EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 608.—The following Resolution by the Government of India in the Home Department is republished for general information:—

"HOME DEPARTMENT.

PROGRESS OF EDUCATION IN INDIA DURING THE YEAR 1822-93.

No. 1 Education 72 A-83

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Home Department (Education),—dated Culcutta, the 13th March 1894.

RRAD-

The several Reports on the Progress of Education in India during the year 1892-93, with the orders passed on them by Local Governments and Administrations.

RESOLUTION.

In the Resolution recorded in the Home Department, dated the 18th June 1888, the Governor General in Council reviewed at length the statistics regarding education for 1885-86 and 1886-87, in connection with the first General Education Report for the whole of India, which was drawn up by Sir Alfred Croft, Director of Public Instruction, Bengal, and in which the progress of education during the years 1881-82 to 1885-86 was discussed. The second General Report, which treats of the progress made

during the five years commencing on the 1st April 1887 and ending on the 31st March 1892, has been prepared by Mr. A. M. Nash, Professor, Presidency College, Calcutta, and is now under the consideration of the Government of India. In publishing, for general information, the statistics of education for 1892-93, His Excellency in Council merely desires to call attention to the most prominent features presented by them.

- 2. The total number of public and private institutions to which the Educational Reports relate rose from 141,793 in 1891-92 to 144,699 in 1892-93. There was, however, a falling-off in the number of Primary Schools for both boys and girls, the total number being 97,109 in the former year and 96,409 in the latter.
- 3. The percentage of scholars to the total population of school-going age (calculated at 15 per cent. on the statistics of population according to the last Census) was 11.38 in 1892-93, as compared with 11.06 in 1891-92. The total number of pupils under instruction at the educational institutions of all classes on the 31st March 1893 was 3,966,267, while on the same date of the previous year the number was 3,856,321. The number attending public institutions increased from 3,348,910 in 1891-92 to 3,418,916 in 1892-93, and the number attending private institutions rose from 507,918 in the previous year to 547,351 in the year under report.

4. From the statement given in the margin, which shows the average monthly attendance at the

several classes of public institutions during the year, it will be seen that there was an increase in the monthly average number of pupils present at these institutions from 3,158,613 in 1891-92 to 3,228,144 in 1892-93. As noticed in previous Resolutions, statistics to show the monthly average attendance at private institutions (advanced and elementary) are not available. On the 31st March 1893 there were 13,387 scholars on the rolls of the Arts Colleges, as compared with 12,985 on the corresponding date in 1892. The number on the rolls of the Colleges or Departments of Colleges for professional training also increased from 3,292 at the end of the previous year to 3,344 at the end of 1892-93. There was also a satisfactory increase in the number of pupils at Secondary and Primary Schools, from 473,294 and 2,837,607, respectively, on the 31st March 1892 to 488,261 and 2,890,824 on the 31st March 1893. There was a

slight falling-off in the number of pupils in Training Schools for Masters (4,327), as compared with the previous year (4,353); but there was a substantial increase in the number on the rolls of Training Schools for Mistresses, which rose from 793 at the close of 1891-92 to 1,092 at the close of 1892-93. The number attending other special schools (17,681) was higher than at the close of 1891-92 (16,586).

- 5. Of the pupils under instruction, the number (including those at private institutions) engaged in studying English rose from 372,002 in 1891-92 to 388,650 in 1892-93, the chief increase being in Secondary Schools. The total number of scholars studying a classical language rose from 535,330 to 575,789, and the number of studying a vernacular language from 3,492,846 to 3,607,327. There was a considerable increase in the number of pupils at private institutions who were studying a classical language as well as those who were studying a vernacular.
- 6. The race and religion of the pupils, and the proportion of each class to the total number, during the past two years may be seen from the following table:—

It is satisfactory to observe from the above figures the sustained increase among Muhammadan pupils. This increase is chiefly noticeable at Secondary and Primary Schools, which were attended by 646,686 Muhammadan pupils as compared with 637,687 in 1891-92.

