Government Notifications, Appointments, &c. NOTIFICATIONS.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 16th July 1894.

No. 4955.—In exercise of the power conferred on him by Section 34 of Bombay Act VI of 1863 (an Act for the regulation of public conveyances, &c.), as amended by Bombay Act V of 1887, the Governor in Council is pleased to extend the provisions of the said Act to the road leading from Sátára to Máhuli in the Sátára District, with effect from the 1st September 1894, and to direct (a) that the duties assigned by the Act to the Commissioner of Police, Bombay, shall be performed by the District Magistrate of Sátára; (b) that all Magistrates of the First or Second Class having jurisdiction over the said road shall exercise the powers conferred by the said Act on Magistrates of Police; and (c) that the balance of license fees, after all necessary contingent expenses shall have been defrayed therefrom, shall from time to time be paid by the District Magistrate into the Treasury to the credit of Government.

No. 4956.—With reference to Government Notification No. 4955, dated the 16th July 1894, extending the provisions of Bombay Act VI of 1863, as amended by Bombay Act V of 1887, to the road leading from Satara to Mahuli, it is hereby notified for general information that the District Magistrate of

Satara as Commissioner of Police has, with the sanction of the Governor in Council, fixed the following rates for the hire of public conveyances on the said road:—

- 1. The open space in front of the Daftar Building.
- 2. The Old Palace.

Subsidiary Rules.

- (1) It shall not be obligatory on any carriage owner or attendant to convey any one or more persons in his conveyance for any fare less than that fixed for the whole conveyance.
- (2) In any case in which a conveyance is called from a stand or from the owner's stable to any place distant more than a quarter of a mile, the driver or owner shall be entitled to charge two annas in addition to the prescribed fare.
- (3) In reckoning the maximum number of passengers, children in arms shall not be counted. Two children not being children in arms but being each under the age of twelve years shall count as one passenger.
- (4) All vehicles should be supplied with two clear burning lights at night time except when there is sufficient moonlight to render such light unnecessary.
- (5) The driver or attendant is entitled to a fare of two annas in addition to the full fare if the hirer detains the carriage for a quarter of an hour beyond the time necessary for the journey.
- (6) The double journey, viz., from Sátára to Máhuli and back, shall not be made more than twice in the 24 hours by the same conveyance without a fresh change of animals.
- (7) The maximum number of passengers and weight of luggage to be carried by and the amount of license fee to be levied on each conveyance shall be as follows:

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 16th July 1894.

No. 2641.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Plague have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, in supersession of those published in Government Notification No. 2453, dated 29th June 1894: they have effect in the Ports of the Bombay Presidency, including Sind, as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel including buggalows or other native craft arriving at ports in the Bombay Presidency, including Sind, from Hongkong, shall, before entering the harbour, hoist a yellow flag (or if entering a port at night time, show whatever quarantine light signals are customary in the port) and indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come, and shall keep such flag and signals flying until permitted to take them down as hereinafter provided. The pilot on going alongside a vessel from Hongkong shall direct the flag prescribed above to be hoisted, if it has not already been done.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, without first having obtained permission as hereinafter provided, allow any communication except orally with the shore or any other vessel or boat, excepting with the boat supplying pilots, and in that case communication shall be limited to receiving on board the pilot, his servant and baggage.
- III.—On any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the Port shall, as soon as possible, go alongside the vessel and ascertain by enquiry from the Commander whether any person on board is suffering, or has during the voyage suffered, from plague, and if the Health Officer is satisfied by such enquiry that no person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, and if the ship carries a qualified Medical Officer, quarantine shall be dispensed with, and pratique granted.
 - If the vessel does not carry a qualified Medical Officer, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified by Government, and there to remain for a period of eight clear days from the date of arrival in the harbour. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour.
- IV.—If the Health Officer, as the result of the enquiry made under paragraph III above, shall have reason to believe at the time when the vessel arrives in the harbour that any person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, and there to remain for a period of fifteen days from the day of arrival in the harbour; and shall further direct that during such fifteen days' intercourse between the said vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour shall be prohibited as provided in Rule III.
- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid any case or cases of plague should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of termination of the last case either by death, recovery or removal from the vessel and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rules III and IV.
- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by Government as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of eight days, or if the vessel has been placed in quarantine for fifteen days, for a period of fifteen days. If a case of plague occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

- VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- IX.—All vessels arriving at Bombay Ports, which may have communicated with vessels coming from Hongkong, shall be subjected to the same rules as vessels arriving at Bombay Ports from Hongkong.

No. 683.—With reference to paragraph 6 of G. G. O. No. 308 of 1894, publishing the regulations for the Indian Army Reserve of officers, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct that every officer of the Indian Army Reserve must notify to the Adjutant-General in India, Army Head Quarters, that he is alive on the 1st January and the 1st July of each year. BY THE COMMISSIONER OF CUSTOMS, SALT, OPIUM AND A'BKA'RI.

