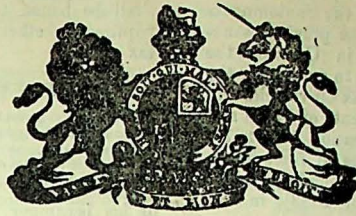

NOTIFICATIONS.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 29th June 1896.

No. 2814.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 17, sub-section (1), of the Cantonments Act (XIII of 1889), and with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, the Governor in Council is pleased to impose in the Cantonments of Poona and Kirkee respectively the following tax to be levied from the owners or persons in charge of vehicles and animals kept within Cantonment limits:—

A tax at the following rates on vehicles and animals:

	Rs. a. p.
1. For every four-wheeled vehicle on springs... ..	5 0 0 per quarter.
2. For every two-wheeled vehicle on springs	3 0 0 ..

Provided, first, that the said tax shall not be levied in respect of any vehicle or animal so kept for a period not exceeding fifteen days:

Provided, secondly, that if any vehicle or animal is so kept during any quarter for a period exceeding fifteen, but not exceeding thirty, days, only one-third of the said tax shall be levied for that quarter: and

Provided, thirdly, that the said tax shall not be levied in respect of any vehicle or animal so kept which has not been used throughout the quarter, if due notice in writing of the fact of disuse is given by the owner in accordance with such rules on the subject as may be prescribed under Section 17, sub-section (2), of the Cantonments Act (XIII of 1889).

No. 2814A.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 17, sub-section (2), of the Cantonments Act (XIII of 1889), and with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, the Governor in Council is pleased to apply, for the assessment and recovery of the tax on vehicles and animals imposed in the Cantonments of Poona and Kirkee respectively by Notification No. 2814, dated 29th June 1896, the rules in force in the Municipal areas notified under the Bombay Highway Act, 1883 (Bombay Act I of 1883), in the adapted form hereinafter set forth:—

Rules for the assessment and recovery of the tax on Vehicles and Animals in the Cantonments of Poona and Kirkee.

PRELIMINARY.

1. In these rules—

(a) 'the said tax,' means the tax on vehicles and animals imposed in the Cantonments of Poona and Kirkee respectively by Notification No. 2814, dated 29th June 1896;

(b) 'Cantonment,' 'Cantonment Magistrate' and 'Cantonment Committee' mean in the Cantonment of Poona, the Cantonment of Poona, the Cantonment Magistrate of Poona, and the Cantonment Committee of Poona; and in the Cantonment of Kirkee, the Cantonment of Kirkee, the Cantonment Magistrate of Kirkee, and the Cantonment Committee of Kirkee respectively.

ASSESSMENT.

2. The Cantonment Magistrate shall cause to be prepared once a year, in a book to be provided by him for this purpose and called the Assessment-book, a list of the persons liable to the said tax, showing in distinct columns—

- (a) the names and residences of such persons;
- (b) the description of vehicles or animals in respect of which they are respectively liable to the tax;
- (c) the amount of tax for which each such person is assessed for each quarter of the year; and
- (d) the amount of the said tax, if any, remitted in each quarter under the second or third proviso to Notification No. 2814, dated 29th June 1896, imposing the said tax.

The Assessment-book shall be kept at the office of the Cantonment Magistrate, and shall be open to the inspection of every respectable resident of the Cantonment.

3. To enable him to have such list prepared,

the Cantonment Magistrate shall send to every person supposed to be liable to pay the tax a schedule to be filled up by such person with such information respecting the vehicles and animals owned by him or in his charge as the Cantonment Magistrate thinks necessary for the assessment of the tax, and to be returned duly signed by him within one week after the receipt thereof.

Every person to whom any such schedule is sent shall be bound to fill up and return the same as required, whether he be liable to be assessed to the tax or not.

4. Every person who becomes possessed of any

vehicle or animal in respect of which he is liable for the first time to pay the tax aforesaid, shall be bound, within fifteen days of his becoming possessed of the same, to give notice thereof in writing to the Cantonment Magistrate.

5. Every person who claims under the second

or third proviso to Notification No. 2814, dated 29th June 1896, to be exempt in respect of two-thirds or the whole of the said tax, as the case may be, shall forward by post to the Cantonment Magistrate, or leave at his office, not later than on the last day of such quarter, a notice in writing under his signature setting forth the facts on which such claim is based.

