GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS, APPOINTMENTS, &c.

NOTIFICATIONS.

LEGAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 22nd December 1909.

No. 932.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Indian Councils Act, 1909 (IX Edw. VII, c. 4), the Governor in Council, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, is pleased to make the following *Rules for the discussion of Matters of General Public Interest* at meetings of the Legislative Council :—

- I. In these rules-
- (1) "President" means-
 - (a) the Governor, or
 - (b) the Vice-President appointed by the Governor under section 4 of the Indian Councils Act, 1909, or
 - (c) the member appointed to preside under rule 26.

(2) "Member in charge" means the member of the Council of the Governor to whom is allotted the business of the Department of the Government of Bombay to which the subject under discussion belongs and includes any member to whom such member in charge may delegate any function assigned to him under these rules; and

(3) "Secretary" means the officer holding the appointment of Assistant to the Remembrancer of Legal Affairs; but all the acts which the Secretary is required or authorised to do by these rules may be done by the Remembrancer of Legal Affairs or by a Secretary, Under Secretary or Assistant Secretary to the Government of Bombay.

Matters open to discussion.

2. Any matter of general public interest may be discussed in Council subject to the following conditions and restrictions.

- 3. No such discussion shall be permitted in regard to any of the following subjects, namely :---
 - (a) any subject removed from the cognizance of the Legislative Council of the Governor by section 43 of the Indian Councils Act, 1861; or
 - (b) any matter affecting the relations of His Majesty's Government, or of the Governor General in Council, or of the Governor in Council with any Foreign State or any Native State in India, or relating to the internal affairs of any such Native State;
 - (c) except with the sanction of the Governor, any matter which is the subject of discussion between the Governor General in Council or the Secretary of State and the Local Government; or
 - (d) any matter under adjudication by a Court of Law having jurisdiction in any part of His Majesty's dominions.

Resolutions.

4. Subject to the restriction contained in rule 3 any member may move a resolution relating to a matter of general public interest :

Provided that no resolution shall be moved which does not comply with the following conditions, namely :---

- (a) it shall be in the form of a specific recommendation addressed to the Governor in Council;
- (b) it shall be clearly and precisely expressed and shall raise a definite issue;
- (c) it shall not contain arguments, inferences, ironical expressions or defamatory statements, nor shall it refer to the conduct or character of persons except in their official or public capacity.

5. A member who wishes to move a resolution shall give notice in writing to the Secretary at least ten clear days before the meeting of the Council at which he desires to move the same and shall, together with the notice, submit a copy of the resolution which he wishes to move :

Provided that the President may allow a resolution to be moved with shorter notice than ten days, and may, in any case, require longer notice or may extend the time for moving the resolution.

6. (1) The Secretary shall submit every resolution of which notice has been given to him in accordance with rule 5 to the President, who may either admit it or, when any resolution is not framed in accordance with rule 4, cause it to be returned to the member concerned for the purpose of amendment.

(2) If the member does not, within such time as the President may fix in this behalf, re-submit the resolution duly amended, the resolution shall be deemed to have been withdrawn.

7. The President may disallow any resolution or part of a resolution without giving any reason therefor other than that in his opinion it cannot be moved consistently with the public interest or that it should be moved in the Legislative Council of another Local Government or of the Governor General.

8. (1) No discussion in Council shall be permitted in respect of any order of the President under rule 6 or rule 7.

(2) A resolution that has been disallowed shall not be entered in the proceedings of the Council.

9. Resolutions admitted by the President shall be entered in the list of business of the meeting in order of priority, which shall be determined by ballot to be held by the Secretary at such time and place as the President may direct:

Provided that the President may give priority to any resolution which he may consider to be of urgent public interest, or postpone the moving of any resolution.

Discussion of Resolutions.

10. The discussion of resolutions shall take place after all the other business of the meeting has been concluded.

11. (1) After the mover of a resolution has spoken, other members may speak to the motion in such order as the President may direct, and thereafter the mover may speak once by way of reply.

(2) No member other than the mover and the member in charge shall speak more than once to any motion except, with the permission of the President, for the purpose of making an explanation.

12. No speech, except with the permission of the President, shall exceed fifteen minutes in duration :

Provided at a mover c. A resolution, when moving the same, and the member in charge may speak for thirsy minutes.

13. (1) Every member shall speak from his place, shall rise when he speaks and shall address the chair.

(2) If at any time the President rises, any member speaking shall immediately resume his seat.

14. Any member may send his speech in print to the Secretary not less than two clear days before the day fixed for the discussion of a resolution, with as many copies as there are members, and the Secretary shall cause one of such copies to be supplied to every member.

15. The discussion of a resolution shall be limited to the subject of the resolution, and shall not extend to any matter as to which a resolution may not be moved.

16. When a resolution is under discussion any member may, subject to all the conditions and restrictions relating to resolutions specified in rules 3 and 4, move an amendment to such resolution : Provided that a purely negative amendment may not be moved.

17. A member who has moved a resolution or an amendment of a resolution may withdraw the same unless some member desires that it be put to the vote.

18. When, in the opinion of the President, a resolution and any amendment thereto have been sufficiently discussed he may close the discussion by calling upon the mover to reply and the member in charge to submit any final observations which he may wish to make:

Provided that the President may in all cases address the Council before putting the question to the vote.

19. (1) When an amendment to any resolution is moved, or when two or more such amendments are moved, the President shall, before taking the sense of the Council thereon, state or read to the Council the terms of the original motion and of the amendment or amendments proposed.

(2) It shall be in the discretion of the President to put first to the vote either the original motion or any of the amendments which may have been brought forward.

20. If any resolution involves many points, the President at his discretion may divide it, so that each point may be determined separately.

21. (1) Every question shall be resolved in the affirmative or in the negative according to the majority of votes.

(2) Votes may be taken by voices or by division and shall be taken by division if any member so desires.

(3) The President shall determine the method of taking votes by division.

General.

22. The President may assign such time as with due regard to the public interest he may consider reasonable for the discussion of resolutions or of any particular resolution; every resolution which shall not have been put to the vote within the time so assigned shall be considered to have been withdrawn.

23. Every resolution, if carried, shall have effect only as a recommendation to the Governor in Council.

24. When a question has been discussed at a meeting of the Council or when a resolution has been disallowed under rule 7 or withdrawn under rule 17 no resolution or amendment raising substantially the same question shall be moved within one year.

25. (1) The President shall preserve order, and all points of order shall be decided by him.

(2) No discussion on any point of order shall be allowed unless the President shall think fit to take the opinion of the Council thereon.

(3) Any member may at any time submit a point of order to the decision of the President.

(4) The President shall have all powers necessary for the purpose of enforcing his decisions.

26. The Governor may appoint a member of the Council to preside in his place, or in that of the Vice-President, on any occasion on which a matter of general public interest is discussed in the Council.

27. The President, for sufficient reason, may suspend any of the foregoing rules.

No. 934.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Indian Councils Act, 1909 (IX Edw. VII, c. 4), the Governor in Council, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, is pleased to make the following *Rules for the asking of Questions* at meetings of the Legislative Council :—

- 1. In these rules---
- (1) "President" means
 - (a) the Governor, or

 (b) the Vice-President appointed by the Governor under section 4 of the Indian Councils Act, 1909;

(2) "Member in charge" means the member of the Council of the Governor to whom is allotted the business of the Department of the Government of Bombay to which the subject of the question belongs, and includes any member to whom such member in charge may delegate any function assigned to him under these rules; and

(3) "Secretary" means the officer holding the appointment of Assistant to the Remembrancer of Legal Affairs; but all the acts which the Secretary is required or authorized to do by these rules may be done by the Remembrancer of Legal Affairs or by a Secretary, Under Secretary or Assistant Secretary to the Government of Bombay.

