Resolution by the Government of India in the Department of Finance and Commerce No. 2270-A,* dated the 18th May 1895, prescribing revised rules for the guidance of depositors in the Post Office Savings

cil is pleased to sanction the following alteration in the rules :

For rule 42, clause (a), the following shall be substituted:

'(a) Government servants, servants of local authorities and of Courts of Wards who are required by their employers to deposit security, and contractors who are required by Government or local authorities to deposit security, may be allowed separate accounts for the security deposits only."

In accordance with the Resolution of the Municipality passed at a Special General Meeting held on the 13th instant, we have the honour to request, on behalf of the Municipality of Surat, permission to borrow in the open Market under the authority of the Local Authorities Loan Act of 1879 the sum of Rupees Six Lákhs (6,00,000) for the construction of Water Works for the City of Surat.

Appendix A, showing the particulars required by Rule 5 of the Rules made by the Governor General in Council under Sections 5 and 7 of the Local Authorities Loan Act, 1879, together with Statements A, B and C, are hereto appended.

APPENDIX A.

Statement showing the particulars pursuant to Rule 5 of the Rules made by the Governor General in Council under Sections 5 and 7 of the Local Authorities Loan Act, 1879.

- 1. The Loan is required for the construction of water works for supplying the city of Surat with water. The estimate of the cost of the work is Rs. 8,50,000.
 - 2. The amount which it is proposed to borrow is Rs. 6,00,000 (six lákhs).
 - 3. It is proposed to borrow the said sum on the security of the revenues of the Surat Municipality.
 - 4. The laws under which these revenues are levied are Bombay Acts VI of 1873 and II of 1884.
- 5. The money will be received between the 1st March 1896 and 31st December 1897. Tenders will be invited for the whole sum required or for portions at such intervals as may be most convenient.
 - 6. The loan is required for a period not exceeding 30 years.
- 7. Interest will be paid at 4 per cent, per annum = Rs. 24,000 per annum; Rs. 20,000 will be set apart yearly for repayment of the principal; Rs. 15,000 will be required for annual working expenses; total Rs. 59,000 per annum.
- 8. The above is on the assumption that the whole of the loan with be raised, but it is confidently hoped that if the rate of exchange falls no lower, five lakhs at the most will be enough. The present balance in hand, including money already paid to the Public Works Department for commencing the water works and private donations promised, already exceeds three lakhs.
- 9. The annual receipts and expenditure for the last three years, together with estimates for the future, are submitted in Statements A, B and C. From these it will be seen that a surplus of Rs. 83,090 may safely be anticipated.
 - With reference to the estimates in Statements A and B the following notes are submitted:—
 Rs. 45,000 estimated in Statement A for House Tax is based on present actuals.
 - Rs. 2,000 has been allowed in Statement A for interest on investments. Though this figure will not be reached for some years, it will be more than made up by the profit expected on sale of Government paper and the premium expected on the issue of this Loan.
 - The cost of watering roads has been reduced by Rs. 5,000, as this will be a result of the water works.
 - So also the cost of watering the Public Park has been reduced by Rs. 500.
 - The repayment of the existing $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. loan is estimated at its present sum, but it will of course decrease year by year.

11. There is only one existing prior charge on the funds of the Municipality, namely, a Loan or Rupees Two Lakhs taken up in the open Market at 5½ per cent. under the authority conveyed in Government Resolution No. 3583 of 20th September 1889. Twenty promissory notes of Rs. 500 each are drawn by lot every year and paid off. The balance of the Loan now remaining is Rs. 1,40,000.

Persons who have any objection to urge to the draft rule are required to forward their objections in writing to the Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, within three months from the date of publication of this Notification :-

In exercise of the power conferred by clause (c)

No timber, firewood, bamboos, myrabolams, shikakai, charcoal or shembe bark shipped at any place declared under Section 12 of the Sea Customs Act, 1878, to be a port, or at any customs port except the Port of Bombay and the Ports in Sind, and in the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach, may be carried in a coasting vessel:

- (a) unless at the time of shipment the shipper appends to his shipping bill a pass in one or other of the forms hereinafter mentioned covering such timber, firewood, bamboos, myrabolams, shikákái, charcoal or shembe bark, nor
- (b) until the Customs Collector at the port of shipment shall have certified by endorsement on the shipping bill that a pass as aforesaid has been produced before him and cancelled by him.

The pass required by this rule shall be either:

- (a) a pass granted by a competent officer under No. 3 of the rules framed by Government under Section 41 of the Indian Forest Act, 1878, and published by Notification No. 33 at page 689 of the Bombay Government Gazette for 1880, Part I, and, under the said section of the said Indian Forest Act as amended by the Forest Act, 1890, amended by the rule published by Notification No. 5586 at page 818 of the Bombay Government Gazette for 1895, Part I, or
- (b) a pass granted for the purpose of this rule
 - (i) a person duly authorized under No. 13 of the said rules under the said Indian Forest Act, amended as aforesaid, or
 - (ii) an officer belonging to one or other of the classes following, that is to say,-

Mámlatdárs, Head Kárkún, General Duty Kárkúns, Talátis, Kulkarnis, Mahálkaris.

No. 1509-I .- Whereas His Highness the Mir of Khairpur has ceded to the British Government the civil and criminal jurisdiction exercised by him within the lands which lie within his State and which are occupied, or may hereafter be occupied, by the Kotri-Rohri Railway (including the lands occupied by stations, by out-buildings and for other railway purposes), and whereas the Governor-General in Council now possesses full jurisdiction within those lands:

In exercise of such jurisdiction and of the powers conferred by sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act (XXI of 1879), and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to provide as follows for the administration of justice within the aforesaid lands:

- (1) All laws in force in the Shikarpur District of the Province of Sind and Presidency of Bombay shall be deemed to be in force in the said lands.
- (2) The Governor of Bombay in Council and all officers of Government subordinate to the Government of Bombay exercising executive authority (other than the administration of the police) in the Shikarpur District, shall have within the said lands the same executive powers as they may respectively exercise within the British territory subject to their administration.
- (3) All Courts having for the time being jurisdiction within the Shikarpur District shall exercise the like jurisdiction within the said lands.
- (4) The administration of the police within the said lands shall be vested in the Assistant Inspector-General of the Railway Police, Punjab, who shall exercise within such lands the same police powers as he may for the time being exercise on the portion of the North-Western Railway which lies in the Shikarpur District, in subordination to the authorities to whom he may be, for the time being, subordinate when exercising those powers on that portion of that rail-
- (5) The said lands shall be deemed to be included for the purpose of clauses 2 and 3 of this Notification within such taluka or other sub-division of the Shikarpur District as the Governor of Bombay in Council shall from time to time direct by Notification in the Bombay Government Gazette.