6. The Cantonment Magistrate, or any person authorized by him in this behalf, may:

- (a) at any time between 5 A.M. and 7 P.M. enter and inspect any stable or coach-house or any place in which he may have reason to believe there is any vehicle or animal in respect whereof the said tax is leviable;
- (b) summon any person whom he has reason to believe to be liable to the said tax, or any servant of such person, and to examine such person or servant as to the liability of such person to the tax, and as to the number and description of the vehicles or animals, if any, in respect of which such person is so liable.

COLLECTION.

7. The said tax shall be payable for each of the following four quarters of every year, and when leviable.

- (1) 1st January to 31st March;
- (2) 1st April to 30th June;
- (3) 1st July to 30th September;
- (4) 1st October to 31st December.

It shall ordinarily be payable in arrear on the first day of the quarter next following that for which it is due; but in the case of a person who ceases to be a resident of the cantonment at any time during the currency of a quarter, it shall be payable one week before such person's departure from the said cantonment.

8. When any tax becomes due, the Cantonment Magistrate shall, with the

least practicable delay, cause to be presented to the person liable to pay the same a bill for the sum due. The bill shall specify the quarter, or portion of the quarter, and the vehicles or animals in respect of which the tax is charged and the name of the person from whom it is claimed, and shall

contain a notice that the amount of the bill must be paid into the Cantonment Magistrate's office within fifteen days from the date of the presentation of the said bill.

9. Complaints against the assessment of any tax under these rules, or the amount thereof, may be made to the Cantonment Magistrate, by application in writing forwarded by post or left at his office, at any time within seven days from the date of the presentation of the bill for such tax, and upon hearing any such complaint the Cantonment Magistrate may make such amendment, if any, in the book kept under Rule 2 and in the bill as he shall think proper, and if he thinks that the complainant is not liable to the tax, shall cancel the bill.

10. If any bill, which is not cancelled under the last foregoing rule, is not paid by the person from whom payment is claimed, or on his behalf, within fifteen days from the presentation thereof, the Cantonment Magistrate may cause to be served upon the defaulter a notice of demand in Form A, hereto annexed, or to the like effect, and if the defaulter does not, within fifteen days from the service of such notice of demand, pay the sum, due or show sufficient cause for non-payment of the same to the satisfaction of the Cantonment Magistrate, and if no appeal has been preferred and the amount of the tax has not been deposited as hereinafter provided, such sum, with all costs, may be levied by order of the Cantonment Magistrate under a warrant in Form B, hereto annexed, by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the defaulter.

For every notice of demand under this rule which the Cantonment Magistrate shall cause to be served upon any person, a fee not exceeding one rupee, the amount of which shall in each case be fixed by the Cantonment Magistrate, shall be paid by such person. Such fee shall be added to the amount of the tax in respect of which the notice is given, and, if not duly paid, shall be recovered as costs in the manner in which such tax may be recovered.

11. The goods and chattels of any person from whom any tax is due may be distrained, wherever the same may be found, for default in the payment of the money due from such person.

12. The officer charged with the execution of a warrant of distress shall make an inventory of the goods and chattels seized under such warrant, and shall at the same time give a notice in writing in Form C, hereto annexed, to the person in possession at the time of the seizure, that the said goods and chattels will be sold as therein mentioned.

13. If the warrant is not in the meantime discharged or suspended by the Cantonment Magistrate, the goods and chattels seized shall be sold under the orders of the Cantonment Magistrate, who shall apply the proceeds, or such part thereof

as may be necessary, in discharge of the tax and of the costs payable by the defaulter; and the surplus, if any, shall be returned on demand to the person in possession of the goods and chattels at the time of the seizure.

Fees shall be payable upon distraints under these rules at the rates set forth in Table D, hereto annexed, and shall be recoverable from the defaulter as costs in addition to the amount of the tax.

14. Instead of proceeding by distress and sale, or in case of failure to realize by distress the whole or any part of the sum due by a defaulter, the Cantonment Magistrate may sue the defaulter in any Court of competent jurisdiction.

APPEALS.

15. Appeals against the assessment or levy of the said tax shall be heard and determined by the Cantonment Committee. When and to whom appeals may be made.

But no such appeal shall be heard unless:

- (a) the amount of the tax has first been deposited with the Cantonment Magistrate; and
- (b) a complaint has been made to and disposed of by the Cantonment Magistrate under Rule 9; and
- (c) the appeal is brought within fifteen days from the date of the presentation of the bill for the tax complained of; or, if a complaint has been made under Rule 9, within fifteen days from the date of the Cantonment Magistrate's order disposing of such complaint.

