EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 19th February 1896.

No. 412-The following Resolution of the Government of India in the Home Department is republished for general information:

"HOME DEPARTMENT.

PROGRESS OF EDUCATION IN INDIA DURING THE YEAR 1894-95.

No. 1-Education.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Home Department (Education),—under date Calcutta, the 11th February 1896.

The several Reports on the Progress of Education in India during the year 1894-95, with the orders passed on them by Local Governments and Administrations.

RESOLUTION.

In Home Department Circular No. 9-Education, dated the 18th July 1895, instructions were issued for the preparation in future by Local Governments and Administrations of quinquennial reports on the state and progress of Education. The first Provincial quinquennial reports will cover the years 1892-93 to

1896-97, and in dealing with them the Government of India will review exhaustively the history of Education in the five-year period. In publishing for general information the statistics of Education for intermediate years, only a brief summary is requisite of the most striking features presented by the figures.

- 2. The total number of Public and Private Institutions to which the Reports relate rose from 147,297 in 1893-94 to 149,496 in 1894-95. The increase was chiefly in the former class of institutions, Public Institutions having numbered 103,172 in 1893-94 and 105,359 in 1894-95, and Private Institutions 44,125 and 44,137 in these years, respectively. Among Public Institutions the largest increase (2,233) was in the number of primary schools, which stood at 97,325 in 1893-94 and 99,558 in 1894-95. Secondary schools, which numbered 5,066 in the preceding year, increased by 33. The number of training schools (159) remained stationary, but the number of all other special schools fell from 468 to 390. There were 5,609 advanced, and 38,528 elementary, Private Institutions in the year under review, as compared with 5,730 advanced, and 38,395 elementary, Private Institutions in the previous year. There was an increase of 583 among elementary Private institutions teaching a vernacular only or mainly.
- 3. The total number of scholars under instruction in schools of all classes increased from 4,066,235 in 1893-94 to 4,189,770 in 1894-95. There was an increase of 107,878 among male scholars, who numbered 3,799,170 in 1894-95 and of 15,657 among female scholars, whose number was 390,600. The percentage of pupils at school to the total population of school-going age (taken at 15 per cent. of the entire population) rose from 11.67 in 1893-94 to 12.02 in 1894-95. The increase was shared by pupils of both sexes, the percentage of the male population of school-going age actually under instruction having risen from 20.82 to 21.43, and the similar percentage of females from 2.19 to 2.28.

4. The average monthly attendance at the different classes of Public Institutions during the years

1893-94 and 1894-95 is compared in the statement given in the margin. Similar statistics regarding Private Institutions (advanced and elementary) are not available. The attendance at Publie Institutions rose from 3,228,114 in 1892-93 to 3,308,121 in 1893-94, and 3,414,303 in 1894-95. The highest increase (91,377) occurred among pupils in primary schools. On the 31st March 1895 there were 14,422 students on the rolls of Arts Colleges, as compared with 14,360 on the 31st March 1894. The number on the rolls of colleges or departments of colleges for Professional Training rose from 3,824 to 4,062. The increase noticed in previous years in the number of pupils at Secondary and Primary Schools was maintained, there being 3,572,084 scholars in these classes of institutions in 1894-95, as compared with 3,455,188 in the preceding year. The rise was shared by both classes of institutions, the

scholars in Secondary Schools having numbered 507,658 in 1893-94 and 525,303 in 1894-95, and those in Primary Schools, 2,947,530 and 3,046,781 in these years respectively. The number of students attending Training Schools for Masters fell from 4,370 to 4,207, but there was a slight improvement in the number at Training Schools for Mistresses, from 909 in 1893-94 to 934 in 1894-95. The number attending other Special Schools decreased from 18,363 to 18,228.

- 5. Of the total number (4,189,770) of scholars attached to Public and Private Institutions of all classes, 428,593, or 10°2 per cent., were studying English, as compared with 404,591 or 9°9 per cent., in 1893-94. There was an increase in the number studying a classical language from 579,361 to 598,484, and in the number studying a vernacular from 3,6°9,391 to 3,811,050. The number of those studying English in Secondary Schools, which had risen from 301,376 in 1892-93 to 310,621 in 1893-94, increased in 1894-95 to 328,002. The highest number (310,243) of those studying a classical language were in Private Institutions (advanced and elementary), but half of these were children in Koran Schools. The number reading a classical language in public Secondary Schools was 115,181, against 112,144 in 1893-94. The number of those studying a vernacular in Primary Schools was 2,932,132 and 3,035,981 in 1893-94 and 1894-95 respectively. It is satisfactory to observe that in every case the figures for 1894-95 were in advance of those for 1893-94.
- 6. The race and religion of the 4,189,770 scholars in Public and Private Institutions during the year 1894-95, and the ratio per cent. borne by each class to the total number, are shown in the following statement, and compared with the figures for the preceding year:—

