## PART VI

## BILLS OF THE COVERNMENT OF INDIA.

### LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Bill was introduced in the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 4th November 1898:—

Bill No. 15 of 1898.

## THE CANTONMENTS (HOUSE-ACCOMMODATION) BILL.

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[The "Rules" referred to on the margin are the draft Cantonment Rules published for criticism in the Supplement to the Gazette of India of the 26th September 1896.]

A Bill to make better provision for securing house-accommodation for officers in cantonments.

WHEREAS various conditions, rules, regulations and orders have from time to time been laid down by, or by the authority of, the Gov-ernment, in regard to the grant of land and

the occupation of land and houses in cantonments, with the object of securing, among other things, that houses built on such land should be made available when required for the accommodation of officers of the army;

And whereas, notwithstanding the said conditions, rules, regulations and orders, difficulties have frequently been experienced in obtaining house-accommodation in cantonments for officers of the army, and it is expedient to make better provision for that purpose;

And whereas it has from time to time been found necessary in certain cases to admit civil officers of the Government to the benefit of certain of the conditions, rules, regulations and orders aforesaid, and it is expedient to make better provision for obtaining house-accommodation in cantonments for such civil officers;

It is hereby enacted as follows:

#### CHAPTER I. PRELIMINARY.

- 1. (1) This Act may be called the Cantonments Short title, extent and (House-Accommodation) Act, 1809.
- (2) It extends to the whole of British India (inclusive of British Baluchistan), except Aden;
- (3) It shall come into force at once, but it shall not become operative in any cantonment or part of a cantonment until the issue, or otherwise than in pursuance, of a notification as hereinafter provided by section 3.

(c) "grantee" means a person who has been granted permission, before the Cantonment Rules, 189-, came into force, to occupy, for the purposes of a building-site, land belonging to the East India Company or to Her Majesty in a can-tonment, and includes the successors in interest of a grantee:

(f) "house" means a house erected on land occupied by a grantee, and includes the land and buildings appurtenant to a house; and, if any question arises whether any land or building is appurtenant to a house, it shall be decided by the Cantonment Magistrate, whose decision thereon shall, subject to revision by the District Magistrate, be final;

(g) the expression "repairs" to a house includes such repairs as are usually made in the neighbourhood to buildings of the same class as that to which the house belongs, but does not include additions, improvements or alterations, except in so far as they are necessary to carry out such repairs as aforesaid or have been made with the grantee's consent.

#### CHAPTER II.

## APPLICATION OF ACT.

3. (1) The Local Government, with the previous sanction of the Gov-Cantonments, or parts ernor General in Council, of cantonments, in which Act is to be may, by notification in the operative. local official Gazette, declare this Act to be operative in any cantonment or part of a cantonment situate in the territories under its administration, other than a cantonment situate within the limits of a Presidency-town.

- (2) Before issuing a notification under subsection (1) in respect of any cantonment, the Local Government shall cause local inquiry to be made with a view to determining how the land in the cantonment is held.
- (3) The Local Government shall cause public notice of every such inquiry to be given in the cantonment. Such notice shall specify, if the Act is to be operative in a part only of the cantonment, the particular part of the cantonment in which it is to be operative, and shall require all persons claiming to hold any land in the cantonment or part of the cantonment, as the case may be, by atawful title acquired by him or his predecessors in title prior to the formation of the cantonment or the inclusion in it of that part in which the Act is to be operative, to appear, personally or by agent, before an officer to be named in the notice at a time and place therein mentioned (such time not being earlier than fifteen days after the date of publication of the notice), and to state the nature of their claims and their objections (if any) to the land being included in the area in which the Act is to be operative.
- (4) On the day so fixed, or any other subsequent day to which the inquiry may be adjourned,

the officer so named shall proceed to inquire into any claims and objections which any person has stated pursuant to the notice given under sub-section (3), and shall make a report