2. Any question may be asked by any member subject to the following conditions and restrictions,

- 3. No question shall be permitted in regard to any of the following subjects, namely :--
 - (a) any matter affecting the relations of His Majesty's Government or of the Governor General in Council or of the Governor in Council with any Foreign State or any Native State in India or relating to the internal affairs of any such Native State, or
 - (b) any matter under adjudication by a Court of Law having jurisdiction in any part of His Majesty's dominions.
- No question shall be asked unless it complies with the following conditions, namely :---
 - (a) it shall be so framed as to be merely a request for information,
 - (b) it shall not be of excessive length,
 - (c) it shall not contain arguments, inferences, ironical expressions, or defamatory statements, nor shall it refer to the conduct or character of persons except in their official or public capacity, and
 - (d) it shall not ask for an expression of an opinion or the solution of a hypothetical proposition.

5. In matters which are or have been the subject of controversy between the Governor General in Council or the Secretary of State and the Local Government no question shall be asked except as to matters of fact, and the answer shall be confined to a statement of facts.

6. A member who wishes to ask a question shall give notice in writing to the Secretary at least ten clear days before the meeting of the Council at which he desires to put the question and shall, together with the notice, submit a copy of the question which he wishes to ask :

Provided that the President may allow a question to be put with shorter notice than ten days and may in any case require longer notice or may extend the time for answering a question.

7. The President may disallow any question, or any part of a question without giving any reason therefor other than that in his opinion it cannot be answered consistently with the public interests or that it should be put in the Legislative Council of another Local Government or of the Governor General.

8. No discussion in Council shall be permitted in respect of any order of the President under rule 7.

9. Questions which have been allowed shall be entered in the list of business for the day and shall be put in the order in which they stand in the list before any other business is entered upon at the meeting.

10. Questions shall be put and answers given in such manner as the President may in his discretion determine.

11. Any member who has asked a question may put a supplementary question for the purpose of further elucidating any matter of fact regarding which a request for information has been made in his original question.

12. The member in charge may decline to answer a supplementary question without notice, in which case the supplementary question may be put only in the form of a fresh question at a subsequent meeting of the Council.

13. These rules, except rule 6, apply also to supplementary questions :

Provided that the President may disallow any supplementary question without giving any reason therefor.

14. The President may rule that an answer to a question in the list of business for the day shall be given on the ground of public interest even though the question may have been withdrawn.

15. No discussion shall be permitted in respect of any question or of any answer given to a question.

16. All questions asked and the answers given shall be entered in the proceedings of the Council:

Provided that no question which has been disallowed by the President shall be so entered.

17. The President may assign such time as, with due regard to the public interests, he may consider reasonable for the putting and answering of questions.

Tolls.

1. No tolls will be levied on goods imported into the port for transhipment on through bills of lading, or goods which are manifested for transhipment by the importing vessel.

Packages of Coffee brought into Aden by sea, ready packed and marked, for export to foreign ports, will be treated as transhipment cargo.

Wharfage.

2. Transhipment goods referred to in clause 1, if placed on the wharves, etc., belonging to the Port Trust, will be liable to the usual wharfage fees for landing and shipping.

Time from which rent is chargeable.

3. Import goods will be allowed on the wharves five clear days free of rent after landing, after which period rent will be charged as shown in column 8 of the Schedule of Tolls, Rates and Charges.

4. Export goods brought for shipment will be allowed five clear days free of rent, if the goods be kept in the open on the wharf, after which period-rent will be charged as shown in column 8 of the Schedule of Tolls, Rates and Charges.

5. Goods brought for shipment but which may not be shipped but removed from the wharf inland, will be charged rent from the date on which they are brought for shipment.

6. Part shipments shut out owing to no fault of the shipper, but because of the vessel being full, shall, if removed inland, receive benefit of the free days, as if the goods had been taken by the vessel.

7. Shut-out cargo brought back to the wharf will not be liable to further wharfage on the shipment of goods, and such cargo will be allowed to lie on the wharf free of rent for 48 hours.

8. Warehouse rent will be levied at the rates detailed in column 8 of the Schedule of Tolls,. Rates and Charges from the date from which the goods are placed in the warehouse.

9. When goods lying on the wharf are removed to the warehouse at the instance of the Board, after the expiration of the free days allowed, a charge at the rates detailed in column 9 of the Schedule of Tolls, Rates and Charges will be levied.

10. In computing the number of free days allowed, Sundays and close holidays will beomitted.

No. 7156.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 1, sub-section (3), of the Bombay Motor-vehicles Act, 1904 (Bombay II of 1904), the Governor in Council is pleased in supersession of Government Notification in the General Department, No. 3862, dated the 25th July 1904, to exempt from the operation of the said Act the following classes of vehicle, namely :-

- (1) Steam rollers.
- (2) Motor rollers.

No. 7157.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 10 of the Bombay Motor-vehicles Act, 1904 (Bombay II of 1904), and in supersession of Government Notification in the Judicial Department, No. 5923, dated the 5th November 1906, as amended from time to time, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules to regulate the use of Motor-vehicles in the Bombay Presidency excluding Aden :—

RULES.

·I.-Preliminary.

Short title, extent and definition. 1. (1) These rules may be called the Motorvehicles Rules, 1909.

(2) They shall extend to the whole of the Bombay Presidency, except Aden.

- (3) In these rules
- (a) "registering authority" shall mean in Sind the District Magistrate of Karáchi and elsewhere the Commissioner of Police for the City of Bombay or the District Superintendent of Police, Poona; and
- (b) "the Act" shall mean the Bombay Motor-vehicles Act, 1904;
- (c) the expression "motor-cycle" means a two, three or four-wheeled cycle propelled by mechanical means, fitted with seats, but without a carriage body and weighing not more than 5 cwt.;
- (d) the expression "heavy motor-vehicle" Heavy motor-vehicle.

exceeding two tons in

weight, unladen;

(e) the expression "trailer" means any vehicle drawn by or attached to a motorvehicle;

(f) the expression "axle weight" means, in relation to an axle weight.

axle of a heavy motor-vehicle or of a trailer, the aggregate weight transmitted to the surface of the road or other base whereon the heavy motor-vehicle or the trailer moves or rests by the several wheels attached to that axle when the heavy motor-vehicle or trailer is loaded; (g) the expression "registered axle weight" Registered axle weight. means, in relation to an axle of a

heavy motor-vehicle, the axle weight of that axle as registered by the licensing authorities in pursuance of the rules;

 (h) the expression "weight," in relation to Weight. weight of the when unladen, means the weight of the vehicle exclusive of the weight of any water, fuel or accumulators used for the purpose of propulsion;

(i) the expression "width," in relation to the tire of a wheel, means Width. the distance measured horizontally and in a straight line across the circumference of the wheel and between the two points in the outer surface of the tire which are farthest apart;

(j) the expression "diameter," in relation Diameter. diameter measured between the two opposite points in the outer surface of the tire which are farthest apart.

II.-Registration.

2. (1) No motor-vehicle shall be used unless Registration. it has been first registered by the registering

authority, and any motor-vehicle which has been already registered in accordance with any other enactment in force for the time being in any part of British India shall,—

- (a) if intended for use in the City of Bombay, be registered within 24 hours, or
- (b) if intended for use in any other part of the Bombay Presidency shall be registered within 72 hours :

Provided that no person shall be liable under Proviso. clause (b) of this rule if he has had no reason-

able opportunity of registering the motorvehicle in accordance therewith.

Provided also that it shall not be necessary to re-register vehicles which have already been registered under the Act.