The numerical increase was universal and was highest (61,125) among Hindus. The proportion of Muhammadans to the total number showed an increase. Of the students (18,484) receiving a collegiate education, the greatest number (15,439) were Hindus; 1,361 were Muhammadans; 576 were Native Christians; 472 were Europeans and Eurasians, and 636 belonged to miscellaneous races or religions. Of those trans; 472 Were Europeans and Eurasians, and 055 belonged to inscendences races of rengions. Of those (525,303) receiving a secondary education, 380,003 were Hindus; 73,804 Muhammadans; 27,277 Native Christians; 23,744 Europeans and Eurasians; and 20,476 belonged to other classes. Of the pupils (3,046,781) under primary instruction in public institutions, 2,167,246 were Hindus, 631,107 Muhammadans, 69,404 Native Christians, 3,138 Europeans and Eurasians, and 175,886 belonged to other classes.

- The gross expenditure (direct and indirect) on Public Instruction, which had increased steadily from Rs. 3,05,19,632 and Rs. 3,16,72,827 in 1891-92 and 1892-93 to Rs. 3,22,79,706 in 1893-94, rose to Rs. 3,30,88,434 in the year under review. The direct expenditure increased from Rs. 2,58,51,608 in 1893-94 to Rs. 2,65,39,921 in 1894-95, and the indirect from Rs. 64,28,098 to Rs. 65,48,513. The rise 1894-95, and the indirect from Rs. 64,25,098 to Rs. 65,913. The rise in direct expenditure was mainly due to the growth of the cost of Secondary and Primary Schools from Rs. 1,06,36,125 and Rs. 1,03,23,937 respectively in 1893-94, to Rs. 1,08,10,970 and Rs. 1,06,48,066 in 1894-95. There was an increase in the cost of Arts Colleges (from Rs. 22,13,938 to Rs. 22,85,129), Professional Colleges (from Rs. 8,22,866 to Rs. 9,07,820), and Special Schools other than Training Schools (from Rs. 11,48,395 to 11,91,155). But the cost of Training Schools for Masters and Mistresses declined from Rs. 7,06,347 to Rs. 6,96,781. The increase; in indirect expenditure (which includes charges on account of direction, inspection, scholarships, buildings, furniture and apparatus, and miscellaneous items) was distributed over every head except 'miscellaneous.'
- 8. Educational expenditure is met from Provincial and Local and Municipal Funds, from fees, and from miscellaneous sources such as subscriptions and endowments. The following statement compares the sums spent from each of these sources, and the proportion of each sum to the total cost of education, in the years 1893-94 and 1894-95 :-

. There is little alteration in the proportion of the total expenditure paid from Municipal Funds. The rise in the proportion of the cost met from fees and miscellaneous sources is satisfactory. On the whole the Governor General in Council considers that the general results summarized above indicate that there has been steady progress in the Department of Public Instruction during the year 1894-95.

Ordered, that a copy of the above Resolution be forwarded to the Local Governments and Central Provinces. Madras. Administrations marginally noted, and to the Bombay. Burma. Department of Revenue and Agriculture for Bengal. N.-W. P. and Oudh, Assam. information.

Ordered also, that the Resolution be published in the Supplement to the Gazette of India.

I am directed by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to transmit to you, to be laid before the Secretary of State for India in Council, the accompanying copy of a Circular addressed to the Chambers of Commerce of this country on the subject of certificates of origin for Spain.

Circular from George N. Curzon, Esq., Under-Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs,

To-The Secretaries to the Chambers of Commerce, United Kingdom.

I am directed by the Marquess of Salisbury to inclose herewith, for your information, copies of two despatches, and their enclosures, from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Madrid, which relate to the requirements of Spain in the matter of certificates of origin for goods exported from the

United Kingdom to that country.

The first of these despatches contains the reply of the Spanish Government to the representations which have been made to them by that of Her Majesty, and shows the result of the unremitting efforts of Her Majesty's Embassy at Madrid to arrive at some arrangement which would entail a minimum degree of inconvenience to merchants in this country engaged in the export trade with Spain. The despatch also contains models of certificates in the form in which, for the present at any rate, the Spanish Government require that they shall be drawn up and visé by a Spanish Consular Officer.

The second despatch contains a translation of a Circular addressed by the Spanish Government to the various Customs officials in Spain.

