No. 1172,-The following General Order by the Government of India No. 260, dated 6th instant, is republished :-

"MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Fort William, the 6th March 1896.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 260.-1. With the sanction of the Secretary of State for India, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to notify that from the 1st April 1896, the following changes in the organisation of the Indian Medical Services will have effect.

- 2. The medical services of Bengal, Madras and Bombay will be amalgamated into one service under the direct administrative control of the Government of India.
- The Surgeon-General with the Government of India will be the head of the amalgamated Indian Medical Service, and his designation will be Director-General of the Indian Medical Service.
- 4. No change will be made in the conditions under which officers of the Bengal, Madras and Bombay Medical Services, appointed before the second examination in 1896, are serving; promotion will continue to run on their respective lists, and the sphere of their employment will remain as at present, except in cases of emergency, when it may be desirable to employ them temporarily beyond it. In time of war all officers who can be spared from civil duties will be employed as the exigencies of the service may demand.
- 5. From the date of the second examination in 1896, Surgeon-Lieutenants will be recruited for the amalgamated Indian Medical Service, and the appointments will be made on one general list. Subject to the requirements of the service, officers will be allowed choice of Commands according to their position on the list as determined by the combined results of the preliminary and final examinations. The officers appointed to this list, although ordinarily employed within the Commands to which they may be posted, will be liable to employment in any part of India according to the exigencies of the service. The subsequent transfers to civil duties will ordinarily be allotted, so far as the requirements of the service will allow, to the provinces within the limits of the Command to which the officers were originally posted.
- 6. The present Surgeon-Generals with the Governments of Madras and Bombay will retain their claim to rank, pay and pensions under existing rules. The question of the continuance of these privileges to their successors in office will be reserved for future consideration.
- 7. The Surgeon-Generals will be restricted to the exercise of the functions of Administrative Medical Officers and Civil Inspector-Generals of Hospitals in respect to the Civil Medical Staff and Civil Medical Institutions in the Presidencies of Madras and Bombay respectively. They will cease to exercise any control over those sections of the existing medical establishments of Madras and Bombay which are composed of officers employed

with the army, or over the reserve of 25 per cent. for leave and casualties, the administration of which will be conducted directly under the orders of the Government of India.

8. The post of Secretary to the Surgeon-General with the Government of Madras or Bombay will be retained for the present incumbents of the office of Surgeon-General with those Governments. On a vacancy occurring in the post of Secretary to the Surgeon-General, Madras or Bombay, it will only be filled by an officiating officer, and when the present Surgeon-Generals vacate their appointments, their successors will not have Secretaries but only Personal Assistants."

No. 20.—In accordance with the provisions of Section 74 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, the following Dock Bye-law which the Trustees of the Port of Bombay propose to make is published for the information of all persons whom it may concern:—

"If any vessel shall discharge upon any wharf or property of the Trust any cargo, goods or substance in such a rotten, putrid, damaged or other condition as to be a nuisance or injurious or dangercus to health in the opinion of the Health Officer of the Port, or if any cargo, goods or substance discharged from any vessel and lying on a wharf or in a shed or other property belonging to the Trust shall become in such a rotten, putrid or other condition as to be a nuisance or injurious or dangerous to health in the opinion of the Health Officer of the Port, the Docks Superintendent or Traffic Manager may require the consignee thereof or, if the consignee should disclaim, deny or dispute the consignment or decline all responsibility for the same, or if there should be no consignee, the owner, master or agent of

the vessel from which the same had been discharged, to forthwith cause the said cargo. goods or substance to be removed from the property of the Trust; and if such consignee or such master, owner or agent as the case may be shall, on being so required, refuse or neglect, for the space of eighteen hours after notice, to remove such cargo, goods or substance, then such removal may be effected in such manner as he may think fit by the Docks Superintendent or Traffic Manager, who may, if he thinks necessary, cause the same to be de-stroyed, and the said consignce or the said master, owner or agent as the case may be shall, within forty-eight hours after demand in writing, pay to the Board all the costs or expense attending or occasioned by such removal and destruction and of such cleaning, purifying or disinfecting the place of discharge or storage as may be considered desirable, and shall be further liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 100."

LIGHTING OF CHANNEL BUOYS.

Further information has been received from the Port Officer, Karáchi, that the channel buoys in the Port of Karáchi are lighted from and after the 26th of February 1896.

Two can (black) buoys on the port hand and one conical (red) buoy on the starboard hand have been recently laid on the bearings (magnetic) noted against them.

The bearings are from seaward.

RESOLUTION.

Calcutta, the 6th March 1896.

The Governor General has had under consideration the question whether it is any longer necessary to continue, in the same place and for the same purpose, the dual system of Presidency Savings Banks and Post Office Savings Banks at Presi-dency Towns. His Excellency in Council has now decided that the Presidency and Post Office Savings Banks should be amalgamated, and that the Post Office organisation being more economical than the other system, the Presidency Savings Banks should be closed and their accounts transferred to the Post Office Savings Banks. The Government Presidency Savings Bank will accordingly be closed with effect from the 1st October 1896. From the date of receipt of the present orders no new accounts should be opened in any of the Presidency Savings Banks. Any person wishing to open an account in any of these Banks should be directed to apply to a Post Office Savings Bank. The transfer of existing accounts will be made gradually between the beginning of April and the end of September.

All transfers will, in the first place, be made to the Presidency Post Office; and it will be open to any depositor to apply for the transfer of his account, under the Post Office Savings Banks' Rules, to any Post Office at which he may wish it to be kept.
