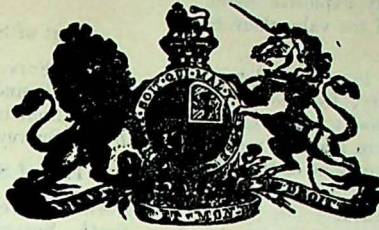

No. 5296.—The following draft Notification of rules which it is proposed to make under Section 7 of the Indian Explosives Act, 1884, is published for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby.

Notice is hereby given that the draft will be taken into consideration on the expiry of one month from the date of this Notification, together with any objections or suggestions with respect thereto received before that date :—

In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 7 of the Indian Explosives Act, 1884, and with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased, in substitution for No. 27

of the rules published in Notification No. 4116 at page 559 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1887, Part I, to make the following rule :

The officers hereinunder-mentioned are authorized, within the areas respectively specified below,

- (a) to enter, inspect and examine any place, carriage or vessel in which an explosive is being manufactured, possessed, used, sold, transported, or imported under a license granted under the Indian Explosives Act, 1884, or in which they have reason to believe that an explosive has been or is being manufactured, possessed, used, sold, transported, or imported in contravention of that Act or of the rules made under that Act;
- (b) to search for explosives therein;

(c) to take samples of any explosive found therein, on payment of the value thereof; and

(d) at their discretion to seize, detain, remove and, if necessary, for the public safety, destroy any explosive found therein in respect of which there may be reason to believe that the provisions of the said Act or of the rules made under the said Act have been contravened.

"HYDERABAD RESIDENCY ORDERS.

NOTIFICATION.

No. 22.

Dated the 7th June 1894.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 23 of the Petroleum Act, 1886, as applied to the lands in the territory of His Highness the Nizám of Hyderabad, which are occupied or may be hereafter occupied by the Nizám's Guaranteed State Railway Company, by the Great Indian Peninsula Railway, by the Dhond-Mannád Railway and by the Madras Railway respectively (including the lands occupied as stations and out-buildings for other railway purposes) by the

Notification of the Government of India in the Foreign Department No. 1482-I,* dated the 3rd May 1894, notice is hereby given that the following rules are proposed to be made by the Resident at Hyderabad under the power conferred on him by Section 8 of the said Act, and that the said rules will be taken into consideration on or after the 1st July 1894, by which date therefore any objections or suggestions concerning them should be submitted:

Draft Rules.

1. (1) All words and expressions defined* in the Act and used in these rules shall have in these rules the meanings assigned to them respectively by the Act, and

(2) For the purposes of these rules 'petroleum in bulk' shall be interpreted to mean petroleum in any vessel or receptacle having a capacity of 300 gallons and upwards.

2. Licenses for the possession of petroleum within the lands occupied by railways in His Highness the Nizám's territory shall be granted only when the place intended to be used for the

keeping of the petroleum fulfils the following conditions:

- (1) the building itself is constructed with stone or brick walls, with terraced, tiled or iron roofs, and with tiled or paved or earthen floors;
- (2) the doorways and openings of the building are built up to a height of not less than two feet above the level of the road or street, or the floor is sunk at least two feet below the level of the road or street in such a manner that the petroleum cannot flow out in case of fire; and
- (3) the building is separated by a clear open space of twenty feet on every side from any other building: provided that the licensing officer may, for special reasons to be stated in writing, dispense with this condition.

The storage capacity of any building so licensed shall be calculated at the rate of ten gallons for three cubic feet.

3. Notwithstanding anything in Rule 2 and subject to such conditions as may be prescribed in this behalf, a license may be granted for the possession of any stated quantity of petroleum in a place specially prepared for the storage of petroleum in bulk in accordance with specifications and plans approved by the Resident at Hyderabad. The capacity in gallons shall be conspicuously marked on every storage-tank or other receptacle in such place.

4. The licensing officer, or any police officer of or above the rank of head constable appointed by him, may enter any place or premises in respect of which a license for the possession of petroleum has been granted, for the purpose of inspecting the same at any time after sunrise and before sunset.

5. The licensing officer or any police officer as aforesaid may require a sample to be delivered to him from any tank or other receptacle containing petroleum stored in any place or premises in respect of which a license for the possession of petroleum has been granted; the procedure prescribed in sections 9 and 10 of the Act shall apply to any demand for samples made under this rule and to the testing of such samples.