It may be convenient that I should furnish you with a brief summary of the various phases through which this question has passed in recent years.

By the Spanish Royal Order of the 28th August 1886, and the Order thereunder of the 2nd September 1886, it was stated that goods should be admitted into Spain provided that the certificate of origin should be duly visé by the Spanish Consul, and should contain a statement that before the official granting it a declaration had been made "to the effect that the goods are the produce and manufacture of a country having a treaty with Spain;" that is to say, the name and address of the manufacturer was not required.

It was further provided that the official to issue such certificates in regards to British goods should be 'the officer' styled in England 'the Collector of Customs.'

The Spanish Regulations in force before this, viz., those of 1882, provided that the certificate might be issued by 'the Mayor, the Chamber of Commerce, or the local authority,' but required the official declaration of the manufacturer or producer that the goods are of his manufacture or production; which is equivalent to giving the name and address of the manufacturer or producer.

Thus the Regulations of 1886 were a mitigation of those of 1882, but stipulated for the issue of English certificates by the 'Collector of Customs' only, to the exclusion, apparently, of other authorities.

In January 1893, however, new Regulations were issued in Spain as attached to the Tariff, stating categorically that the name and address of the manufacturer or producer must be given in the certificates, but that such certificates might be issued by the 'Mayors, Chambers of Commerce and Navigation, Magistrates, Notaries Public, or Administrators of Customs.'

This arrangement gave rise to a series of complaints from the mercantile community of this country, which were brought to the notice of the Spanish Government, and Sir G. Bonham obtained in writing from the Chief Customs Department at Madrid a memorandum to the following effect, viz., that bearing in mind the difficulty of stating the house of the manufacturer, 'the admission of the goods is permitted ('se tolerá') by the Customs officials if the exporter declares them to be of British origin, in accordance with the Circular of this Department of the 28th August 1886,' which was quoted at the end of the memorandum, and which, as shown above, specially mentioned the Collector of Customs as the British official to issue certificates of origin for English goods.

Inasmuch as this Customs memorandum did not expressly state that the officials mentioned in the Regulations of 1893, which were still in force could not issue certificates under this memorandum, as well as the Collector of Customs specially mentioned by the Royal Order of 1886, the trade in England no doubt believed that the certificates might be issued by Mayors, Chambers of Commerce, Magistrates, etc., and that certificates so issued need not contain the name and address of the manufacturer or producer. As a matter of fact, certificates not containing the name and address were thenceforward issued by Mayors, Chambers of Commerce, Magistrates, etc., in England, and were always accepted by the Spanish Customs officers from 1893 down to the middle of the present year—1895.

In July 1895, however, new Regulations were again issued in Spain, categorically requiring the name and address of the manufacturer or producer, and simultaneously English goods, accompanied by certificates not containing this indication, began to be stopped.

Complaint was made by Her Majesty's Ambassador who called attention to the Customs memorandum of 1893, and the Spanish Government consented to delay the operation of the new Regulations pending negotiations on the subject.

How these negotiations may result it would not be safe to predict. At present, the Spanish Government are firm in their resolve that only those English certificates which are issued by Collectors of Customs can omit the name and address of the manufacturer or producer, whilst those issued by Chambers of Commerce, Magistrates, etc., must contain this indication.

Her Majesty's Government regret this decision, but they do not see their way to further contesting it, for though a different course of procedure has in practice been followed for some years, the strict letter of the Regulations of 1893 appears to justify the contention set up by the Spanish Government.

I have the honour to transmit herewith copy and translation of a note which I have received from the Minister of State in reply to the representations which, by instructions from Your Lordship, I have made in favour of permission being granted to the English Chambers of Commerce, and more especially that of London, to continue to use the form of certificate hitherto employed by them.

The note forwards a Royal Order issued by the Minister of Finance, of which I have had the honour to forward a summary by telegraph.

With reference to Your Excellency's notes requesting that certificates of origin issued by English Chambers of Commerce be admitted, I have the honour to transmit to you the annexed copy, and forms of certificates of origin of the Royal Order of the Ministry of Finance, dated the 8th instant, from which Your Excellency will perceive what has been granted by that Department with reference to certificates of origin, and the good dispositions which animate Her Majesty's Government in its commercial relations with Great Britain.

ROYAL ORDER OF THE MINISTRY OF FINANCE, SPAIN.

