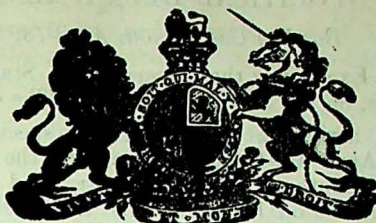

NOTIFICATIONS.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 25th April 1894.

POLITICAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 20th April 1894.

No. 2307.—His Excellency the Governor and Staff left Bombay *en route* for Kolhápur at 2 P.M. on the 31st March 1894. The departure was public.

His Excellency arrived at Kolhápur by special train at 10-30 A.M. on Sunday the 1st April 1894, and was met at the station by the Political Agent, Kolhápur and Southern Marátha Country and by the Members of the Council of Administration on behalf of His Highness the Rájá. His Excellency then drove to the Residency. The arrival was private.

2. At 7-30 A.M. on Monday the 2nd of April 1894, His Excellency the Governor received the visit of His Highness the Rájá of Kolhápur at the Residency, Kolhápur.

The Officiating Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, and an Aide-de-Camp to His Excellency the Governor in a State carriage proceeded to the Palace of the Rájá to escort His Highness thence to the Residency. An escort of His Excellency the Governor's Body Guard accompanied His Highness to the Residency. The gentlemen of His Highness' suite followed in their own carriages in rear of the escort.

On His Highness' arrival at the Residency, a salute of 19 guns was fired and a Guard of Honour of British Infantry was in attendance and presented arms. On alighting from his carriage, His Highness was received by the Acting Secretary to Government, Political Department, by whom he was conducted into the Darbár Room. His Highness was received by His Excellency the Governor at the edge of the carpet nearest the door and was conducted to a seat on His Excellency's right hand. Immediately to the right of His Highness were seated the Political Agent, Kolhápur and Southern Marátha Country, and beyond them the suite of His Highness, including the Members of the Council, the Principal Feudatory Jághirdárs, and His Highness' relations. The Assistant Political Agent sat behind the Political Agent. On the left of His Excellency the Governor were seated the Acting Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Military and Private Secretaries to His Excellency, the Officiating Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Oriental Translator to Government, and the Personal Staff of His Excellency. The Members of the Council of Administration and the Jághirdárs and others attending on the Rájá were presented to His Excellency by the Political Agent, Kolhápur and Southern Marátha Country, and offered Nazars, which were touched and remitted. During the interview the Band played.

Attár, flowers, and pán were given to His Highness at the close of the visit by His Excellency the Governor. The Acting Secretary and the Officiating Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, presented attár, flowers, and pán to His Highness' suite according to rank.

His Excellency the Governor took leave of His Highness at the same point at which His Excellency received His Highness. On the departure of His Highness, who was conducted to his carriage by the Acting Secretary to Government, Political Department, a salute of 19 guns was fired, and the Guard of Honour presented arms.

His Highness returned to the Palace accompanied by the deputation and by the escort of the Body Guard which escorted him to the Residency.

3. The Southern Marátha Country Jághirdárs were received as follows :—

At 5 P.M. on the same date His Excellency the Governor held a public Darbár at the new Palace at Kolhápúr for the purpose of formally investing His Highness the Rájá of Kolhápúr with the administration of the affairs of his State. The Southern Marátha Country Jághirdárs were present at the Darbár, the Chiefs of Kurundvád (Junior) arrived first and the Chief of Mudhol last. They were received on arrival by the Officiating Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, assisted by the Oriental Translator to Government, and were by them conducted to their seats.

At 4-50 P.M. a deputation, consisting of two Senior Members of the Council of Administration and two of the leading Feudatory Jághirdárs of Kolhápúr waited on His Excellency the Governor at the Residency, and His Excellency proceeded to the Palace in his own State carriage and escorted by a party of the Body Guard. His Excellency was accompanied by the Acting Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Political Agent, Kolhápúr and Southern Marátha Country, the Military and Private Secretaries, and His Excellency's Personal Staff.

His Excellency was met at the Palace as he alighted from his carriage by His Highness the Rájá of Kolhápúr, together with the Junior Members of Council and three of the next Senior Feudatory Jághirdárs of Kolhápúr. A Guard of Honour of the Yorkshire Light Infantry was drawn up outside the Palace porch and presented arms as His Excellency arrived. A salute of 17 guns was also fired from the Saluting Battery. From the entrance to the Palace grounds to the Palace itself the route was lined by Kolhápúr troops.

