In place of No. 24 of the said rules amended as aforesaid there shall be substituted the following, Viz :

- 24. (1) For foreign-going certificates the term Sea-service means, except where otherwise stated, service performed-
 - (a) in foreign-going vessels, or
 - (b) in voyages extending beyond a distance of 500 miles from the port of departure, in ships which are Home-trade ships within the meaning of Act I of 1859, and which are commanded by Masters holding foreigngoing certificates :

Provided that-

- (i) in calculating the length of the service on Home-trade ships all time spent in a port of departure shall be excluded, and
- (ii) no certificate of discharge shall be accept ed as conclusive with regard to the length of such service unless the time so to be excluded is therein specified.
- (?) Service in the Home or Coasting-trade may be counted for such certificates, but, except in the cases specified in sub-clause (b) of clause (1) of this rule, as equivalent only to two-thirds of the same length of service in the foreign trade.
- (3) By certificate is meant a certificate granted by the Board of Trade under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 (57 and 58 Vict. c. 60), or by the Government of a British possession under an Order in Council issued in pursuance of the said Statute.

No. 97.-In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 36 of the Indian Steam-ships Act (VII of 1884) and with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council as required by Section 42, sub-section (5) of the said Act, the Governor in Council is pleased to amend the rules for the examination of and grant of certificates of com-

 - (b) to service under a First Class Engineer on voyages extending beyond a distance of 500 miles from the port of departure on board a vessel which is within the meaning of Act I of 1859 a Home-trade ship, and which is commanded by a Master holding a foreign-going certificate :

Provided that-

- (i) in computing the length of such service on board a Home-trade ship, all time spent in a port of departure shall be excluded, and
- (ii) no certificate of discharge shall be accepted as conclusive with regard to the duration of such service, unless the time so to be excluded is therein specified.

(2) Service in the Home or Coasting trade must, except in the cases specified in sub-clause (b) of clause (1) of this rule, amount to at least (b) of clause (1) of this rule, amount to at least half as much again as that required by the regulations to make up for the time spent in port; e.g., for every twelve months' service under the regulations, eighteen months' service in the Home or Coasting trade will (save in the cases excepted as aforesaid) be required. In event the lower the service wide will ever computing the length of service under this clause the service will be deemed to have commenced on the date of signing the articles of agreement and to end on the date of discharge.

WHEREAS in the year 1886 Sir Barrow Ellis, K.C.S.I., left by his will Rupees Twenty-five Thousand to the Government of Bombay to be applied by them in such manner as they might think fit towards any object or objects of a perma-nent character for the benefit of the native inhabitants of the district of Ratnágiri ; and whereas the Government of Bombay decided that there was no way in which the interest of the bequest could be employed more beneficially to the people of Ratnágiri than in promoting the welfare and usefulness of the Ratnágiri Technical School which is main-tained by the District Local Board; and whereas with accumulations the investments representing the fund now consist of Government of India Promissory Notes for Rs. 26,800 ; and whereas the persons now administering the fund are William Wilson Drew, Collector and President of the District Local Board, Ratnágiri, and Balwant Ram-chandra Sahasrabudhe, Educational Inspector, Southern Division; and whereas by order dated the 11th day of September 1896, duly notified in the Bombay Government Gazette, the said Government of India Promissory Notes for Rs. 26,800 have been, under Section 4 of the Charitable Endowments Act, 1890, vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the Bombay Presidency; and whereas the said William Wilson Drew and Balwant Ramchandra Sahasrabudhe have applied to the Government of Bombay to settle a scheme for the administration of the said property ; and whereas the following scheme has been settled by the Governor in Council.

Now under Section 5 of the Charitable Endowments Act, 1890, it is hereby declared that the following scheme shall come into operation from the date that the securities so as aforesaid become vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the Bombay Presidency :

The income of the property so as aforesaid vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments for the Bombay Presidency shall be administered by the Collector and President of the District Local Board of Ratnágiri for the time being. In awarding the scholarships the Collector and President of the District Local Board of Ratnágiri shall be guided by such rules as he and the Director of Public Instruction with the approval of the Governor of Bombay in Council may from time to time agree upon, regard being always had to the purposes hereinbefore set out for which the fund was given.

We have the honour to forward the papers entered in the annexed schedule relating to a proposal to amend Section 19 of the Indian Paper Currency Act so as to raise from eight to ten crores of rupees the amount of the paper currency reserve which may be invested in Government securities.

2. The maximum limit of the invested resorve was raised in 1890 from six to eight crores of rupees by Act XV of 1890, which was passed in accordance with the sanction given in Lord Cross' Despatch No. 107, Financial, dated the 12th June 1890. Acting on the sanctions conveyed in Lord Cross' Financial Despatches Nos. 235 and 206, dated respectively the 6th November 1890 and 29th October 1891, we increased the investment first to seven crores and subsequently to the full amount of eight crores of rupees. The completion of the additional investment was reported in our Despatch No. 65, Financial, dated the 23rd March 1892.

