RESOLUTION—By the Government of India, Finance and Commerce Department.

Read again—

Resolution by the Government of India in the Department of Finance and Commerce No. 2270-A. dated the 18th May 1895,* prescribing Revised Rules for the guidance of Depositors in the Post Office Savings Banks.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the following alteration in the Rules:

For Rule 41, clause (b), the following shall be substituted:

‘District Superintendents of Police, and Officers in Command or charge of any Police Force, may open similar accounts on account of the men of the Police Force under their command or charge.’

No. 3082.—The following draft of rules which it is proposed to make under sub-section (2) of Section 58 of the Pilgrim Ships Act (XIV of 1895) is hereby published, as required by the said Act, for the information of all persons likely to be affected thereby, and notice is hereby given that the draft will be taken into consideration on or after the 1st day of September 1896.

2. Any suggestions or objections received before the date aforesaid will be considered by the Governor in Council and also by the Governor General in Council:—

Draft Rules.

1. (1) No pilgrim shall be embarked on any pilgrim ship—

(a) if it is in dock, more than six hours before the time fixed for the departure of that ship from the dock, or

(b) until he has been medically inspected.

(2) Any pilgrim or other person committing a breach of this rule shall be punished with fine which may extend to Rs. 200.

2. (1) When the time has arrived at which the embarkation is under Section 32 permitted to commence, every pilgrim, after he has been medically inspected, shall, on producing a ticket in the prescribed form, be embarked forthwith on the pilgrim ship to which the ticket applies—

(a) if the ship is in dock, by proceeding at once on board by a passage leading direct to the ship, or

(b) if the ship is in midstream, by proceeding immediately to the ship by such direct route and by such boat as shall be indicated in this behalf by the Health Officer of the Port.

(2) Any pilgrim or other person committing a breach of this rule shall be punished with fine which may extend to Rs. 100.

3. (1) Every pilgrim ship shall depart from dock within six hours from the time at which the embarkation of pilgrims has under Section 32 of the said Act been permitted to commence.

(2) The master of a pilgrim ship committing a breach of this rule without lawful excuse or wilfully shall be punished with fine which may extend to Rs. 200, and when the breach continues with a further fine which may extend to Rs. 20 for every day after the first during which the breach continues.

No. 3090.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 3 of the Indian Factories Act, 1881, as amended by the Indian Factories Act, 1891, the Governor in Council is pleased to appoint the Civil Surgeon of Hyderabad to be Inspector of Factories within the local limits of the Thar and Parkar District.

No. 3097.—The following Rules made in exercise of the powers conferred on the Governor in Council by the Indian Tramways Act, 1886, are published under Section 26 of the said Act for general information:—

RULES.

1. The Rules may be cited as "The Bombay Short title. Presidency Tramway Rules."

They shall apply to all tramways in the Presidency of Bombay constructed under "The Indian Tramways Act, 1886."

2. The several words and expressions defined in Section 3 of the Indian Tramways Act, 1886, have in these Rules the same meanings respectively as are therein assigned to them.

3. Every application by a local authority for Form of application by an Order authorizing it local authorities for an to construct a tramway Order. under the Indian Tramways Act, 1886, shall be made in duplicate in the following form:—

"To

THE SECRETARY TO THE GOVERNMENT OF BOMBAY, GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Sir,

The (*here the local authority applying should be designated by its proper title*) having, by resolution passed at a general meeting of the (*Local Board, Municipality or other body, as the case may be*) duly convened for the purpose, a certified copy of which resolution is hereto annexed, decided that it is desirable that a tramway should be constructed and worked from to a distance of not more than miles, I am instructed to submit this application on their behalf under Section 4 of the Indian Tramways Act, 1886, to His Excellency the Governor of Bombay in Council for an Order authorizing them to construct the said tramway.

This application is made with the consent of the , which is the road-authority of the road which is to be traversed by the tramway, as given in the resolution

of that , dated , of which a certified copy is hereto annexed [*or The (local authority aforesaid) is the road-authority of the road to be traversed by the tramway, as the case may be*].

The particulars required by the Bombay Presidency Tramway Rules are herewith submitted, as per annexed list."

Such application shall be signed on behalf of the local authority making it by the President, Secretary, or other officer of the body who usually conducts correspondence on its behalf.