A procession was then formed consisting of the three Members of Council and five of the leading Feudatory Jághirdárs of the Kolhápúr State, together with the Acting Political Secretary, the Political Agent, the Assistant Political Agent, the Military and Private Secretaries to His Excellency, the Officiating Under Secretary, and His Excellency's Personal Staff. The juniors went first, His Excellency and His Highness following last, and the whole walked two abreast, His Excellency's party on the right and His Highness the Rájá's on the left. Chobdárs preceded and followed the procession. On the head of the procession reaching the lower dais on which were placed the first two chairs of State, it halted, and the whole turned inward. His Excellency and His Highness passed up between the files to their seats on the lower dais, and as they took their seats the Members of the procession filed off to their places in the Darbár, and the whole of the assembly, who had risen when the procession entered the Darbár Hall, resumed their seats.

His Highness the Rájá was seated on the right of His Excellency the Governor, the Acting Political Secretary being seated on the dais a little to the rear and to the left of His Excellency. On the right of His Excellency were seated the Political Agent and Assistant Political Agent, Kolhápúr and Southern Marátha Country, the Members of the Council, the Feudatory Jághirdárs of Kolhápúr, and the relatives of His Highness the Rájá.

To the left of His Excellency were seated the Southern Marátha Country Jághirdárs, the Military and Private Secretaries, the Officiating Under Secretary, the Oriental Translator to Government, His Excellency's Personal Staff, and the British Officers and European guests in their allotted places.

Behind the dais occupied by His Excellency and His Highness was a second higher marble dais on which was placed a wide Throne, which represented the Gádi upon which His Highness was afterwards formally placed by His Excellency. When all were seated, His Excellency the Governor rose and addressed His Highness the Rájá as follows :—

“Your Highness, Ladies, and Gentlemen,—I deem myself fortunate that during my tenure of that office it falls to the Governor of Bombay to confirm the pledge which the Paramount Power gave to the people of Kolhápúr when it selected your Highness to succeed to the throne which you and your ancestors have derived from the immortal Siváji. I can well understand, Sir, that after an experience of the misfortunes that have attended your house for nearly thirty

years the people of this State have been anxiously, perhaps impatiently, looking forward to the day when the rightful heir should ascend that throne, and under such arrangements as may seem best to yourself commence to administer their affairs. I congratulate them that that day has arrived, and that it is brightened by the fact that their future ruler is a Prince of your Highness's high and amiable character. It will be not inappropriate if I refer briefly to some of the chief incidents affecting the affairs of the Kolhápúr State which have taken place between the date of your Highness's selection by the Paramount Power after the untimely and unfortunate death of your Highness's predecessor, and this day. Your adoption by their Highnesses the Ránis was celebrated with due pomp and publicity, and on that occasion the British Government waived its right to receive a *nazarána* from the State. Measures were at once taken to secure for your Highness the best possible education and training, so that you might fit yourself for the high position you would presently attain, and that you might appreciate the solemn obligations which your house has incurred, namely, of loyalty to the Crown, a faithful adherence to the engagements, treaties, and *sanads* which fix your Highness's relations with the Paramount Power. It has, I think you will admit Sir, been your good fortune to have, not merely as a tutor, but as your friend and companion as well, Mr. Fraser, who, intent on that high ideal which the members of his distinguished service aim at in all they undertake, has given an unremitting and an affectionate solicitude to his important task. I have reason to believe that your Highness and your family appreciate his devotion as much as does the Bombay Government. Meanwhile, the affairs of the State were watched over with a jealous and discriminate care by your respected father whilst he lived, and since his death by a Council of Regency, the *personnel* of which could bring to bear on questions of State a political, administrative, and judicial experience which was calculated to ensure and has resulted in the adoption of a just and broadminded system of government (conforming at the same time to the treaty obligations of the State). And whilst on that subject it is befitting that I should mention the names of two valued officers of Government and sincere friends of the State and of your Highness personally—I mean Colonel Wodehouse and Mr. Lee-Warner. The former, alas! has gone from us for ever, and his too early death was no doubt in some measure due to his great anxiety to himself complete the work which had occupied him of late years and to be present when your Highness took over from him and his colleagues the responsibilities of administration. Your Highness's kindly disposition will, I know, have caused you to give a thought to-day to our lamented friend and to his daughter, whose graceful presence which we miss to-day has lent a charm to many of our social gatherings of late years. Of Mr. Lee-Warner, I will only say that I know that his interest in the State and in your Highness is undiminished, and that his absence from this ceremony is due to the necessity for his presence on the Viceroy's Council until the last day of its sittings. I will briefly remind your Highness of the more important reforms which the Council of Regency have fixed their attention on during their term of office. In the first place your Land Revenue system has been set in order. The Diván was able, in his Administrative Report of 1889-90, to state that the whole of Kolhápúr proper had been brought under the Survey Settlement with the exception of inám lands. Then the Kolhápúr system of laws has been codified. In 1887 a statement was submitted giving a list of the enactments and rules having the force of law hitherto introduced and deemed to be in force in Kolhápúr. This statement was subsequently embodied in a notification which was published by the Council of Regency with the sanction of Government on behalf of the Rájá. Next, trade has been freed to a great extent. Your system in 1884 was meant to be one merely imposing import and export duties, that is customs not transit duties; but inasmuch as these dues were farmed out, and as there was no guarantee that export duties might not be levied on goods which had already paid import duty, and as no provision for refunds existed, it is easy to see that trade was subjected to great harassment. In 1886 this system was abolished and a revenue estimated at about a quarter of a lákhs extinguished; and the example thus set to the Southern Maráthha Chiefs by the State received the warm approval of the Governor General in