- (5) Primá facie, all land in such a canton-ment as aforesaid shall be deemed to be held under a grant from Her Majesty, but, if any person proves to the satisfaction of the Local Government that he holds any land by a lawful title acquired by him or his predecssors in title prior to the formation of the cantonment, then such land shall be excluded from the area of the notification, and in like manner if, pending the inquiry or at any time thereafter, any land is proved by the decree of a Court of competent jurisdiction to be held under such lawful title, it shall be excluded from the area of the notification by a further notification to be published in the same manner as the original notification.
- 4. ## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

As stated in the preamble to this Bill, various conditions, rules, regulations and orders in regard to the grant of land and the occupation of land and houses in cantonments have from time to time been made with the object of making accommodation available for officers whose duties require their residence within cantonment-limits. These provisions have been collected and are published for general information as an appendix to this Statement; but, notwithstanding their issue in the past, great difficulties have been, and are still being, experienced in the matter.

2. The necessity for removing these difficulties and of making suitable provision for the housing of officers has long been recognized by the Government, and a special Chapter was in 1888 with that object included in the Bill "to amend the law relating to cantonments." The Chapter was, however, subjected to criticism at the time, and as the matter seemed to call for further consideration, while it was thought undesirable to delay the whole measure on that account, it was decided to exclude the provisions in question and to proceed with the rest of the Bill, which was eventually passed into law as the Cantonments Act, 1889 (XIII of 1889). The difficulties referred to have, as was indeed only to be expected, steadily increased, and the Government of India consider it inexpedient any longer to defer remedial legislation on the subject.

3. The Bill which it is proposed now to introduce, has been framed after careful consideration of the objections previously raised, and, while aiming at securing house-accommodation for the military and civil officers of the Government whose presence in cantonments is obviously necessary, it endeavours also to safeguard as far as possible the interests of the house-owners concerned.

Clause 2 (a): definition of "grantee."—It will be observed that this definition is limited to persons who obtained grants of land prior to the coming into force of certain Cantonment Rules which have at present to be indefinitely referred to in the Bill, inasmuch as, though prepared and published for criticism some time ago, they have not yet come into force. It is intended, however, to bring them into operation before the Bill becomes law. These rules will provide fully for the matters dealt with in the Bill so far as grants made under them will be concerned. Consequently the operation of the Bill will be practically restricted to past grants only.

Clause 3 enacts that the provisions of the proposed Act shall not be operative in any cantonment, or part of a cantonment, until it has been declared to be so by a notification issued by the Local Government with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council. And it further provides that, before any notification of the kind is issued, the Local Government shall cause local inquiry to be made with a view to determining how the land in the cantonment is actually held. The inquiry contemplated is to proceed on the presumption that all land in cantonments is held under a grant from the Government; but, if any person is able to prove to the satisfaction of the Local Government that he holds land in a cantonment by a lawful title obtained prior to the formation of the cantonment, then that land is to be excluded from the area within which the provisions of the Act are to be operative. In like manner, if any land is at any time shown, by the decree of a Court of competent jurisdiction, to be held under such a title as is indicated above, it also is to be excepted from the operation of the Act,

Clause 4 expressly declares that nothing in the proposed Act shall affect the provisions of any lease or other agreement in writing granted or made by the Government before the commencement of the Act, unless the lessee or other party entitled consents in writing to be bound by the terms of the Act.

Chapter III deals with the appropriation of houses for occupation by officers, the terms of tenancy and the reference of disputes to arbitration. Clause 12 provides for the exemption, under certain conditions, from appropriation of a house occupied as a bank, hotel, shop, school or public office or by a railway administration; also a house which is occupied by the "grantee" and was so occupied at the commencement of the Act.

Clauses 18 to 21 contemplate arbitration in case of dispute as regards either rent or repairs, arbitration in such matters having hitherto been an essential condition of the grant of land in cantonments, and clause 22 confers power on the tenant in certain cases to execute repairs himself and deduct the cost from the rent.

