General Rules for Railways under construction.

READ —

Sections 3 (4), 16 (2), 47 and 148 (1) of the Indian Railways Act (IX) of 1890.

Government of India, Public Works Department, Notification No. 480½, dated the 30th October 1890, publishing in the *Gazette of India* of the 8th November 1890 the Government of India Resolution No. 736-R. T., dated the 17th October 1890 and the General Rules for working railways under construction and not used for the public carriage of passengers, animals, or goods.

Letter from the Government of Bombay No. 378, dated the 12th February 1896, forwarding letter No. 279, dated the 8th February 1896, from the Resident Engineer and Agent, Bārsi Light Railway Company.

OBSERVATIONS.—The Resident Engineer and Agent, Bārsi Light Railway Company, has applied for leave to adopt, on the Bārsi Light Railway, the General Rules for working railways under construction and not used for the public carriage of passengers, animals or goods, which rules were published in the *Gazette of India* of 8th November 1890 under Public Works Department Notification No. 480½, dated the 30th October 1890.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the application of the General Rules, which are referred to in the foregoing Observations, to such portion or portions of the Bārsi Light Railway as are situate in British territory and have been sanctioned for construction.

ORDER.—Ordered that the General Rules which have already been published in the *Gazette of India* of the 8th November 1890 be further notified to the railway servants and to the public by a copy thereof being kept open to inspection, free of any charge, in the office of the Engineer in charge of the construction of the railway.

Ordered, also, that this Resolution be communicated to the Government of Bombay for information and guidance, and that it be published under a Notification in Part I of the *Gazette of India*.

No. 1979.—Whereas it appears to the Governor of Bombay in Council that land is required to be taken by Government at the public expense for a public purpose, namely, for the new road from Wári Bandar to Gunpowder Road, and its frontages at Mázgaon, Naughar, on the north side of the Naughar Tank in the City of Bombay; it is hereby declared that for the above purpose a piece of land measuring more or less 337 square yards, together with the building standing thereon, assessed by the Collector of Land Revenue, Old Nos. 12 and 32, New Nos. 11705 and 11720, and New Survey No. 3524 and assessed by the Collector of Municipal Rates and Taxes under Ward Nos. 5180 and 5181 and Street Nos. 47 to 49; bounded on the north by a passage abutting on the property of Pirozbai, wife of Pestonji Coverji, on the south by a public passage, on the east partly by the house of Rustomji Sorabji Patel and partly by the house of Merwanji Hormusji Mistry, and on the west partly by the Government vacant land and partly by the Gunpowder Road, is required within the aforesaid village of Mázgaon, Naughar.

“EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

An open Competitive Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India will be held in London, under the subjoined Regulations, commencing on the 3rd August 1896.

Sixty-one Candidates will be selected, if so many shall be found duly qualified, at this examination, viz.:—For the Lower Provinces of Bengal (including Assam) 19, for the Upper Provinces of Bengal (North-West Provinces and Oudh, the Punjab, and the Central Provinces) 24, for Burma 4, for Madras 7, for Bombay 7.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before the 1st June 1896 an application on the prescribed form, accompanied by a list of the subjects in which the candidate desires to be examined.

The order for admission to the examination will be posted on the 21st July 1896 to the address given on the form of application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates will be required to attend, and as to the manner in which the fee (£6) is to be paid.

REGULATIONS.

. The following Regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year.

1. An examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of each year. The date of the examination and the number of appointments to be made for each Province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners:—

- (i.) That he is a natural-born subject of Her Majesty.
- (ii.) That his age will be above twenty-one years and under twenty-three years, on the first day of the year in which the examination is to be held.

[N.B.—In the case of Natives of India it will be necessary for a candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality, signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the Division within which his family resides, or should he reside in a Native State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.]

(iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India.

(iv.) That he is of good moral character.

3. Should the evidence upon the above points be *prima facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in

their discretion at any time prior to the grant of the Certificate of Qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries, in the case of any candidate, should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and if already selected, will be removed from the position of a Probationer.

4. The Open Competitive Examination will take place only in the following branches of knowledge:—

Candidates are at liberty to name any or all of these branches of knowledge (c). No subjects are obligatory.

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks; and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. The marks assigned to candidates in each branch will be subject to such deduction as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that 'a candidate be allowed no credit at all for taking up a subject in which he is a mere smatterer.'

NOTE.—No deduction will be made from the marks assigned to Candidates in Mathematics or English Composition.

(c) A Syllabus, defining in general terms the character of the examination in the various subjects, may be obtained on application to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission.

