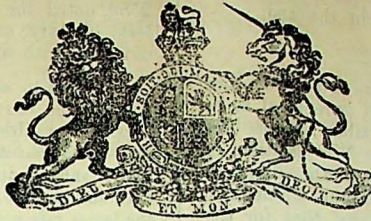

Customs Circular No. XIX of 1896.

From—The Government of India, Finance and Commerce Department, No. 3924-S.R., dated the 15th September 1896,

To—The Secretary to the Government of Bombay, Revenue Department.

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 6089, dated the 4th August 1896, requesting orders on certain points raised by the Collector of Customs, Bombay, on the instructions

contained in the letter from this Department No. 2589, dated the 15th June 1896, regarding the levy of duty on cotton goods bordered or embroidered with silk or wool.

2. I am to explain that the principle of the instructions conveyed in the letter of the 15th June is that, although the law (Section 21 of the Sea Customs Act) prescribes the levy of the higher rate of duty on cotton goods ornamented with silk or wool, the Government prefer to levy the lower rate applicable to cotton goods when the articles inserted in the fabric are inserted simply for decorative effect and are not so interwoven as to form a substantial portion of the fabric.

3. On the principle here stated, it would not be expedient to tax, as silk goods, cotton socks, vests, and drawers, because they have, for the purpose of decorative finish, a silk clock on the socks, a waist-band of silk on the drawers, or a border of silk where the buttons and button holes are inserted in the vest. Nor would it be in accordance with the wish of the Government to tax a piece of cotton muslin or grenadine at the higher rate applicable to silk or woollen goods because the piece is decorated with embroidered flowers like the samples received with your letter. The article, even so embroidered, remains a piece of cotton muslin and would not be treated in the trade, and should not be treated in the Custom-house, as anything but cotton. The higher value imparted to it by the embroidery is, as in all the cases under discussion, sufficiently met by the tax being assessed on the market value, whatever that is. The case is entirely different where cotton forms but a part of the fabric, as where cotton is the warp and silk or wool the weft, or where the embroidery practically covers and disguises the fabric. In such cases the article must be treated as made of the more highly taxed article. No rules are required for the treatment of such cases, which can easily be differentiated in practice from cases where the embroidery is merely a decoration on a cotton tissue which remains in substance and to sight a cotton tissue.

4. Similar remarks apply to the case of dhutis, saris, scarves, or other goods bordered with silk. In essence the case does not differ from that of embroidered goods, and, as it is not possible to define a limit for a decorative embroidery, so it is not possible to define a limit for a narrow ornamental border. If, for instance, a limit of one inch were fixed, the effect of the decision would be to penalise goods with a border of 1½ inch, with the effect of restricting and harassing trade in goods which are as much cotton goods as those with a border an eighth of an inch less wide. It must be left to the Customs authorities to decide in the exercise of their discretion when borders, embroideries, or stripes are of such a nature that they practically disguise or alter the appearance or substance of the cotton fabric, the article then being taxed at the rate applying to the tissue of such borders, embroideries, or stripes.”

## Read again—

Resolution in this Department No. 13,\* dated the 1st January 1889.

RESOLUTION.—Under the first condition in paragraph 4 of the Resolution read above, loans may be granted by Local Governments from the Local Loans Account to Municipalities ‘only for works of public and general convenience and utility, such as drainage, water-works, bridges and the like, and not for works which are merely or mainly ornamental or convenient, such as a town hall, public garden or market place.’ The Governor General in Council is now pleased to decide that loans may be granted by Local Governments in the cases excluded by this rule, but on the condition that they are repaid within a period not exceeding ten years.

ORDER.—Ordered that this Resolution be communicated to the Home Department, to all Local Governments and Administrations (except Hyderabad, Coorg, Ajmere-Merwara and Baluchistan), to the Comptroller and Auditor General, and all Accountants General and Comptrollers (except Comptroller, Hyderabad, and Comptroller, Post Office).

Ordered also that this Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India*.

## GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 4358.—The following telegram from the Colonial Secretary to the Government of Ceylon, dated 1st instant, is published for general information :—

“Please telegraph daily state of Bubonic Plague. Information in Bills of Health insufficient. All vessels will be quarantined until inspected.”