4. Every application by any person other than a local authority for an

Form of application for an Order authorizing him to construct a tramway under the said Act shall be made in duplicate in the following form and shall be signed by the applicant:—

"To

THE SECRETARY TO THE GOVERNMENT OF BOMBAY, GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Sir,

Being desirous of constructing and working a tramway from to , a distance of not more than miles, I (*or we*) hereby apply, under Section 4 of the Indian Tramways Act, 1886, to His Excellency the Governor of Bombay in Council for an Order authorizing me (*or us*) to construct the said tramway.

This application is made with the consent of the , which is the local authority, and of the , which is the road-authority (*or of the , which is both the local authority and the road-authority, as the case may be*) of the road which is to be traversed by the tramway, as given in the resolution (*or resolutions*) of that body (*or those bodies respectively*) of which a certified copy (*or certified copies*) is (*or are*) hereto annexed.

The particulars required by the Bombay Presidency Tramway Rules are herewith submitted, as per annexed list."

5. Whenever it is proposed that a local authority shall make an application for an Order or shall consent to an application for an Order being made under the said Act, the making of such application or the giving of such consent shall be approved by a resolution passed by a majority at a general meeting of the Local Board, Municipality or other body constituting the local authority, duly convened for the purpose.

6. Applicants for an Order under the said Act shall submit with their application the following plans and drawings in duplicate:—

- (1) Map or plan of the district to the scale of not less than six inches to a mile, or, if no such map or plan is procurable, then the

best map obtainable, with the proposed tramway marked thereon.

- (2) An index plan or diagram, on a scale of not less than two inches to a mile, showing the general location of the proposed tramway.
- (3) A drawing consisting of a full-sized section of the proposed rail, and full-sized plan and elevation of the same extending to about nine inches on each side of the joint, and showing how the joint is proposed to be secured.

(There should be a statement on this drawing giving the material, weight and length of the proposed rail and fish-plates, and the depth and width of the groove.)

- (4) A drawing, on a scale of two inches to the foot, consisting of a plan, cross-section and longitudinal section of the permanent-way and substructure of the tramway, and showing the mode of fixing the rails and chairs, if any, and the gauge ties, if any.

(There should be a statement on this drawing giving the nature of the paving proposed to be adopted between the rails, and for a distance of eighteen inches outside the rails. There should also be on this drawing a plan, on a scale of one inch to a foot, of the points proposed to be employed at single line passing-places and junctions.)

- (5) The drawings required under (2), (3) and (4) should be on tracing cloth.

7. Before an Order authorising the construction of a tramway is published under Section 6, sub-section (4), the promoters, unless they are a local authority, shall deposit with the Collector of the district within the limits of which it is desired to construct the tramway, a sum in Government paper, or in such other form as Government may direct, which shall be equal to five per cent. of the estimated cost of the works or such sum as the Governor in Council may decide.

Deposits required before publication of Order.

8. A receipt for all sums or securities so deposited shall be given to the promoters by the officer with whom the same are so deposited.

Receipts for deposits to be given.

9. All Government papers so deposited shall be lodged with the Accountant General.

Any sum deposited in cash may be invested in the Government Savings Bank by the officer with whom it is so deposited.

10. (1) The interest, if any, accruing due on the Government securities during the period of deposit shall be drawn by the Accountant General and shall be invested by him in Government securities and added to the principal deposit.

(2) Any small balance of the interest which cannot be so invested shall be remitted to the Collector for deposit in the Savings Bank.

(3) When the amount of deposit by the Collector in the Savings Bank reaches the maximum amount permissible under the Savings Banks Rules, it shall be remitted by the Collector to the Accountant General, Bombay, for investment in Government securities, which shall be lodged, together with the principal deposit, with the Accountant General.

(4) The following fees shall, in addition to Fees to be charged in respect of Government paper lodged with the Accountant General, any actual outlay on brokerage, be chargeable by the Accountant General in respect of Government paper lodged with him under these Rules, viz. :—

(i) one-eighth per cent. on all purchases and sales of Government securities made by him under these Rules;

(ii) one-quarter per cent. on all interest realized by him under these Rules.

11. At the expiration of the time specified in the Order for the completion and opening of the tramway, should the promoter fail to discharge any liability to Government or to any local or road authority incurred by him in connection with the tramway, or any penalty which under the provisions of any Order under Section 7 or further Order under Section 8 of the Act he may have incurred, such sum or securities shall be forfeited to Government, and the Governor in Council may apply any sum so deposited to the discharge of such liability or penalty or may realise by sale of any such securities any sum so due from the promoter and apply such sum to the discharge of such liability or penalty.