No. 3349.—The following rules approved by the Commissioner of A'bkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the A'bkári Act, 1578, for the management of the Central Distillery at Násik and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein are published for general information:—

Rule I.—The Distillery Inspector shall live on the premises throughout the year in the quarters provided for him and shall be responsible for the general management of the distillery and for the efficient sanitation of the premises, and also for the Government trees standing thereon. The Distillery Inspector shall open and close the outer gate of the distillery daily in the presence of the officer in charge of the police guard.

Rule II.—Except upon the written permission of the Huzur Deputy Collector, to whom power to grant the permission has been delegated, the distillery shall not be opened on Sundays, Good Friday, and Christmas Day, New Year's Day, or the Queen's Birthday, for work of any kind except for cleaning the premises and for soaking mhowra only; nor without such permission shall work of any kind be carried on in the distillery on working days before sunrise or after sunset, but the distillery gate may be opened one hour before sunrise for the purpose of kindling the furnace and may remain open for one-fourth of an hour after sunset in order to extinguish the furnace.

Rule III.—In the event of work being done under such permission as above, extra remuneration shall be given to the Distillery Inspector for supervision on the scale sanctioned in Government Resolution No. 6882, dated 29th September 1886 in the Revenue Department, and report should be made to the Collector of each occasion on which such permission is granted.

Rule IV.—The Inspector shall be present on duty at the distillery while the stills are working and while distillation is going on, and he shall be responsible that no spirits are removed from the distillery except under proper authority. In the event of his unavoidable absence from sudden illness or other urgent causes, he should make an immediate report to the Huzúr Deputy Collector, who will make such arrangement as is possible for the temporary conduct of the Inspector's duty, reporting his proceedings to the Collector forthwith. In case of urgency the Huzúr Deputy Collector may grant casual leave to the Distillery Inspector, and shall submit a report to the Collector on each occasion of his having done so.

Rule V.—All liquor drawn during the day shall be tested with the standard Sikes' hydrometer and the strength thereof ascertained and adjusted to the standard prescribed as soon as it is cool and fit for testing. It shall then be removed to the strong room, measured by the brass standard measure supplied by Government, and deposited in the vats there.

Rule VI.—The Distillery Inspector shall forward to the Huzúr Deputy Collector daily a report showing for the preceding day—

(a) opening balance.
(b) liquor drawn.
(c) liquor issued.
(d) balance in stock.

Rule VII .- There shall be two locks to the strong room, the keys of one of which shall be kept by the Inspector, and the other by the Contractor or his agent.

Rule VIII .- To each vat in the strong room shall be affixed a board on which shall be clearly painted -

(1) the serial number of the vat,

(2) its full capacity,(3) date of testing capacity,

(4) strength and quantity of liquor contained in it.

The strong room shall always be kept locked except when it is necessary to open it for the purpose of testing, storing or issuing liquor.

Rule IX.—No combustibles other than liquor shall be allowed to be stored in the strong room, which must not be entered with an open light.

Rule X.—The Distillery Inspector shall be directly responsible for all accounts, for keeping the distillery books and registers correctly written up to date, and for the due performance of all orders issued by the Collector or by the Huzúr Deputy Collector for the management of the distillery.

Rule XI.—Liquor issued under permit should leave the distillery at the same time as the permit.

Rule XII .- As all work has to stop at sunset, the workmen employed in the distillery may be allowed quarter of an hour to clean themselves and leave the premises. The distillery will then be closed in the presence of the Inspector, who, before leaving it, shall see that the store room is duly fastened under his own lock and seal.

Rule XIII.—One dram of liquor may be given to each of the men working at the distillery who may wish it every evening to be drunk on the premises in the presence of the Distillery Inspector.

Rule XIV.—There shall be affixed in front of the distillery a sign-board 4 feet long by 11 feet broad, on which shall be painted in large letters "Government Central Distillery.

Rule XV.—There shall be no admittance to the public to the distillery except on business. Visi-tors may be admitted to see the distillery on permits from the Collector, or from the Huzúr Deputy Collector.

Rule XVI.—The following registers and books shall be kept in the distillery, and shall be filled in daily after the work of distillation is completed:

(1) Material Stock Account...(Form A.).

(2) Stock Account of single

distilled Spirit ... (Form AI).
(3) Account in Form B. (Liquor Stock).

Form C. (Register of Passes). Form D. (Gauge Book). Form E. (Monthly account of (4) (5)

(6) Spirit manufactured and issued).

.(7) A Register of the daily contents of each Vat. Rule XVII .- (a) A Visitors' book shall be kept and produced whenever an Inspecting Officer shall visit the distillery. Copy of such remarks as he may make shall be forwarded at once to the Collector through the Huzur Deputy Collector.

(b) An order book containing such orders as may from time to time be issued by the Collector or by the Huzur Deputy Collector shall also be kept and shown to Inspecting Officers, in order that they may enter in the Visitors' book any suggestions they may have to offer regarding modifications or amplifications of existing orders.

Rule XVIII. -The sentry at the gate shall be regarded as always on duty until he is relieved.

Rule XIX.—The distillery should be carefully inspected at least once in each month by the Huzúr Deputy Collector.
