No. 2941-S.R.—Whereas it has been found necessary for the prevention of the fraudulent employment of previously used stamps to provide that postage stamps defaced before posting by the impression of rubber or other stamps shall not be recognised by the Post Office in payment of postage,

The Governor General in Council has been pleased to frame the following rule under section 63 of the Indian Post Office Act, 1866, and to direct that it shall be substituted for the rule published in Notification of the Government of India in the Finance and Commerce Department No. 3552,* dated the 16th October 1885, with effect from the 1st day of November 1894:

XLIX. The postage of a letter, newspaper, or other article shall not be deemed to be prepaid by means of a proper stamp—

(a) if the stamp is a stamp which has not been provided for use as a postage stamp under section 36 of the Indian Post Office Act, 1866; or

(b) if the stamp has been obliterated, defaced, torn, cut, or otherwise rendered imperfect; or

(c) if the stamp has upon it any word, letter, figure, or design printed or impressed upon it, otherwise than by the authority of Government, before posting; or

(d) if the stamp has been cut or otherwise separated from an embossed envelope or from a post-card; or

(e) if the stamp is on an embossed envelope, and that envelope is used as a wrapper for a newspaper, or is wholly or partly cut open;

Provided that nothing in this rule is intended to prevent the perforation of postage stamps with initials traced in minute holes.

No. 2453.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Plague have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect in the Ports of the Bombay Presidency, including Sind, as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel including buggalows or other native craft arriving at ports in the Bombay Presidency, including Sind, from Hongkong, shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the Port shall go alongside the vessel and ascertain by enquiry from the Commander whether any person on board is suffering, or has during the voyage suffered, from plague, and if the Health Officer is satisfied by such enquiry that no person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague and that the vessel carries a qualified Medical Officer, isolation shall be dispensed with.
- IV.—If the Health Officer shall have reason to believe at the time when the vessel arrives in harbour that any person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague or even if he has no reason to suspect that a case has occurred during the voyage, and that the vessel does not carry a qualified Medical Officer, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by Government and there to remain for a period of eight days from the day of arrival in the harbour; and shall further direct that during such eight days, intercourse between the said vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour shall be prohibited.
- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of plague should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of eight days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule IV.
- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by Government as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of eight days. If a case of plague occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of eight days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.
- VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- IX.—All vessels arriving at Bombay Ports, which may have communicated with vessels coming from Hongkong, shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Bombay Ports from Hongkong.

ORDER TO THE PUBLIC.

Whereas in former years, on the occasion of festival processions in the streets of the town of Belgaum disturbances of the public peace have occurred, in consequence of assumption by certain of the processionists of masks or disguises offensive to the feelings of persons of other castes; I issue the following orders (under Section 42 of the District Police Act IV of 1890) in view to prevent any such disturbance taking place at the approaching festival of the Mohorum.

(1) * On the occasion of the procession to be held on various days on or about the 9th July to

14th July 1894, both days inclusive, in connection with the Mohorum festival no mummer or person disguised in any way will be permitted to take part in or accompany any such procession, unless he shall have obtained a written pass from the District Superintendent of Police granting him permission so to do.

(2) Again, on the aforesaid dates no such mummer or disguised person shall, without special permission from the District Superintendent of Police, perambulate or appear in the aforesaid streets, unless he takes part in, or accompanies a procession, directions for the conduct of which have been issued by the District Superintendent of Police, except indeed he be on his way to or from any such procession.

(3) Further, no one shall, without permission from the Superintendent of Police, take part in, or accompany such procession, who is armed with a stick or stone or anything whatever that may be used as a weapon of offence.