Clause 23 takes power in certain cases to veto the transfer of a "grantee's" interest in any land or house in a cantonment. Such a power has hitherto been expressly reserved as one of the conditions of the grant of land in cantonments for building purposes; but the clause as drafted secures for the "grantee" a safeguard which he has not now, inasmuch as it provides that the power of veto shall be exercised by the General Officer of the Command, instead of by the local military authorities, and then only with the concurrence of the Local Government.

Chapter IV deals with the convening, constitution and proceedings of committees of arbitration. The most important provisions are those to be found in clauses 32 and 33, the former of which lays down the principle on which the selling-value of house-property in cantonments is to be calculated, and the latter the mode of fixing the rent of houses. Clause 33 has been drawn so as to remove what has hitherto been a fruitful source of complaint on the part of house-owners.

Chapter V makes adequate provision for the right of appeal.

The provisions of Chapter VI are supplemental. Power is taken for the Governor General in Council to make rules to carry out the purposes and objects of the proposed Act, and protection is afforded to persons acting under its provisions in good faith.

- 3. When no objection occurs, the application is to be forwarded, through the prescribed channel, by the Commanding Officer of the station to the Quarter Master General of the Army, who, if the Commander-in-Chief approves, will submit it for the orders of Government.

4. All such applications are to be in the annexed form marked A.

- 5. All grants are to be registered by the officer of the Quarter Master General's

  Department attached to the division, and, at stations where no such officer may be present, by the executive officer of public works, to whom also, in such cases, applications for ground are to be addressed; and all grants are to be immediately noted upon the plan of the cantonment in the Quarter Master General's office.

## General Order by the Governor General in Council, No. 684, dated 7th July, 1862.

It having been brought to the notice of Government that instances still occur of owners of houses, etc., in military cantonments either refusing or failing to keep the buildings in such a state of repair as to render them suitable for the purposes of which their erection was permitted, although the power retained by Government of resuming the ground on which they stand has been more than once exercised, the Right Honourable the Governor Resumption of land on failure to General in Council deems it necessary to notify for general

information that authority will be given for the resumption repair. of the land on which the buildings so neglected are situated, whenever it shall appear that the owners or their agents have failed, although duly warned, to cause the necessary repairs to be executed, and that inconvenience has thereby been caused to the inhabitants of the station.

The value of the buildings as they stand shall in such cases be paid to the owners, such value being determined by a Committee of Arbitration General Orders No. 179, dated 12th September, 1836, No. 74, dated 10th April, 1837, No. 154, dated 15th July, 1840, and No. 174, dated 5th August, 1840. The owner or agent shall, however, however the option of removing the materials within one fortnight from the date of the Committee's report.

#### General Order by the Governor General in Council, No. 1001, dated 8th December, 1864.

It having been brought to the notice of Government that in some cases owners of houses in military cantonments have made use of the right to sell or rent their houses at their option, which is secured to them by General Orders, so as to evade the plain intention of Government in issuing those orders, -e.g., by electing to sell when military officers have claimed the houses, in order to force them to waive their claims, and then renting the houses at whatever rent they could obtain, to persons not belonging to the cantonment,—the Right Honourable the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct the substitution of the following for paragraph 7 of Government General Order No. 179, dated 12th September, 1836, as amended by Government General Order No. 700, dated 3rd July, 1855.

"7. The owner of any house in a military cantonment not occupied by a person be-Power to require owner to let house longing to the army on duty at the station, or by a person to military officer.

in the service of Government directed or authorized by Government to reside therein, may be required to rent the same to any military officer belonging to the station who may require it to reside in, if the Officer Commanding the station is satisfied that there is no other suitable house available with due regard to the rank of the claimant and to the duties he may have to perform.

## Rent or Sale or Private Buildings.

35. A military cantonment is, as its designation implies, a locality set apart primarily for military and medical officers, chaplains, soldiers, subordinates attached to the troops and their families, for whom houses situated within such limits are by priority of right available.