In view of the Royal Order, transmitted by Your Ministry, of the 30th October last, forwarding copy of a despatch, dated the 25th of the same month, from the Marquess of Salisbury to Sir George Bonham, in which it is requested that certificates of origin in their present form be admitted by the Spanish Government until the negotiations are concluded, and that the guarantee offered by the London Chamber of Commerce with relation to the same be deemed sufficient for those issued by it, inasmuch as it is authorized to receive declarations in judicial form, which is the same as the administration of an oath:

In view of the Royal Order, communicated the 30th of the aforesaid month by the Under-Secretary of the Ministry of State, transmitting a note, dated the 25th, addressed to Your Excellency by Her Britannic Majesty's Charge d'Affaires, requesting that for the importation of English goods into Spain the form of certificates in harmony with the Memorandum of 1893, which the Chargé d'Affaires supposes to be intentionally rejected in some Custom Houses, be admissible until the conclusion of the above-mentioned negotiations:

Considering that, according to section 5, letter (A), of Disposition 12 of the Customs Tariff in force, the certificate must necessarily consist of an official declaration made by the producer or manufacturer, or by his authorized representative, before the local authority of the place of production or deposit in the country of origin, to the effect that the goods to which the certificate refers are of his manufacture or the produce of his industry, the name and address of the producers or manufacturers being required when the declaration is made by persons authorized by them for the purpose:

Considering that the Chambers of Commerce are limited in their power by said Disposition 12 to the receipt of the official declaration of the producer or manufacturer, or person authorized by the same, showing that the goods to which the certificate refers are of his manufacture or the produce of his industry:

Considering that, in view of the intention of the Spanish Government to manifest its constant good-will towards that of Great Britain, and to favour the legitimate interests of English commerce in so far as the proper protection of national commerce may allow under the legal provisions in force, a Royal Order was issued by the Ministry of Finance on the 2nd September 1886, granting the admission of English goods with certificates of origin issued by the official known there under the name of Collector of Customs, equivalent to our 'Administrator de Aduanas,' provided that the certificates issued by said functionary be visé by the Spanish Consulate:

Considering that the aforesaid provisions of Disposition 12 of the Customs Tariff in force, and of the Royal Order of the 2nd September 1886, constitute, with respect to certificates of origin for goods proceeding from England, the legal régime in force in Spain, the derogation of which cannot be inferred from mistakes made in its interpretation and application, in doubtful cases, by some Custom Houses whose conduct has rather afforded opportunity for confirming the régime in question by provoking decisions of the office of the Director General which have always been in conformity with said legal prescriptions:

Considering that the essential terms ('comunicaciones constitutivas') of the Memorandum of 1893 do not, as regards certificates for English produce, imply any alteration whatsoever in the form harmonizing with Disposition 12 of the Customs Tariff and Royal Order of 1886, with which agree the copies of certificates annexed to the present Royal Order as visible examples of the legal and admissible form, which examples correspond exactly with the respective original documents of a date subsequent to the year 1893 attached to their particular Records:

Considering that, as regards certificates issued by the English Custom Houses, the legal prescriptions defining the officially constituted position, the continuance of which is asked by the English Chargé d'Affaires, are thus established, and that they preclude the grant to the London Chamber of Commerce of the power conceded as an exception to the above-mentioned Custom Houses, and that it only remains to avoid or correct any inconvenience which, owing to the involuntary error of any Spanish Custom House, may stand in the way of the exact observance of the régime in force, His Majesty the King, and, in his name, the Queen Regent, has been pleased to order—

- (1) That the office of the Director General of Customs be reminded and enjoined, for the information of all the Custom Houses in the kingdom, to maintain the strictest observance of the above-mentioned legal provisions.
- (2) That the same Department be recommended, with a view to giving proper effect to the law, to observe in every case, and especially where there is any doubt, an equitable discrimination which, without contravening the said precepts, and causing undue loss to the revenue of the Customs and improper injury to the national commerce, may facilitate the commercial relations of England and Spain, and may harmonize with the relations of mutual sympathy and respect existing between the two Governments.

With reference to my despatch of the 13th instant relating to certificates of origin, I have the honour to transmit herewith copies and translation of a Circular addressed to the various Custom Houses, stating the treatment to which English certificates of origin are to be subjected. The Circular, although dated the 12th instant, is only published in the 'Eco de las Aduanas' of yesterday.

[Translation.]

Extract from 'El Eco de las Aduanas,' November 21st, 1895.

Circular referring to the admission of Certificates of Origin issued in England, November 12th, 1895.

