RESOLUTION.—It was stated in paragraph 1, clause V, of Public Works Department Resolution No. 2112 G., dated 19th July 1892, that the men of the Upper Subordinate class to be selected annually

for special promotion to the Provincial Establishment shall be ordinarily Sub-Engineers chosen for their ability and merit.

2. With the sanction of the Secretary of State, it has been decided to widen the field of selection of Subordinates for the Provincial Engineer Establishment, by extending it to men of the Supervisor class, who may be considered qualified by education, practical training, and character for such promotion. It is provided, however, that, in selecting men of the lower class, due regard shall be paid to the legitimate claims possessed by men of the Sub-Engineer class, who are desirous of accepting appointments in the Provincial Engineer Fetablishment and are recommended for them. RESOLUTION-By the Government of India, Public Works Department.

General Rules of 1895 for working railways open for traffic.

Read-

Section 47 of the Indian Railways Act, 18 90.

Government of India, Public Works Department, Notification No. 118, dated the 21st March 1895, publishing—in the Gazette of India of the 23rd March 1895—the Government of India Circular No. 6 Railway, dated the 12th March 1895, and the General Rules for all open lines of Railway in British India administered by the Government, therewith promulgated.

Government of India, Public Works Department, Notification No. 257, dated the 28th May 1896, publishing—in the Gazette of India of the 30th May 1896—the Government of India Circular No. 3

Railway, dated the 22nd May 1896, and the amended rules therewith promulgated.

Letter from the Government of Bombay, Public Works Department, Railway Branch, No. 2222, dated the 12th September 1896, forwarding letter from the Manager and Engineer-in-Chief, Bhavnagar-Gondal-Junagadh-Porbandar Railway, No. 3814, dated the 5th August 1896.

OBSERVATIONS.—The Manager and Engineer-in-Chief, Bhavnagar-Gondal-Junagadh-Porbandar Railway, has applied that the General Rules for working open lines of Railway in British India, administered by the Government, which have been published under the Government of India, Public Works Department, Notification No. 118, dated the 21st March 1895 (vide the Gazette of India of the 23rd March 1895), as modified by the Government of India Circular No. 3 Railway, dated 22nd May 1896, published under Public Works Department Notification No. 257, dated the 28th May 1896 (vide the Gazette of India of the 30th May 1896), may be made applicable to the Bhavnagar-Gondal-Junagadh-Porbandar Railway, including the Jetalsar-Rajkot Railway.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction, with effect from the 1st October 1896, the application to such portions of the Bhavnagar-Gondal-Junagadh-Porbandar Railway as are situate in British territory, of the General Rules for working open lines of Railway in British India, administered by the Government, which are cited in the foregoing observatious, in supersession of the rules now in force.

ORDER.—Ordered, that this Resolution be published under a Notification in Part I of the Gazette of India, as required by section 47, sub-section (3) of the Indian Railways Act, 1890; also that the General Rules cited in the foregoing observations—which have already been published in the Gazette of India—be kept at Railway stations as directed by sub-section (6) of the same section.

RESOLUTION.

In the statement appended to this Resolution the figures returned from the various Provinces regarding the number of human beings and cattle killed by wild animals and snakes, the number of wild animals and snakes destroyed and the amount of rewards paid for their destruction and the number of licenses issued in Form XI, under the Indian Arms Act, 1878, free of charge, for the destruction of wild animals or protection of crops, for the year 1895, are compared with the corresponding figures for the previous year.

2. The following table shows the loss of human life caused by wild animals and snakes during the last two years:

- 3. The mortality from wild animals in 1895 was larger than in the previous year. This increase is chiefly due to a large rise in the North-Western Provinces and Oudh, where wolves proved exceptionally destructive, 246 deaths, mostly of young children, being ascribed to them (mainly in the Rohilkhand and Meerit Divisions) compared with 106 in 1894. The Local Government has recently sanctioned the grant of higher scales of rewards and if these are not effective in lessening their numbers, wolf-hunts should be organized. It is observed that the Government of Madras also, in consequence of the increasing destructiveness (chiefly among cattle) of wolves, intend to consider the desirability of reviving the rewards for killing these animals which were discontinued in 1890. In the North-Western Provinces and Oudh the number of persons killed by 'other animals' rose from 127 to 209, 153 of which are attributed to jackals. The total number of deaths from tigers shows an increase throughout India, viz., from 864 to 909: 27 of these occurred in the Kumaun Division of the North-Western Provinces and were due to a man-eating tiger which has since been destroyed. In the Central Provinces there was an increase of 40 deaths caused by tigers. The figures for other Provinces show little variation except those for Burma, where the total number of persons killed by wild animals fell from 156 to 110, and the number of deaths caused by tigers from 108 to 69. The Provinces in which the loss of life from all causes was highest in proportion to population were Assam, the Central Provinces, the Lower Provinces of Bengal and Burma; the mortality in these Provinces being one in 32,600, one in 37,059, one in 67,119 and one in 69,141, respectively. Taking the whole of British India together, one person was killed among every 71,051 against one in every 76,436 in 1894.
- 4. Altogether 22,086 deaths of human beings from snake-bite were reported in 1895, as compared with 21,556 deaths in 1894. As in previous years the largest number of deaths occurred in Bengal and the North-Western Provinces and Oudh. The decline of 717 deaths in Bengal is attributed to the comparative absence of floods. It is observed that there has been a continuous increase in the number of deaths from snake-bite in the North-Western Provinces as follows:—1892, 4,566; 1893, 4,847; 1894, 5,689; 1895, 6,269; and that no explanation of this increase has been furnished. The Government of India invite the attention of the Local Government to the subject and desire that it may be more fully noticed in future reports. The loss of life caused by snake-bite was highest in proportion to the population in the North-Western Provinces and Oudh, Bengal and the Central Provinces; being one person per 7,449, 7,792 and 8,432 in these Provinces respectively.

