No. 5605.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to vary, with effect from the 4th January 1897, the rules framed under Section 35 of the Bombay Boiler Inspection Act, 1891, and published in Government Notification No. 515, dated the 3rd February 1896, at pages 94 to 102 of the Bombay Government Gazette for 1896, Part I, by substituting for clause (d) of Rule 2 of the said rules the following clause:—

"(d) The words defined in Section 3 shall be deemed to have respectively the same meaning as is given to them by the Act, provided that wherever in these rules service with engines and boilers is required as a qualification for admission to an examination under Section 21, the word 'engine' or 'boiler' shall be held to include any locomotive engine or boiler used upon, or appertaining to, any railway within the meaning of that word as defined in Section 3, clause (4), of the Indian Railways Act, 1890."

No. 5366.—With reference to Sections 19 and 20 of the Indian Paper Currency Act, 1882, as amended

by Act XXI of 1896, and in supersession of the Notification by the Government of India in the Finance and Commerce Department No. 4861, dated the 3rd December 1891, it is notified that, with the consent of the Secretary of State for India, the Governor General in Council fixes one hundred millions of rupees as the amount of the coin and bullion received for currency notes which need not be retained and secured as a reserve to pay for such notes.

In continuation of Government Notification No. 10120, dated 11th instant, the following Memorandum is published for general information:—

The situation is generally unchanged in the affected districts, but more rain is now wanted for the rabi crops sown after the fall in November. The reports from district officers for the week ending 12th instant are summarised below.

Shola'pur-

There has been no rain. The average price of jowari during the week was $20\frac{9}{20}$ lbs. and of bajri $18\frac{2}{40}$ lbs, per rupee. Grain-supply is sufficient in all talukas except Sangola. Rabi crops sown in September and October are in good condition; the crops sown after the recent rain are likely to wither without more rain, but not everywhere. Semi-gratuitous relief has been given to about 144 weavers during the week. The details of prices of jowari are given below:

Ahmednagar.

There has been no rain. Sowing is nearly finished everywhere. Some of the newly sown crops in Jámkhed are already withering. The state of the crops is otherwise unchanged. The average price of jowári in the district during the week was 21½ lbs. and of bájri 10½ lbs. per rupee. Prices at Nagar are unchanged. Cattle are deteriorating slowly, many being killed for their hides. Cultivators with no crops are feeling the pressure in central and northern tálukas. Labourers are apparently feeling want of work more acutely. There has been great increase of numbers on works in Nagar and Ráhuri tálukas, 408 persons have emigrated from Akola. There has been no rain. The outlook for the latest sown jowari crop will be but a poor one if more rain does not fall. The average price of jowari during the week was 19 ½ lbs. and of bájri 16 ½ lbs. per rupee. Small-pox has appeared in one village. Arrangements have been made for vaccination operations in the famine camps. Grainsupply is sufficient. Water-supply is also sufficient. The work of gratuitous relief is steadily extending. The detailed prices are given below:—

Na'sik.

There has been no rain. The average price of bajri during the week was $16\frac{2}{4}\frac{7}{6}$ lbs., of jowari $18\frac{2}{4}\frac{7}{6}$ lbs. and of nagli $22\frac{1}{3}$ lbs. Prices of jowari and bajri have risen, while that of nagli has fallen. The prospects have remained unchanged. Standing rabi crops are in need of rain. The stock of grain is generally sufficient for the present. Fodder is scarce in most talukas. There has been no starvation and no disease worth noticing among cattle. The condition of cultivators is normal and that of town population (except weavers in Yeola and Malegaon) fair. 2,075 labourers are employed by the Taluka and District Local Boards. The details of prices are given below:—

Kha'ndesh.

There has been no rain. Prices are almost stationary. Grain-supply is sufficient. Crops and agriculturists are in the same condition as before. Harvesting operations are almost completed and labourers and town population are beginning to come on works. There has been no emigration worth mentioning.

Bija'pur.