Owing to protests made to the Minister of Finance and to this Central Department, it has come to knowledge that some Custom Houses, not taking into account the provisions in force, have refused English certificates of origin issued by the 'Collectors of Customs,' because the said documents failed to give the name of the manufacturers of the goods mentioned therein, or because the person who made the declaration of origin was not duly authorized for the purpose by the manufacturers; and as this ruling is in opposition to the Royal Order of the 2nd September 1886, published in the 'Boletin' of this Direction General, whereby Administrators of British Custom Houses are authorized to issue certificates of origin, which order is still in force, as also the provisions of Disposition 12 of the Customs Tariff for countries mentioned in the Circular of the 22nd October last, this Department, by order of the Minister, enjoins you, until the diplomatic negotiations on the application of the Royal Order of the 6th July last, commenced by the Ministry of State, are concluded—

- To observe most strictly the aforesaid Royal Order of the 2nd September 1886, and other provisions in force relating to English certificates of origin.
- (2) To observe in every case, and especially where there is any doubt, an equitable discrimination which, without contravening the said precepts, and causing undue loss to the revenue of the Customs and improper injury to the national commerce, may facilitate commercial relations between Spain and Great Britain.

(3) And, following out the instructions of the Minister, to admit likewise certificates issued by English Chambers of Commerce, which have been refused owing to their not containing the names of the manufacturers, on condition that the 'expediente' have been farnished by the date of this Royal Order; as also those which, under similar conditions, refer to goods ready for clearance at the date alluded to, provided that documents amending the deficiencies of the said certificates be furnished within a reasonable time by the interested parties, and that this exception shall not extend to subsequent cases.

You are requsted to acknowledge receipt of the present Circular, and to be careful to comply with the same, and to transmit it to the subordinate officials in your province.

There was thus a net decrease in Revenue of Rs. 5,60,870 and a net increase in Expenditure of Rs. 6,58,289 as compared with the figures of the previous year. The more important variations under the several heads are explained below:—

The decrease under Land Revenue, which is the only decrease of great importance, is due chiefly to a contribution of Rs. 5,60,000 to meet the exigencies of Imperial Finances, and to postponements caused by late and poor crops in the Ahmedabad, Broach and Surat Districts, and by change in the date of instalments by which close on thirteen lákhs of Revenue (of which 4th represents the "Provincial" share) due or under previous arrangements payable in 1894-95, was not collected until after the close of the year. The increase under Salt being small, calls for no explanation; while that under Stamps is due (1) to the receipt of special ite ms on account of probate duty on the estates of three wealthy inhabitants of Bombay, (2) to a general increase in the sale of Court-fee stamps throughout the Presidency, and (3) to an improvement in the revenue from "Duty on other unstamped documents," "Share transfer stamps," and "Other non-judicial stamps." Under Excise the improvement is due (1) to larger issues of spirits from the Uran distillery to Bombay and Karáchi, as in 1893 it was found necessary to close the shops during the riots, (2) to the duty on strong liquor in Sind having been raised from Rs. 4 to Rs. 5 per gallon, and (3) to a good season generally. The improvement under Customs is due to larger receipts from transhipment fees which are now levied on all goods brought under the new Customs Tariff Act, while that under Assessed Taxes is due mainly to larger collections on salaries owing to the Exchange Compensation Allowances having been paid at higher rates, to larger collections in connection with the tax on securities owing to the anticipation interest paid in advance on the conversion of the 4 per cent loans into 3½ per cents, and to stricter scrutiny and care in assessment. The decrease under Forests is mainly due to a special receipt in 1893-94, not repeated in the following year, in connection with the sale-proceeds of the Government half share of trees standing in an Infam forest, while the increase under

due to a larger attendance at the Professional Colleges of Bombay and Poona, and to the levy of fees for the use of the Law Library attached to the College at Bombay, to larger fee-receipts in Government schools and larger receipts from the workshop attached to the School of Art, Bombay. The better results due to these causes were, however, considerably counterbalanced by a decline in the fees in the two Arts Colleges at Bombay and Poona owing to the growing competition of private Colleges and to the poor results of the Matriculation Examination of 1893-94. The improvement under Medical is chiefly due to the recovery of arrears from the Port Trustees of Bombay on account of the maintenance of the European General Hospital and partly to larger fees from paying patients in the same hospital. The falling off under Scientific and Other Minor Departments is due to decreased receipts on account of experimental cultivation owing to the sale last year of the Bhadgaon farm in Khándesh, while that under Receipts in aid of Superannuation is due to certain efficers lent to foreign service having reverted, retired, or proceeded on furlough. The improvement under Miscellaneous is due to special receipts representing (1) unclaimed estates of over 15 years' standing in the hands of the Administrator General written off to the credit of Government, (2) the balance of the Cotton Gin Factory Fund written off to the credit of Provincial under orders of Government, and (3) the sale-proceeds of the Nazarána paid by His Highness the Rája of Kolhápur. The increase under Civil Works in charge of Public Works Officers is chiefly in receipts under the Highway Act.