(2) The fee for registration shall be four rupces for motor-cycles and sixteen rupces for all other motor-vehicles. There shall be no fee for registering motor-vehicles which have been already registered under any other enactment in force in British India.

3. (1) The registering authority shall Number, transfer of assign a distinguishing number to the motor-

vehicle and shall record the name and address of the owner.

(2) Numbers assigned to motor-vehicles other than motor-vehicles intended to ply for hire

- (a) at Bombay shall be shown in white figures on a black ground,
- (b) at Karáchi shall be shown in red figures on a white ground, and
- (bb) at Poona shall be shown in white figures on a red ground ;

- (c) the numbers shall be of the following dimensions painted on a plate which shall be rigidly affixed in a conspicuous place on the front and back of the motor and on the back of any vehicle drawn by the motor-vehicle :---
 - Height of each figure $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches, uniform thickness $\frac{3}{4}$ inch, each figure occupying a space of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches with 1 inch between each figure, and a margin of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch at the top, bottom and sides of the plate :

(d) No number shall in any way be obscured, or rendered, or allowed to become, not easily discernible at a reasonable distance.

(3) Every transfer of ownership shall forthwith be intimated to the registering authority by the registered owner and for every such transfer the registered owner shall pay a fee of one rupee in the case of a motor-cycle and three rupees for any other motor-vehicle.

(4) The registering authority may assign to a manufacturer of, or dealer in, motor-vehicles, on payment of an annual fee of thirty rupees, a general number which, together with a distinguishing alphabetical letter of the same dimensions as the numbers, shall be affixed as laid down in rule (2) (c) to any motor-vehicle when on trial after completion, or when on trial by an intending purchaser. Provided that such motor-vehicle shall not ply or be let for hire unless it has been separately registered under rule 2.

4. (1) Before registering a motor-vehicle, Requirements before registering authority shall be satisfied (a) that it is provided with two independent brakes or other means of stoppage in good working order and of such efficiency that the application of either is capable of promptly stopping the motor-vehicle whether going forwards or backwards; (b) if such motor-vehicle is propelled by steam that

i. it is so constructed as to consume its own smoke as far as practicable,

ii. it is fitted with an efficient "spark arrester".

(c) If such motor-vehicle is propelled otherwise than by steam that it is so used that no smoke or visible vapour is emitted therefrom except from any temporary or accidental cause.

(2) Before registering a heavy motor-vehicle the registering authority shall also satisfy himself that the tires of the wheels of the vehicle, if the tires are not pneumatic, or are not made of a soft or elastic material, are of the dimensions required by the special rules for heavy motor-vehicles, and may also have the weight of the heavy motor-vehicle, and if he thinks necessary, the axle weight of each wheel ascertained in such manner as he may by general or special order direct.

(3) In the case of applications for the registration of motor-vehicles outside the cities of Bombay, Poona and Karáchi, the registering authority may accept the certificate of the District Superintendent of Police of the district from which the application is made that the requirements of sub-rule (1) and where that applies, sub-rule (2) are, in any particular case, in his opinion specially complied with.

5. Where the registering authority at any Subsequent defects. time after a motorvehicle has been registered, considers, on the report of any District Superintendent of Police or otherwise, that it has ceased to comply with the requirements of sub-rule (1) of rule 4, or, if the vehicle is a heavy motor-vehicle, any of the special rules for heavy motor-vehicles, or that it has not

for heavy motor-vehicles, or that it has not been maintained in such a condition as to prevent danger to the public, such registering authority may, after notice to the registered owner, direct that the registration be cancelled until such time as the defects are rectified to its satisfaction.

III.-General.

6. A motor-vehicle shall be driven in accord-

Driving on the right side of the road. left of the road except when passing horses

and other vehicles going in the same direction which should be passed on the right, and provided that it should ordinarily pass a tramcar on the left or near side whether it be going in the same or the contrary direction.

7. (1) A motor-vehicle shall not be driven Reckless driving. in a public road or place recklessly or negligently

or at a speed or in a manner which is likely to endanger human life or to cause hurt or injury to any person or animal or damage to any vehicle or property or which would be otherwise than reasonable and proper having regard to all the circumstances of the case including the nature, condition and use of the road, and to the amount of traffic which is actually on it at the time, or which may reasonably be expected to be on it:

Provided always that under no circumstances Speed limit. shall a motor-vehicle be driven within the limits of the City of Bombay at a greater speed than

15 miles an hour. Provided also that when passing through or near any road-side village, within such limits as the District Magistrate may indicate by means of notice boards, motor-drivers shall not allow the speed to exceed 6 miles an hour or

such higher rate as may be shown on the

board.

(2) The speed at which a heavy motorvehicle is driven on any public road shall not exceed 7 miles an hour.

Provided that-

1

- (a) if the weight of the motor-vehicle unladen exceeds three tons, or
- (b) if the registered axle weight of any axle exceeds six tons, or
- (c) if a trailer is attached to the heavy motor-vehicle, the speed shall not exceed five miles an hour.
- Provided also that-
 - If the heavy motor-vehicle has all its wheels fitted with pneumatic tires or with tires of a soft or elastic material, the speed at which the heavy motorvehicle may be driven on any public road shall not exceed-
 - (a) twelve miles an hour where the registered axle weight of any axle does not exceed six tons ;
 - (b) seven miles an hour where such registered axle weight exceeds six tons.
- 8. A motor-vehicle shall not be driven in

Prohibition as to use of motor-vehicles on foot-paths in certain localities. any footway nor shall such be driven in any road or public place where such traffic may,

for the time being, be prohibited by the licensing authority.

9. (1) The person in charge of a motorvehicle shall obey all

Directions in regulation directions of Police of traffic.

of traine. officers posted or sta-tioned at crossings or other places for the regulation of traffic and shall cause the motorvehicle to stop and to remain stationary so long as may reasonably be necessary

- (a) when requested to do so by any Police officer for the purpose of ascertaining his name and address or for any other reasonable purpose or
- (b) when approaching restive horses or animals or when requested to do so by any person having charge of a restive horse or animal, or
- (c) when an accident occurs to any person or to any animal or vehicle in charge of any person owing to the presence of the motor-vehicle on the road.

(2) The request referred to above may be made by such Police officer or person by putting up his hand as a signal or at night in such a manner as the licensing authority may direct.

(3) The person in charge of a motor-vehicle shall, on request of any Police officer, or on the occurrence of an accident such as is referred to in sub-rule (I) (c) above, on the request of any other person truly state his request of any other person truly state his name and address and the name and place of abode or business of the owner, and shall further render all possible assistance to any person injured, and if there be no Police officer present shall give intimation of the accident at the nearest Police station.

10. Every person driving a motor-vehicle shall have ready and Motor-vehicles to carry horns.

available for immediate use a suitable horn or,

in the case of a motor-cycle, a suitable horn or bell, capable of giving audible and sufficient warning of his approach or position, and shall sound the same whenever expedient to prevent danger to any of the public.

11. No person shall drive a motor vehicle between half an hour Motor-vehicles to carry after sunset and half an lamps. hour before sunrise. without three lighted lamps of suitable character and illumination affixed thereto, one on either side of the front portion and one at the back of such motor-vehicle, the light at the back having a red glass facing to the rear and a white glass at the side thereby illuminating and rendering the number of the vehicle easily distinguishable :

Provided that acetyline gas lamps shall not be used for the above Proviso.

Proviso. purpose unless the same are properly hooded or screened to the satis-faction of the registering authority, but such hooding or screening shall not be insisted upon outside the City of Bombay or elsewhere outside any local limits specially notified by the District Magistrate.

Provided also that one lamp shall be sufficient in the case of a motor-cycle.

