gold, rupees are converted into sterling at the rate of exchange fixed for the time being for the adjustment of financial transactions between the Imperial and Indian Treasuries, unless any other rate has been exceptionally authorised. But for the present the rate of conversion is subject to a minimum of 1s. 6d. to the rupee. Privilege Leave pay when issued from the Home Treasury (this is only admissible when privilege leave is combined with other leave) is converted at 1s. 4d. to the rupee.

APPENDIX IV.

(See paragraph 16 of the Regulations.)

PENSIONS AND PROVIDENT FUND.

1. The following is a summary of the principal pension rules applicable to officers of the Indian Forest Service appointed by the Secretary of State from the United Kingdom.

An officer of the Indian Forest Service is eligible for a pension on voluntary retirement after completing 20 years' qualifying service or attaining the age of 55 years. If at an earlier date he is compelled to retire from the service through ill-health, not occasioned by irregular or intemperate habits, he becomes eligible for an invalid pension or a gratuity according to the length of his service.

The amount of pension or gratuity is regulated as follows:—

After a service of less than 10 years, an invalid gratuity not exceeding one month's emoluments for each completed year of service.

After a service of not less than 10 years, an invalid pension not exceeding the following amounts:—

Officers who have shown special energy and efficiency during an effective service of three years as Inspector-General of Forests or Conservator may, at the discretion of the Government of India, be allowed an additional pension of Rs. 1,000 a year, subject to the condition that the officer must not retire voluntarily before the completion of a total qualifying service of 28 years.

Subject to certain prescribed conditions, rupee pensions are now issued to pensioners residing in countries where the Indian rupee is not legal tender at the rate of exchange of 1s. 9d. the rupee.

2. A General Provident Fund has also been established on the following basis :—
- (a) The contribution is compulsory up to 6½ per cent. on salaries, with voluntary contributions of not more than a further 6¼ per cent. Subscriptions on leave of any kind are optional.
 - (b) Compound interest on such payments is annually credited by Government to each officer subscribing, the rate being at present 4 per cent. per annum.
 - (c) The sum which will thus accumulate to the credit of an officer to be his absolute property, to be handed over to him unconditionally on quitting the service; or in the event of his death before retirement, to his legal representatives.

No. 11584.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 46 of the Bombay Court of Wards Act, 1905 (Bom. I of 1905), the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules under the said Act for the Province of Sind, namely:—

1. (1) These rules may be called the Sind Court of Wards Rules, 1909.
- (2) These rules shall extend to the Province of Sind.
- (3) In these rules "the Act" means the Bombay Court of Wards Act, 1905.

2. The Court of Wards may remove any guardian appointed for the person of a Government Ward for any of the following causes:—

- (a) for abuse of his trust;
- (b) for continued failure to perform the duties of his trust;
- (c) for incapacity to perform the duties of his trust;
- (d) for ill-treatment or neglect to take proper care of his ward;
- (e) for contumacious disregard of any provision of the Act or of any order of the Court of Wards;
- (f) for conviction of an offence implying, in the opinion of the Court of Wards, a defect of character which unfits him to be the guardian of his ward;
- (g) for having an interest adverse to the faithful performance of his duties;
- (h) for ceasing to reside within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards;
- (i) in the case of a female ward, upon her marriage to a husband who is not, in the opinion of the Court of Wards, unfit to be guardian of such ward:

Provided that the Court of Wards shall not remove a guardian appointed by will or other instrument or appointed or declared under the Guardians and Wards Act, 1890, except with the previous consent of the District Court.

3. The Court of Wards may award to a guardian such remuneration as, having regard to all the circumstances of the case, it thinks fit.

4. Any person interested in the good management of the property of a Government Ward under the superintendence of the Court of Wards may be appointed Manager of such property. Where for any reason there is no such person available, any person qualified by character, merit, industry and knowledge may be appointed Manager. A Manager may be appointed for property comprising a single estate or comprising a group of estates as the Court of Wards, having regard to the size and other circumstances of the estate or estates, may deem suitable. The remuneration of such a Manager shall be fixed by the Court of Wards with due regard to the financial condition and other resources of the estate or estates placed under his management.