EXPENDITURE.

Under Refunds and Drawbacks the savings being small, no explanation is necessary, while the excess under "Assignments and Compensations" is chiefly in the book adjustments on account of "Assessment of Alienated Lands less Quit Rents" chiefly in the Ahmedabad, Kaira and Sátára Districts, due to revision of settlements partially counterbalanced by savings in cash payments to Inámdárs and other grantees owing to their not having been claimed before the close of the year. The increase under Land Revenue may be briefly stated to be due (1) to the payment of Exchange Compensation Allowances at higher rates, and (2) to a large payment of arrears in the Dhárwar District of allowances to District and Village Officers. The increase under Stamps is chiefly in "Stamp Paper" supplied from "Central Stores," and is reported to be due to an increase in the quantity of all descriptions of stamps issued, particularly Non-judicial Stamps. The decrease under Excise, and the increases under Assessed Taxes, Forests and Registration, being small, do not call for explanation, while the increase under Interest on Ordinary Debt Registration, being small, do not call for explanation, while the increase under Interest on Ordinary Debt represented interest paid to the Government of India on the additional Funds allotted to the Local Government for loan purposes. The increase under Interest on Other Obligations and the decrease under Post Office are small, and do not call for special remarks. The increase under General Administration is spread over several minor heads, and may be briefly stated to be due, (a) in "Staff and Household of the Governor," to the payment of privilege leave allowances to the Private Secretary, to the purchase of new tents, and to the payment on account of arrear for water-supply, (b) in "Executive Council," to the Pay and Exchange Compensation Allowance of the Honourable Mr. Lee-Warner, member of the Supreme Council from the let to the 20th March 1894, having been adjusted to the debit of this head in February. Council from the 1st to the 20th March 1894, having been adjusted to the debit of this head in February 1895, and also to a larger payment on account of Exchange Compensation Allowances, (c) in "Civil Secretariats" to fewer absentees, and to larger payments on account of Exchange Compensation Allowances, (d) in "Commissioner in Sind," to the post of Assistant Commissioner having been held by an officer of a higher grade, and to larger payments on account of Exchange Compensation Allowances, and (e) in "Commissioners," to larger payments on account of Exchange Compensation Allowances, and to Officers of Other Provinces. Under Law and Justice—Courts of Law, the increase is mainly due (1) to a larger number of officers being on duty than in the previous year, (2) to Exchange Compensation Allowances having been paid at higher rates, (3) to the payment of privilege leave allowances of the Judicial Commissioner, Sind, and the Salary and Exchange Compensation of the acting officer, (4) to payments to efficer of other previous and (5) to the post of Special Judge under the Decemparation training the salary and the salary a officers of other provinces, and (5) to the post of Special Judge under the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act being held by a Covenanted European Civilian. The savings under Jails being small, do not call for remarks. The increase under Police is chiefly in (1) Presidency Police, (2) District Executive Force, and (3) Village Police, due in the first to the strengthening of the force, arising out of the reorganization scheme, and to arrears of Exchange Compensation Allowance for 1893-94 being paid, in the second to the reorganization of the Force and to the Compensation Allowances having been paid at higher rates, and in the third to an increase in the cash payments to Heads of Village Police and Watchmen. These increases were, however, partly counterbalanced by decreases under "Special Police" and "Railway Police," due in the former to the recovery of contributions for Railway Police in Káthiáwár, which is brought to account the former to the recovery of contributions for Kallway Police in Kathawar, which is brought to account by deduction from charges, and in the latter to the transfer to the Punjáb of the charges of the Sind section of the North-Western Railway Police. The increase under Marine is due to special repairs to the steamer "Jhelum," partly counterbalanced by the actuals of 1893-94 having been swollen by the cost of coals supplied to the Sultan of Zanzibar's S.S. "Avoca" in connection with the rescue of pilgrims from the S.S. "Khiva" destroyed by fire off the Coast of Arabia. Under Medical, the increase is chiefly under "Hospitals and Dispensaries" and "Sanitation and Vaccination," and is due in the first (a) to the payment of arrears of "Rates and Taxes" of the Sir Jamestji Jijibhoy Hospital, and to the special charges sanctioned in connection with the outbreak of cholera in that hospital, (b) to an increase in the establishment of the St. George's Hospital and larger payments on account of Exchange Compensation Allowances, and (c) to an increase under Salaries of the Pestonji Hormasji Kama Hospital, due to the acting arrangements made in connection with the resignation of the First Physician, and in the second to the payment of the Exchange Compensation Allowances at higher rates, to a larger purchase of tents, and to the payments of grants to the Village Sanitation Committees. The decrease under *Political* is due chiefly to the recovery of certain arrear contributions which are brought to account by deduction from charges and to smaller expenditure under "Darbar Presents." Certain special charges in connection with the Darbar at Ahmedabad and the purchase of horses for the Raja of Kolhapur were incurred in 1893-94. The increase under Scientific and other Minor Departments is due to the appointment of the Inspector of Factories and to an increase under Medical Inspection Fees, while that under Superannuation Allowances is due partly to the usual progressive increase under this head and partly to reduction in the Survey Department. Under Stationery and Printing, the increase is due to larger supplies of paper to the Government Central Press, and to special purchases of woollens for clothing the Sind Police, while that under Miscellaneous is due to refunds made on account of certain lands in the Bijápur and Dhárwár Districts relinquished by the Southern Mahratta Railway, and to the refund to the Western Dekhan Branch of the same railway, of compensation for certain lands which having remained unclaimed beyond the period allowed by the rules of the Court had been credited to "Unclaimed Deposits." The decrease under Contributions from Provincial to Local is due chiefly to smaller grants for "Village Sanitation" and for local public works, partly counterbalanced by the transfer to this head of the grants to Local Board Dispensaries and to Veterinary Dispensaries, and by increased grants to Local Board Schools. The decrease under Irrigation—Minor Works and Navigation is due to the special payments in 1893-94 in settlement of claims for land compensation in connection with the Gokák Canal Works.