The number of cattle reported as destroyed by wild animals in the Lower Provinces of Bengal is very high, and, as observed last year, has risen rapidly in late years. The rise is attributed by the local officers to better reporting.

The cattle destroyed in 1895 are set down in almost equal numbers to tigers and to leopards. Tigers appear to be specially destructive in Assam and leopards in Madras; but these figures are probably deceptive, as the people do not accurately discriminate between these animals when reporting. The statistics under this head are far from trustworthy and it is not easy to improve their accuracy.

6. The total number of wild animals returned as destroyed is 16,271 as compared with 14,009 in 1894; the total amount of rewards paid was Rs. 1,03,736 against Rs. 1,04,932. Compared with the previous year the figures do not vary much. In all rewards were paid for 1,381 tigers, 4,360 leopards, 1,392 bears and 3,022 wolves destroyed in 1895. Tigers were most largely destroyed in Assam, Bengal and the Central Provinces, where 360, 336 and 225 were killed, respectively, at an expenditure of Rs. 7,137, 5,387

and 10,620, showing that the amount of rewards paid for the destruction of these animals in the Central Provinces is high, but not higher than the increase in mortality from tigers in these Provinces seems to justify.

- 7. The number of snakes destroyed is returned as 1,31,726 compared with 1,06,312 in the preceding year and the amount of reward paid for their destruction was Rs. 16,447 against Rs. 10,151. In the Central Provinces the orders issued for the grant from Provincial funds of a reward of Re. 1 for the killing of a poisonous snake had the effect of stimulating activity in their destruction. The Chief Commissioner has, however, in view of the large expenditure likely to be involved, now directed the discontinuance of the rewards in rural areas, as he is of opinion that the mortality from snake-bite is trifling compared with that from the main diseases which ravage the population, and that the money available can be more usefully spent in extending medical relief than in the fruitless endeavour to exterminate poisonous snakes. In urban areas discretion has been left to Municipalities to grant rewards or not. In Bengal, too, the Lieutenant-Governor has issued instructions directing the discontinuance of rewards except in Municipalities. The large increase in Burma is reported to be fictitious. Of the snakes destroyed 6,936 were returned from the Meiktila district against 146 in the previous year. The figures were obtained from village headmen and, as observed by the Chief Commissioner, doubtless include both harmless and poisonous snakes. The statistics under this head are clearly untrustworthy.
- 8. The number of licenses issued in Form XI under the Indian Arms Act, 1878, free of cost, for the purpose of destroying wild animals or for protection of crops, was 16,689 against 15,043 in the previous year. The total, including the number of licenses granted for this purpose which were in force from previous years, amounted to 60,020 in 1895 against 64,857 in 1894. In Madras the number of licenses granted during the year was 1,856 as compared with 2,636 and the total number of licenses in force 6,798 against 9,443 in 1894. In the Punjab the number of licenses granted rose from 2,095 to 4,228, but notwithstanding this increase the total number in force was less than in 1894, being 9,741 against 10,631 in that year. The small number of licenses in this form in Bengal as compared with that in the other Provinces is remarkable.
- 9. The measures which should be taken for reducing the mortality caused by wild animals and venomous snakes have been fully discussed in the Resolutions which have been published in late years and the Government of India are satisfied that efforts are being made to give effect to these instructions in most Provinces.