6. (1) Licenses for the transport of petroleum other than dangerous petroleum in quantities exceeding five hundred gallons may be either general or special.

(2) Licenses for the transport of dangerous petroleum shall be special only.

7. (1) General licenses for a period of twelve months may be issued for the transport of petroleum in bulk by rail, by road or by water in Form F, hereto appended. Such licenses shall authorize the holders to transport in bulk any petroleum *bona fide* their own property, without restrictions as to destination or quantity. Every such license shall specify the marks and numbers of wagons or carts covered by it, and state that such wagons or carts have been certified or approved under rule 11, clauses (2) and (3). Such licenses shall be granted by the Resident at Hyderabad only.

(2) General licenses for a period of twelve months may be issued also for the transport

of petroleum otherwise than in bulk by cart only. Such licenses shall be granted in Form G.

(3) The holder of a general license in Form G shall, with each consignment of petroleum conveyed under cover of his license, issue a pass in Form H appended to these rules, specifying the places from and to which the petroleum is to be conveyed and the quantity of petroleum covered by it. Each pass shall be numbered.

8. Special licenses for the transport of petroleum shall be in force for such period not exceeding six months from the date of the grant of the license as may be specified in the license.

9. Every special license for the transport of petroleum shall specify the places from and to which, respectively, the petroleum is to be conveyed, the quantity of petroleum covered by the license, and the time for which the license is in force; or, in the case of petroleum to be carried in bulk, shall state that the wagon, vessel or cart in which it is to be carried has been approved or certified, as the case may be, as required by sub-rules (2) and (3) of rule 11.

10. (1) Applications for special licenses for the transport of petroleum otherwise than in bulk shall specify the description and quantity of the petroleum to be transported, the places from and to which, and the route by which, the petroleum is to be conveyed, and the time likely to be occupied in the journey, and shall describe the receptacles in which the petroleum is to be contained.

(2) In the case of applications for licenses for the transport of dangerous petroleum under section 4 of the Act, the application shall also contain the particulars required by sub-section (2) of that section.

(3) Applications for general or special licenses for the transport of petroleum in bulk shall state the marks and numbers of the wagons, or carts to be used under the license, and shall be accompanied by the certificate of the authorities referred to in rule 11, clauses (2) and (3).

11. (1) Licenses for the transport of petroleum otherwise than in bulk shall only be granted if the petroleum to be transported is packed in air-tight tins, air-tight tanks or drums of steel or iron, or other vessels not easily broken or is contained in stoppered bottles carefully packed so as to avoid the risk of breakage.

(2) Licenses for the transport of petroleum other than dangerous petroleum in bulk by railway may be granted if the petroleum is contained in wagons approved by the railway administration over whose line it is proposed to transport it and by the Consulting Engineer for Railways to Government.

(3) Licenses for the transport of petroleum other than dangerous petroleum in bulk by cart may be granted if the cart is certified to be fit for the service by an officer appointed by the Resident at Hyderabad in this behalf.

(4) Such arrangements as may be approved by Government shall be made for freeing from gas tanks, railway wagons and carts in which petroleum has been stored or carried in bulk.

(5) Wagons or carts approved or certified under clause (2) or (3) of this rule shall be marked and

numbered by the Consulting Engineer or the certifying officer, as the case may be.

12. It shall be the duty of all police officers to see that the petroleum is carried only by such route as may be specified in the license, and any such officer may stop and inspect any petroleum in transit.

13. Licenses for the possession or transport of dangerous petroleum in quantities exceeding forty gallons and licenses for the possession of petroleum in bulk will be granted, subject to the provisions of Section 4 of the Act in the case of dangerous petroleum, under the signature of the Resident at Hyderabad, on the recommendation of the Railway Magistrate or any Magistrate of the first class.

Applications for such licenses should be made to the Railway Magistrate or such other Magistrate as aforesaid, as the case may be.

14. The following fees shall be charged for licenses under the Act:—

Licenses for the possession of dangerous petroleum:

General license for the transport of petroleum by rail, by road, or by water for twelve months100

Provided that no fee shall be levied for licenses granted under the foregoing provisions on any petroleum which is the property of Government.

15. Save in cases to which Section 4 of the Act is applicable, the licensing officer may, in his discretion, grant a license for the possession or transport of such quantity of petroleum as he thinks fit.