7. The examination will be conducted on paper and *viva voce*, as may be deemed necessary.

8. The marks obtained by each candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the several candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining candidates, will be set forth in order of merit, and such candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the selected candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case, the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected candidate. A candidate entitled to be deemed a selected candidate, but declining to accept the nomination as such, which may be offered to him, will be disqualified for any subsequent competition.

9. Selected candidates before proceeding to India will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will be examined with a view of testing their progress in the following subjects (d):—

* These subjects may not be offered by any Candidate who has offered them at the open competition.

In this examination, as in the open competition, the merit of the candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the open competition), and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The examination will be conducted on paper and *viva voce*, as may be deemed necessary. This examination will be held at the close of the year of probation, and will be called the 'Final Examination.'

(d) Instructions, showing the extent of the examination, will be issued to the successful candidates as soon as possible after the result of the Open Competition is declared.

10. The selected candidates will also be tested during their probation as to their proficiency in riding.

The examinations in riding will be held as follows:—

- (1) Shortly after the result of the Open Competitive Examination has been declared, or at such time or times as the Commissioners may appoint during the course of the probationary year.
- (2) Again, at the time of the Final Examination, candidates who may fully satisfy the Commissioners of their ability to ride well and to perform journeys on horseback, shall receive a certificate which shall entitle them to be credited with 200 or 100 marks, according to the degree of proficiency displayed, to be added to their marks in the Final Examination.
- (3) Candidates who fail to obtain this certificate, but who gain a certificate of minimum proficiency in riding, will be allowed to proceed to India, but will be subjected on their arrival to such further tests in riding as may be prescribed by their Government, and shall receive no increase to their initial salary until they have passed such tests to the satisfaction of that Government. A candidate who fails at the end of the year of probation to gain at least the certificate of minimum proficiency in riding, will be liable to have his name removed from the list of selected candidates.

11. The selected candidates who, at the Final Examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force, at the time, for that Service.

12. Persons desirous to be admitted as candidates must apply on forms, which may be obtained from 'The Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S.W.,' at any time after the 1st December, in the year previous to that in which the examination is to be held. The forms must be returned so as to be received at the office of the Civil Service Commissioners on or before the 31st May (or, if that date should fall upon a Sunday or public holiday, then, on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open), in the year in which the examination is to be held.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorized by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make the following announcements:—

(i.) *Selected candidates will be allotted to the various provinces upon a consideration of all the circumstances, including their own wishes; but the requirements of the Public Service will rank before every other consideration.*

(ii.) *An allowance amounting to £100 will be given to all candidates who pass their probation at one of the Universities or Colleges which have been approved by the Secretary of State, viz., the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Glasgow, Edinburgh, St. Andrew's, and Aberdeen; Victoria University, Manchester; University College, London; and King's College, London; provided such candidates shall have passed the Final Examination to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners, and shall have conducted themselves well and complied with such rules as may be laid down for the guidance of selected candidates. The whole probation must ordinarily be passed at the same Institution. Migration will not be permitted except for special reasons approved by the Secretary of State.*

(iii.) *The allowance of £100 will not be paid to any selected candidate until he has been certified by the Civil Service Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India; and every certificated candidate must, before receiving his allowance, give a written undertaking to refund the amount in the event of his failing to proceed to India.*

(iv.) *All candidates obtaining certificates will be also required to enter into covenants, by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to make such payments as under the rules and regulations for the time being in force they may be required to make towards their own pensions or for the pensions of their families. The stamps payable on these covenants amount to £1.*

(v.) *The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the selected candidates will be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the combined marks of the Open Competitive and Final Examinations.*

(vi.) *Selected candidates will be required to report their arrival in India within such period after the grant of their Certificate of Qualification as the Secretary of State may in each case direct.*

(vii.) *Candidates rejected at the Final Examination held in any year will in no case be allowed to present themselves for re-examination.*

ORDERED, that the foregoing Resolution be forwarded to the Governments of Madras, Bombay, and Bengal, and the Chief Commissioner of Burma, in continuation of No. 3457, dated the 19th July 1895.

THE CHARITABLE ENDOWMENTS ACT, 1890.

IN THE MATTER OF THE LADY REAY FUND FOR NURSES IN CONNECTION WITH THE GRANT MEDICAL COLLEGE AT BOMBAY.

Vesting Order.