The falling off under Land Revenue is due to an over-estimate of revenue expected from revision of settlements and to a bad kharif crop in Sind. The increase under Stamps is due chiefly to an increase in the revenue from sale of General Stamps, Court-fee Stamps, and to two special receipts aggregating Rs. 1,40,000 on account of Probate Duty. That under Excise is due to higher prices realized in the auction sales of the country liquor licenses, to an increase in the still-head duty on country liquor, and also to an increase in consumption. Larger revenue is also expected in "Transit Duty on Excise Opium." The decrease under Customs is under "Miscellaneous," while the increase under Assessed Taxes is chiefly in "Income Tax on other sources of Income." Under Forests, the increase is chiefly due in the Northern Circle to high prices obtained for coupes in the Thána Division and for teak timber from occupied and waste numbers in the Panch Maháls Division, in the Central Circle to better results in the sales of firewood and charcoal, and in the Southern Circle to larger sales of bamboos. The increase under Registration is chiefly in "Fees for registering Documents," and is due to the growing appreciation of the advantages of registration. That under Interest is due to an increase in interest on "Advances to Cultivators" and to the interest on two Funds which have been vested in the Treasurer of Charitable Endowments, the interest on which was in former years credited to Excluded Local Funds. The increase under Law and Justice—Courts of Law is chiefly expected under "General Fees, Fines and Forfeitures," while the falling off under Jails is almost wholly in "Hire of convicts," due to sufficient work not being available for the employment of the convict gangs. The increase under Education is due to a progressive improvement in fees in Government Colleges—Professional, and Schools—General, while under Medical the improvement is in Medical College fees due to a larger number of students at the Grant Medical College and t

cultivation due to the sale-proceeds of "Gool" out of the sugarcane plantation at the Poona farm, while the falling off in the Receipts in aid of Superannuation is chiefly under "Other Foreign Service," due to several officers having reverted to British service and proceeded on long leave. The decrease under Miscellaneous is under Unclaimed Deposits, while the increase under Contributions from Local to Provincial is due chiefly to the recovery of arrears on account of Collector's Local Fund Establishments.

EXPENDITURE.