- 7. The total expenditure (direct and indirect) rose from Rs. 3,05,19,632 in 1891-92 to Rs. 3,16,72,827 in the year under review. The direct expenditure, which was Rs. 2,40,93,149 in the preceding year, increased to Rs. 2,50,54,254; this increase, as in previous years, was mainly due to increased expenditure on Secondary and Primary Education, the amounts spent under these heads in 1892-93 having been Rs. 1,03,29,480 and Rs. 99,73,177, respectively, as compared with Rs. 98,95,691 and Rs. 96,14,284 in 1891-92. The expenditure on Arts Colleges rose from Rs. 20,43,552 to Rs. 21,10,205; that on Professional Colleges fell from Rs. 8,29,281 to Rs. 7,97,427; that on Training Schools for teachers rose from Rs. 6,67,376 to Rs. 6,82,740, and that on other special schools from Rs. 10,42,965 to Rs. 11,61,225. The indirect expenditure on education, which includes charges on account of direction, inspection, scholarships, buildings and miscellaneous items, and which in 1891-92 was Rs. 64,26,463, rose to Rs. 66,18,573 in 1892-93.
- 8. This expenditure was met from Provincial and Local Funds, from Municipal revenues, from Fees' and from miscellaneous sources such as Subscriptions, Endowments, etc.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 27th March 1894.

No. 2101.—The following order of Her Majesty in Council approving the Rules framed by the High Court of Judicature at Bombay for regulating the procedure and practice in cases brought before the High Court under the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890, is republished for general information:—

"AT THE COURT AT OSBORNE HOUSE, ISLE OF WIGHT,

The 29th day of January 1894.

PRESENT:

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

Whereas there was this day read at the Board certain Rules made on the 18th day of September 1893, under Section 7 of the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890, by the High Court of Judicature at Bombay for regulating the procedure and practice in cases brought before that Court:

Her Majesty having taken into consideration the said Rules (a copy of which is hereunto annexed) was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to approve the same.

C. L. PEEL.

Rules for regulating the Procedure and Practice in Cases brought before the High Court under the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890.

1. In the construction of these Rules, the following terms shall (if not inconsistent with the context or subject matter) have the respective meanings hereinafter assigned to them; that is to say:—

'The Court' shall mean the High Court of Judicature at Bombay.

'Judge' shall mean a Judge of the said Court.

'Registrar' shall mean the Admiralty Registrar of the said Court.

'Registry' shall mean the office of the said Admiralty Registrar.

'Sheriff' shall mean the Sheriff or Deputy Sheriff of Bombay, or other officer who may be appointed to execute the process of the said Court.

'Attorney' shall mean any Attorney entitled to practise in the said Court, or the party himself if conducting his suit in person.

'Suit' shall mean any suit, action, or other proceeding instituted in the said Court in its jurisdiction under the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act.

'Affidavit' shall, in addition to its ordinary meaning, include a statement in writing on solemn affirmation wherever by law a person may make a solemn affirmation instead of an oath.

 These rules shall, if previously approved by Her Majesty in Council, come into operation on the second day of April 1894, and shall apply to all suits instituted on and after that day.

Institution of Suits.

3. A suit shall be commenced by a plaint drawn up subscribed and verified according to the provisions of the Code of Civil Procedure.

Warrants.

4. If the suit is in rem, the Attorney may, on the plaint being filed, on filing a Præcipe and an Affidavit, take out a warrant for the arrest of the property proceeded against.

The Affidavit shall set forth the name and description of the property to be arrested and that

the claim has not been satisfied.