No. 4395.—The following telegram, dated 5th October 1896, received from Her Majesty's Consul, Alexandria, is published for general information :—

“Sanitary Board have decided to apply from to-day to arrivals from Bombay provisionally Plague regulations in force since 13th June 1894.”

No. 4431.—The following telegram, dated the 6th instant, from the Colonial Secretary to the Government of Ceylon, is published for general information in continuation of Government Notification No. 4358, dated the 3rd idem :—

“Strict quarantine will be imposed here on all vessels from Bombay. No passenger or cargo will be allowed to be landed. Vessels will be allowed to take food and water and transfer passengers and cargo in quarantine.”

No. 4434.—The following telegram from the Political Resident, Turkish Arabia, and Her Britannic Majesty's Consul General, Bagdad, dated the 6th instant, is published for general information :—

“Sanitary Inspector intimated imposition twenty-one days' quarantine at Bussorah against arrivals from Bombay owing appearance Plague in Bombay.”

No. 4435.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Plague have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 5th instant in the Ports of Aden, Perim, and the Somali Coast as a temporary measure :—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving at Aden, Perim, and the Somali Coast from Bombay shall, before entering the harbour, hoist a yellow flag (or if entering a port at night time, show whatever quarantine light signals are customary in the port) and indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come, and shall keep such flag and signals flying until permitted to take them down as hereinafter provided. The pilot on going alongside a vessel from Bombay shall direct the flag prescribed above to be hoisted, if it has not already been done.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, without first having obtained permission as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, except orally, with the shore or any other vessel or boat, excepting with the boat supplying pilots, and in that case communication shall be limited to receiving on board the pilot, his servant and baggage.
- III.—On any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the Port shall, as soon as possible, go alongside the vessel and ascertain by enquiry from the Commander whether any person on board is suffering, or has during the voyage suffered, from plague, and if the Health Officer is satisfied by such enquiry that no person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, and if the ship carries a qualified Medical Officer, quarantine shall be dispensed with, and pratique granted.



If the vessel does not carry a qualified Medical Officer, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified by the Resident, and there to remain for a period of eight clear days from the date of arrival in the harbour. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour.

- IV.—If the Health Officer, as the result of the enquiry made under paragraph III above, shall have reason to believe at the time when the vessel arrives in the harbour that any person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, and there to remain for a period of fifteen days from the day of arrival in the harbour; and shall further direct that during such fifteen days intercourse between the said vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour shall be prohibited as provided in Rule III.
- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid any case or cases of plague should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of termination of the last case either by death, recovery or removal from the vessel and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rules III and IV.
- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of eight days, or if the vessel has been placed in quarantine for fifteen days, for a period of fifteen days. If a case of plague occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.
- VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somáli Coast which may have communicated with vessels coming from Bombay, shall be subjected to the same rules as vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somáli Coast from Bombay.

## Notification.

WHEREAS a dangerous disease, namely, Bubonic Fever, has broken out in certain parts of the City of Bombay, and the Municipal Commissioner is of opinion that the ordinary provisions of the City of Bombay Municipal Act, 1888, or of any other law in force in Bombay, are insufficient for the purpose of effectually preventing the spread of such disease, *Public Notice* is hereby given that, with the sanction of Government, and pursuant to the provisions of Section 434 of the said Act, the Commissioner hereby prescribes the following temporary regulations to be observed by the public and all persons concerned; AND FURTHER that the Commissioner will, if necessary, take such special measures as are hereby indicated for carrying into effect the objects of the said regulations:—

1. In extension of the provisions of Sections 422, 425 and 427 of the said Act, it is hereby prescribed that every person having the control or charge of any building, or part of a building, shall, on demand by the Commissioner, or any officer to whom the powers, duties or functions of the Commissioner under those sections may have been or may be delegated, immediately cause such building or part of a building to be opened, and shall permit the Commissioner, or any such officer as aforesaid, to cleanse and disinfect the same, and to cause the removal for disinfection or destruction of any grain, bedding or clothing, or of any other goods or articles found therein.