Council. The Treaty Jāghirdārs quickly followed the good example set them, with the result that an area of some 6,500 miles, with a population of 1,500,000, is in the same position as regards free trade as is the neighbouring British territory. • Your Highness can see for yourself from your State accounts that the average gross revenue of the years following on that reform has handsomely exceeded the average of the years that preceded it; so that it is impossible to point to its having resulted in a loss to the State revenues. Then again various complicated and not unimportant questions relating to hereditary customs, such as the claim of the Chief of Kāpshi to receive *nazarāna* on *Kalmi* ināms in the Kāpshi *Saranjām*; as the nomination of the successor to the Kāpshi Chiefship; and as the seigniorial rights of Kolhāpur over the *Saranjām* of Torgal; these and such as these have been argued by the respective parties, considered by this Government, and orders finally passed by the Secretary of State. By no means less important, • having regard for the protection and guarantee afforded by the Paramount Power to the higher *Jāghirdārs*, is the fact that the civil and criminal jurisdiction appertaining to the Treaty Jāghirdārs of Kolhāpur have been laid down by Government; and finally, your capital town has been connected by a State railway with the main line, which serves the Southern Marātha Country, and whereby even if your Highness cannot as yet look to great pecuniary profits on the State investment, your subjects must benefit by the opening up of markets and very possibly by an increased demand for cultivable land. It is not for me at this short interval to claim for the Bombay Government or the Council of Regency that what has been done has been perfectly done, or that there is not much that remains: it will be for your Highness to pass judgment as time and experience enable you to appreciate the results, but I may claim that what has been done has been done with singleness of purpose to secure a just system of administration for your Highness to inherit. And now, Sir, having dealt with the past, let me address a few words to your Highness as to the future. Your Highness has travelled over the length and breadth of India and to the neighbouring British colony of Ceylon: you have not been able, as yet, to carry out your father's wish that you should visit England; though I doubt not you regard that expression with a reverence befitting the solemnity of the occasion and the circumstances under which it found vent. But you have seen for yourself many systems of administration, both in British and Native State territory, and it will be for your Highness to decide what your system here is to be. For the moment you have decided—and wisely I think, in order that no interruption to the orderly performance of public business may occur—not to disestablish the Council, in so far as it is one of advice or of administration, though, of course, its existence as one of Regency expires when your Highness seats yourself on the *gādi*; and though its composition must change itself in so far as the Political Agent, who could not well have a seat on it, is concerned, you propose to retain it for the moment as a Council of advisers until you have decided what form your system shall take. Sir, in this important matter I think you should be untrammelled by that political advice which under your treaty engagements you are bound to accept. For friendly advice, if you think you need it, you can turn to many quarters; but your Highness should understand that the responsibility for the selection you may eventually make rests with yourself, and in that selection the most important that can fall to the lot of a ruler, I pray that your Highness may be guided by an influence more potent, more beneficial than any to be met with on this earth. Your Highness, I have dealt with the past and the future, and there only remains for me to deal with the present object of our assembly. It is my pleasing duty to convey to your Highness the congratulations of His Excellency the Viceroy upon the happy occasion, and to announce to your Highness's Sirdārs and people that the British Government entrusts to-day to their lawful ruler the administration of the Kolhāpur State, thereby conveying the gracious assurance of the interest which Her Majesty the Queen-Empress takes in the perpetuation of Native rule. In making that announcement I also express myself confident that your Highness recognises the solemn nature of the trust which now devolves upon you of your responsibility to uphold, and have regard for the rights of the *Jāghirdārs* and others subject to your rule, that your Highness recognises the value of the advice which the Political Agent is by

