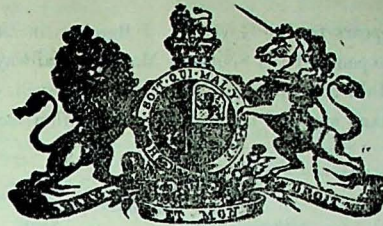

No. 1526.—In accordance with Rule 9 of the Rules prescribed in the Notification of the Government of India in the Department of Finance and Commerce No. 15, dated 1st January 1889, republished in the *Bombay Government Gazette* of the 10th idem, under No. 116, dated 9th idem, Financial Department, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following application from the Municipal Commissioners of Bhiwndi for the grant of a loan of Rs. 4,000 under the provisions of the Local Authorities Loan Act, 1879 :—

SIR,

We, the President of the Bhiwndi Municipality and members of the Managing Committee, respectfully beg to apply to Government, under the Local Authorities Loan Act of 1879, for a grant of a loan of Rs. 4,000 at 4½ per cent. interest for the construction of a new School building at Bhiwndi. The estimated cost of the work is Rs. 20,891, out of which Rs. 10,177-15-6 have already been credited to the Public Works Department and Rs. 6,053-4-0 are to be received from the Educational Department as Government grant sanctioned in Government Resolutions Nos. 62 and 646, dated 10th January 1893 and 29th March 1893, respectively, of the Educational Department; but there is still a deficit of nearly Rs. 4,000, which the Municipality is not at present in a position to meet at once.

2. The funds on the security of which the amount is to be borrowed is the general revenue of the Municipality levied under the District Municipal Act VI of 1873 and amended Act II of 1884.

3. The loan asked for is required during the official year 1894-95.

4. The statements showing the annual receipts and expenditure of this Municipality for the last three years are herewith submitted, from which it will be seen that the average ordinary annual income of the Municipality is Rs. 15,444 and the expenditure is Rs. 15,537; but the Municipality has made retrenchments in the expenditure of the year 1892-93, leaving a surplus of Rs. 725, and similar retrenchments will be made in future leaving nearly the same surplus.

5. The loan will be re-paid with interest in eight years in sixteen equal half-yearly instalments of Rs. 300-8-0, payable on 30th June and 31st December each year. The amount of Rs. 300-8-0 required half-yearly for repaying the loan will be met from the annual savings as explained above.

6. The Municipal Board have proposed to revise the assessment list of the house-tax in accordance with the principles laid down in Government Resolutions Nos. 775 and 1829, General Department, dated 9th March 1892 and 3rd June 1892, respectively, and the revised list on being sanctioned by Government will give a surplus over the present house-tax by Rs. 734. It will thus be seen that under these circumstances the Municipality will be able to re-pay the liabilities when incurred.

7. There are no prior existing charges upon the funds of the Municipality.