For the purpose of carrying into effect the objects aforesaid, the Commissioner, or any such officer as aforesaid, will, whenever he shall deem it necessary so to do, break open and forcibly enter any such building or part of a building, and, without previous notice to the owner or occupier thereof, will cleanse and disinfect the same, and direct or cause the forcible removal and disinfection or destruction of any grain, bedding, clothing, goods or articles as aforesaid.

2. In extension of the provisions of Section 424 of the said Act, it is hereby prescribed that any person suffering from Bubonic Fever, wheresoever found, and whether provided with proper lodging or accommodation, or not, or whether lodged in a building occupied by more than one family, or not, shall, on a certificate signed by the Executive Health Officer or by any duly qualified Medical Practitioner that such person is suffering from the said disease, be liable to be removed to any hospital or place at which patients suffering from the said disease are received for medical treatment.

For the purpose of carrying into effect the objects of this regulation the Commissioner, or any officer to whom the powers, duties or functions of the Commissioner under Section 424 have been or may be delegated, or any Police Officer empowered by the Commissioner in this behalf, will, whenever he shall deem it necessary so to do, cause any person in respect of whom such certificate as aforesaid has been made, to be removed to any such hospital or place as aforesaid.

3. Every house in which any case of the aforesaid disease exists, or has existed, shall, for so long as the Commissioner shall deem necessary, be isolated in accordance with such orders as the Commissioner may in each case prescribe, and every occupant of such house and other person who may be therein, or who may resort or desire to obtain access thereto, shall obey any order which he may receive from the Commissioner, or any Municipal or Police Officer empowered by the Commissioner in that behalf, prohibiting ingress to or egress from such house.

For the purpose of carrying into effect the objects of this regulation the Commissioner, or any such Municipal or Police Officer as aforesaid, will, if necessary, forcibly prevent persons from entering or leaving such house.

Sir,—I have the honour to state that the number of your account of the Forest Officers' Provident Fund is \_\_\_\_\_, and this should be quoted whenever a reference to the fund is made in your accounts, returns, and letters.

2. No withdrawals will ordinarily be allowed from your deposit, but should the Local Government sanction under Rule VI a temporary withdrawal for any of the following purposes:

(i) to pay for your passage on going on leave out of India on medical certificate or returning after such absence,

(ii) to pay for the passage of any member of your family coming from beyond the sea, or going beyond the sea, sick, or from some urgent cause,

the sanction of this office must be obtained before the payment can be made.

3. A separate letter has been addressed to all Conservators and the Divisional Forest Officers, in which instructions have been given as to the manner in which the transactions of the fund should be accounted for.

ALL CONSERVATORS OF FORESTS and DIVISIONAL FOREST OFFICERS.

Sir,—With reference to Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 573J, dated the 23rd July 1896, communicating the orders of the Government of India (Resolution No. 2881-P., dated 1st July 1896, Finance and Commerce Department) regarding the institution of a Provident Fund for the Forest Department, I have the honour to issue the following instructions for your guidance as to the manner in which the transactions of the fund should be accounted for:—

(a) The monthly deposits, which should not be less than 5 per cent. and not more than 10 per cent. of salary (as defined in the Civil Service Regulations), should be made by deduction from salary bills, except in the following cases in which they may be made in cash in India and in rupees only—

(i) when an officer draws his leave allowances out of India,

(ii) when an officer is on leave without allowances,

(iii) when an officer is in Foreign Service (except Berar).

(b) In the exceptions mentioned cash payment of subscriptions will be made by depositors direct to this office by credit or remittance or in case of officers in foreign service by credit or remittance to the Account Officer to whom their contribution on account of leave and pension is payable.

(c) When subscriptions to the fund are recovered by deduction from pay bills they should be shown against the entry 'Forest Officers' Provident Fund' to be opened in manuscript in the bill where other entries of fund, &c. &c., deductions have been printed. The gross



amount of the bill should be debited to the proper head of service and the subscription on account of the fund credited on the receipt side of the Cash Account under a separate entry showing the name of the officer, the number of his account, the rate *per cent.* of salary and the month for which the subscription is made.