Forfeiture of deposit and application thereof to liabilities and penalties incurred by promoters.

12. Any surplus, whether as principal or interest, remaining to the credit of the promoter after the discharge of all such liabilities and penalties and after deducting such commission as may be chargeable under clause (4) of Rule 10 shall be paid or returned to the promoter on his producing and giving up the receipt for the original deposit granted by the officer with whom the original deposit was made and on the promoter giving to the officer who repays or returns such surplus a receipt acknowledging such repayment or return.

13. The maximum number of passengers that may be carried in each carriage shall be distinctly exhibited in a conspicuous place on such carriage in English and in the vernacular language of the district.

Return of balance to promoter.

14. If the promoter of a tramway desires that the same or any portion thereof shall be inspected under Section 12 of the Indian Tramways Act in view to the same being opened for public traffic, he shall give to the Secretary to Government, General Department, or to such other officer as Government from time to time appoints in this behalf, notice in writing of his desire not

less than fourteen days before the date on which the tramway or portion thereof will be ready for inspection.

15. The manager or chief officer of a tramway shall, within forty-eight hours after the occurrence upon the tramway of—

- (a) any accident attended with loss of human life or serious injury to person or property,
 (b) any accident of a description which the Governor in Council may, from time to time, direct to be notified,

give notice thereof to the Secretaries to the Government of Bombay in the Judicial and General Departments; and shall be responsible that notice of such accident be given in writing or by telegram to the nearest Magistrate and to the officer in charge of the police station in the jurisdiction of which the accident occurs, and to such other person, if any, as Government may from time to time direct.

16. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorized officer the fare legally demanded for the journey.

17. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any have been supplied to him) when required to do so by any duly authorized servant of the promoter, and shall also deliver up such ticket upon demand to any servant of the promoter duly authorized to collect tickets.

18. No passenger or other person, not being a servant of the promoter, shall ride or attempt to ride on the steps or any other part of a carriage upon any tramway, except on those parts which are intended for the accommodation of passengers.

19. No person shall, without permission of the promoter, ride or attempt to ride upon any locomotive engine upon any tramway, or in or upon any vehicle not appropriated to the carriage of passengers.

20. No person shall travel in or on any carriage on a tramway with loaded fire-arms.

21. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the promoter in the execution of his duty in connection with a tramway.

22. When any carriage contains the maximum number of passengers fixed by competent authority for such carriage, no additional passenger shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by a servant of the promoter not to do so.

23. No person in a state of intoxication shall, after he has been desired by a servant of the promoter not to do so, enter or remain in or on any tramway-carriage, and no person who is suffering from an infectious disease shall enter any tramway-carriage, and no person shall commit any nuisance or act of indecency in any tramway-carriage or shall wilfully and without lawful excuse interfere with the comfort of any passenger or extinguish any lamp in any tramway-carriage.

24. When animal power is used the draught animals shall be subject to inspection by the police. The promoter shall afford all reasonable facilities for such inspection, and shall, on an order by a Magistrate, remove any animal found unfit for working on the tramway from such work and shall not re-employ such animal on such work unless and until, on its being again inspected by the police, it has been declared fit for such work by a Police officer not lower in rank than a Chief Constable.

25. When any engine or vehicle is run on a tramway between sunset and sunrise, it shall be provided with at least one lamp lighted and brightly burning to the front.

26. When any vehicle is run on a tramway between sunset and sunrise for the conveyance of passengers, it shall be lighted with a lamp or lamps for the convenience of the passengers using the same.

27. The publication of any rule or rules made by a local authority or by a promoter or lessee under Section 24 (2) and (3) shall be

(i) by insertion once in the *Bombay Government Gazette* and in not less than three issues of a local newspaper (if any);

(ii) by affixing copies in English and in the vernacular language of the district in conspicuous spots in the towns or villages served or to be served by the tramway, and at stations or other principal places on the line of the tramway.

28. Any person committing a breach of Rule 15 shall be punished with fine which may extend to forty rupees, and, for every day after the first during which the breach continues, with fine which may extend to twenty rupees.

Any person committing a breach of any of the foregoing rules, viz., 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 25, and 26, shall be punished with fine which may extend to twenty rupees.