- 6. In a suit of necessaries and in a suit of wages, the national character of the vessel proceeded against shall be stated in the plaint, and in a wages suit against a foreign vessel, notice of the institution of the suit shall be given to the Consul of the State to which the vessel belongs, if there be one resident in Bombay, and either a copy of the notice and a statement of service thereof or a statement that there is no resident Consul shall be annexed to the plaint.
- 7. In a suit of restraint, and in a suit of possession, it shall not be necessary to obtain a decree or order of the Court for the issue of the warrant, but the warrant shall be allowed to issue on the requisite affidavit being filed.
- 8. The Court or a Judge may in any case allow the warrant to issue though the Affidavit or plaint may not contain all the required particulars and in a suit of wages may also waive the service of the notice.
- 9. Every warrant shall be served by the Sheriff or his Bailiff. The Attorney taking out the warrant shall within six days from the service thereof file the same in the Registry.
- 10. In suits in rem no service of writ or warrant shall be required when the Attorney of the Defendant agrees to accept service and to give security or to pay money into Court.
- 11. In suits in rem service of summons or warrant against ship, freight or cargo on board is to be effected by nailing or affixing the original writ or warrant for a short time on the mainmast or on the single mast of the vessel and by taking off the process, leaving a true copy of it nailed or affixed in its place.
- 12. If the cargo has been landed or transhipped service of the writ or warrant to arrest the cargo and freight shall be effected by placing the writ of summons or warrant for a short time on the cargo and by, on taking off the process, leaving a true copy upon it.
- 13. If the cargo be in the custody of a person who will not permit access to it, service of the writ or warrant may be made upon the Custodian.

Suits in rem by default.

- 14. After the expiration of twelve days from the filing of a warrant, if no appearance shall have been entered in the suit, the Attorney for the Plaintiff may cause the suit to be set down for hearing.
- 15. If when the suit comes before the Court, the Judge is satisfied that the Plaintiff's claim is well founded he may pronounce for the claim and may order the property to be sold with or without previous notice and the proceeds paid into the Registry or may make such order in the premises as he shall think just.

Entry of Appearance.

- 16. An Attorney desiring to enter an appearance in any suit, shall file in the Registry a Praccipe, a copy of which shall have been previously served on the adverse Attorney.
- 17. The Præcipe shall contain the name of the Attorney, and an address in Bombay at which it shall be sufficient to leave all instruments and documents in the suit.
- 18. A party who shall not enter an appearance until after the expiration of six days from the service of the Warrant shall pay all costs that may have been occasioned by his default.

Security.

19. If security is to be given in the Registry, it shall be given according to the rules and practice of the Court as to security in the case of an attachment before judgment in an ordinary civil suit.

Releases.

- 20. Property arrested by Warrant shall only be released under the authority of an instrument issued by the Registrar, to be called a release.
- 21. An Attorney at whose instance any property has been arrested may, before an appearance has been entered, obtain the release thereof by filing a Praccipe to withdraw the Warrant.
- 22. An Attorney may obtain the release of any property by paying into the Registry the sum in which the suit has been instituted.
- 23. Cargo arrested for the freight only, may be released by an order of a Judge in Chambers upon proof by Affidavit of the value of the freight, and by paying the amount of the freight into the Registry.
- 24. In a suit of salvage the value of the property under arrest shall be agreed to or proved by Affidavit to the satisfaction of a Judge in Chambers before the property is released.
- "25. When security shall have been given in the sum in which the suit has been instituted, or such sum shall have been paid into the Registry, and if the suit be one of salvage the value of the property arrested shall have been proved to the satisfaction of a Judge in Chambers, an Attorney shall be entitled to a release for the same, unless there be a Caveat against the release thereof outstanding in the 'Caveat Release Book.'
- 26. The release, when obtained, shall be left with a Pracipe in the office of the Sheriff by the Attorney taking out the same, who shall also at the same time pay all costs, charges, and expenses attending the care and custody of the property whilst under arrest, and the Sheriff shall thereupon release the property.

Caveat Release Book.

- 27. An Attorney in a suit desiring to prevent the release of any property under arrest, shall file in the Registry a Pracipe, and thereupon a Caveat against the release of the property shall be entered in a book to be kept in the Registry, called the 'Caveat Release Book.'
- 28. A party delaying the release of any property by the entry of a Cavcat, shall be liable to be condemned in costs and damages, unless he shall show, to the satisfaction of the Court or a Judge, good and sufficient reason for having so done.

Caveat Warrant Book.