There has been no rain. The average price of jowari during the week was $21\frac{1}{10}$ lbs. per rupec. There is slight cholera in Hungund Taluka. The grain-supply is sufficient. The demand for labour is rapidly rising. The state of cattle is unchanged. The detailed prices of jowari are given below:—

Belgaum.

There has been no rain. Prices ars almost stationary, the average price of jowári in the affected tálukas being 21 lbs., of bájri 22 lbs., and of rice 16 lbs. per rupee. Grain supply is sufficient. There has been no immigration. About 1,000 people from Athni Táluka left for Kolhápur territory with their cattle. Cultivators and agricultural labourers are still employed in field work, which will not, however, last long. Rabi crops sown after recent rains are not expected to thrive if more rain does not fall.

Dha'rwa'r.

The position is virtually unaltered since last report. Prospects in Gadag and Navalgund are fair. The crops sown before the rainfall are assured; of those sown since, the greater part will come to maturity. These two talukas are now removed from all risk of searcity. In Petha Nargund, Ron and Petha Mundargi the outlook is not so good. In parts of Nargund and Ron the latesown seed is not likely to come to maturity, and a large area has not been sown at all. However, there is no present distress, though the labour market is somewhat overcrowded owing to the absence of all kharif harvest operations, the kharif having been an entire failure. The rabi crops results now depend largely upon favourable weather; in the absence of rain, cool, moist winds and heavy dews are of service to prevent the drying up of the soil; and so far conditions have been fairly good.

Dha'rwa'r-continued.

Petha Mundargi is now definitely ascertained to have had practically no rain where most wanted, i.e., in the black soil villages. These only grow rabi crops, and not more than that of the crop area has been sown. The seed has germinated, but a good deal of it will die off. The rain has not contracted the area of the fodder searcity to any great extent, though sensible relief has been caused. Most of the rabi sowings are wheat, the rainfall not having been sufficient for jowari, and the wheat in these parts produces but little straw. There has been no enigration except from Ron and Mundargi to Mallad. Prices show a steady tendency to rise. The prices of jowari are given below:—

Kola'ba.

The general situation is unchanged. There has been no rain: Prices are stationary in Alibág, Pen, Nágothna and Uran, fallen in Panvel and Mángaon, and risen in Mahád, Roha, Khálápur and Karjat. Twenty-eight labourers have gone to Bombay from Nágothna. The rabi area sown is only three per cent. of the total cultivable area of the district. The crops are doing well. 350 immigrants have come from above gháts on their way to Bombay; 150 persons from Poona and Ratnágiri have arrived at Uran for work and 100 more have arrived at the same place from Bombay. Fodder and watersupply is generally sufficient and cattle are in fair condition. The outturn of kharif crops is 5 annas in Alibág, 6 annas in Panvel and Karjat, including Uran and Khálápur Pethas, and 8 annas in the remaining tálukas.

Ratna'giri-

There has been no rain. The rabi crops where sown are doing well. Prices of paddy have slightly risen in Vengurla and fallen in Khed, and those of nagli have risen in Malvan and Vengurla. The prices of nagli and vari have slightly fallen in Dapoli; elsewhere they are stationary. There has been no demand for work anywhere except in Malvan, where 34 persons have come to work on test relief works under the Taluka Local Board. People are going as usual to Bombay for work, but some have returned owing to plague. Cattle are healthy except in some talukas. Prices of cattle are falling in Khed.