Any person committing a breach of Rule 24 shall be punished with fine which may extend to twenty rupees, and, for every day after the first during which the breach continues, with fine which may extend to five rupees.

29. Orders authorising the construction of tramways shall be published in the *Bombay Government Gazette* in the following languages as well as in English, viz :

In the case of tramways to be constructed in Sind—In the Sindhi and Hindustani languages.

In the case of tramways to be constructed in the districts of Belgaum, Dhárwár, Kánara and Sholápur-Bijápur—In the Maráthi and Kánarese languages.

In the case of tramways to be constructed in any other district—In the Maráthi and Gujaráthi languages.

30. The making of any requisition by a local authority requiring a promoter to sell to such local authority his undertaking or any part thereof shall be approved by a resolution passed by a majority at a general meeting of the Local Board, Municipality or other body constituting such local authority duly convened for the purpose.

31. A local authority intending to make a lease of the right of user of any tramway and of demanding and taking the authorized tolls of which it has authority to make a lease approved by Government, shall give notice of its intention to make such lease in the *Bombay Government Gazette*, in at least one English and one vernacular daily newspaper published in Bombay and in the local newspapers published within its circle. Such notice shall set forth the conditions which will be binding on the lessee.

No. 76.—The following Notice to Mariners issued by Her Majesty's Colonial Government, Ceylon, on the 15th June 1896, is published for general information :—

“NEW LIGHT.

Mullaittivu—North-East Coast of Ceylon.

On and after July 1, 1896, a 5th order dioptric light, showing a fixed bright light, will be exhibited from the Mullaittivu beacon.

The lantern will be hoisted to the dome of the beacon at an elevation of 79 feet above mean sea level. The light will be visible from all points seaward, and should be seen in clear weather from a vessel's deck at a distance of 12 miles.”

No. 77.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 57 of the Karáchi Port Trust Act, 1886, the Governor in Council is pleased to approve the following bye-law made by the Trustees of the Port of Karáchi under Section 56 of the Act for the regulation of the wharves, piers, jetties, &c., of the Karáchi Port Trust :—

46A. No person shall, unless the sheds are full, deposit or cause to be deposited,

(a) in the open, or

(b) in such manner as to obstruct the entrance to the sheds or the traffic on the Jetty,

any goods landed at the Native Jetty other than metals.

No person shall stack or cause to be stacked in separate places any goods bearing the same mark, or any goods in uneven piles or without leaving sufficient passage between the piles for the access of persons requiring to remove goods, or (if the goods are contained in bags sufficient in number to allow of such an arrangement) in heaps less in height than seven bags.

The Governor in Council is further pleased to approve of the insertion of the figure “46A” after “35” in bye-law No. 56 of the bye-laws published under Government Notification No. 5, dated 3rd February 1892.

No. 1315.—The following programme for the Forest Classes of the College of Science, Poona, is published for information :—

I.

REGULATIONS FOR ADMISSION TO THE GRADE OF FORESTER IN THE FOREST DEPARTMENT.

1. A class for the Forester grade of the Forest Department is opened at the College of Science, Poona, to which candidates will be admitted on the 1st January in each year.

2. All candidates for this class must be above 18 and under 23 years of age, and have attended for at least 400 days in the workshops of the College of Science, and the Principal of the College will select a certain number to join the class in December of each year.

3. No candidate will be admitted who has not passed the 4th Standard for Anglo-Vernacular schools of the Educational Department, and each candidate must furnish a medical certificate from the Civil Surgeon of Poona that he is physically fitted for employment in the Forest Department, as well as a certificate of vaccination.

4. The following scholarships will be annually open to competition :—

- 3 of Rs. 8 each per mensem.
2 of Rs. 7 „ „

All students holding scholarships must execute a guarantee that they will, if selected at the final examination, serve Government in the Forest Department for at least two years, unless declared by a Government Civil Surgeon to be incapacitated for service therein, failing which the amount drawn as scholarship is to be refunded.

5. At the end of one year after entrance, candidates will be examined in the following subjects :—

1. Arithmetic.
2. Elementary Mensuration of surfaces and solids.
3. Surveying with compass and chain and plotting the work.
4. Materials used in construction.
5. Elementary Botany.
6. Forestry.

II.

REGULATIONS FOR ADMISSION TO THE GRADE OF RANGER IN THE FOREST DEPARTMENT.