treaty bound to render to you, and that your Highness recognises the fact that the surest foundation upon which the prosperity of a ruler can rest is the welfare of his people and a just and progressive administration. In leading your Highness to that throne to which your people will in future look for wisdom, sympathy, and justice, let me adjure you to rule without fear and without favour, and to think only of the right, and may that Almighty Power which guides the destinies of all, both great and humble, so direct your acts that they may earn for you that greatest reward of a wise ruler, the respect, the affection of a contented people."

A translation of His Excellency the Governor's address was then read in Maráthi by Mr. Whitworth, the Acting Secretary to Government, Political Department. All present then rose. The chairs were removed from the lower dais and His Excellency the Governor conducted His Highness the Rájá up the steps of the second dais to the *Gádi*. The Acting Secretary to Government then recited His Highness's full titles, viz., His Highness Shahu Chhatrapati Maháráj, and His Excellency the Governor declared His Highness invested with the administration of his State. His Highness the Rájá then presented his peshkash of Rs. 20,000. The Band played the National Anthem, and a salute of 19 guns was fired in honour of His Highness. All present then resumed their seats, and the Khilat was brought in and conferred on the Rájá, His Excellency the Governor handing over to him the sword of State. His Highness the Rájá then rose, as did also the assembly, His Excellency the Governor alone remaining seated, and His Highness replied to the Governor's address as follows:—

"Your Excellency,—I need hardly say that it is with the closest attention that I have listened to the weighty words of advice in which your Excellency has done me the great honour of handing over to my charge the care of my State. In so doing your Excellency has alluded to the chief events of recent minorities, which evidence the rapid progress made in Kolhápur during the past thirty years, and it is with sincere gratitude that I acknowledge the obligations under which I lie to the Government of Her Majesty the Queen-Empress—obligations both for the care of my State and for the measures taken from my childhood to ensure my own personal welfare. Looking to what has been done in the State, it is not too much to say that the Kolhápur of the present is a different place from the Kolhápur of the last generation, and having seen something of the greater part of India, I venture to think that few Chiefs have succeeded to a better ordered inheritance than I do to-day. For this I tender my thanks to the various Political Agents appointed by Government who have supervised, and to my able Diván, Khán Bahádur Meherjibhai Kuvvarji, C.I.E., and the Council who have so successfully carried on the administration during my minority. Nor can I on such an occasion pass over in silence the debt that I owe to my lamented father, the late Regent of Kolhápur. And, much as I have to thank Government for the watchful eye they have kept upon the progress of this State, not less must I acknowledge the direct and personal interest taken in my own bringing up by the Governors of Bombay, Sir James Fergusson and Lord Reay, and continued so kindly by your Excellency. To this I owe it that for nearly five years I have had the great advantage of the guardianship of Mr. Fraser, a friend about whom I will here only say that my brother and myself will owe him a lifelong debt for the able, conscientious, and almost fatherly care which he has devoted to preparing us to fill worthily the positions in life that lie before us; that but for his abilities, zeal, conscientious work, and uncommon tact I should not have been what I am; and that it would not be too much to say that he has taken a fatherly care of my brother and myself. With regard to the future, it is with full sincerity that I declare my intention to show loyalty to Her Gracious Majesty the Queen-Empress, and to faithfully abide by the engagements, treaties, and sanads which regulate my relations to the Paramount Power. Further, as regards my people, while recognising all that has already been done and the favourable circumstances under which I begin my rule, at the same time I understand fully that in government there is no standing still, that a serious and solemn task lies before me, not only to preserve for my subjects the benefits they already enjoy, but to ensure further steady pro-