16. Every license for the possession of petroleum in any premises shall specify the maximum quantity of petroleum which may be stored in those premises.

17. Licenses for the possession of petroleum shall be in force for one year from the date of the grant of the license: Provided that the licensing officer may, at any time, for good and sufficient reason, cancel a license.

18. Licenses granted under these rules shall be in the forms, and shall have endorsed on them the conditions, respectively, prescribed for them in the schedule hereto annexed.

Every such license shall, on the breach of any such condition, be liable to be forfeited.

19. Every application for the renewal of a license for the possession of petroleum shall be made in the same manner as an application for an original license.

Every such application shall be made at a date not less than fifteen days before the date on which the original license expires. The same fee shall be charged for the renewal of a license as for a new license.

4. No smoking, light or fire in any form shall be permitted at any time within such building.

5. If the licensing officer calls on the holder of the license, by a notice in writing, to execute any repairs of the licensed place which may, in the opinion of such officer, be necessary for the safety of the place, the holder of the license shall execute the repairs within such period, not being less than one week from the date of the receipt of the notice, as may be fixed by the notice.

6. The license-holder is prohibited from delivering any quantity of dangerous petroleum exceeding three gallons to any one who has not a license under Section 4 or Section 5 of the Act, or any less quantity of such petroleum, except in accordance with the conditions of the proviso to Section 5 of the Act as to the vessels in which the petroleum must be contained.

The appended report by the Secretary under the Inventions and Designs Act, 1888, on the working of his office during the year ending 31st December 1893.

RESOLUTION.

The arrangement by which the Inventions and Designs office was placed under the superintendence of the officer in charge of the Mathematical Instrument Department of the Survey of India continued in force during the year under review. The distance of the Survey office from the Patents office has always been an objection to this arrangement; but, in the absence of any responsible official at the Secretariat buildings during the summer, the plan adopted was unavoidable. With a view, however, to the greater convenience of the public, advantage has been taken of the appointment of an Imperial officer to the charge of the Imperial Libraries in the Secretariat buildings to arrange for the control of the Patents office from the 1st January 1894 by an official whose duties are conducted under the same roof. The Patents office has accordingly been placed under the management of the Director of Records to the Government of India.

2. The working of Act V of 1888 (the Inventions and Designs Act) during the year, as illustrated by the table of annual statistics, and especially by the figures relating to the continuance of an exclusive privilege, indicates that the public find the protection afforded to Inventions by the Act to be of material value.

3. References to experts have in the year under review been slightly reduced. The question has from time to time been raised as to the extent to which the preliminary examination contemplated by the Act is necessary or desirable. In England and in most European countries it is considered sufficient to advertize applications for exclusive privilege without initiating any investigation of their novelty by the State, whereas in America and Germany a preliminary enquiry is in cases of doubt both permitted and encouraged by the law. The Government of India hold the view that the examination authorized by the Indian enactment is, as a rule, expedient in those cases where the invention is likely to affect (a) industries in which the interests of the more ignorant classes of the population are concerned; (b) State operations (such as the working of railways) undertaken on behalf of the public. Subject to the above considerations, the policy which guides the present administration of the Act contemplates the expeditious disposal of applications for protection under the Act, the curtailment of preliminary investigation, and, in cases in which the interests of those classes of the general community who are unable to protect themselves are not directly concerned, less exigence in demanding enquiry as to novelty than in cases in which public interests require protection.

4. The circumstance that the number of cases referred for opinion on novelty to the Public Works Department has fallen while the number referred to experts on payment of fee has risen is due to the fact that the increasing amount of work thrown upon officers of Government, whose time belongs to the public, was found to interfere with their ordinary duties. The Government of India accordingly resolved that cases connected with mechanical inventions should, when calling for investigation, be in future ordinarily referred to non-official experts and not to officers of the State Departments.

ORDER.—Ordered, that the above Resolution be forwarded to the Legislative Department and to the Local Governments and Administrations noted in the margin.

Report on the working of the office of the Secretary under the Inventions and Designs Act during the year ending 31st December 1893.

The Inventions and Designs office continued under the superintendence of the officer in charge of the Mathematical Instrument Department of the Survey of India during the year under report.