1. A class is opened at the College of Science, Poona, for the instruction of candidates for the Ranger's grade of the Forest Department.

2. All candidates for admission to the class must have passed either the Matriculation Examination of the University of Bombay, or have passed the School Final Examination held by the University, and taken up subject IV of the optional subjects.

3. A competitive examination will be held at the College of Science, Poona, on the second Monday in January in each year at which scholarships will be awarded as follows :—

- 1 of Rs. 12.
5 of Rs. 10.

Candidates to whom scholarships are awarded must give a guarantee that, if finally selected for employment in the Forest Department, they will serve Government for at least two years in that Department, unless declared by a Government Civil Surgeon to be incapable of such service.

Subjects of Examination.

- (a). Arithmetic, Algebra and Euclid, as for the Matriculation Examination.
- (b). English Composition (hand-writing to be especially considered).
- (c). Reading and writing in one of the Vernaculars.

4. Candidates should produce a certificate from a Civil Surgeon that they are physically fit for employment in the Forest Department, as also a certificate of vaccination.

5. Candidates will pay in advance a College fee of Rs. 25 for each term while they continue in the College.

6. At the end of the first year, candidates will be examined, and scholarships awarded as follows :—

- 1 of Rs. 12 per mensem.
1 of Rs. 11 per mensem.
3 of Rs. 10 per mensem.

7. After the completion of the course of two years, candidates will be finally examined in the following subjects :—

The value of the practical work will be estimated as double that of the paper.

SIR,—I have the honour to request that, in preparing the Annual Municipal Account of your district rendered to this office under Government Resolution, General Department, No. 1754, dated 12th May 1882, the following points should be carefully observed to obviate unnecessary correspondence and the consequent delay in submitting to Government the Consolidated Municipal Account prepared in this office:—

- (I) The opening balance shown in the account should agree with the closing balance for the last preceding year, differences, if any, being clearly explained.
- (II) Details of certain items, specially noted in the printed form, on the Receipt and Disbursement sides should invariably accompany the account.
- (III) No amount should be shown against Realizations of Sinking Fund for Repayment of Loans on the Receipt side under "F. Extra-

ordinary and Debt," until it has actually been realized from the Sinking Fund to repay a loan (i. e., sale-proceeds of Government Securities previously purchased and set apart to form a Sinking Fund should only be credited to this head). When an amount is withdrawn from the Savings Bank or a Government Security (other than for Sinking Fund) is sold to repay a loan or to meet expenditure the sale-proceeds should be shown against F. Extraordinary and Debt—1 "Sale-proceeds of Government Securities and Withdrawals from Savings Bank" on the Receipt side.

- (IV) "*Repayment of Loans*" under G. *Extraordinary and Debt on the Debit side*—
- (i) The amount entered against this head should always agree with that entered in the Loan Statement.
- (ii) Any amount paid as interest should not be shown against "Repayment of Loans" but should appear against F. Miscellaneous—1 Interest on Loans—current year or previous years as the case may be.
- (iii) If the amount shown as "Repayment of Loans" represents amounts on account of two or more Municipalities a remark to that effect should be made at foot of the account.
- (V) *Memorandum of Liabilities and Claims—Balance of Loans*—
- (i) This should represent the balance at the close of the year on account of *all* the Municipalities in the district.
- (ii) It should agree with the amount shown against this head in the Loan Statement.
- (VI) *Investments* should not be shown in the Memorandum of Liabilities and Claims. But the invested balance in hand at the close

of the year 1895-96 should be shown against a distinct entry below "closing balance." It should not be mixed up with the closing cash balance.

SIR,—With regard to the amount of interest remitted from this office to your cemetery annually, out of the total amount of interest accruing from the Common Fund for repairs, I have the honour to state that if in any case the amounts remitted include fractions of an anna, which under Rule 9 of the rules for depositors in Post Office Savings Banks, are not accepted by the Postal authorities as a deposit, such fractions should be retained in your hands, the opportunity being taken when subsequent remittances are received to make up sums containing even annas as far as possible for deposit in the Savings Bank. There may, for some time, be fractions of an anna left over, after such deposits, which must be similarly retained, the amount in hand, however, will never exceed one anna. Sums, so retained, should be shown separately in the memorandum of entries in the Post Office Savings Bank Pass Book which is forwarded to this office in accordance with Rule II of the Account Rules prescribed in Standing Order No. 125.