WHEREAS application has been made to the Local Government of Bombay by the Honourable John Macpherson, Barrister-at-Law, Acting Advocate General of Bombay, William Keith Hatch, Acting Principal of the Grant Medical College, Bombay, Annette Matilda Benson, M.D., First Physician of the Kama Hospital, Bombay, Mancherjee Merwanjee Bhownagari, a Representative of His Highness the Thakor Sahib of Bhavnagar, and Gertrude Anna, Sister, All Saints Community, Lady Superintendent of the Nursing Establishment of the Jamsetjee Jeejeebhoy Hospital, that the Government of India Stock of the Loan of 1865 of the nominal value of Rupees one lakh and seven hundred, Certificate No. $\frac{437}{231}$, standing in the name of the Accountant General, Bombay, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum, may be vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the Presidency of Bombay upon the following terms:—

To collect or draw the income or interest thereof as and when the same becomes due and payable and to hand over and pay the same as and when the same is received to or to the order or account of the Managers, person or persons appointed to administer the same under a scheme settled or to be settled under Section 5 of the Charitable Endowments Act, 1890, or other law for the time being in force, to be applied for the training and maintenance of Nurses at the Jamsetjee Jeejeebhoy Hospital or any of the Hospitals connected with the Grant Medical College according to such scheme.

Now under or by virtue of Section 4 of the Charitable Endowments Act, 1890, His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased hereby to order that the abovementioned Securities be and they are hereby vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the Bombay Presidency upon the terms aforesaid.

THE CHARITABLE ENDOWMENTS ACT, 1890.

IN THE MATTER OF THE LADY REAY FUND FOR NURSES IN CONNECTION WITH THE GRANT MEDICAL COLLEGE AT BOMBAY.

Scheme.

WHEREAS in 1889 His Highness Sir Takhatsingji Jaswantsingji, G.C.S.I., Thákor Sáheb of Bhávnagar, gave Rs. 1,00,000 as an Endowment for the Training and Maintenance of Nurses at the Jamsetjee Jijeebhoy Hospital or any of the Hospitals connected with the Grant Medical College, Bombay, under the following conditions:—

- A.—That the Fund be called "The Lady Reay Fund for Nurses."
- B.—That the amount be placed at the disposal of the following Managers:—
- I.—The Honourable the Advocate General for the time being.
 - II.—The Principal of the Grant Medical College for the time being.
 - III.—The First Physician of the Kama Hospital for the time being.
 - IV.—A Representative of His Highness the Thákor Sáheb of Bhávnagar for the time being.
 - V.—The Lady who for the time being superintends the Nursing Establishment of the Jamsetjee Jijeebhoy Hospital or any of the Hospitals connected with the Grant Medical College, and in case of there being two or more Ladies qualified as aforesaid, such one as the other Managers may elect.
- C.—That the entire management of the Fund shall be at the discretion and under the supervision of the said Managers.
- D.—That it shall be competent to the Managers to invest the Capital in any Securities which they may consider advisable, except Personal Securities, and that only the interest thereof shall be utilized for the purpose aforesaid.

AND WHEREAS the investments now representing the said Fund consist of Government of India Stock of the Loan of 1865 of the nominal value of Rs. 1,00,700, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum; AND WHEREAS by order dated the 24th day of February 1896, duly notified in the *Bombay Government Gazette*, the said Government of India Stock for Rs. 1,00,700 has been, under Section 4 of the Charitable Endowments Act, 1890, vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the Bombay Presidency; AND WHEREAS the Honourable John Macpherson, Acting Advocate General of Bombay, William Keith Hatch, Acting Principal of the Grant Medical College, Bombay, Annetto Matilda Benson, First Physician of the Kama Hospital, Bombay, and Gertrude Anna, Sister, All Saints Community, Lady Superintendent of the Nursing Establishment of the Jamsetjee Jijeebhoy Hospital, Bombay, and Mancherji Merwanji Bhownaggri, the Representative of His Highness the Thákor Sáheb of Bhávnagar, have applied to the Government of Bombay to settle a scheme for the administration of the said property, and the following scheme has, with their concurrence, been settled by the Government of Bombay in Council. Now under Section 5 of the Charitable Endowments Act, 1890, it is hereby declared that the following scheme shall come into operation from the date that the Securities so as aforesaid became vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the Bombay Presidency:—

IV.—A Representative of His Highness the Thákor Sáheb of Bhávnagar for the time being.

V.—The Lady who for the time being superintends the Nursing Establishment of the Jamsotjee Jijeebhoy Hospital or any of the Hospitals connected with the Grant Medical College, and in case of there being two or more Ladies qualified as aforesaid, such one as the other Managers may elect.

C.—That the entire management of the income of the Fund shall be at the discretion and under the supervision of the said Managers.