- 2. The progress of relief measures during the last week is shown in the appended statement. The returns of relief works are not complete, but the daily average number (72,571) given in the returns received shows an increase of 17,658 as compared with the preceding week. A relief work has been opened in the Athni Taluka of the Belgaum District, where the test-work hitherto in progress showed an increase in the demand for labour at famine wages, and a Special Relief Mamlatdar with an establishment has been appointed for that taluka. Three large works have also been opened specially for the relief of Kolis and other hill cultivators inhabiting the Ambegaon and Mulshi Pethas and other forest tracts in the west of the Poona District. The works have been provided as near the homes of these people as possible, because the system of rab-cultivation followed by them necessitates their constant presence near their fields from January to March, during which months the fields are being prepared for the monsoon crops. Two Special Civil officers have been appointed for large relief works in Poona. Arrangements have been made for the survey and alignment of the contemplated Barsi-Pandharpur Railway, so that its earth-work can be utilised as a relief work if necessity arises. Several small works have been started in different talukas of the Bijapur District, and the attention of the Commissioners has been again invited to Section 100 of the Famine Code, and they have been asked to report in what way people whom it is inexpedient to draft to works at a distance from their homes can be suitably employed; on the other hand, it appears that in Sholapur persons to whom that provision does not apply are employed on small works.
- 3. A further allotment of Rs. 10,000 has been placed at the disposal of the Collector of Bijapur for expenditure on gratuitous relief. As the numbers of wandering paupers and of non-working children are reported to have largely increased in the Indapur and Bhimthadi talukas of the Poona District, the application to those talukas of Chapters VIII and IX of the Famine Code about poor-houses and kitchens respectively has been authorised. It has been directed that relief under Chapter IX should be confined to the children of persons employed on relief works, as others are sufficiently provided for by Section 57 of the Code, and that when cash payments are substituted for distribution of cooked food, the precautions laid down in Section 133 (b) should be strictly enforced. The attention of District officers has been drawn to Section 52 (f) of the Famine Code regarding the relief of Patils and Village Accountants whose emoluments and private means are not sufficient for their support, and they have been directed to enforce the provision of Section 60 for the relief of inferior village officers, substituting a weekly dole where the grant of a daily dole is found to be inconvenient. It has also been ordered that the wives and children above seven years of the inferior village servants who are relieved under Section 60 should work for their living on the nearest relief works or in other ways.
- 4. The demand for tagái advances for agricultural improvement is increasing, and the following additional assignments, which have been applied for, have been sanctioned:—

The employment of special kárkúns to deal with the applications for such advances has been authorised where necessary.

- 5. Arrangements are in progress for the supply of grass to the affected areas. Hay-presses have been working at several stations in the Sátpudas and the hilly tracts of Poona and in the Thána District, and grass is being collected at several depôts in the districts of Sátára, Belgaum, Dhárwár and Kánara. While the dealers are to be encouraged to take part, as far possible, in the distribution of the grass, authority has been given to the Honourable Mr. Shuttleworth to despatch the grass by rail to the larger railway stations in the affected districts if suitable offers are not made to buy it at an earlier stage, and to make the best arrangements he can to dispose of grass sent to these places at a fair price, such as if possible will cover all charges. It has however been again pointed out that the great bulk of the cattle can be saved only by being taken to the grazing grounds and importation of grass is intended only for those which must be kept in the district.
- 6: The application of Chapter XIII of the Famine Code to the Bijápur District has been authorised, and the question of strengthening the Police in that district is under consideration. The recruitment of 50 extra men for the Khándesh Police has been sanctioned.

No. 8801-A.—The following Rule made by the Judge of the Sadar Court in Sind, with the previous sanction of the Government of Bombay, under the provisions of Section 553 of the Criminal Procedure Code, 1882, is published for general information as Rule 59, Part III of the Manual of Rules for the guidance of criminal courts in Sind:—

"59. Commissions sent for execution to any place where the language is different from that of the court issuing them should be accompanied by translations in the language of such place, or in English."

No. 8804.—The following Rule made by the Judge of tha Sadar Court in Sind, with the previous sanction of the Government of Bombay, under the provisions of Section 553 of the Criminal Procedure Code, 1882, is published for general information as Rule 60, Part III of the Manual of Rules for the guidance of criminal courts in Sind:—