The chief matter of public interest dealt with during the year was a proposal submitted by Her Majesty's Secretary of State for extending to India the benefits of section 103 of the English Patents Act of 1883. The Government of India were willing to amend the Inventions and Designs Act so as to secure the benefits contemplated by the section above quoted, but the proposal had ultimately to be abandoned in consequence of there being no provision in the Indian Act for the registration of trade marks.

The total number of applications filed was in excess of the preceding year by 39, having stood at 375 against 336 in 1892. Of these 261 were granted, 36 refused, and 78 remained pending at the close of the year. One hundred and fifty-six of these applications were referred for the opinion of experts, 61 on payment of fees, and 95 without. The latter included 31 references to the Public Works Department, or 16 less than in the previous year. The majority of these were connected with Railways, and it was decided to refer such cases in future to the Agent, East India Railway, who, on payment, calls in the aid of such officer as may appear to him most competent to give an opinion. The number of applications submitted by persons resident in India was 192, of which 22 were by natives.

Two hundred and fifty-three specifications were filed during the year, being 52 less than the previous year. Twenty-five of these were for matters connected with railways, sixteen for the manufacture of tea, seven for the treatment of cotton and other fibres, five for punkah-pulling machines, five for water lifts, and two for baling presses.

During the year only 37 applications were made for the registration of designs against 89 in 1892. Of these 26 were admitted and 11 rejected, the latter including three applications for the registration of trade marks.

Two cases were referred for the opinion of the Honourable the Advocate General on points of law.

The number of cases in which exclusive privilege was continued was 80, 69 being beyond the fourth year, 10 beyond the fifth, and 1 beyond the eighth year. The number of cases which lapsed through the non-payment of the fourth year's renewal fee stood at 144.

The fees collected showed an increase over the preceding year, the amount having reached Rs. 17,057-2-0 against Rs. 15,352-10-0. Of this amount, Rs. 150 were refunded, leaving a nett total income of Rs. 16,907-2-0. This sum included Rs. 4,300 for the continuance of exclusive privilege, Rs. 335 for extensions of time for payment of renewal fees and filing of specifications, Rs. 343-2-0 for copying of specifications, Rs. 202 for tracing of drawings, and Rs. 82 for the inspection of applications and specifications.

The statement appended gives statistics of the working of the Inventions and Designs office during the year under report as compared with the two previous years.

In exercise of these rights and of the powers conferred by sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act (XXI of 1879), and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to issue the following orders :

- (a) duties of customs on goods imported at the said port or crossing the said frontier into the Sāvāntvādi State shall be levied at the rates prescribed in the Indian Tariff Act (VIII of 1894) as amended for the time being by subsequent enactments ;
- (b) the provisions of the Sea Customs Act (VIII of 1878) and of Act XXIX of 1857 (*an Act to make better provision for the collection of land-customs on certain foreign frontiers of the Presidency of Bombay*), so far as they may be suitable and as amended for the time being by subsequent enactments, are hereby applied to the said port of Bānda and the said Sāvāntvādi-Goa Frontier ;
- (c) for the purpose of facilitating the application of the said Acts VIII of 1878 and XXIX of 1857, any of the Courts of the Political Agency in the Sāvāntvādi State may construe them with such alterations not affecting the substance as may be necessary or proper to adapt them to the matter before the Court ;
- (d) the said Courts shall exercise the powers conferred on Magistrates by the said Acts ;
- (e) the administration of the Sea and Land Customs establishments at the said port and frontier shall be vested in the Collector of Salt-revenue for the time being of the Bombay Presidency, who shall exercise with respect to the said establishments the same powers as he may exercise for the time being in the Bombay Presidency, in subordination to the authorities to whom he may be for the time being subordinate when exercising those powers in the Bombay Presidency.

PUBLIC ORDERS by the COMMISSIONER OF POLICE under the provisions of Section 77 of Act No. XIII of 1856, sanctioned by the Right Honourable the Governor in Council, to regulate the RELIGIOUS PROCESSIONS during the MOHURRAM, and for the PRESERVATION of the PUBLIC PEACE during the Festival of the MOHURRAM.

1st.—No person may erect or carry about a Táboot, Punja or Dholeeka Punja during the ensuing Mohurram, except under the authority of a License from the Commissioner of Police.

2nd.—No person may be a member of any assemblage or procession connected with any Táboot, Punja or Dholeeka Punja, except when License has been granted to carry such Táboot, Punja or Dholeeka Punja.