12. No person shall drive a motor-vehicle (a) unless it is at all Maintenance.

13. No motor-vehicle shall be allowed to stand in any street or public place unattended by a person licensed under section 4, subsection (2), of the Act, unless all reasonable precautions have been taken to ensure that it cannot be put in motion in the absence of the driver, or, if such motor-vehicle is propelled by steam, unless its fires have been extinguished and it has ceased to contain in itself sufficient power to move.

The driver of a motor-vehicle shall not cause the vehicle to travel backwards for a greater distance or time than may be requisite for purposes of safety or in order to turn

15. A manufacturer or a dealer in motorvehicles shall keep a Register to be kept. as the registering authority may direct showing the name of the driver and the hours and register in such forms dates on which he was in charge of the vehicle.

Such register shall be open to inspection on the demand of any Police officer of or above the rank of Sub-Inspector.

16. No motor competition, reliability trial, Motor competition or reliability trials. part, shall be permitted on any public road without the previous sanction of Government.

IV .- Special Rules for heavy motor-vehicles.

17. On every application to a registering Registration of weights. authority for the regis-

motor-vehicle and for permission to ply for hire the applicant shall declare

(a) the weight of the heavy motor-vehicle unladen,

(b) the axle weight of each axle,

(c) the diameter of each wheel.

18. Upon receiving from the licensing Registered weight to be retried on the vehicle.

Registered weight to be printed on the vehicle. entries made in the register relating to a heavy motor-vehicle or trailer, the owner of the motor-vehicle shall cause

(a) the registered weight of the heavy motorvehicle or trailer unladen, and

(b) the registered axle weight of each axle

to be printed or otherwise plainly marked in letters not less than one inch in height, and in such a manner as to be legible at a reasonable distance, upon some conspicuous part of the right or off side of every heavy motor-vehicle or trailer.

This rule shall not apply to trailers not exceeding one ton in weight unladen.

19. (i) The axle weight of an axle of a heavy motor-vehicle shall not exceed the

registered axle weight.

(ii) The registered maximum axle weight of any axle of a heavy motor-vehicle shall not exceed eleven tons and the axle weight of a trailer shall not exceed seven tons.

(iii) The sum of the registered axle weights of all the axles of a heavy motor-vehicle shall not exceed sixteen tons.

20. The tires of each wheel of a heavy motor-vehicle or trailer, unless the tires are pneumatic or made of a soft or elastic material, shall be smooth and shall, where the tire touches the surface of the road or other base whereon the heavy motor-vehicle moves or rests, be flat, provided that the edges of the tire may be bevelled or rounded to the extent in the case of each edge of not more than half an inch:

Provided also that :--

(i) if the tire is constructed of separate plates, the plates may be separated by parallel spaces which shall be disposed throughout the outer surface of the tire, so that nowhere shall the aggregate extent of the space or spaces in the course of a straight line drawn horizontally across the circumference of the wheel exceed one-eighth part of the width of the tire.

- (ii) the driving wheels of a heavy motorvehicle shall be cylindrical and smoothsoled, or shod with diagonal cross-bars of not less than three inches in width nor more than three quarters of an inch in thickness extending the full breadth of the tire, and the space intervening between each such cross-bar shall not exceed three inches.

- (b) The width shall be not less than that number of half inches which is equal to the number of units of registered axleweight of the axle to which the wheel is attached.

The unit of registered axlc-weight shall vary according to the diameter of the wheel, and the rules set forth in the subjoined scale; that is to say—

(i) if the wheel is 3 feet in diameter, the unit of registered axle-weight shall be 7½ cwts.;

(ii) if the wheel exceeds 3 feet in diameter, the unit of registered axle-weight shall be 7½ cwts, with an addition of weight in the proportion of one hundredweight for every 12 inches by which the diameter is increased beyond 3 feet; and in the same proportion for any increase which is greater or less than 12 inches; and

(iii) if the wheel is less than 3 feet in diameter, the unit of registered axle-weight shall be $7\frac{1}{2}$ cwts, with a deduction of weight in the proportion of one hundredweight for every 6 inches by which the diameter is reduced below 3 feet; and in the same proportion for any reduction which is greater or less than 6 inches.

(2) This rule shall not apply to any tire which is pneumatic or which is made of a soft or elastic material, or to trailers not exceeding one ton in weight unladen.

22. The diameter of a wheel of a heavy Size of wheels. motor-vehicle or trailor, if the wheel is fitted

with a tire which is not preumatic or is not made of a soft or elastic material, shall be not less than two feet.

25. (1) Each trailer attached to a heavy motor-vehicle shall have a brake approved by the licensing authority and each trailer shall carry upon it a person competent to apply the brake efficiently, provided that where the brakes upon the motor-vehicle to which any trailer is attached are so constructed and arranged that neither of them can be used without bringing into action simultaneously the brake attached to the trailer, or if the brake of the trailer can be applied from the motorvehicle independently of the brakes of the latter, the above conditions need not be complied with.

(2) No heavy motor-vehicle used on any street or road shall have attached to it more than three trailers.

26. A trailer shall not be attached to a Vehicles for the conveyance of passengers.

except under a permit granted by the Governor in Council or by an officer authorized by Government in this behalf.

27. (i) Where the registering authority or elsewhere than in Bom-

Use of motor-vehicles on bridges.

elsewhere than in Bombay, Poona and Karáchi, the District Magistrate

or the Executive Engineer or a local board or Municipality or Railway Administration affixes or sets up in suitable and conspicuous positions, on each approach to a bridge, forming part of a highway, notices which, as regards all their contents or subject-matter, shall be clearly and distinctly legible and visible by persons approaching the bridge, and which state that the bridge is insufficient to carry a heavy motorvehicle, the registered axle weight of which exceeds that specified in the said notice board, the owner of any such heavy motor-vehicle shall not cause or suffer the motor-vehicle to be driven, and the person driving or in charge of the motor-vehicle shall not drive the motorvehicle upon the bridge.

(ii) The owner of a heavy motor-vehicle shall not cause or suffer the motor-vehicle to be driven, the person driving or in charge of the heavy motor-vehicle shall not drive the motorvehicle, upon a bridge forming part of a highway at any time when another heavy motorvehicle or a locomotive is on the bridge, the combined weights of which would exceed the carrying capacity of the bridge.

28. When a heavy motor-vehicle is used on any road or street two persons shall be employed in driving or attending to such vehicle.

29. The cylinder taps of a heavy motorvehicle propelled by steam shall not be opened within sight of any person riding, driving, leading or in charge of any horse upon the road or street, nor shall the steam be allowed to attain a pressure so as to exceed the limit fixed by the safety valve, so that no steam shall blow off when the vehicle is upon the road or street.

30. No heavy motor-vehicle, or class of heavy motor-vehicles, shall be driven in any street or road wherein such traffic may for the time being be prohibited in Bombay by the Commissioner of Police, in Poona by the District Superintendent of Police, and elsewhere by the District Magistrate.

31. Every applicant for registration of a heavy motor-vehicle shall make a declaration in the form of Schedule D and append it to his application for registration.

V.-Ghat Roads and Hill-stations.

32. The following rules shall be in force on the ghát roads specified in Schedule E which will be revised from time to time as Government may prescribe. On all such roads motorists shall proceed with special caution.

33. In the following rules-

- "Night" means the period from half an hour after sunset to half an hour before sunrise. The "outside" of the road on a ghát means the side from which the slope of the hill is downwards.
- A "ghát" or "ghát road" means a road constructed on a gradient on the side of a mountain or hill. The District Magistrate shall notify by means of large notice boards on the roadside where each ghát begins and ends.

34. No motor-vehicle shall travel by night on any of the ghát roads between Poona and Mahábleshwar or on any other ghát road on which with the previous sanction of Government the District Magistrate has prohibited night travelling by notification in the *Government Gazette* and by erecting notice boards at the top or bottom of the hill.

