No. 2492.—With reference to Government Notification No. 8551, dated the 10th December 1895, the following amendments of Rules 7 and 8 of the subsidiary Rules relating to public conveyances plying for hire on the road leading from Wáthár to Mahábaleshvar *via* Wái and Panchgani, sanctioned in Government Notification No. 8058, dated the 20th December 1893, are published for general information:—

Rule 7.—The number of horses and bullocks to be maintained for each class of conveyance plying between Wáthár and Mahábaleshvar, and the stages at which changes of fresh animals are to be made, shall be as follows:

Rule 8.—With the exception of second class tongas (with two ponies), each laden licensed conveyance shall be drawn by double the ordinary number of horses or bullocks up the Wái Ghát as far as the Pasarni Plateau. Laden second class tongas shall be drawn by four ponies from Wái to Panchgani,

No. 2495.—The following proposed amendment of Rules 6, 7 and 8 of the subsidiary Rules relating to public conveyances plying for hire on the road leading from Wáthár to Mahábaleshvar *via* Wái and Panchgani, sanctioned in Government Notification No. 8058, dated the 20th December 1893, as amended by Government Notification No. 2492, dated the 7th April 1896, is published for general information; and it is hereby notified that any objections to the proposed amendment, which are delivered in writing at the office of the Secretary to Government in the Judicial Department on or before the 15th May 1896, will be taken by the Governor in Council into his consideration:—

“ In Rules 6, 7 and 8 for the words ‘*Pasarni Plateau*’ substitute the words ‘*the toll gate at the village of Dandeghar*’* and add to the rules a foot-note as follows:—

* “The stage or stand may be at any place within a distance of 400 yards from the toll gate.”

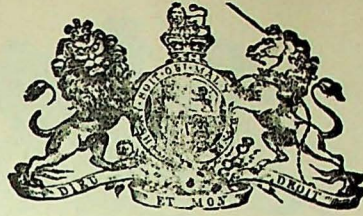

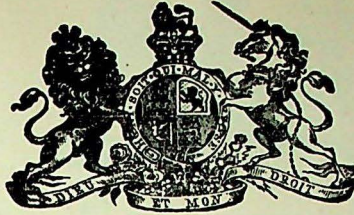