The expected decrease under Refunds and Drawbacks is chiefly in "Excise" refunds, while the increase under Assignments and Compensations is chiefly due to the payment of arrears to certain Inámdárs and other grantees and to expected excess adjustments on account of Alienated Land Revenue. The decrease under Land Revenue is spread over all the minor heads and may briefly be described to be due in the charges of "District Administration," to savings in "Salaries," "Establishment Charges," "Allowances," and of "District Administration," to savings in "Salaries," Establishment Charges, "Allowances," and "Supplies and Services," partly counterbalanced by an expected excess under "Contingencies" under "Survey and Settlement," to recoveries on account of "Foreign Service of the 3rd kind," and a saving in the grant for cost of eadastral maps and in charges on account of re-survey of the river Indus; in "Land Records and Agriculture" to savings in "Salaries" (due to the absence of the Director on special leave for six months), "Allowances," "Supplies and Services," "Contingencies" and "Allowances to District and Village Officers," also to the lump provision for agricultural staff in the Kaira District not being required. The increase under Stamps is due to an expected improvement in the revenue from "Sale of General Stamps" and also from "Sale of Court-fee Stamps." An increase is also expected under Stamp Paper supplied from Central Stores. The large decrease under Forests is under A—Conservancy and Works, and is chiefly in the Sind Circle, and is due to a change in the system under which timber and other forest produce is now disposed of direct from the forests to contractors, and departmental agency is done away with for supplying the North-Western Railway and other public bodies as well as for feeding local markets, while that under Interest is due to the grant for advances allotted by the Government of India not being required to under Interest is due to the grant for advances allotted by the Government of India not being required to the full extent. Under General Administration the decrease is chiefly in "Executive Council," "Civil Secretariats" and "Commissioner in Sind," partly counterbalanced by an increase under "Staff and Household of Governor" owing to the Provincialization of certain charges on account of pay and allowances of His Excellency the Governor's Band. The falling off under Law and Justice—Courts of Law is due to considerable savings in "Salaries," chiefly under "Criminal Courts" and "High Court," and that under Jails is due chiefly to the abolition of two district jails partly counterbalanced by the conversion of another into a Central Prison and to savings in the charges for rations. Under Police the expected savings are in "Salaries," "Establishments" and "Supplies and Services" under "District Executive Force," partly counterbalanced by a large increase in "Presidency Police" due to a reduction in the contribution of the Bombay Municipality resulting from a recasting of the divisible share of the charges from the 1st of April 1892 by which certain items previously included in the calculation are now to be omitted from it. April 1892, by which certain items previously included in the calculation are now to be omitted from it. The increase under Marine is under "Marine Establishment" and "Miscellaneous," due in the former to the allowances paid owing to the absence of the Shipping Master on privilege leave, and in the latter to certain special charges sanctioned by Government in connection with the life-boat at Alibag and rewards to certain lascars and fishermen for gallant conduct on the occasion of the wreck of the S.S. "Ajmir." Under Education the savings are chiefly in "Government Schools, General and Special" and in "Grantsin-Aid," due in the last-named minor head to the transfer of Rs. 75,351 to the Public Works Estimates, to the adjusting head Contribution from Provincial to Local and to Scientific and other Minor Departments. The decrease under Medical is chiefly under "Hospitals and Dispensaries" and "Medical Establishments," due to the absence of officers on long leave, partly counterbalanced by an increase under "Sanitation and Vaccination," due to provision having been made under orders of Government for expenditure which may possibly be incurred before the close of the year in connection with the new "Pilgrims' Ship Act" and for the purchase of a new boiler for the steam-launch of the Health Officer of the Port of Bombay. The savings under *Political* are chiefly under "Political Agents," "Darbár presents" and "Miscellaneous," due in the first to the absence of permanent officers on long leave and in the other two to the full provision due in the first to the absence of permanent officers on long leave and in the other two to the full provision not being required. The savings under Scientific and other Minor Departments are chiefly under "Provincial Museums" and "Veterinary and Stallion Charges." The savings under Provincial Museum, are due to the Revised not providing for the grant of Rs. 17,000 to the Reay Industrial Museum, Poona, while those under Veterinary and Stallion Charges are in the charges of the Veterinary College, Bombay, due chiefly to a junior officer acting for the Assistant Professor of Veterinary Science. Under Superant the control of the College and Professor of Veterinary Science. nuations the savings are chiefly expected in the grant for Superannuation and Retired Allowances, the estimate for which was fixed too high, while that under Stationery and Printing is chiefly in "Stationery Office at the Presidency" and "Stationery purchased in the country," due in the former chiefly to smaller expenditure on forwarding charges under "Supplies and Services." Under Miscellaneous the savings are spread over several minor heads, but are chiefly in "Rewards for Proficiency in Oriental Languages," "Allowance to Language Examination Committees" and in "Donations for Charitable purposes." The increase under Contributions is nominal, as it is the net result from the form other heads of account, partly counterbalanced by a saving in the grant for "Village Water-supply and Sanitation," the grant for which was fixed too high. The increase under Construction of Railways represents an additional grant sanctioned by Government for the construction of an independent line to the locomotive shed at Gidu.

The Original Budget Estimate of the current year provided for a closing balance of Rs. 20,64,000 on the 31st of March 1896, which has now, in accordance with the Revised Estimates, improved to Rs. 30,86,000. The better result is due to an improvement in the estimated revenue and a decrease in the estimated expenditure, partly counterbalanced by a smaller actual opening balance than was assumed in the original Budget.