Exception.—Should a motor-vehicle break down on any road on which night travelling is prohibited, the driver, if unable to accomplish his journey before nightfall, may proceed after executing the necessary repairs but shall halt at the first Police Station he comes to after dark and there give his name and the number of his car and a statement of the reasons why he is travelling at that hour, and shall drive with great caution.

35. Motor-vehicles shall, where practicable, pass all animals or vehicles drawn by animals on the outside, in whichever direction such animals may be proceeding.

36. The driver of a motor-vehicle shall, in passing animals, allow as much space as the width of the road permits.

37. No motor-vehicle shall be driven on the Kelghar ghát between Mahábleshwar and Sátára unless the District Magistrate shall notify that the said ghát is available for motorists.

(2) No person shall drive a motor-vehicle within the limits of Mahábleshwar. (4) The Superintendent shall notify by means of notice boards on the roadside such roads as are closed against all motor traffic and no motor-vehicle shall proceed along any road so closed.

No. 33.—The following regulations as to appointment of Assistant Engineers, 1910, published in the Supplement to the *Gazette of India*, dated 25th December 1909, are republished :—

"INDIAN PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

REGULATIONS AS TO APPOINTMENT OF ASSISTANT ENGINEERS, 1910.

1. The Secretary of State for India in Council will, in the summer of 1910, make not less than 25 appointments of Assistant Engineers in the Public Works Department of the Government of India.

In making these appointments he will act with the advice of a Selection Committee, including at least one eminent representative of the Engineering profession.

2. Applications for the appointments must be made on a printed form to be obtained from the Secretary, Judicial and Public Department, India Office, Whitehall, London, S. W., and to be returned so as to reach him not earlier than 1st March 1910, or later than Saturday, the 30th April 1910.

No applications received after the latter date will be considered.

3. Candidates must have attained the age of 21 and not attained the age of 24 years on the 1st July 1910.

4. Every candidate, except as provided in Regulation 5, must be a British subject of European descent, and at the time of his birth his father must have been a British subject, either naturalborn or naturalised in the United Kingdom. The decision of the Secretary of State in Council as to whether a candidate satisfies this condition shall be final. He must also be of good moral character and sound physique.

5. Natives of India who are British subjects are eligible for appointment, and shall be selected to the extent of 10 per cent. of the total number of Assistant Engineers thus recruited, if duly qualified.

6. Candidates must produce evidence that they have (1) passed the A.M.I.C.E. examination or obtained one of the University degrees mentioned in Appendix I, or (2) obtained such diploma or other distinction in Engineering, as may, in the opinion of the Selection Committee, be accepted as approximately equivalent thereto.

It will, therefore, be for the Selection Committee to decide, in dealing with the applications, whether they will recommend any candidate under head (2).

7. It is advisable that candidates who have been through a college course and obtained one of the degrees mentioned in Appendix I should have had at least one full year's practical experience under a corporate member of the Institution of Civil Engineers at the time when they appear before the Selection Committee. Those who have taken no college course should have had a full 3 years of such practical experience. In the event of any candidate being selected who has not, in the opinion of the Selection Committee, had sufficint practical experience, he may be required to undergo, after arrival in India, a year's probation in charge of works, and his final appointment may be made dependent upon the result of such probation.

8. Candidates must be prepared, if called upon, to attend at the India Office, at their own expense, for a personal interview with the Selection Committee, not later than the 31st May 1910.

9. They will further be required, before final appointment by the Secretary of State in Council, to appear before the Medical Board at the India Office for examination as to their physical fitness for service in India.

The regulations governing the Physical examination of candidates for the Public Works Department of the Government of India are given in Appendix III.

10. Candidates will also be required, before final appointment, to satisfy the Secretary of State, in such manner as he may determine, of their ability to ride.

11. They will on appointment be provided with a free first-class passage to India, or an allowance in lieu thereof, and they will be expected to proceed thither about the end of September 1910.

Their pay will begin from the date of their landing in India, and, if they so desire, they will be able to obtain in India an advance of two months' pay, recoverable by monthly instalments of one-third of salary.

12. They will enter the service as Assistant Engineers, Third Grade, on a salary of Rs. 4,560 a year (equivalent to 304l. a year, when the rupee is at 1s. 4d.).

13. The instruments required by Assistant Engineers are supplied to them in India.

14. Particulars as to their prospects of pay, pension, etc., are contained in Appendix II.

NOTE FOR THE INFORMATION AND GUIDANCE OF CANDIDATES.

The Selection Committee of 1906 drew attention to the subjects which were held to be of most importance for the Public Works Service, viz. :

Materials used in Construction.

- Building Construction .- Wood and metal work, limes and cements, and building with stone. brick, and concrete.
- Knowledge of the principles of road-making, waterworks, sanitary and railway engineering. (Important.)
- The Selection Committee were further of opinion that all candidates should have had some workshop training.
- The following announcement regarding the recruitment of the Public Works Department in future years is published for the information of intending candidates :
 - (i) The foregoing regulations apply only to the appointment of Assistant Engineers in the permanent establishment of the Public Works Department in 1910, but it is the intention of the Secretary of State for India in Council, as at present advised, to recruit the permanent establishment of the Department in succeeding years on the same general lines as those already laid down.

He is, however, unable to give any undertaking that the regulations will remain unaltered in the future.

1. The Engineer Establishment of the Indian Public Works Department consists of a staff of Engineers, military and civil, engaged on the construction and maintenance of the various public works undertaken by the State in India.

2. The permanent establishment of the Department is recruited from the following sources :--

- (1) Officers of Royal Engineers.
- (2) Persons appointed to the Imperial Service by the Secretary of State by selection from the United Kingdom.
- (3) Persons educated at the Government Civil Engineering Colleges in India, and appointed to the Provincial Services by the Government of India.
- (4) Occasional admission of other qualified persons.
- 3. The various ranks of the Department are as follows :--

4. The increments will be given for approved service only, and in accordance with the rules of the Department.

Exchange compensation allowance will not be granted to future entrants.

5. Except as regards promotions from the grade of Assistant to the grade of Executive Engineer, promotions from one class to another are dependent on the occurrence of vacancies in the sanctioned establishment, and are regulated in the following way.

6. In the Civil Works Branch of the Department, all promotions in Madras and Bombay are made by the Governments of those provinces respectively; in other provinces also promotions are made by the Provincial Governments, except as regards the appointments of Chief and Superintending Engineer, which are made by the Government of India.

7. In the Railway Branch of the Department promotions are made by the Railway Board, except as regards the appointments of Chief and Superintending Engineer, which are made by the Government of India.

8. Promotion is made wholly by selection ; mere seniority is considered to confer no claim to it.

PENSIONS AND PROVIDENT FUND.

9. The following is a summary of the principal pension rules applicable to Engineers appointed to the Imperial Service by the Secretary of State from the United Kingdom.

An officer is eligible for a pension on voluntary retirement after completing 20 years' qualifying service or attaining the age of 55 years. If at an earlier date he is compelled to retire from the service through ill-health not occasioned by irregular or intemperate habits, he becomes eligible for an invalid pension or a gratuity according to the length of his service.

The amount of pension or gratuity is regulated as follows :

After a service of less than 10 years, an invalid gratuity not exceeding one month's emoluments for each completed year of service.

After a service of not less than 10 years an invalid pension not exceeding the following amounts:

Officers who have shown special energy and efficiency during an effective service of three years in certain appointments, may, at the discretion of the Government of India, be allowed an additional pension of Rs. 1,000 a year, subject to the condition that the officer must not retire voluntarily before the completion of a total qualifying service of 28 years.