- 29. A party desiring to prevent the arrest of any property, may cause a Caveat against the issue of a Warrant for the arrest thereof to be entered in the Registry.
- 30. For this purpose he shall cause to be filed in the Registry a notice, signed by himself or his Attorney, undertaking to enter an appearance in any suit that may be instituted against the said property, and to give security in such suit in a sun not exceeding an amount to be stated in the notice, or to pay such sum into the Registry, and a Caveat against the issue of a Warrant for the arrest of the property shall thereupon be entered in a book to be kept in the Registry called the 'Caveat Warrant Book.'
- 31. An Attorney instituting a suit against any property in respect of which a Caveat has been entered in the 'Caveat Warrant Book' shall, before filing the plaint, serve a copy thereof upon the party on whose behalf the Caveat has been entered or upon his Attorney and annex to the plaint a statement of such service.
- 32. Within three days from the filing of the plaint, the party on whose behalf the Caveat has been entered shall, if the sum in which the suit has been instituted does not exceed the amount for which he has undertaken, give security in such sum, or pay the same into the Registry, or if it exceeds that amount, give security in the sum in which the suit has been instituted or pay the same into the Registry.
- 33. After the expiration of three days from the filing of the plaint, if the party on whose behalf the Caveat has been entered shall not have given security in such sum, or paid the same into the Registry, the Plaintiff's Attorney may proceed with the suit by default, and have it heard; provided that the Court may on good cause shown and on such terms as to payment of costs as it may impose extend the time for giving security or paying the money into the Registry.
- 34 If when the suit comes before the Court it is satisfied that the claim is well founded, it may pronounce for the amount which appears to be due, and may enforce the payment thereof by order and attachment against the party on whose behalf the Caveat has been entered, and by the arrest of the property if it then be or thereafter come within the jurisdiction of the Court.
- 35. The preceding rules shall not prevent an Attorney from taking out a Warrant for the arrest of any property, notwithstanding the entry of a Caveat in the 'Caveat Warrant Book' but the party at whose instance any property in respect of which a Caveat is entered shall be arrested, shall be liable to be condemned in costs and damages, unless he shall show, to the satisfaction of the Court, good and sufficient reason for having so done.

Sales by order of the Court.

- 36. Every sale under the decree of the Court shall, unless the Judge shall otherwise order, be made by the Sheriff in like manner as a sale of moveable property in execution of a decree in an ordinary civil suit, and the Sheriff shall be entitled to receive the same fees and poundage as he would be entitled to in such a case.
- 37. The Sheriff shall pay into Court the gross proceeds of sale of any property sold by him, and shall at the same time bring into the Registry the Account of Sale, with vouchers in support thereof.

for taxation by the Taxing Officer of the Court, to whom the same shall be transmitted by the Registrar for that purpose.

38. Any person interested in the proceeds, may be heard before the Taxing Officer on the taxation of the account of expenses, and an objection to the taxation shall be heard in the same manner as an objection to the taxation of an Attorney's bill of costs.

Payment of Moneys.

- 39. All money paid into Court shall be paid to the Registrar.
- 40. Money paid into Court shall not be paid out of Court except in pursuance of an order, of the Court or a Judge.
- 41. Security for latent demands shall not, unless the Judge shall otherwise order, be required on the payment of money out of Court.
- 42. An Attorney desiring to prevent the payment of money out of the Registry shall file a notice, and thereupon a Caveat shall be entered in a book, to be kept in the Registry called the 'Caveat Payment Book.'

Motions.

43. Motions may be made either in Court or to a Judge in Chambers.

Precipes.

- 44. Forms of Praccipes required to be filed in the Registry or the Sheriff's Office may be obtained on application in the Registry. They may be varied or altered by a Judge at his discretion.
- 45. Every Præcipe shall be signed either by the party or by his Attorney.
- 46. If a Precipe be not properly filled up, the Registrar or the Sheriff, as the case may be, may refuse to receive the same or to act thereon.

Caveats.