5. A Manager appointed under the Act may be removed for any of the causes for which a guardian may be removed under rule 2 and for bankruptcy or insolvency and for any special cause rendering it desirable in the opinion of the Court of Wards that he should be removed.

6. (1) The amount of security to be furnished by a Manager shall not be less than is sufficient to cover the maximum receipts which it is estimated may be in the hands of the Manager at any one time.

(2) Such security may consist of a deposit in the Post Office Savings Bank or of a deposit of Government Promissory Notes or a security bond may be executed in form A as the Court of Wards shall deem fit in each case.

(3) The Manager shall, if the amount of the security does not exceed one thousand rupees, furnish at least one surety; in any other case he shall furnish at least two sureties.

7. Managers shall keep such accounts and submit such returns as the Court of Wards may from time to time direct.

8. Servants of the Court of Wards whose duties require them to deal with money, shall furnish such security as the Court of Wards shall deem fit. Such security shall consist either of a deposit in the Post Office Savings Bank or, with the approval of the Court of Wards, any such servant may execute a security bond in form B.

9. The Court of Wards shall submit to the Commissioner in Sind an annual consolidated report upon the estates under its superintendence in form C with such variations as may from time to time be prescribed in this behalf by the Commissioner in Sind. The report shall be submitted by the Commissioner in Sind to the Governor in Council with such remarks, if any, as he may think fit to make.

10. (1) All Government securities and securities the interest whereon is guaranteed by the Government of India or Local Government shall be forwarded to the Accountant-General for safe custody in cases where it is likely that they will be held for a longer period than 12 months.

(2) All securities referred to in sub-rule (1) which are likely to be returned within a period of 12 months, all securities other than those referred to in sub-rule (1), all title deeds, all Savings Bank Pass Books in which deposits are completed, and all jewellery and ornaments, the use of which is not permitted to the ward, shall be deposited for safe custody in either the Táluka or District Treasury, as the Court of Wards may direct.

11. The delegation of powers to Managers shall be notified by notices posted at the offices of the Collector of the district and of the Mukhtiárkar of the táluka and at the *chávdi* or other conspicuous place of the village or villages in which the property concerned is situated.

12. All expenses lawfully incurred in respect of an estate shall be debited to and recovered out of the income of the estate.

13. (1) In the administration of estates under its superintendence the Court of Wards shall be entitled to the services of the establishment entertained by the Manager of Incumbered Estates in Sind, and to the use of all premises, furniture, or other necessary things vested in, or hired or maintained by, the Manager.

(2) The general cost of superintendence and of management respectively shall be defrayed as a common charge and shall be assessed proportionately on the gross produce of the estates under the superintendence of the Court of Wards together with the estates under the protection of the Manager of Incumbered Estates in Sind under Act XX of 1896, as amended by Act II of 1906.

14. (1) The notification under section 13 (1) of the Act shall be in form D. It shall be published in the *Sind Official Gazette*, and copies of it in Sindhi shall be sent for publication to all Mukhtiárkars of the district or districts in which the property is situated.

(2) The notice prescribed by sub-section (1) of section 14 of the Act shall be in form E. It shall be published in the *Sind Official Gazette*, and also in one or, if the Court of Wards thinks it necessary, in more newspapers. A copy of such notice shall be sent to each of such persons as are known to be creditors and a copy of it shall be posted at the offices of the Collector of the district, and of the Mukhtiárkar of the táluka and at the *chávdi* or other conspicuous place of the village or villages, within which the ward resides or within which any portion of his immoveable property is situated.

15. The schedule of debts and liabilities required to be submitted by the Court of Wards to the Commissioner in Sind under section 18 of the Act shall be in form I and shall be accompanied by a report containing a careful review of the financial position of the estate, and by the following sub-schedules:—

- (1) Sub-schedule of landed property (including arable land and house property) in form II.
- (2) Sub-schedule of moveable property showing the value of personal property owned by the estate under the classes "(i) cash, (ii) jewels, (iii) grain, (iv) other," the total amount of the debts including takávi advances and arrears of rent due to the estate and the amount under each head which is probably recoverable.
- (3) Statement showing the estimated realizations from the estate and the manner in which it is proposed to dispose of them in form III.
- (4) Account current of the estate showing the result of management during the period prior to the submission of the report in form IV.