"60. The Judge of the Sadar Court in Sind desires to point out, for the guidance of all Magistrates, that it is their duty to despatch their criminal work with the least possible delay, it being essential for the proper administration of justice that it should be promptly dealt with. As far as possible criminal work should be given precedence over other work, cases in which the accused are in custody being taken up for disposal in preference to those in which the accused are on bail. Magistrates should so arrange for the despatch of their criminal work that the hearing of one case should, as much as possible, not be allowed to interfere with the hearing of another, each one being fixed for hearing for distinct days, due regard being had to their probable duration. Every effort should be made to minimise delay and hardship to the parties and witnesses. When a case is once commenced, it should be heard de die in diem and completed with every possible despatch, the whole or as much of the working day as could be spared being devoted to its hearing. Witnesses remaining over from one day should be examined at the first sitting of the court on the following day. The practice of taking up a case for an hour or so and then dropping it again should be avoided, and cases should be disposed of, as far as possible, in continuous sittings. Adjournments should, as a rule, be avoided, specially when the accused are likely to be prejudiced thereby, and if from any unavoidable cause an adjournment is deemed indispensable, it should be for as short a time as possible.

"In any case a trial once commenced should be continued from day to day, except on Sundays, other days when the public treasuries are closed and days when native usage absolutely requires the intermission of all business. Every court should sit daily and punctually at the hour appointed for its opening, unless prevented by circumstences, which should be recorded in its proceedings.

"When a Magistrate is on tour, every care should be taken to let the parties and witnesses know the place as well as the time, for their appearance, which should be fixed so as to obviate, as far as practicable, the inconvenience which must be caused to them by their being called away to long distances from their residences, and the hearing of cases should, as far as possible, be completed at the appointed place without obliging them to move from camp to to camp with the Magistrates."

In continuation of Government Notification No. 10415, dated 19th instant, the following Memorandum is published for general information:—

Want of rain is now generally felt in the affected districts for the late sown crops, which have begun to wither in places. The reports for the week ending 19th instant are summarised below.

Ahmednagar.

There has been no rain. Sowing is generally finished. Most of the newly sown crops are withering and will die unless rain falls within ten days. Cattle in some places are still in good condition, in others beginning to suffer. Labourers in northern and central talukas are flocking to works in very large numbers. Grain supply is generally sufficient, but there are complaints that Banias do not sell at published bazar rates. The average price of jowari is 19 10 and of bajir 19 17 lbs. per rupee. There has been some emigration. The detailed prices are given below—

Kha'ndesh.

There has been no rain. Prices are almost stationary. The average price of jowári is 18 lbs. per rupee. Grain supply is sufficient. Crops and agriculturists are in the same state as before. Harvest operations being over, labourers are coming on to works in increased numbers. There has been no emigration worth mentioning.

Bija'pur.

There has been no rain during the week and no progress in sowing operations. Standing crops are withering. Prices of jowari have risen in three talukas; they vary from 24 lbs. in Bagalkot to 17½ lbs. in Indi. The condition of cattle is deplorable owing to want of fodder and they are sold at nominal rates. The condition of cultivators is unsatisfactory. Agricultural labourers have no field work and all are flocking to relief works. Weavers and artizans have no sufficient work. The former have commenced joining relief works. There is slight cholera in Hungund Taluka. Grain supply is generally fair. Water-supply is failing. The taluka prices of jowari are given below—

Belgaum.

There has been no rain. Prices have slightly fallen. The average price of jowari is 23 lbs., of bajri 23 lbs., and of rice 16 lbs. per rupee. Grain supply is sufficient. Emigration from Athni and parts of Parasgad to adjacent talukas and States continues. There has been no immigration. Fodder is scarce and dear. Cattle are being sold at cheap rates. Dha'rwa'r.

There has been no rain. Kharif jowári and rice harvest is in progress. Standing rabi crops are good so far, but in Ron, Mundargi and Nargund more rain is wanted for them. Some rabi sowings are still going on. The condition of agriculturists in affected parts is fair, and that of labourers and artizans improved. Cattle are indifferent in affected tálukas. Food-grains and water are generally sufficient. Fodder is insufficient in affected parts. There has been no emigration to Bombay. Prices are much above normal. The price of jowári in the affected tracts is—Navalgund 261%, Ron 28, Nargund 25% and Mundargi 27 lbs. per rupec.