If the appellate authority remits in whole or in part the amount of the tax, the Cantonment Magistrate shall grant to the appellant a refund accordingly.

The Indian Civil Service Family Pension Regulations: second quinquennial valuation of.

Valuation by Mr. Willis Browne, F.I.A.,* of the Assets and Liabilities under the Indian Civil Service Family Pension Regulations as at the 30th of September 1893, together with observations thereon by Mr. William Sutton, F.I.A.†

INDIA OFFICE:

London, 2nd April 1896.

2. For the purpose of this valuation interest at the rate of 4½ per cent., as heretofore, has been used, but a lower interest is now being considered as regards the valuation of the Military Family Pension Regulations; and, as it was never intended that the pensions provided by these rules should bring any charge on the revenues of India beyond the prescribed Government contributions, the rate to be adopted on the next occasion will depend upon a consideration of the market rates of the day as specified in the constitution of the Regulations.

3. It will be observed that Mr. Sutton is of opinion that no serious attempt should now be made to appropriate any portion of the surplus of 26,716½, which represents over 23¾ per cent. of the value of the liabilities. It appears that more than three-fourths of the surplus is produced by the subscriptions of unmarried officers, but this result was fully anticipated by the late General Hannington, who inaugurated the scheme, and neither Mr. Willis Browne nor Mr. Sutton advocate any special reduction at the present time of the subscriptions of unmarried officers.

4. In his Despatch dated the 15th of May 1890, No. 3, paragraph 8, Lord Cross stated that he was not satisfied that the principle of using a surplus to lessen the effect on the payments in India of a fall in the value of silver was a sound one, and he remarked that the question of adopting the principle (originally advocated by Mr. Sutton) that the rupee payments in India should vary annually according to the value of the rupee, in order that the equivalent of the fixed contributions in sterling may be paid by the subscribers in India, would be considered in connection with the reports of the Actuaries on the Military Service Family Pension Regulations which were then under his consideration. In his subsequent Despatch, dated the 11th of December 1890, No. 10, His Lordship decided that the official rate of exchange should from the 1st of April 1891 be adopted with reference to the Military Service subscribers, but no orders have since been given in respect of the Civil Service Regulations.

5. I see no reason why a different treatment should be meted out to the two funds. I direct, therefore, that on and after the 1st of October next the contributions in India (subscriptions and marriage donations) under the Civil Service Regulations be recovered at the official rate of exchange for each year. Donations payable by instalments must be dealt with according to Lord Cross' Despatch, dated 25th June 1891, No. 5, paragraph 5.

6. Having considered in Council the question what reduction in the existing subscriptions should

now be made in consequence of the surplus, I have decided that, as a temporary measure until the next valuation, the present rates shall be reduced in England and in India by 27½ per cent. with effect from the 1st of October next. Marriage donations cannot be included in this reduction. Tables V and VI regarding monthly contributions should stand as noted on the margin.‡

7. In accordance with the terms of Lord Cross' Despatch, dated the 11th of December 1890, No. 10, the *pro forma* accounts for the half-year commencing on the 1st of October next should be rendered in sterling and should not in future be balanced, the details only of receipts and payments during the half-year being furnished. Those details will be embodied in the *pro forma* account which is made up and balanced half-yearly in this Office.

8. I forward tables prepared by Mr. Willis Browne showing the rupee values, at various rates of exchange, of the reduced sterling subscriptions.

The above facts in no way lead me to suppose that the amounts of “rate-in-aid” estimated by me and explained in my last report are incorrect, and I have accordingly adopted the same for the purposes of the present valuation, *viz.*, £5.323 for each daughter and £4.5 for each son.

The annual charge for expenses of management as at present fixed, *viz.*, 350*l.*, bears the following proportions to the respective yearly amounts of receipts and payments in India:

In the Indian Military Service Family Pension Fund a fixed charge is made of 2½ per cent. on the gross receipts and disbursements in India, and I recommend that the same method be adopted in respect to this Fund from the date at which the present annual charge shall represent that percentage on the Indian receipts and disbursements. Also, as in the case of the Military Fund, I recommend a charge of 200*l.* per annum for this Office, to commence forthwith. In these circumstances I value the charges of management at 7,375*l.*

The value of the incumbent pensions is estimated at 8,285*l.* There were no pensioners at the date of the last valuation.

The value of future subscriptions for existing wives is estimated at 79,805*l.*, being 2,587*l.* less than the value of their contingent pensions estimated at 82,392*l.*

The value of future subscriptions for existing children is estimated at 16,445*l.*, being in excess by 1,930*l.* of the value of their contingent pensions.