Subject to certain prescribed conditions, rupee pensions are now issued at the rate of exchange of 1s. 9d. the rupee to pensioners residing in countries in which the Indian Government rupee is not legal tender.

10. A general provident fund has been established for all Civil Engineers of the Department on the following basis :

- (1) The contribution is compulsory up to 64 per cent. on salaries, with not more than a further 64 per cent. voluntary contributions. Subscriptions on leave of any kind are optional.
- (2) Compound interest on such payment is annually credited by Government to each officer subscribing, the rate being at present 4 per cent. per annum,
- (3) The sum which thus accumulates to the credit of an officer is his absolute property, subject to the rules of the Fund, and is handed over to him unconditionally on quitting the service; or, in the event of his death before retirement, to his legal representatives.

LEAVE.

11. The following is a summary of the principal regulations relating to the leave admissible to Engineers appointed to the Imperial Service by the Secretary of State from the United Kingdom.

(a) Short Leave.

12. Privilege leave is a holiday which may be granted to the extent of one-eleventh part of the time that an officer has been on duty without interruption; and it may be accumulated up to three months, earned by 83 months' duty. During privilege leave the officer retains a lien on his

" "Average emoluments " means the average calculated on the last three years' service.

appointment, and receives an allowance equal to the salary which he would receive if he were on duty in the appointment on which he has a lien. An interval of six months must elapse between two periods of absence on privilege leave.

Privilege leave may be prefixed to furlough, special leave, or extraordinary leave without allowances. The whole period of leave thus taken in combination is known as combined leave. Combined leave cannot be granted for a shorter period than six months, nor, except on medical certificate, may be extended beyond two years.

13. Extraordinary leave without allowances may be granted in case of necessity, and, except in certain specified cases, only when no other kind of leave is by rule admissible. It may be granted in continuation of other leave.

14. Subsidiary leave in India for a minimum of 10 days usually with half average salary, may be granted to an officer proceeding on or returning from leave out of India, or on retirement, to enable him to reach the port of embarkation or to rejoin his appointment. It is admissible only at the end, and not at the beginning, of combined leave.

15. Short leave is also granted to enable officers to appear at examinations, etc.

(b) Long Leave.

16. Furlough and special leave with allowances (see paragraph 6) are admissible to an aggregate maximum amount of 6 years during an officer's service. The amount of furlough 'earned' is one-fourth of an officer's active service, and the amount 'due' is that amount less any enjoyed.

Furlough without medical certificate can, if due, be generally taken after eight years' active service, and again after intervals of not less than three years' continuous service. It is limited to two years at a time.

Furlough on medical certificate may be granted (a) to an officer who has rendered three years' continuous service, for not more than two years, but capable of extension up to three years, and (b) to an officer who has not rendered three years' continuous service up to one year in any case, and up to such longer period, if any (but not exceeding two years), as the officer may have furlough 'due' to him.

17. The allowances admissible during furlough are :--

- During the first two years of furlough without medical certificate and during so much of furlough with medical certificate as may be 'due,'—half average salary subject to certain maximum and minimum limits.
- (2) After the expiration of the period for which the foregoing allowances are admissible,—onequarter of average salary, subject to certain maximum and minimum limits.

18. Special leave may be granted at any time for not more than six months, with intervals of six years' service; allowances calculated as during furlough are given during the first six months only, whether taken in one or more instalments.

General Rules.

21. Leave of absence, whether on furlough or on privilege leave, can never be claimed as of right, and is given or refused at the discretion of Government.

22. After five years' continuous absence from India an officer is considered to be out of the employment of Government.

23. When leave allowances are paid at the Home Treasury, or in a Colony where the standard of currency is gold, rupees are converted into sterling at the rate of exchange fixed for the time being for the adjustment of financial transactions between the Imperial and Indian Treasuries, unless any other rate has been exceptionally authorised. But for the present the rate of conversion is subject to a minimum of 1s. 6d. to the rupee.

APPENDIX III.

REGULATIONS AS TO THE PHYSICAL EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR APPOINTMENT TO THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT OF THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

Note.—These regulations are published for the convenience of candidates and in order to enable them to ascertain the probability of their coming up to the required physical standard. But it must be clearly understood that the Secretary of State reserves to himself an absolute discretion to reject as unfit any candidate whom he may consider, after hearing the opinion of his medical advisers, to be physically disqualified for the public service ; and that his discretion is in no respect limited by these Regulations.

General Physical Requirements.

1. A candidate must be in good mental and bodily health, and free from any physical defect likely to interfere with efficient performance of duty.

2. In the examination of candidates the Medical Board will apply the following table of correlation of age, height, and chest girth :---

3. Measurement of Height.—The candidate will be placed against the standard with his feet together, and the weight thrown on the heels, and not on the toes or outside of the feet. He will stand erect without rigidity and with the heels, calves, buttocks and shoulders touching the standard; the chin will be depressed to bring the vertex of the head level under the horizontal bar, and the height will be noted in parts of an inch to eighths. In the Indian Police Force a minimum height of 5 feet 4 inches is required, but in other Departments no fixed limit of height is imposed.

4. Measurement of Chest.—The candidate will be made to stand erect with his feet together and to raise his hands above his head. The tape will be carefully adjusted round the chest, with its posterior upper edge touching the inferior angles of the shoulder blades, and its interior lower edge the upper part of the nipples. The arms will then be lowered to hang loosely by the side, and care will be taken that the shoulders are not thrown upwards or backwards so as to displace the tape. The candidate will then be directed to empty his chest of air as much as is possible. This is best done by continuous whistling with the lips as long as sound can be produced. The tape is carefully gathered in during the process, and when the minimum measurement is reached it is recorded. The candidate will then be directed to inflate his chest to its utmost capacity. This maximum measurement will likewise be noted. The girth with the chest fully expanded and the range of expansion between the minimum and maximum will then be recorded.

5. The hearing must be good.

6. The speech without impediment.

7. The teeth in good order, *i.e.*, decayed or broken teeth must be properly stopped or crowned and deficient teeth replaced by artificial teeth where necessary for effective mastication.

8. The chest must be well formed, the lungs and heart sound.

9. Rupture, hydrocele, varicocele, varicose veins in a severe degree, or other condition likely to cause inefficiency will disqualify a candidate, unless such condition is cured by operation.

10. The limbs, feet, and toes must be well formed and developed, with free and perfect motion of all the joints.

11. A candidate must have no congenital malformation or defect likely to interfere with efficiency.

12. A candidate must not be the subject of chronic skin disease.

13. Evidence of previous acute or chronic disease pointing to an impaired constitution will disqualify.

14. The regulations as to the standard of vision required are shown separately for each Department. In all cases of "colour blindness" a note of the same will be made on the candidate's papers.

Candidates may, if they wish it, undergo a preliminary examination by the Medical Board, which meets at the India Office every Tuesday, under the following conditions :---

(a) Applications must be addressed to the Under Secretary of State, India Office, Whitehall, London, accompanied by a fee of two guineas, and a statement as to the particular appointment which the candidate desires to obtain.

(b) Candidates must pay their travelling expenses.

(c) Candidates considered to be unfit by the Medical Board at this preliminary examination are not bound to accept its opinion, but may, at their own risk, continue their studies, with the knowledge that they will have to submit themselves for a final medical examination by the Medical Board, prior to the examination, or to their appointment.

(d) On the other hand, it must be distinctly understood that the preliminary examination by the Medical Board is held solely for the candidate's information, and that, if after that examination he is reported to be apparently fit, he has not on that account any claim to be accepted as physically fit when he presents himself for the final Medical Examination, upon which alone his acceptance or rejection will depend. Candidates may be considered fit for the service at the preliminary examination, but may be found at the final examination to be unfit, either on account of some physical defect which did not exist or passed undetected at the preliminary examination, or for other reasons.