gress in the promotion of their welfare. In this task I look with confidence to receive the loyal support of my feudatories and jāghirdārs, and while upholding their rights I trust to find them real pillars of the State, as in early days their ancestors were to mine. Setting before myself a high standard, I shall endeavour to take advantage of the great opportunities which lie open to me, and in beginning my duties I am encouraged by the hope that from future Governors of Bombay I shall receive the same countenance in manhood as I have received during my minority from your Excellency and your predecessors, and that the Political Agents, whose advice I shall welcome, will prove friends such as those I have so far known, like Mr. Lee-Warner, whose personal interest in me from the day of my father's death down to the present has never flagged; like the late Colonel Wodehouse, by no one more regretted than myself; and like Colonel Hunter, the present Political Agent of Kolhāpur. In conclusion, I beg that your Excellency will convey to His Excellency the Viceroy my best thanks for his kind message of congratulation."

On the conclusion of His Highness's address, all present resumed their seats, and the Diván, with the permission of His Excellency the Governor, read a translation of the address in Maráthi. Printed copies of the translation of the address were afterwards circulated amongst the Native guests.

The Assistant Political Agent, Southern Marátha Country, then led the Members of the Council of Administration and the leading Feudatory Jāghirdārs and relations of His Highness the Rāja to Colonel Hunter, the Political Agent, who presented each in turn to His Excellency the Governor. The usual Nazars were presented, touched, and remitted.

His Excellency the Governor then gave attār, flowers, and pán to His Highness the Rāja, the Acting Political Secretary assisted by the Oriental Translator gave the same to the Southern Marátha Country Chiefs, and the Council of Administration arranged for the distribution to the remainder. After the distribution of attār &c., the procession in reverse order to that on entering the Hall was formed, His Excellency and His Highness leading. Chobdārs preceded and followed the procession. His Highness accompanied His Excellency the Governor to his carriage, and on his departure the Guard of Honour presented arms, and a salute of 17 guns was fired.

The Southern Marátha Country Jāghirdārs left in the reverse order to that of their arrival, the Chief of Mudhol leaving first. They were escorted to their carriages by the Assistant Political Agent, Southern Marátha Country, the Officiating Under Secretary, and the Oriental Translator to Government.

Full dress uniform was worn by all entitled to wear uniform and evening dress by others.

5. His Excellency the Governor held a reception at the Residency after dinner on the same night, which was attended by His Highness the Rāja and the officials of the Kolhāpur State and by the residents and others present in Kolhāpur.

6. At 7-30 A.M. on Tuesday the 3rd April 1894, His Excellency the Governor paid a return visit to His Highness the Rāja of Kolhāpur.

His Excellency was accompanied by the Acting Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Military and Private Secretaries to His Excellency the Governor, the Officiating Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Oriental Translator to Government, and His Excellency's Personal Staff, and was escorted by a party of the Body Guard.

At 7-15 A.M. two principal officers of the State waited upon the Governor and escorted His Excellency to His Highness' Palace, where His Excellency was met as he alighted from the carriage by His Highness the Rāja.

His Highness then conducted His Excellency into the Darbār Room to a seat on his right hand. Immediately to His Highness' left hand were seated the Political Agent, Kolhāpur and Southern Marátha Country, and his Assistants

and His Highness' suite. On the right of His Excellency the Governor were seated the Acting Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Military and Private Secretaries to His Excellency the Governor, the Officiating Under Secretary to Government, Political Department, the Oriental Translator to Government, and His Excellency's Personal Staff.

Attár, flowers, and pán were given by the Rájá himself to His Excellency the Governor, and to the officers present with His Excellency by the principal officers of the State.

The ceremonies attending His Excellency's arrival were repeated at his departure and a salute of 17 guns was fired by His Highness the Rájá's artillery on each occasion. A Guard of Honour of the Kolhápúr Infantry was drawn up at His Highness' Palace and presented arms on His Excellency's arrival and departure.

7. His Excellency then paid return visits to the following Chiefs at the hours mentioned against their names. The order of these visits was fixed according to the geographical position of the various residences and camps of the Chiefs concerned:—

On the evening of the same day His Excellency attended the State Banquet given by His Highness the Rájá in the new Palace.

8. On the evening of the 4th idem His Excellency attended the Ball which was given at the new Palace by His Highness the Rájá in his honour.