(d) Withdrawals from deposit will ordinarily be allowed only when the depositor quits the Service or dies. Should, however, Government sanction a temporary withdrawal for the purposes mentioned in Rule VI of the Government of India orders, application should be made to this office for the payment of the amount so sanctioned. These withdrawals will be recovered in twenty equal monthly instalments compulsorily deducted from salary in addition to the ordinary monthly contributions to the fund whenever full salary is drawn until the whole is refunded. Such instalments may be paid in advance which should be credited direct on the receipt side of the Cash Account separately from the ordinary monthly contribution in the manner prescribed in (c) above.

No. 4502.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Plague have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 3rd instant in the Ports of Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast, as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast from Assyr between Lith and Lohaja shall, before entering the harbour, hoist a yellow flag (or if entering a port at night time, show whatever quarantine light signals are customary in the port) and indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come, and shall keep such flag and signals flying until permitted to take them down as hereinafter provided. The pilot on going alongside a vessel from Assyr between Lith and Lohaja shall direct the flag prescribed above to be hoisted, if it has not already been done.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, without first having obtained permission as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, except orally, with the shore or any other vessel or boat, excepting with the boat supplying pilots, and in that case communication shall be limited to receiving on board the pilot, his servant and baggage.
- III.—On any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the Port shall, as soon as possible, go alongside the vessel and ascertain by enquiry from the Commander whether any person on board is suffering, or has during the voyage suffered, from plague, and if the Health Officer is satisfied by such enquiry that no person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, and if the ship carries a qualified Medical Officer, quarantine shall be dispensed with, and pratique granted.



If the vessel does not carry a qualified Medical Officer, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified by the Resident, and there to remain for a period of eight clear days from the date of arrival in the harbour. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour.

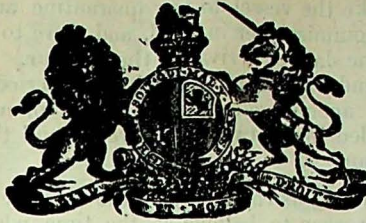
- IV.—If the Health Officer, as the result of the enquiry made under paragraph III above, shall have reason to believe at the time when the vessel arrives in the harbour that any person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, and there to remain for a period of fifteen days from the day of arrival in the harbour; and shall further direct that during such fifteen days' intercourse between the said vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour shall be prohibited as provided in Rule III.
- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid any case or cases of plague should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of termination of the last case either by death, recovery or removal from the vessel, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rules III and IV.
- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of eight days, or if the vessel has been placed in quarantine for fifteen days, for a period of fifteen days. If a case of plague occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.
- VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast, which may have communicated with vessels coming from Assyr between Lith and Lohaja, shall be subjected to the same rules as vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast from Assyr between Lith and Lohaja.

- II.—Such Commander shall not, without first having obtained permission as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, except orally, with the shore or any other vessel or boat, excepting with the boat supplying pilots, and in that case communication shall be limited to receiving on board the pilot, his servant and baggage.

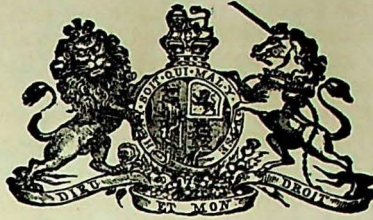

- IX.—All vessels arriving at Karáchi which may have communicated with vessels coming from Bombay, shall be subjected to the same rules as vessels arriving at Karáchi from Bombay.

No. 4557.—The following letter from the Colonial Secretary to the Government of Ceylon, Colombo, dated the 9th October 1896, is published for general information:—

“I am directed to inform you that consequent on the outbreak of the Bubonic Plague at Bombay, the Port Surgeon, Colombo, has been directed to quarantine all vessels arriving from Bombay, whether they contain clean Bills of Health or not, and to detain them until eight clear days have elapsed from the date of their departure from Bombay, when they will be released if all on board are healthy.

2. Vessels in quarantine will be allowed to take in food and water and to tranship passengers and cargo to other vessels which may also be in quarantine, but no passenger, luggage, nor cargo will be allowed to be landed in Colombo until the full period of quarantine has expired.”