The amount of capital in hand is 41,698*l.*, which, together with the outstanding contributions and contingent assets, brings the total up to 139,283*l.* On the other hand, the total value of the liabilities, including the sum of 7,375*l.* for charges of management, amounts to 112,567*l.*, leaving a balance in favour of the Fund of 26,716*l.*, which represents over 23¼ per cent. of the value of the liabilities.

It is necessary to examine into the cause of this very large surplus, and I have in consequence valued the assets and liabilities appertaining to married officers only with a view of ascertaining how far the surplus is due to the contributions of unmarried officers in excess of the amount required to

supplement the subscriptions of married officers for the purpose of providing pensions to their children. The result I find to be as under :

Thus it is seen that the surplus represents about 5 per cent. of the total value of the liabilities. This is as it should be, and is, in my opinion, no more than necessary to provide a margin of safety. It is evident, therefore, that the rates of contribution, so far as we can judge from the experience at hand, are such as to justify their retention. The large surplus is due chiefly to the subscriptions of unmarried officers, which, as pointed out in my report on the last quinquennial valuation, are, as a matter of course, larger than required at the present time, but which, when the state of membership shall become normal, or thereabouts, will not be found in excess of the requirements of the time. When the Fund shall have arrived at that state in which the approach of a full complement of married officers may be anticipated, the percentage of liabilities represented by the surplus will decrease, supposing always that the experience now in our possession will continue to prevail. I should not, therefore, be justified in recommending any permanent reduction in the rates of subscription beyond the amount of excess capital we have already in hand together with a sum representing the present value of the annual income to be derived temporarily from unmarried officers in excess of the income required. This, I think, we might be justified in making use of. Hitherto we have applied this excess income as a relief in mitigation of the ruling low rate of exchange.

It has already been decided in the case of the sister fund, *viz.*, that appertaining to the Military Service, that no rate of exchange should be allowed to enter into the calculations, and that the contributions should be paid at the rate fixed for the financial year. The adoption of this principle in respect to the contributions of members of the Indian Civil Service Family Pension Fund was advocated in paragraph 8 of Financial (Funds) Despatch to India, No. 3 of 1890, and I think the time has now arrived for the final settlement of the question. If the decision be identical with that pronounced in the case of the sister fund, it becomes necessary to consider the manner in which the surplus may best be utilized. It is pointed out by the Director of Funds that the rates of subscription fall very heavily on married subscribers in receipt of absentee allowance, and he has furnished a statement that leaves no room for doubt that such is the case, assuming always that these officers have no means other than their pay.

The amount of capital already in hand, which is due to the income derived from unmarried members in excess of the income required, I estimate to be 24,781*l.*, and the present value of the excess income to be hereafter derived, and which will gradually decrease until it shall have disappeared in about the year 1908, I estimate at about 25,181*l.* Thus we have a sum of about 50,000*l.* that we may apply, *if considered advisable*, to the reduction of subscriptions payable during furlough.

If the rates of subscription during furlough were to be reduced all round by one-half, I estimate that we should require a present sum of about 69,500*l.* Hereafter should the fund be found more prosperous financially than is now anticipated, this even might be taken into consideration, but at present it would, in my opinion, be very unwise to adopt such a course. To reduce the rates of subscription of married officers during furlough for *wives only* would, I estimate, cost about 51,000*l.* I may allude to the fact that, as the excess income from unmarried members can only be looked for temporarily, and that any reduction in the rates of subscription whilst on furlough will probably be considered a permanent reduction, I have, in estimating the amount required, valued the reduction not on an annuity appertaining to the Society in its present state, but as a perpetuity. Nevertheless, in respect to the present abstract of valuation, the surplus will, in the event of the concession proposed being granted, be reduced by 3,089*l.* only. This value appertains to present married officers only, but, as in the case of the valuation of their subscriptions and of the contingent pensions to existing wives and children, it applies throughout the period of their existence, duly taking into account promotions from class to class.

In the alternative, I am of opinion that the favourable rate of exchange now ruling might without causing a deficit be continued until the date of the next quinquennial valuation or that the full sterling rates of subscription both in England and in India might be reduced by 27½ per cent. until such time as by valuation it may be shown necessary to increase them. In the latter case the increase would be gradual and the full sterling rates would become payable only when the surplus arising from excess unmarried subscriptions shall have been absorbed.