REGULATIONS AS TO THE STANDARD OF VISION.

1. If myopia in one or both eyes exists, a candidate may be passed provided the ametropia does not exceed 3.5 D, and if, with correcting glasses not exceeding 3.5 D, the acuteness of vision in one eye equals § and in the other 6, there being normal range of accommodation with the glasses.

2. Myopic astigmatism does not disqualify a candidate, provided the lens, or the combined spherical and cylindrical lenses, required to correct the error of refraction, does not exceed 3.5 D; the acuteness of vision in one eye, when corrected, being equal to 5, and in the other 8, together with normal range of accommodation with the correcting glasses, there being no evidence of progressive disease in the choroid or retina.

3. A candidate having total hypermetropia not exceeding 4 D is not disqualified, provided the sight in one eye (when under the influence of atropine) equals §, and in the other eye equals §, with + 4 D glasses, or any lower power.

4. Hypermetropic astigmatism does not disqualify, provided the lens or combined lenses required to cover the error of refraction do not exceed 4 D, and that the sight of one eye equals § and the other 6, with or without such lens or lenses.

5. A candidate having a defect of vision arising from nebula of the cornea is disqualified if the sight of one eye be less than $\frac{1}{12}$. In such a case the better eye must be emmetropic. Defects of vision arising from pathological or other changes in the deeper structures of either eye, which are not referred to in these rules, may exclude a candidate.

6. A candidate may be disqualified if he be unable to distinguish the principal colours (achromatopsia).

7. Paralysis of one or more of the exterior muscles of the eyeball disqualifies a candidate for the service.

No. 948.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Indian Councils Act, 1909 (IX Edw. VII, c. 4), the Governor in Council, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, is pleased to make the following *Rules for the Discussion of the Annual Financial Statement of Government* at meetings of the Legislative Council.

Definitions.

1. In these rules-

(1) "Finance Committee" means the Committee of the Council appointed under rules 2 and 3 to consider and revise the Draft Financial Statement;

(2) "President" means-

- . (a) the Governor, or
 - (b) the Vice-President appointed by the Governor under section 4 of the Indian Councils Act, 1909, or

(c) the Member appointed to preside under rule 36;

(3) "Finance Member" means the Member of the Governor's Council to whom the business of the Financial Department is allotted;

(4) "Member in charge" means the Member of the Governor's Council to whom is allotted the business of the Department of the Local Government to which the subject under discussion belongs, and includes any Member to whom such Member in charge may delegate any function assigned to him under these rules;

(5) "Draft Financial Statement" means the preliminary financial proposals of the Governor in Council for the financial year next following;

(6) "Revised Financial Statement" means the Draft Financial Statement as revised by the Local Government with the approval of the Government of India after considering the proposals of the Finance Committee;

(7) "Budget" means the Financial Statement as finally sanctioned by the Government of India, after amendment with reference to resolutions passed in Council and accepted by the Local Government or to any special circumstances not previously foreseen; and

(8) "Secretary " means the officer holding the appointment of Assistant to the Remembrancer of Legal Affairs; but all the acts which the Secretary is required or authorized to do by these rules may be done by the Remembrancer of Legal Affairs or by a Secretary, Under Secretary or Assistant Secretary to the Government of Bombay.

The Draft Financial Statement.

2. On a day not later than the 5th day of January in every year, the Governor shall appoint a Finance Committee for the purpose of discussing the Draft Financial Statement and making proposals with reference thereto for the consideration of the Local Government.

(1) The Finance Committee shall consist of not more than twelve members, of whom not

(2) The remaining Members of the Committee shall be elected by the non-official Members of Council by votes given under such procedure as the Governor in Council may from time to time prescribe by notification in the Bombay Government Gazette.

t. The Finance Member shall be the Chairman of the Committee, and in the case of an equality of votes on any matter shall have a second or casting vote.

(1) On a day not later than the 18th day of January in every year, the Local Government shall refer to the Finance Committee the Draft Financial Statement.

(2) The draft shall comprise tabular statements showing-

- (a) the opening balance of the Provincial account,
- (b) the estimated Provincial revenue under the various major heads of account,
- (c) the estimated Provincial expenditure, under specific major heads, on existing establishments and schemes and on new schemes the cost of which is not considerable or which the Local Government considers to be of an absolutely obligatory character,
- (d) the amounts available for maximum recurring expenditure and for total expenditure upon other new schemes, the latter being provisionally included under a head 'Unallotted Expenditure,' and
- (e) the estimated closing balance.

(3) There shall be appended to the Draft Financial Statement a memorandum indicating as fully as possible the manner in which the Local Government provisionally proposes to allot the sum available for total expenditure on new schemes referred to in clause (d) of sub-rule (2), and also indicating, if thought desirable, alternative methods of distributing this expenditure. In respect of each suggestion thus made, the maximum recurring expenditure, and the total expenditure, (a) recurring and (b) non-recurring, which it is proposed to incur in the next financial year, should be separately stated.

6. (1) The Finance Committee shall consider how the provision made under the head 'Unallotted Expenditure' referred to in clause (d) of sub-rule (2) of rule 5 shall be distributed among the specific major heads and to what purposes the sums thus allotted should be applied:

Provided that-

(i) the total provision for recurring and non-recurring expenditure on new schemes shall not exceed the amount entered in the Draft Financial Statement as available for these purposes; and

(ii) the limit of recurring expenditure shall be determined with reference to the maximum amount which a scheme will eventually involve, any difference between this figure and the recurring expenditure required to be provided in the Draft Financial Statement under discussion being made up by addition to non-recurring expenditure.

(2) It shall also consider the estimates of revenue and expenditure referred to in clauses (b) and (c) of sub-rule (2) of rule 5 and recommend such amendments in them as seem to it to be advisable, so long as these do not materially affect heads of revenue and expenditure which the Local Government shares with the Government of India :

Provided that any recommendation likely to reduce the estimated closing balance referred to in rule 5 (2) (e) shall be accompanied by proposals for a counterbalancing increase in revenue or reduction in expenditure referred to in clause (c) or (d) of sub-rule (2) of rule 5.

7. (1) The proceedings of the Committee shall be private and informal.

(2) They shall begin not later than the 20th day of January and be completed not later than the 27th day of the same month.

(3) Free discussion shall be allowed, but the Chairman may at his discretion close discussion upon any particular item when he thinks that it cannot be continued with advantage.

(4) Where the question of making any particular provision in the estimates coming within the scope of the Committee's functions is in dispute, the Member in charge shall be heard in its support, and the Committee shall then proceed to vote, the decision being by majority of votes.

8. The Finance Committee shall submit to the Local Government, not later than the 28th day of January, a report indicating the changes which it recommends in the Draft Financial Statement.

9. After considering the proposals of the Committee the Local Government shall embody its own conclusions in the Draft Financial Statement, and shall refer the Statement thus amended to

The Revised Financial Statement.

10. (1) The Revised Financial Statement shall be presented to the Council on a day not later than the 13th day of March.

(2) It shall comprise a memorandum by the Finance Member explaining the general financial situation of the province in the current and ensuing years, together with memoranda explaining the estimates of revenue and expenditure under the various major heads, or groups of major heads

(3) A week before the Revised Financial Statement is presented to the Council, copies of the amended Draft Financial Statement, as provisionally approved by the Government of India at the time, shall be supplied to the Members with a note that the figures and remarks contained in it are

(4) Copies of the Revised Financial Statement, together with copies of a memorandum detailing the alterations made in the Statement of which copies have been previously supplied under subrule (3), shall be supplied to the Members not later than the day preceding that on which it is presented to the Council.