9. At 4-45 P.M. on the 5th idem His Excellency accompanied by his Staff left Kolhápúr by special train *en-route* to Mahábaleshar. A Guard of Honour of the Yorkshire Light Infantry was in attendance at the Residency and presented arms as His Excellency departed thence to the Station. His Excellency the Governor was accompanied by His Highness the Rájá, the Political Agent, Kolhápúr, and an Aide-de-Camp. Part of the route was lined by troops. Guards of Honour of the Kolhápúr Infantry were drawn up in the Railway Station compound and on the platform and they presented arms on His Excellency's arrival and departure. A salute of 17 guns was also fired as the train conveying His Excellency moved off. No. 33.—The following draft of Rules which it is proposed to make under Section 36 of the Indian Steam Ships Act, 1884, to regulate the granting of certificates of competency as Engine-drivers under the said Act to persons desirous of obtaining the same at Aden, is published for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby. Notice is hereby given that the above draft will be taken into consideration on or after the first day of July 1894 :—

1. Certificates of competency will be granted to those persons who pass the requisite examinations

and otherwise comply with the requisite conditions. For this purpose examiners have been appointed and arrangements have been made for holding the examinations whenever necessary at the port of Aden.

2. The application for examination is to be made in Form Exn. 3a, which must be filled up at the Port Office. The Exn. 3a properly filled in, together with the candidate's testimonials, must be lodged with the President not later than the day before the day of examination.

3. He must have the testimonial shown in Appendix A filled up by the Engineer with whom he has last served, or his other testimonials must contain all the particulars therein required.

4. A candidate must be twenty-two years of age. He must have served three years as principal Syrang or Tindal of a watch in the engine-room of a steamer under a certificated Engineer or Driver, or have been three years in charge of the engine of a factory or mill under a certificated Engineer, as well as one year Syrang or Tindal in the engine-room of a steamer under a certificated Engineer.

5. He must pass a *viva voce* examination before the Examiner as to the working of engines and the management of boilers.

6. He must be able to describe and name the different parts of engines and the way to start and stop them.

7. He must be able to give a description of boilers and the methods of staying and the use and management of the different valves, cocks, pipes and connections.

8. He must state the causes, effects and usual remedies for incrustation and corrosion.

9. He should also be able to state what should be done in the event of the disablement of portions of his engine and of the boiler connections.

10. He should be able to read and understand the pressure and water-gauges.

11. Candidates for examination, in making the application on Form Exn. 3a, will be required to pay the examination fee before any step is taken, whether by enquiring into their services or testing their qualifications, &c. No part of the fee will under any circumstances be returned to them; but should it be found that their service is not sufficient to entitle them to be examined, or that their testimonials are unsatisfactory, they will be allowed to present themselves for examination without paying any further fee, when they have fulfilled the requisite service or are able to produce satisfactory testimonials, as the case may be.

12. The fee for examination under these rules is ten rupees, and the amount must be paid in the Cash Office and the Cashier will forward the application after completing it to the President, Board of Examiners. In any case in which a candidate offers money to any other officer than the Cashier, and in any place but the Cash Office, the candidate so offering money will be regarded as having committed an act of misconduct, and will be rejected, and not allowed to be examined for twelve months.

13. If a candidate fails in his examination, *no part of the fee he has paid will be returned to him.*

14. In case of failure, candidates may be re-examined *de novo* after a lapse of six months if the past examination showed that they might reasonably be expected to qualify.

15. Certificates of competency shall be made and issued by the Government in the form hereunto annexed.

16. Every certificate of competency shall be made in duplicate, and one copy shall be delivered to the person entitled to the certificate and the other shall be kept and recorded by the Port Officer of Aden.

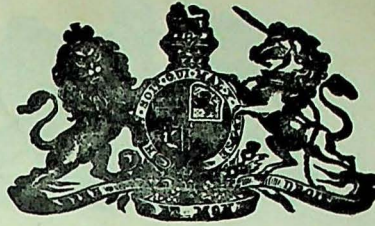

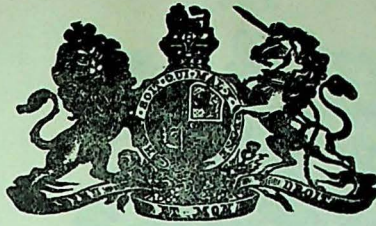