3. Since that time the circulation of currency notes has considerably increased. The following table gives the figures of the circulation for all India from 1887-88 to 1895-96:

For the reasons explained in paragraph 3 of the letters from our Financial Secretary dated the 7th November 1895, we do not consider it quite safe to assume that the currency notes held by the Government Reserve Treasuries and by the Presidency Banks at their head offices form part of the circulation which can be counted on as permanent; and we decided to exclude those notes from the figures used

for the present discussion. Excluding them, the following table shows for the year 1889-90 and subsequent years the net circulation, that is to say, the amount of notes which remain in the hands of the public :

4. It will be seen that in 1889-90 the net circulation amounted to only about 13 or 131 crores, while during the three years ending 1895-96 the minimum net circulation has been well above 18 crores. The net circulation has now attained a level more than 50 per cent. higher than in the year 1839-90; and we are of opinion that it will be quite safe to raise the limit of the investment to ten crores. The statistics of circulation might indeed justify an even greater increase in the investment, but we do not desire to go to the full limit of safety. An investment of the reserve to the extent of ten crores would represent less than 50 per cent. of the present average circulation. The proposed increase would therefore appear to leave a fully sufficient margin to secure the immediate convertibility of the note even during a commercial crisis.

5. We consulted the Presidency Banks and the Chambers of Commerce in this country on the subject. The replies show that none of these bodies calls in question the proposal to make this increase in the investment on the ground that it would diminish the security for the convertibility of the currency note; the mercantile and banking opinion is practically unanimous that in increasing the investment by two erores there is no risk whatever so far as the convertibility of the note is concerned. Since the proposal was circulated for the opinion of the Banks and Chambers of Commerce, additional evidence of the security with which the proposed increase could be made has been forthcoming. Since August last—the latest month for which figures were given in the letters of the 7th November 1825 the total gross circulation (shown in the first table of paragraph 3 of this despatch) has gone down from Sl₁ crores to 26 crores. But notwithstanding this reduction in the gross circulation, the net circulation (shown in the second table) which is the balance which remains in the hands of the public and which can be depended upon to a large extent to remain in their hands, has increased by a small amount. When we consulted the Banks and Chambers of Commerce, we based our proposals entirely upon the statistics of the net circulation. The evidence, therefore, afforded by this diminution of the gross circulation entirely unaccompanied by any diminution in the net circulation, adds considerable strength to our argument.

6. If any objection had been raised to the proposed increase of the investment on the ground of its affecting the public assurance of the convertibility of the currency, we would be inclined to drop the proposal whether we agreed with the argument or not. We would hold that the question being one of the public credit of a Government Department, should be judged by the opinions of the Banking and Commercial public. But the only objection that has been raised to the proposal as that we might by throwing upon the market two erores of runces to some extent endanger our currency policy, that is, the policy which was initiated by the closure of the mints in 1893. It is argued that the result of the measure we propose being to add two erores to the circulation of silver coin, it must necessarily be inconsistent with the policy of raising the value of the runce by restricting the quantity of rupees in circulation. This was one of the declared objects of the currency policy of 1893, to which we firmly adhere. We would not be prepared for the sake of a more or less inconsiderable present economy to take any measure which would have a substantial effect in materially retarding the attainment of the end sought by the measures of 1893 ; but we do not consider that the effect of the measure we now propose upon the exchange value of the rupee would be so considerable as to interfere effectively with the operation of the policy of 1893 or to warrant our foregoing the saving of six or seven lakhs which will accrue from the increase of the investment.

7. Moreover, we have some doubt whether in discussing the question of investment of our currency reserve we are at liberty to look at considerations of the kind discussed unless the harmful effects of the measure are so clear as to be beyond the possibility of doubt. We beleve that strong objection would be taken to our manipulating the currency reserve with the intention of producing any effect upon the exchange value of the rupee. For the same reason we are inclined to doubt whether, when a measure affecting the currency reserve is proposed from the point of view of paper currency reserve, pure and simple, we ought to allow ourselves to be influenced by the possible effect which a measure, desirable from a currency reserve point of view, may have upon the exchange value of the rupee.

8. We therefore ask Your Lordship's permission to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal during the next Calcutta Legislative Session, if on consideration it then appears desirable in view of public opinion to do so. We would postpone all action until that season, in order that the measure may be fully discussed by the representatives of commercial interests. The manner in which we should effect the increase would, with Your Lordship's approval, be to allot to the Head Commissioner of Paper Currency two crores worth of new debt at the average rate of subscription to an early, probably the first, public loan of sufficient measured after the average of the Activity for the limit. of sufficiant magnitude issued after the passing of the Act raising the limit.

I have considered in Council Your Excellency's letter dated the 2nd of June, No. 131, proposing to introduce into the Legislative Council, at the next Session in Calcutta, a Bill to amend the 19th section of the Paper Currency Act, in such a manner as to raise from eight to ten crores of rupees the amount of the reserve which may be invested in Government securities.

2. I consider that the increase in the average circulation of the paper currency is sufficient to justify the proposed step, and I therefore assent to the course proposed by Your Excellency.

3. I am of opinion that, in such a measure, the best course is to deal with the paper currency on its own merits, and not to allow the question of the proper reserve to be dependent on the possible effect which the addition of two crores of rupees to the supply in the market may have on the exchange value of the coin.