11. (1) On the day when the Revised Financial Statement is presented to the Council, each head or group of heads in the Statement, which is specified in the schedule appended to these rules as being open to discussion, shall be considered separately according to such grouping as the Member in charge may determine.

(2) The consideration of each such head or group of heads shall be introduced by the Member in charge with such explanations supplementing the information contained in the Revised Financial Statement as may appear to him to be necessary.

(3) A Member who has entered in his name in the List of Business in accordance with these rules a resolution relating to any question covered by any such head or group of heads, shall move such resolution immediately after the consideration of that head or group has been introduced by the Member in charge.

No discussion shall be permitted in regard to any of the following subjects, namely :-12.

- (a) any subject removed from the cognizance of the Legislative Council of the Governor by section 43 of the Indian Councils Act, 1861; or
- (b) any matter affecting the relations of His Majesty's Government, or of the Governor General in Council, or of the Governor in Council with any Foreign State or any Native State in India or relating to the internal affairs of any such Native State; or
- (c) except with the sanction of the Governor, any matter which is the subject of discussion between the Governor General in Council or the Secretary of State and the Local Government; or
- (d) any matter under adjudication by a Court of Law having jurisdiction in any part of His Majesty's dominions.

13. No resolution shall be moved which does not comply with the following conditions, namely :-

- (a) it shall be in the form of a specific recommendation addressed to the Governor in Council;
- (b) it shall be clearly and precisely expressed and shall raise a definite issue;
- (c) it shall not contain arguments, inferences, ironical expressions or defamatory statements, nor shall it refer to the conduct or character of any person except in his official or public capacity;
- (d) it shall not challenge the accuracy of the figures of the Revised Financial Statement;
- (e) it shall be directly relevant to some entry in the Revised Financial Statement;
- (f) it shall not criticise any decision of the Government of India in respect of Provincial finance; and
- (g) if it would in itself have the effect of causing the total expenditure of the Presidency to exceed the amount sanctioned by the Government of India, it must propose some counterbalancing reduction in the estimates so as to avoid such excess.

14. On receipt of the Statement mentioned in rule 10 (3), a Member, who wishes to move a resolution at the Council meeting mentioned in rule 10 (1), shall send to the Secretary, so as to reach him before the day fixed for the meeting of the Council, a copy of the resolution which he desires to move :

Provided that the President may fix a date after which no such resolution may be received.

15. The President may disallow any resolution or part of a resolution without giving any reason therefor other than that in his opinion it cannot be moved consistently with the public interests or that it should be moved in the Legislative Council of the Governor General.

16. (1) No discussion in Council shall be permitted in respect of any order of the President

under rule 15.

(2) A resolution that has been disallowed shall not be entered in the proceedings of the Council.

17. Resolutions admitted by the President shall be entered in the List of Business in such order as he may direct.

Discussion of Resolutions.

18. (1) After the mover of a resolution has spoken, other Members may speak to the motion in such order as the President may direct, and thereafter the mover may speak once by way of reply. (2) No Member other than the mover and the Member in charge shall speak more than once to

any motion except, with the permission of the President, for the purpose of making an explanation.

19. No speech, except with the permission of the President, shall exceed fifteen minutes in. duration :

Provided that the mover of a resolution, when moving the same, and the Member in charge, may speak for thirty minutes.

20. The discussion of a resolution shall be limited to the subject of the resolution, and shall not extend to any matter as to which a resolution may not be moved.

21. A Member who has moved a resolution may withdraw the same unless some Member desires that it be put to the vote.

22. When, in the opinion of the President, a resolution has been sufficiently discussed, he may close the discussion by calling upon the mover to reply and the Member in charge to submit any final observations which he may wish to make :

Provided that the President may in all cases address the Council before putting the questionto the vote.

23. If any resolution involves many points, the President at his discretion may divide it, so that each point may be determined separately.

24. (1) Every question shall be resolved in the affirmative or in the negative according to the majority of votes.

(2) Votes may be taken by voices or by division and shall be taken by division if any Member so desires.

(3) The President shall determine the method of taking votes by division.

25. (1) The President may assign such time as with due regard to the public interests he may consider reasonable for the discussion of resolutions or of any particular resolution.

(2) Every resolution which has not been put to the vote within the time so assigned shall be deemed to have been withdrawn.

26. Every resolution, if carried, shall have effect only as a recommendation to the Governor in Council.

27. When a question has been discussed at a meeting of the Council or when a resolution has been disallowed under rule 15 or withdrawn under rule 21, no resolution raising substantially the same question shall be moved within one year.

The discussion of the Revised Financial Statement shall be closed not later than the 16th 28. day of March, or if the discussion commences before the 13th day of March, then on the third day of the discussion.

The Budget.

29. (1) On such day as may be appointed in this behalf by the Governor, the Budget shall be presented to the Council by the Finance Member who shall describe the changes that have been made in the figures of the Revised Financial Statement, and shall explain why any resolutions passed in Council have not been accepted.

(2) A printed copy of the Budget shall be given to each Member before the day fixed under sub-rule (1) of this rule.

30. (1) The general discussion of the Budget in Council shall take place on such later day as may be appointed by the President for this purpose.

(2) At such discussion, any Member shall be at liberty to offer any observations he may wish to make on the Budget, but no Member shall be permitted to move any resolution in regard thereto, nor shall the Budget be submitted to the vote of the Council.

(3) It shall be open to the President, if he thinks fit, to prescribe a time-limit for speeches.

31. The discussion shall be limited to those branches of revenue and expenditure which are under the financial control of the Local Government, and it will not be permissible to enter upon

32. The Finance Member shall have the right of reply, and the discussion shall be closed by the President making such observations as he may consider necessary.

General.

(1) Every Member shall speak from his place, shall rise when he speaks, and shall address 33. the chair.

(2) At any time, if the President rises, any Member speaking shall immediately resume his seat. 34. (1) Any Member may send his speech in print to the Secretary not less than two clear days before the day fixed for the meeting of Council, with as r any copies as there are Members, and the Secretary shall cause one of such copies to be supplied to every Member.

(2) Any such speech may, at the discretion of the President, be taken as read.

35. (1) The President shall preserve order, and all points of order shall be decided by him. (2) No discussion on any point of order shall be allowed unless the President thinks fit to take the opinion of the Council thereon.

(3) Any Member may at any time submit a point of order to the decision of the President.

(4) The President shall have all powers necessary for the purpose of enforcing his decision.

36. The Governor may appoint a Member of the Council to preside in his place, or in that of the Vice-President, on any occasion on which the Revised Financial Statement or the Budget or any portion thereof is discussed in the Council.

37. The President for sufficient reason may suspend any of the foregoing rules.

PART I

No. 949.—In accordance with rule 3 of the Rules for the discussion of the Annual Financial Statement of Government published in Government Notification in the Legal Department, No. 948, dated the 29th December 1909, the Governor in Council is pleased to prescribe the following rules of procedure for the election of the elected members of the Finance Committee :—

I. The election shall be made by the non-official members of the Legislative Council on such date, time and place as may be appointed by the Governor in Council in this behalf.

2. The Secretary shall inform the members present at such meeting of the number of members to be elected to the Committee and provide each non-official member with a voting paper containing the names of all the non-official members with a space for recording a vote opposite each member's name, and shall then withdraw. The non-official members of the Legislative Council shall elect a Chairman from among their own number.

3. Each member present shall have as many votes as there are members to be elected and shall record his votes by placing a cross against the name of each of the members for whom he wishes to vote.

4. Any point of order not referred to in these rules shall be settled by the Chairman forthwith, and his decision shall be final.

5. On the conclusion of the election the Chairman shall inform the Secretary of the names of the members elected.