3rd.—Licenses to carry Táboots, Punjas or Dholeeka Punjas will be granted to Mahomedans only, and all persons obtaining such Licenses must produce them whenever required by any Magistrate or Officer of Police to do so.

4th.—Every such License-holder will be held responsible for the peaceable behaviour of the persons composing any assemblage or procession connected with his Táboot, Punja or Dholeeka Punja, and shall enforce the good behaviour of all such persons, and the above clause shall be deemed to be one of the conditions of the License. In the event of any such persons being guilty of any riotous or disorderly conduct in any such assemblage or procession, the Commissioner of Police may, should he see fit, at once withdraw such License by verbal notification that the same is withdrawn, and all persons composing such assembly or procession, shall immediately disperse and shall not re-assemble or continue to carry about the Táboot, Punja or Dholeeka Punja belonging thereto.

5th.—No music may be played in any of the streets or thoroughfares of Bombay, except under the authority of a License issued by the Commissioner of Police. The Licensee must comply with the terms and conditions of his License.

6th.—No *Mella* or *Swari* processions connected with any Táboot, Punja or Dholeeka Punja shall be permitted to parade any of the streets or thoroughfares after 2 o'clock A.M.

7th.—No procession accompanied by music may parade any of the streets or thoroughfares and no person may join in or be a member of any such procession, except when a License to play music with such procession has been obtained as mentioned in paragraph 5.

N.B.—Licenses to play music in the streets and thoroughfares will only be granted for the 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th days of the Mohurram, and for no other days.

8th.—No persons may go in procession with Táboots on the last night of the Mohurram before 12 o'clock, or continue in procession after 3 o'clock on the following morning, or on the last day before 1 o'clock P.M., on which day the ceremony must be concluded by sunset.

9th.—Two or more Táboots may not proceed abreast on the public road, and when two Táboots meet, each Táboot must keep to the left to make way for the other. On meeting carriages and horsemen, persons accompanying the Táboots, must cease playing music, the Táboots keeping to their left side of the road.

10th.—No procession of the Zool-Junnah or horse through the public streets or roads will be permitted.

11th.—No person may carry a sword, dirk, bludgeon, or other offensive weapon.

12th.—Any persons violating the above rules or behaving in a disorderly manner, or making a disturbance of any kind, will be immediately taken into custody and dealt with according to law.

A'zam Mahadev Ramchandra Potnis having been appointed Magistrate of the Third Class in Bágán Táluka of the Násik District, vide Government Notification No. 4254, dated 20th June 1894, published at page 633 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, Part I, dated 21st idem, is invested with the following additional powers under Schedule IV of the Code of Criminal Procedure :—

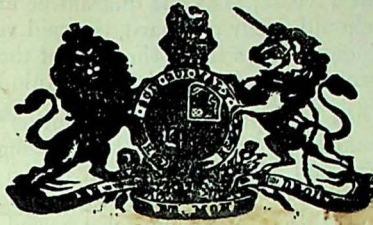
- (1) Power to make order prohibiting repetition of nuisances (Section 143).
- (2) Power to make orders under Section 144.
- (3) Power to hold inquests (Section 174).
- (4) Power to take cognizance of offences upon complaints and upon police reports (Section 191, clauses (a) and (b)).

PART I.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 29th June 1894.

No. 2453.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Plague have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect in the Ports of the Bombay Presidency, including Sind, as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel including buggalows or other native craft arriving at ports in the Bombay Presidency, including Sind, from Hongkong, shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the Port shall go alongside the vessel and ascertain by enquiry from the Commander whether any person on board is suffering, or has during the voyage suffered, from plague, and if the Health Officer is satisfied by such enquiry that no person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague and that the vessel carries a qualified Medical Officer, isolation shall be dispensed with.
- IV.—If the Health Officer shall have reason to believe at the time when the vessel arrives in harbour that any person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague or even if he has no reason to suspect that a case has occurred during the voyage, and that the vessel does not carry a qualified Medical Officer, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by Government and there to remain for a period of eight days from the day of arrival in the harbour; and shall further direct that during such eight days, intercourse between the said vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour shall be prohibited.

- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of plague should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of eight days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule IV.
- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by Government as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of eight days. If a case of plague occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of eight days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.
- VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- IX.—All vessels arriving at Bombay Ports, which may have communicated with vessels coming from Hongkong, shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Bombay Ports from Hongkong.