Kola'ba.

There has been no rain. The price of rice at Alibág is 183 lbs. per rupee. Prices are generally stationary or falling. 45 labourers from Pon have gone to Bombay, and 225 labourers have arrived in Uran from Ratnágiri and Poona. The general situation is unchanged. People are not yet willing to work for famine wages.

Ratna'giri.

There has been no rain. Prices of paddy and rice have fallen slightly in Malvan and Khed and of rice only in Mandangad; that of nágli has fallen slightly in Vengurla and Khed and risen slightly in Rájápur; that of vari has fallen considerably at Ratnágiri; elsewhere prices are sta-

Ratna'giri-continued.

tionary. There has been no demand for work anywhere except in Málvan, where 51 persons are on test relief works. There are fewer people going to Bombay for work than returning owing to the plague in that city. Cattle are healthy except in some tálukas. Late crops are in fair condition.

2. The progress of relief measures during the last week is shown in the appended statement, Excluding the district of Khándesh, for which no returns have been submitted, the daily average number of labourers on relief works was 114,644 as compared with 72,571 in the preceding week. Harvesting and sowing operations are now generally completed; the demand for labour at famine wages is increasing, and several new works have been ordered to be started.

One earth-work (strengthening and improving banks of Ekruk Tank Canals) has been specially provided for weavers in Sholapur who are in need of relief, and it has been ordered that weavers alone should as far as possible be employed on it, other applicants being sent to road works. Estimates for new metal-collecting works have been sanctioned and the works have been brought on the famine relief programme. The survey of five tank projects in Sholapur has been ordered, and Rs. 4,000 have been allotted for the survey of the Bársi-Pandharpur Railway. Allotments have also been sanctioned for several small works in Khandesh. Programmes of suitable relief works to be utilised in case of necessity have been prepared for the districts of Kolaba and Ratnagiri.

- 3. The Yeola Municipality have proposed a scheme for relieving, the distressed weavers in that town by employing them in their own craft, and have asked for the assistance of Government to enable them to carry out the scheme. Government have approved of the proposal, and it has been suggested that the project should be started at once. Under the existing law a loan cannot be granted for this purpose, but a loan on favourable terms has been offered for the water-works now under construction, and the sum of Rs. 50,000, which will thus be set free out of the balance at the credit of the Municipality, can be utilized for the relief project. It has been ordered that such of the relief workers as are temporarily unfitted for work by illness should, for the time being, be put on gratuitous relief in accordance with the intention of Section 176 (l) of the Famine Code. In order to afford relief to District and Village Hereditary Officers it has been directed that the annual cash allowances of the former should be paid in two, and those of the latter in four, instalments.
- 4. The Police force in the Poona District, where increase of crime is reported, has been strengthened. It has been ordered that the Village Police employed for guarding relief works, stores of grain, &c., should receive the wage of labourers of A Class.

No. 5684.—The following telegram from the British Consul, Alexandria, dated the 25th December 1896, is published for general information:—

"Sanitary Board has applied plague regulations to arrivals from Karáchi,"

By order of His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor in Council,

J. DEC. ATKINS, Secretary to Government. If the vessel does not carry a qualified Medical Officer, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appeinted and notified by the Resident, and there to remain for a period of eight clear days from the date of arrival in the barbour. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the barbour.

- IV.—If the Health Officer, as the result of the enquiry made under paragraph III above, shall have reason to believe at the time when the vessel arrives in the harbour that any person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, and there to remain for a period of fifteen days from the day of arrival in the harbour; and shall further direct that during such fifteen days' intercourse between the said vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour shall be prohibited as provided in Rule III.
- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid any case or cases of plague should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of termination of the last case either by death, recovery or removal from the vessel and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rules III and IV.
- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of eight days, or if the vessel has been placed in quarantine for fifteen days, for a period of fifteen days. If a case of plague occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.
- VII —Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somáli Coast which may have communicated with vessels coming from Karáchi, shall be subjected to the same rules as vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somáli Coast from Karáchi.