- 47. A Caveat, whether against the issue of a warrant, the release of property, or the payment of money out of the Registry, shall not remain in force for more than six months from the day of the date thereof.
- 48. A Caveat may be withdrawn by the party on whose behalf it has been entered, or by his Attorney; but the Præcipe to lead the withdrawal thereof shall, save by permission of the Registrar, be signed by the person who signed the Præcipe to lead the entry of the Caveat.
- 49. Application may be made to the Court on motion, or to a Judge in Chambers, by summons to overrule any Caveat.
- 50. The fees to be taken by the Officers of the Court, by the Sheriff and by Attorneys, shall be regulated by the table of fees sanctioned for proceedings under the Original Civil Jurisdiction of the High Court.
- 51. The forms used in the Admiralty Division of the Supreme Court in England under the Rules of the Supreme Court, 1883, shall be followed as nearly as the circumstances of each case will allow.
- 52. The other proceedings in suits brought in the Court in the exercise of its jurisdiction under the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890, not

provided for by these Rules, shall be regulated by the rules and practice of the Court in suits brought in it in the exercise of its Ordinary Original Civil Jurisdiction.

53. The foregoing Rules shall apply to suits brought in the Court in the exercise of its Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Jurisdiction in supersession of all former Rules.

And in exercise of the power conferred by Section 26 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Section 8 of Act I of 1891, the Governor in Council proposes to direct that, with respect to the local areas hereinbelow specified, the first paragraph of the said Section 26 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, shall, on and after the date specified in the first paragraph of this Notification, be read as if it had reference to cattle of any kind mentioned in the scale aforesaid instead of to pigs only, and as if the words 'fifty rupees' were substituted for the words 'ten rupees.'

- Except as is hereinafter in these rules otherwise provided, no goods shall be transhipped unless
 and until—
 - (a) a tranship permit covering the same is produced;
 - (h) the transhipment fees, if any, payable in respect thereof have been paid;
 - (c) an order to let tranship has been obtained, in writing, on the tranship permit.
- 3. (1) When it is desired to tranship goods (not being arms and ammunition or explosives or petroleum as defined respectively in the Arms, Explosives and Petroleum Acts) from one steamer to another and the receiving steamer is to start within twenty-four hours of the arrival of the discharging steamer, such transhipment may be effected within the said period, with the permission and under the superintendence of the Preventive Officer on board, in anticipation of the production of a tranship permit and of the payment of the transhipment fees, if any, payable in respect thereof: provided that the agent or master of the discharging steamer furnishes the said Preventive Officer with a list of all the goods which it is desired so to tranship.

BY DISTRICT MAGISTRATES.

With the object of preventing the outbreak of or spread of any epidemic disease during the Ashtabandha Játra to be held at Gokarn in the Kumta Táluka of the Kánara District from 29th April 1894 to 13th May 1894, both days inclusive, the District Magistrate, Kánara, prescribes the following regulations under clause 1 of Section 45 of the District Police Act IV of 1890 to be observed by all residents at or visitors to Gokarn during the fifteen days specified:—

1. The sanitary arrangements shall be under the control of a Committee consisting of—

The Assistant Collector in charge of the táluka. The Mámlatdár of Kumta.

The Medical officer in attendance at the fair.

The Vice-President, Gokarn Municipality.

The Managing Committee, Gokarn Municipality.

- 2. All persons attending the Jatra or residing within the limits of the Gokarn Municipality during the Jatra shall obey all orders issued by the Committee on all matters affecting sanitation and public safety. Such orders shall be published by means of notices pasted up in conspicuous places within the Gokarn municipal limits. Disobedience to these orders entails liability to purishment under Section 69, Bombay District Police Act.
- 3. With the sanction of Government a polltax of one anna per head will be levied from all persons attending the Játra except—
 - (1) Persons permanently residing within the limits of the Gokarn Municipality.
 - (2) Servants of Government or of the Gokarn Municipality present on duty during the continuance of the Jatra.
 - (3) Children under ten years of age.
- 4. The Committee is authorized to make all arrangements for the collection of the tax and to prevent the spread of any epidemic or outbreak of disease with the reservation that the District Magistrate alone may forbid the assembling (or dispersing) of the pilgrims or visitors attending the Játra.
- 5. The powers of the Committee may at any time be cancelled or modified by the District Magistrate.
- 6. All orders of the Committee published as directed in paragraph 2 above shall be signed by not less than three members, one of whom shall be the Assistant Collector or Mámlatdár or Vice-President, Gokarn Municipality.