Whereas a dangerous disease, namely, Bubonic Fever, has broken out in certain parts of the City of Bombay, and the Municipal Commissioner is of opinion that the ordinary provisions of the City of Bombay Municipal Act, 1888, or of any other law in force in Bombay, are insufficient for the purpose of effectually preventing the spread of such disease, Public Notice is hereby given that, with the sanction of Government, and pursuant to the provisions of Section 434 of the said Act, the Commissioner hereby prescribes the following temporary regulations to be observed by the public and all persons concerned; And further that the Commissioner will, if necessary, take such special measures as are hereby indicated for carrying into effect the objects of the said regulations:—

- 1. In extension of the provisions of Sections 422, 425 and 427 of the said Act, it is hereby prescribed that every person having the control or charge of any building, or part of a building, shall, on demand by the Commissioner, or any officer to whom the powers, duties or functions of the Commissioner under those sections may have been or may be delegated, immediately cause such building or part of a building to be opened, and shall permit the Commissioner, or any such officer as aforesaid, to cleanse and disinfect the same, and to cause the removal for disinfection or destruction of any grain, bedding or clothing, or of any other goods or articles found therein.
- For the purpose of carrying into effect the objects aforesaid, the Commissioner, or any such officer as aforesaid, will, whenever he shall deem it necessary so to do, break open and forcibly enter any such building or part of a building, and, without previous notice to the owner or occupier thereof, will cleanse and disinfect the same, and direct or cause the forcible removal and disinfection or destruction of any grain, bedding, clothing, goods or articles as aforesaid.
- 2. In extension of the provisions of Section 424 of the said Act, it is hereby prescribed that any person suffering from Bubonic Fever, wheresoever found, and whether provided with proper lodging or accommodation, or not, or whether lodged in a building occupied by more than one family, or not, shall, on a

certificate signed by the Executive Health Officer or by any duly qualified Medical Practitioner that such person is suffering from the said disease, be liable to be removed to any hospital or place at which patients suffering from the said disease are received for medical treatment.

- For the purpose of carrying into effect the objects of this regulation the Commissioner, or any officer to whom the powers, duties or functions of the Commissioner under Section 424 have been or may be delegated, or any Police Officer empowered by the Commissioner in this behalf, will, whenever he shall deem it necessary so to do, cause any person in respect of whom such certificate as aforesaid has been made, to be removed to any such hospital or place as aforesaid.
- 3. Every house in which any case of the aforesaid disease exists, or has existed, shall, for so long as the Commissioner shall deem necessary, be isolated in accordance with such orders as the Commissioner may in each case prescribe, and every occupant of such house and other person who may be therein, or who may resort or desire to obtain access thereto, shall obey any order which he may receive from the Commissioner, or any Municipal or Police Officer empowered by the Commissioner in that behalf, prohibiting ingress to or egress from such house.
- For the purpose of carrying into effect the objects of this regulation the Commissioner, or any such Municipal or Police Officer as aforesaid, will, if necessary, forcibly prevent persons from entering or leaving such house.

"Strict quarantine will be imposed here on all vessels from Bombay. No passenger or cargo will be allowed to be landed. Vessels will be allowed to take food and water and transfer passengers and cargo in quarantine."

No. 4434.—The following telegram from the Political Resident, Turkish Arabia, and Her Britannic Majesty's Consul General, Bagdad, dated the 6th instant, is published for general information:—

"Sanitary Inspector intimated imposition twenty-one days' quarantine at Bussorah against arrivals from Bombay owing appearance Plague in Bombay."

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 7th October 1896.

No. 4435.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Plague have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 5th instant in the Ports of Aden, Perim and the Somáli Coast, as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somáli Coast from Bombay shall, before entering the harbour, hoist a yellow flag (or if entering a port at night time, show whatever quarantine light signals are customary in the port) and indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come, and shall keep such flag and signals flying until permitted to take them down as hereinafter provided. The pilot on going alongside a vessel from Bombay shall direct the flag prescribed above to be hoisted, if it has not already been done.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, without first having obtained permission as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, except orally, with the shore or any other vessel or boat, excepting with the boat supplying pilots, and in that case communication shall be limited to receiving on board the pilot, his servant and baggage.
- III.—On any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the Port shall, as soon as possible, go alongside the vessel and ascertain by enquiry from the Commander whether any person on board is suffering, or has during the voyage suffered, from plague, and if the Health Officer is satisfied by such enquiry that no person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, and if the ship carries a qualified Medical Officer, quarantine shall be dispensed with, and pratique granted.

If the vessel does not carry a qualified Medical Officer, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified by the Resident, and there to remain for a period of eight clear days from the date of arrival in the harbour. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour.

- IV.—If the Health Officer, as the result of the enquiry made under paragraph III above, shall have reason to believe at the time when the vessel arrives in the harbour that any person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, and there to remain for a period of fifteen days from the day of arrival in the harbour; and shall further direct that during such fifteen days intercourse between the said vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour shall be prohibited as provided in Rule III.
- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid any case or cases of plague should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of termination of the last case either by death, recovery or removal from the vessel and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rules III and IV.
- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of eight days, or if the vessel has been placed in quarantine for fifteen days, for a period of fifteen days. If a case of plague occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.
- VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to acilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast which may have communicated with vessels coming from Bombay, shall be subjected to the same rules as vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast from Bombay.