36. Civil and political officers of Government, and officers of the Public Works

Civilians permitted to reside in Department, are permitted to reside within the limits of military cantonments whenever the public interests may require that they should so reside, or whenever special grounds may exist for granting the indulgence, such as the want of other available shelter or the necessity of ensuring their personal safety; but these exceptions are not ordinarily to interfere with the priority of right possessed by military officers and others on duty at the station to the houses within its boundaries.

37. In the event of a house in cantonments occupied by a non-military resident being required for an officer, a formal notice should be served on the occupant requiring him to vacate by a certain date, and warning him that, in the event of his declining or failing to comply, legal proceedings will be taken to enforce compliance. Should the notice (which should be personally served if possible) fail of effect, intimation of the same should be forwarded to Government in order that the necessary steps may be taken in the matter.

Commanding Officers should not, however, have recourse to this measure except under the most unavoidable circumstances, when houses are claimable and absolutely necessary for the accommodation of officers whose services are actually required of their duty. In the case of civil or political officers, or officers of the Public Works Department, applications for their removal are to be made to the Commander-in-Chief through the Quarter Master General for submission to Government.

38. The owner of any house in a military cantonment not occupied by a person belonging to the army on duty at the station, or by a person in the service of Government directed or authorised by Government to reside therein, may he required to rent the same to any military officer belonging to the station who may require it to reside in the Officer Commanding the station is satisfied that there is no other suitable house

available (paragraph 46), with due regard to the rank of the claimant and to the duties he may have to perform.

In every such case, however, if the owner shall have formally intimated to the officer Vacation of house on sale to another officer.

Who has so obtained the house his desire to sell rather than to let it, and the offer shall not have been accepted, the officer shall at any time be required to vacate it within a week of his receiving notice through the Staff Officer of the station that the house has been sold, with the consent of the Commanding Officer of the station, to another military officer on duty at the station who requires it for his own residence.

The rent to be paid in such cases, or the price to be paid for the house when the claimant accedes to the owner's desire that he shall purchase it, shall be fixed, in the event of the parties disagreeing as to the amount, by a Committee of Arbitration, to be assembled by order of the Officer Commanding the division or district, after he has fully satisfied himself as to the necessity for the same, and that the application for the Committee is not opposed to the orders of Government (paragraphs 42 and 44).

- 39. When a house is required to be rented for a military or medical officer under the conditions laid down in these regulations, the right to insist on anything beyond a monthly tenancy does not exist in cantonments unless there is some specific authority for taking the building out of the usual conditions on which land for building purposes is usually granted for military limits.
- 40. In all cases of dispute the owner should be called upon, previous to the assembly of the Committee of Arbitration, to elect whether he will rent or sell his house. Should he elect to rent the house, the Committee cannot compel him to sell it.
- 41. A tenant who has once taken possession of a house, or who is occupying it, cannot appeal for any reduction of rent which he may have agreed to pay, nor can a Committee be assembled to arbitrate on this point.
- 42. Committees of Arbitration are to be composed of a civil officer (the principal one, if practicable, at or in the vicinity of the station), the Commanding Officer of the cantonment, and any other individual (who need not belong to either the civil or military services) whom the proprietor of the house may please to nominate. # General Order by the Governor in Council, dated 19th December, 1826.

The following revised code of regulations for the conduct of the Quarter Master General's Department, compiled under the orders of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, having been approved by the Honourable the Governor in Council, it is hereby directed that the same be considered as Standing Orders of the Government of Fort St. George, and that printed copies be transmitted to every station and to the head-quarters of every corps for the general information and guidance of the army.

- 34. Officers in command of divisions of the army or in charge of cantonments shall not permit private buildings of any description to be erected within the limits of a military station until they shall have obtained the sanction of Government; and all officers or other persons, in Submitting applications for this purpose, will be particularly careful to explain the extent and site of the ground, and whether it be the property of Government or of individuals.
  - 35. They will also submit plans of the buildings which they may desire to erect, and the estimated amount of the expense, which is never to be exceeded except under the sanction of the same authority.
  - 36. No building shall be erected within the limits of any cantonment but on condition of its immediate surrender to the Government at a fair valuation to be determined by their authority if at any future period it shall be required for public purposes; nor shall the grant in perpetuity of any piece of ground within the precincts of a fort or cantonment be hereafter accorded to any individual.