16. The Court of Wards shall keep the following registers and accounts:—

- (1) A register of securities furnished under rules 6 and 8 in form V.
- (2) An inventory of all the property belonging to each estate in form VI.
- (3) A Day Book of receipts and expenditure in form VII.
- (4) A classified register of receipts and expenditure for each estate in form VIII.
- (5) A register of receipts and payments on account of personal deposits in form IX.
- (6) A register of advances in form X.

- (7) A statement showing the running accounts of creditors of each estate in form XI.
 (8) Register of demands, collections and balances for each estate in form XII.
 (9) Statement showing the financial position of each estate at the end of each year in form XIII.
17. The accounts to be kept by the Court of Wards shall be for the revenue year commencing with the 1st August and ending with the 31st July.
18. The Court of Wards and its subordinates shall promptly pay into the Treasury all collections of money.
19. All sums required for expenditure shall be drawn from the Treasury by cheques.
20. Where the Court of Wards withdraws its superintendence from the property of a Government Ward, the following records and documents shall ordinarily and subject to the provisions of rule 21 be made over to the land-holder, namely:—
- (1) Correspondence between the Court of Wards and the vendor or vendee regarding any purchase or sale of property made on behalf of the estate, together with all documents affecting the purchase or sale.
 - (2) Correspondence between the Court of Wards and any persons who have any claims against or are indebted to the estate regarding such claims and all documents appertaining thereto.
 - (3) Correspondence between the Court of Wards and lessees regarding leases granted by the Court of Wards.
 - (4) Papers connected with proceedings in Civil, Revenue or Criminal Courts, relating to the person or property of a Government Ward.
 - (5) Such statement of accounts as may suffice to show clearly the financial position of the estate at the time of its release from management.

Note.—Copies of any accounts or vouchers will be given on application at the expense of the land-holder and free examination of the accounts will be permitted to him.

- (6) Bonds and other documents securing repayment of money to the estate.

21. The Court of Wards may, in its discretion, direct that any of the records and documents referred to in rule 20 shall not be made over to the land-holder, and may in its discretion, on the application of the land-holder, direct that any documents or records not referred to in rule 20 shall be made over to the land-holder.

- The licensee of each conveyance shall provide for the driver a dress to be approved by the Superintendent of Police.
- Each licensee will be required to keep a spare pair of ponies for each conveyance for change half way between Jalgaon and Chondi at the foot of the Ghát.
- The fares shown in the Table are for the single journey; for a return journey the fare shall be half that for the single journey, provided that the period of detention at the end of the outward journey does not exceed one hour. If it exceeds one hour, the driver shall be entitled to charge full fares as shown in the Table.
- If a conveyance engaged for the day is detained after sunset the rate per hour for every hour of such detention shall be payable in addition to the rate for the day.
- All tolls shall be payable by the licensee. Conveyances will be licensed to carry four passengers in addition to the driver. Children in arms will not be counted, and two children not in arms but under the age of 12 will be counted as one passenger.
- Conveyances shall not be used for the carriage of goods except personal luggage of passengers, and no conveyances carrying the full complement of passengers shall carry in addition more than 15 seers of luggage per passenger.
- It shall not be obligatory on the owner of any conveyance to carry less than the full complement of passengers for less than the full fare for the conveyance. If there is only one passenger he cannot claim to pay for one seat only, but must pay for the whole conveyance and similarly for two or three passengers.
- Drivers of public conveyances must keep to the left side of the road, except when passing another conveyance in front of them. But they must under no circumstances take the right side if, in so doing, they obstruct a conveyance coming from the opposite direction.
- No pony shall be used in a licensed conveyance if below 12-2 hands in height.
- All tongas shall be supplied with 2 clear burning lights during the period between three-quarters of an hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, except when there is sufficient moonlight to render such lights unnecessary.

12. Licensees of tongas shall, when the yearly licenses and the numbers are renewed, bring their tongas and ponies to the office of the District Superintendent of Police or to anyone authorised by him in this behalf for inspection, and shall satisfy him that the tongas, ponies and harness are in all respects in sufficiently good order and otherwise fit for the purpose intended, and that the drivers are clean, steady and capable.

13. Every driver shall, when engaged in his occupation, be cleanly and decently clothed.
