Floating Wreck off Jaigarh Headland.

Information has been received from the Port Officer, Bombay, dated 6th instant, that the Master of S. S. ‘Colaba’ reports having passed on 3rd October 1896 at noon in latitude 17° 15’ 00” N., longitude 72° 58’ 00” E. Boria Pagoda bearing N. 49° E. true, distant 16 miles, a large buggalow, bottom up, apparently not long been capsized. A small patimar was fast to her evidently intent on salvage.”

No. 114.—The following draft of a rule which it is proposed to make in substitution of Rule 3 of the rules for the Port of Aden published under Notification No. 55, dated 2nd May 1893, under Section 6 (1) of the Indian Ports Act, 1889, is published for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby. The draft and any objections or suggestions made with respect thereto received before the 15th day of November 1896 will be taken into consideration on or after the said date:—

“3. All steamers and square-rigged vessels arriving off the Port of Aden and requiring the services of a pilot shall make the authorized pilot signals by day and night as required by Section 615 of the British Merchant Shipping Act of 1894.”

No. 115.—In accordance with the provisions of Section 74 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, the following bye-laws, which the Trustees of the Port of Bombay propose to make for the regulation of Railway Trains working through and in the neighbourhood of the Port Trust Docks and on all sidings connected with the Docks, are published for the information of all persons whom they may concern:—

1. No trains, engines or wagons may be run over any Port Trust siding on Sundays, New Year’s Day, Good Friday, the Queen-Empress’ Birthday and Christmas Day, or between sunset and sunrise, unless special arrangements have been made beforehand between the Railway and Port Trust officials concerned.

2. No trains, engines or wagons may be moved over any Port Trust sidings unless led by a bell-man.

If a bell-man is not in attendance when a train enters a Port Trust siding, the driver shall stop and whistle until the bell-man comes up.

When a train is about to move on any Port Trust siding and no bell-man is in attendance, the driver shall whistle and not start until a bell-man comes up.

3. The bell-man shall walk not more than ten feet ahead of the train, engine or wagons, and shall ring his bell without intermission.

4. Drivers shall regulate the speed to keep the train not more than ten feet behind the bell-man. In no case is the speed to exceed four miles an hour.

5. When leading a train, engine or wagons, if the bell-man sees any obstacle, impediment, person, animal or vehicle on the line, he must at once signal to stop by holding up both arms.

6. Drivers and mukadams shall keep a sharp look-out for signals from the bell-man, and if they see any obstacle, impediment, person, animal or vehicle on the line, whether the bell-man signals or not, they shall stop.

7. In crossing the Frere Road, two police ramosies or peons must be present, one on each side of the line, to stop all road traffic clear of the line.

The bell-man shall not lead a train and drivers shall not proceed across the road until the two men have been posted.

8. Level-crossing gates shall be kept shut across the siding, except to allow engines, trains or wagons to pass.

The gatemen shall be present when trains are passing to prevent the gates being moved until the road is clear.

9. The bell-man shall not lead a train up to a level-crossing until the gates have been properly opened.

10. No train, engine or wagon may stand on a level-crossing. If a train is obliged to stop on a level-crossing and is impeding road traffic, it must be divided and the road cleared (see Rule 8) until the train is ready to proceed.

11. Road traffic must not be stopped for more than one train at a time.

12. Where there is a double line, trains, engines and wagons must not be moved over a level-crossing in both directions at once.

No. 4729.—The following letter from the British Consul, Goa, No. $\frac{9}{B.G.}$, dated the 19th October 1896, is published for general information:—

“With reference to my telegram of the 17th instant, which reads as follows:

‘From yesterday five days’ quarantine against passengers from Bombay arriving by rail or sea. Same applies to passengers from south travelling by Shepherd’s steamers,’

which I beg to confirm; I have now the honour to inform you that the rules have been modified and are as follows:

- 1st.—Passengers by steamer from Bombay stopping in Goa will be subject to five (5) full days’ quarantine from the time of their arrival.
- 2nd.—Passengers by steamers from Bombay proceeding by rail into British India will be kept in quarantine until they can be forwarded, but arrangements will be made for them to proceed with their luggage by the first available train.
- 3rd.—Passengers by steamers from south ports stopping in Goa will be kept under medical inspection for twenty-four hours.
- 4th.—Passengers by steamers from south ports proceeding by rail will be subject to the conditions mentioned in Rule 2.
- 5th.—First and Second Class passengers from Bombay by rail will be granted free pratique.

- 6th.—Third Class passengers from Bombay by rail will be subject to five days' quarantine, inclusive of the time occupied on the journey.
- 7th.—Steamers on arrival will be allowed to come alongside and discharge passengers and cargo, but only overside communication will be allowed between the staff on board and that on shore.
- Through goods in transit will not be detained.
- 9th.—Goods for local stations will be disinfected and detained twenty-four hours."