Doubts having arisen as to the channel through which applications for grants of land situated within forts and military cantonments should be submitted to the Government, the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to declare paragraphs 34 to 42 of the Quarter Master General's regulations to be still in force, with the exception of that part of the 37th clause which restricts the terms of leases to a period of twenty-one years, and the portion of the 42nd paragraph which, in reference to the General Order by Government of the 8th May, 1812, prescribes the Military Board as the channel through which applications for grants should be submitted to Government.

Applications for grants of land within the limits of forts and military cantonments will be made hereafter, in the first instance, to Officers Submission of application for land.

the propriety of each particular grant, will forward the applications to the Quarter Master General of the army, who, having received His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief's orders, will submit them for the approval or rejection of Government. To give proprietors of land situated within military limits a more permanent interest in the property and a stronger inducement to construct good houses, the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to declare that grants shall hereafter be made for a period not exceeding fifty years, and that they shall be renewable at the expiration of every tenth year on the conditions of the original deed on payment of a small fine of ten rupees.

As it is desirable that all grants of land by the Government should be registered in one office, it will be the duty of the Military Board, pre-Registration of grants. Registration of grants.

# General Order by the Governor in Council, No. 11, dated 16th January, 1838.

The Right Honourable the Governor in Council, in reference to G. O., 8th May, 1812, and 4th December, 1829, is pleased to direct that, previously to submitting to Government applications, whether from Europeans or natives, for grants of land within fortresses or the limits of military cantonments, a reference shall be made by the Commanding Officer to the Collector of the district to ascertain how the land, if the property of the Enquiry as to assessment, etc., of Government land. Government, is entered in his accounts, and what rent has hitherto been assessed upon

it; and the report of the Collector shall accompany the application for such land through the channel prescribed by the existing rules.

With respect to lands not being the property of Government within fortresses and cantonments, application shall be made through the Application as to private land. Collector and the Board of Revenue, and on the production of a certificate from the Commanding Officer that the · Certificate by Commanding Officer. occupation of the land in the manner proposed is free from objection in a military point of view.

## General Order by the Governor in Council, No. 107, dated 19th July, 1844.

The Most Noble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following extract from the Minutes of Consultation in the Revenue Department, dated the 15th June, 1844, No. 588, relative to the payment of quit-rent or assessment for lands situated within military cantonments :-

- "The Most Noble the Governor in Council resolves to direct, in modification of all former orders, that the following rules, which will be promulgated through the Military Department, shall guide the local officers in the disposal of questions arising on the subject of lands in military cantonments :-
  - " 1st .- That the terms of the grants which have been obtained for lands situated in military cantonments shall be respected, and that such lands shall pay the amount of quit-rent stipulated in those grants.
  - " 2ndly.—That for all lands in excess of the extent entered in such grants the ordinary assessment shall be levied for such excess.
  - " 3rdly.—That for all lands for which grants have not been obtained the ordinary assessment shall be charged, except when that may exceed the quit-rent, in which case the amount of quit-rent shall be levied."

## General Order by the Governor in Council, No. 71, dated 17th April, 1849.

The Right Honourable the Governor in Council directs the publication of the following rules in supersession of paragraphs 34 to 42 of section I of the regulations for the Quarter Master General's Department.

#### CANTONMENTS-GRANTS OF LAND.

These rules are not to have retrospective effect\*: nor are they to disturb the residence of officers and others at the present moment, except in cases of extreme and proved public inconveni-ence. Their object is to secure gradually, and as opportunity offers, a better arrangement for the future.

15. In ordinary cases, the decision of the Station Commanding Officer should be considered final, but appeals may be heard and decided by the Appeal.
